
### Shakespeare and the Falklands War!

What has Shakespeare to do with the Falklands War? Well, they are both literary events at this year's Festival. On Wednesday, 4th May, cartoonist Will Kevans will talk about his cartoon book, *My Life in Pieces*.

From the Battle of Hastings to the Falklands War, artists have tried to make sense of these conflicts and delivered their own interpretation of events that shaped history.

Will Kevans was brought up in Ceredigion and enlisted in the Welsh Guards as a teenager and suddenly found himself on the way to the Falklands.



Will has turned his passion for drawing into a career and since leaving the army has worked as a cartoonist on such animations as Dennis the Menace and as a designer of video games "For me it was Catharsis", says Will.

Simon Weston, OBE, said "My Life in Pieces" is a brilliant perspective of one man's view of a time ... I have read a number of books on the Falklands over the years and Will's book, I can honestly say, is one of my favourites".

In November, 2014, Prince Harry saw Kevans' artwork at an exhibition at Westminster Abbey



and revealed that "I don't read many books but I love comics". The Prince also said "I might actually read that".

2016 is also the four-hundredth anniversary of the death of William Shakespeare. Fluellen, the professional theatre company based at the Grand Theatre in Swansea, are celebrating the event in a major way. But did William write the plays attributed to him? Many people, from the dramatist Christopher Marlowe to the Earl of Southampton, have it is claimed, written these works. Fluellen have come up with the definitive answer. It was a Welshman called Taffy Shakespeare.

This delightful new play by Francis Hardy, stars Swansea's favourite comedian, Kevin Johns. Kevin is heard regularly on Swansea Sound and appears annually as the dame in the Grand pantomime. He has previously been to Morganstown in Fluellen's hilarious version of The Odd Couple. Don't miss this sidesplitting play.

First and last impressions are the most telling when you go to an amateur show and the RPMG's "Kiss me, Kate" scored highly on both. It's a cold wet night as you step into an uninviting school foyer, but the warmth of the welcome strikes you at once. A bevy of front-of-house staff, immaculate in their evening attire and red carnations are seamlessly organized. You pass smoothly from ticket sales to interval drinks orders, raffle tickets and a very professionally produced programme and finally to the ticket check. They've done this before. Well actually they've even done this show before - in 1999 and tonight there are around a dozen of the original cast on stage.



This year the orchestra has moved from the side to the 'pit' and this is a welcome change. Nineteen enthusiastic players can produce quite a sound, but this is what musicals are all about and they never overcame the company on stage. Indeed, the musical director, Ben Pinnow, had a firm hold on all his forces, conducting with precision and willing his singers through every single word. At his disposal was a find and disciplined young band, with particular strengths in every department.

"Another Op'nin', Another Show" – well, with a suspicion of a couple of "Anotha Rop'nin's" – but this blemish was not a taste of things to come. The chorus got stuck into its words and off we went. Movement around the crowded stage had been impressively

# Connie Fisher to Headline at Festival

The singer / actress Connie Fisher will headline at this year's Radyr and Morganstown Festival.



Connie Fisher shot to stardom in the television series *How Do You Solve a Problem Like Maria* and went on to play the part of Maria in The Sound of Music at the London Palladium and on tour for a period of two years. In 2011 she discovered a problem with her vocal cords which cut short her

singing career but has continued as an actress and presenter. She became a regular as Amanda in *Casualty* and currently introduces series like *Songs of Praise* and *Cardiff Singer of the World*.

Although born in Northern Ireland, Connie is most closely associated with Pembrokeshire and began her professional career at the Torch in Milford Haven.

Each year the Festival Charity organises a concert. This year's charity, Velindre, have organised a concert by the Welsh Pops Quartet and guests, featuring hit songs from your favourite films and musicals from *Hello Dolly* to *Dr. Zhivago*, which will be introduced by Connie. The Welsh Pops Quartet is a new concept in musical entertainment, great music brilliantly performed.

