Emergency Blankets for Rough Sleepers

I didn't think of this myself, but I had decided that giving money to homeless people I saw in town was not what I wanted to do. I don't have much for a start, living on a government pension, but also I had been generous one time, a while ago and given a tenner to a homeless man. I then met a friend on the street and we were chatting, then out of the corner of my eye I saw him going into the corner shop and come out again with a load of alcohol. So I made a decision to give food and vitamin drinks from then on. Which I have kept up for

I have also given away coupons that I have received, giving you money off take-away food. From time to time, we get them on our bus tickets now.

Giving out Emergency Blankets was the idea of Stephen Paul Rimmington, a Facebook friend. And I do wish I had found out about this before. Gloves and socks are also appreciated - Stephen's idea again, but I am focussing on 'silver blankets' for now. I have found them online for less than 50p each if I buy ten at a time and so far I have bought 70. They are packed up really small when new and it is easy to keep a few in your bag or pocket. I have given them to people in Cardiff, Newport and Bristol so far. A few I have given to other people to give out. I was worried people wouldn't know what they

were – this small silver square! But everyone knew what they were and they have been very appreciated. Even in warmer weather, they can mean that you do not lose heat sitting on the cold pavement. Only one drunk outside Tesco refused one!

I also have made sandwiches and given them out from time to time. As these were home-made they were appreciated, but cereal bars are not so well received! If you buy food for homeless people, it is best to make sure it is hot food, with a hot drink, if possible. I also wanted to say, as so many people report that they feel invisible when sitting on the street. I am guilty of "not looking" when I have nothing to offer and for me it is a mixture of being embarrassed that I can't help and feeling guilty that the society I am part of is not looking after all the people. I don't know how to smile and be friendly while I am feeling like this. So I really understand how people would feel invisible.

Last year I sadly lost my grandfather to Alzheimer's Disease after a difficult struggle and I decided, along with my brother and my partner, that I wanted to do something to commemorate him and raise money to help others suffering with dementia.

We decided, in keeping with the theme of memory walks, that we would set ourselves the challenge of walking the length of the Taff Trail (58 miles) over two days (17th-18th June) and would fundraise with the daunting target of £10,000. So far we have raised over £2,000. and are edging closer to our target every week.

So far we have walked 117 miles in preparation, with the longest distance so far being 24 miles and we quickly realised just how much of a challenge we have set ourselves up for! Ice baths and leg massages have been the regular post-walk treatment, along with plenty of compeed patches! However, I am confident that all the hard work will pay off and we will complete the challenge, finishing with a celebratory meal in Cardiff Bay.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

TOMATO, SOFT CHEESE AND SESAME TART

A tart packed with flavour and good to serve with salad on a warm Summer day.

Serves 2.

 $^{1/2}$ x 375g pack of ready rolled puff pastry

2 tbs sesame seeds

200g (7oz) Brie or other soft cheese

300g (10oz) cherry tomatoes on the vine

For pesto – 1 bunch flat leaf parsley 1 tbs small capers Handful olives Olive oil

Heat oven 200C/Gas 8
Lay pastry on baking parchment
Sprinkle with sesame seeds
Roll to half original thickness
Trim edges to make a neat

Using sharp knife, score border around edge about 2cm (1") being careful not to cut all the way through the pastry

Lift pastry (on parchment) on to baking sheet

Bake for 4-5 minutes

rectangle

Slice Brie finely and lay on top of pastry not on border

Arrange tomatoes on top

Bake approx 7 minutes until browned and crisp

Chop parsley finely, chop olives and place in mortar with capers Add good glug olive oil, season,

stir well and taste

Drizzle pesto over tart when it is cooked

Serve immediately

Blood Brothers

For their spring production the Radyr Drama Society presented the play version of Willy Russell's Blood Brothers, now more often seen in its musical version. The musical version seems to have been playing in the west end or on tour for the last quarter century and it was refreshing to see Willy Russell's original idea for the piece.