The concert will also feature rising star, singer/songwriter Bronwen Lewis. Bronwen hails from Seven




Sisters and made a considerable impression on the BBC's talent series *The Voice*. Sir Tom Jones was visibly touched when he was not allowed to select her for his "team".

Mathew Warchus, the film and stage director, immediately booked her to take part in his film *PRIDE*. *Pride* tells the unlikely but true story of a Gay and Lesbian group from London who came down to support a group of Welsh Miners during the 1984-5 Miners Strike.

### Shocking Lifesaving Equipment brings Lifesaving changes to the Community of Radyr

Wales leading first aid charity St John Cymru Wales (St John Ambulance in Wales) has joined forces with the Radyr and Morganstown Association, to bring lifesaving equipment to the streets of Radyr. Later this year the first public access Automatic External Defibrillator [AED] will be brought into the area. The AED will be situated outside Radyr Eyecare on Station Road.

Ralph Vaughan from the Radyr and Morganstown Association wrote in a recent article that the "Association had been looking to provide an AED in the village for some time but was concerned about the lack of community CPR training". The Association was therefore delighted when St John re-established their volunteer division in Radyr last November and they immediately agreed to assist with that training.

Every year over 170,000 people die from sudden cardiac arrest in the UK. A cardiac arrest can happen to anyone, anywhere, at any time. A person's chance of survival falls by about 10% for each minute that passes without defibrillation. However, many can be saved if their heart is defibrillated (shocked back into rhythm) with an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). In a non-hospital environment, victims only have a 5% chance of survival but if a trained AED operator can treat the casualty in time, the survival rate can rise to a massive 80%. An AED is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses and treats life threatening cardiac arrhythmias through the application of electrical therapy, allowing the heart to re-establish an effective rhythm.

St John Wales Radyr Division along with other parties, Cardiff West Rotary, Cardiff Lions and the R&M Community Council managed to raise vital funds to purchase an AED.

St John Radyr is now calling on the members of the community of Radyr and Morganstown to learn how to operate the AED by attending a Free Course. Courses will be around 4 hours long but will teach you everything you need to know, from CPR, recovery position, recognising heart attacks, getting to know the AED and using the AED. Participants on the course will be issued with a certificate from St John.

As an organisation St John Wales mission is to have a first aider on every street in Wales by 2017.

### News from Radyr and Morganstown WI

Our speaker for 8th February was Ms. Joan Webster. Joan is a holder of the Queen's Police Medal for distinguished service which she received at Bucking Palace in 1997. She had two careers; one in the WRNS and later, as a police officer where she rose through the ranks to the position of Deputy Chief Constable, prior to retirement. Her talk entitled "A Woman of Substance" was very much enjoyed by members, being both thought provoking and amusing.

On Thursday, 27th February, a group of members visited the National Museum for a guided tour called "Highlights of Art -Impressionists and Modern Art". Our museum's most famous painting is Renoir's "Blue Lady" but it also houses one of Europe's finest collections of impressionist works. The sisters, Gwendoline and Margaret Davies from Mid Wales amassed one of the greatest British art collections of the twentieth century. Together they bequeathed 260 works to the National Museum on their deaths in 1951 and 1963, completely transforming its art collection in character, quality and range.

In spite of the bitterly cold weather, we are, at last enjoying bright spring sunshine and fortunately, it was a beautiful spring day when the annual "St. David's Day walk" of our local link group took place. This actually happened on leap year day – 29th February. Twelve members from Radyr joined members from Treforgan, Tongwynlais and Pontcanna for the walk from the Bay to Morganstown Village Hall. There were "joining spots" along the route for the less fit. Rumour has it that one errant group stopped for coffee in the Secret Garden Café in Bute Park and still made it back in time for the superb lunch provided b Treforgan WI. The soup – home-made leek and potato - was excellent, as always. Participants maintained it

was the best St. David's Day walk so far, no doubt because of the soup and the sunshine!

We are now half way through March and our local primary schools have each held an Eisteddfod on St. David's Day in order to award the WI millennium cups to the winners for creative writing. The winner in Bryn Deri was Chloe Thomas in Year 6 and the cup was won in Radyr Primary by Kayla Brennan, also in Year 6. The winning poems were read out at the March WI meeting on Monday 14th and congratulations conveyed to t6he two young writers.

Our speaker for the March meeting was Lynne Butterworth whose talk was entitled "Forever Living". This was a well illustrated and informative talk on the cultivation, history and uses of the Aloe Vera plant. Its history has shown it is one of the oldest mentioned plants on record and was known to the ancient Chinese and Egyptians due to its medicinal properties. It is the gel contained in the leaves that is used in treating burns, wounds and fever. The Romans cultivated it to use in the treatment of wounds in order to speed recovery. Lynne's talk sent me rushing to "Google" more about it. This is one of the joys of WI - we are always learning something!

Both our Institute and the Glamorgan Federation are planning walks, talks, meals and events for the Spring/Summer seasons. In addition, Radyr Festival will soon be with us. It is our turn to "do the teas", so see you all there!

In February, we welcomed Dr. Ray Tangey of the National Museum of Wales to talk about "Mosses". This is a genus of plants that is worldwide and is one of the earliest surviving plants, being found in fossilised form in many parts of the world. Dr. Tangey discussed the wide-range of habitat in which mosses are found and the many species of the plants. A recent research project and visit to the Falkland Islands was used to illustrate the talk.

Sadly, due to damage caused by the high winds on the day, our speaker had to withdraw at the last minute so our March meeting about Victorian Parks had to be cancelled. However, Rosie James has offered to return and give her talk later in the year.

choreographed and despite the many opportunities for trips and spills there were none.

The musical theatre demands a lot from its players: you need to be able to act, sing, dance ... and not to be short of athleticism and stamina. "Kiss me, Kate" needs the strong leads it had in Mike Gelder's Fred/Petruchio and Lesley Collier-Roberts' Lilli/Katherine. Although their "Wunderbar" didn't quite lilt into its full Viennese swing,



they came well into their stride with Kate's splendid "I Hate Men" and Fred's all too believable "Wivin' it" wealthily in Padua. It also calls for a seductive Lois/Bianca who can shimmy and wiggle beneath a Colgate smile – a role confidently assumed by Sarah Jones with much success. The parts of the gangsters (Dan Collier-Roberts and Andrew Massocchi) are a gift to character actors and it has to be said that with their impeccable timing and glorious facial expressions these two 'seasoned professionals' stole the show more effectively than their counterparts in a recent production at no less an event than the BBC Proms. Their several verses of "Brush Up Your Shakespeare" may have been originally written to cover a scene change, but the audience would

willingly have heard them all again. Bill/Lucentio has perhaps the hardest job in this show3, as his character is less well drawn than the others, but Gareth Hurman gave us what we needed. It would be invidious to pick out anyone from among the smaller parts, save to say that there were one or two voices worthy of greater prominence next year.

The five dancers were a real plus – a splendid set of varied routines, well executed and with their "Too Darned Hot!" a real highlight. As always, the mixed age chorus, in this case the servants, suitors and villagers, threw themselves into their roles with much enthusiasm and some subtle stage business. Bravo!

Off stage we had much to be grateful for: a great deal of work had gone into the design and construction of an ingenious well-lit set which looked and worked well for both indoor and outdoor scenes. Thanks to sterling efforts by wardrobe and make-up everyone appeared "just right" for their part, with a few pretty nifty costume changes along the way.

Leading the production team was the Director, Bev Jones, demonstrating real assurance in her first show as producer and choreographer. Not only that, she was on stage as a member of the aforementioned dance troupe. If she had stepped forward at the end, there is no doubt she would have received a special round of well-deserved applause!