This was an excellent production by Mike Gelder, with some interesting innovations, like using the narrator as some of the smaller parts, which gave unity to the piece. He succeeded in bringing out a great deal of comedy in what is in essence, a tragic tale.

The play revolves around Mrs. Johnson who with a large family already, discovers that she is pregnant with twins soon after her husband leaves her. She decides to give one of the twin boys to the wealthy, childless lady for whom she cleans. Although the twins know each other and become "blood brothers", they never discover their real relationship until it is too late.



The twins and their friend Linda have to age from seven to their late thirties and the three actors taking these parts totally succeeded in this. Peter Griffiths and Mark Sadler as the twins and Helen Blundell as Linda, all actors in their thirties or forties, succeeded particularly well as their younger selves.

It was more difficult for Bev Jones and Lesley Collier-Roberts to age as the two mothers and this is my one criticism of what were two excellent performances. There were some strong performances in the smaller parts, Alex Brent as the narrator and Jane Sinclair as the Policewoman.

Once again an excellent set by Raymond Rivron was well lit by Dave Burgess, with sound by Tony Watson and costumes by Sandra Geen and Nora Starkey.

It was particularly pleasing to see Morganstown Village Hall so full for the three nights, with a sell out performance on the Saturday. It just shows that a well chosen play, known to the audience, can still pack them in.





Festival Arts...

Once again the Arts were well represented in this year's Festival. The two Friday lunch time concerts in the Methodist Church – such a delightful venue for these events – were particularly pleasing.

Greek harpsichordist, **Despina Homatidou**, succeeded in bringing out the full range of colour in her Flemish style instrument. She concentrated on the battle between the English composers, Purcell and Gibbons, and their French counterparts, Couperin, Balbastre and Duphly. A delightful innovation to the Festival.



By comparison the visit by the Wales International Academy of Voice, was their fourth or fifth. The audience keep saying that the concerts get better from year to year and this is perhaps true. This year's concert was full of operatic fireworks from Granada and the Student Prince to Juliet's love song by Gounod and



from Nessum Dorma to the drinking duet from La Traviata, Libiamo.

Bath based soprano Chloe Morgan and Indian tenor Sharmul Sharma are fully rounded performers needing only a sprinkling of luck to catapult them into the first rank of their profession. Interestingly Sharmul started life as a heavy metal singer and this shows in the power of his voice. We look forward to seeing if next year's visit is "even better".

The excellent Swansea based professional theatre company Fluellen brought a new play with music, "The Other Jolson", based on the life of Larry Parks who played Al Jolson in two films about the legendary singer whose voice was the first to be heard in the "talkies". Parks was nominated for an Oscar for his performance in them. It was clear that Jolson didn't like Parks and wanted to play himself in the films.

Remembering Sensei Bernard Harding (6th Dan)



Sensei Bernard Harding (6th Dan) was a highly-skilled martial artist and an experienced practitioner of Kendo, Karate and Aikido. He studied Aikido for over 40 years and was a long-time friend and student to Sensei's Nobuyoshi Tamura and Pierre Chassang.

Bernard founded Aikido Gakko Ueshiba in 1981. After a couple of moves around the city, the club came to settle in Morganstown Village Hall in 1998 and has been teaching there ever since. Bernard's influence on Aikido across the UK was profound and, for a time, he served as the Technical Director for the National Aikido Federation, Bernard had a deep love for Japan and always pursued excellence in the club. The dedication to his students was only matched by his enjoyment for a pint of Guinness in the Ty Nant after training.

On Saturday 11th March 2017, Aikido Gakko Ueshiba held a Memorial Course in tribute to Bernard. The event was held at the National Sports Centre in Sophia Gardens. We invited seven instructors who had either trained and been taught by Bernard to teach on the day. Turnout was fantastic and we had representation from clubs across South Wales and as far away as Barrow In