Last impressions: out we went amid a warm babble of conversation from folk who had clearly enjoyed their evening. Who would have thought that such vibrant music was composed by a man who had been permanently confined to a wheelchair by a riding accident! Someone then reminded us that Welsh National Opera will be doing this show next season. It will be different, but will it be more fun?

### CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

### Whole orange cake with mascarpone icing

As an option you can add mixed spice]
A delicious, special and very moist cake
using a whole orange which is boiled
and pureed,

It is important to use a thin-skinned orange

1 small thin-skinned orange 275g (9³/4oz) SR flour 2 tspn baking powder 250g (9oz) caster sugar

275g (9<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>oz) soft margarine or butter

4 medium eggs

1 tspn cinnamon

1 tspn mixed spice (both optional)

Heat oven 180C/350F/Gas 4

Grease and line 2 x 20cm (8") sandwich tins
Place whole orange in small pan and cover with water
Boil for 30 minutes and leave to cool
Cut in half and remove pips

Place in a processor, blend until medium-chunky

Transfer to a bowl

Reserve 3 tbs for icing

Place all cake ingredients in processor Blend until just smooth (do not overbeat)

Remove blade

Stir in orange pulp

Divide between tins and bake for 30/35 minutes

Should be golden and slightly shrinking from sides

Cook and peel off paper

For icing:

50g (1<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> oz) softened butter 175g (6oz) sieved icing sugar 250g (9oz) full fat mascarpone cheese 2 tbs orange pulp (reserved from above)

Place butter in bowl

Use hand mixer to gradually add icing sugar

Add mascarpone and beat until smooth Add orange pulp, mix until smooth Cut each cake into two

Divide icing between each layer Finish with a layer on top You could decorate with candied orange rind

### Roald Dahl and Radyr

2016 is the centenary of Roald Dahl's birth and it will be celebrated all over the UK. Several of the R & M Festival events will be connected with him.

Roald Dahl was born on the 13th September 2016 in Villa Marie, Llandaff, to Harald Dahl a wealthy ships chandler and docksman and his wife Magdalene. They soon needed a larger house and they moved to Ty Mynydd in Radyr, a house that the young Roald remembered in *Boy* as large with turrets, a farm, pigsties, chicken pens, a cowman a ploughman and two gardeners.

It was while they lived at Ty Mynydd that Roald's eldest sister died of appendicitis followed a few weeks later by his father Harald. They are buried in the parish Church of Radyr, St. John's, now part of Danescourt. His indomitable mother moved the family to a smaller and easier to run house, Cumberland Lodge, now part of Howells School in Llandaff


It was in Llandaff that he started school, first at the local dame school, Elm Tree House and then at the Cathedral School, at that time on the Cathedral Green.

Most of the sites associates with Roald's

childhood have blue plaques including Mrs Pratchett's sweet shop which is the site of one of his most memorable pranks.

The Radyr and Morganstown Community Council will be unveiling a blue plaque on Ty Mynydd Lodge, next to the Scout Hut, during the May Festival. Ty Mynydd itself was demolished in the 1960's to make way for Maes yr Awel. Here are some of the events taking place.

- 1. **Sat. 30th April.** Festival Parade, 11.30 onwards at the Old Church Rooms. Local children will dress up as characters from some of Dahl's stories.
- 2. **Sun 1st May**. Festival Walk. Meet at St. John's Church Danescourt at 2.30. We will walk the sites in Radyr and Llandaff associated with Roald. Free.
- 3. The Junk Challenge.
  Individuals and organisations in Radyr and Morganstown are asked to create sculptures out of recyclable material on a Dahl theme, all over Radyr and Morganstown. On view throughout the Festival. Collect a map in the Library.
- 4. The Magical Mr. Dahl. An evening of music associated with Roald Dahl presented by the RPMG. Saturday 7th May, Morganstown Village Hall at 7.30. Tickets £10, concessions £8.
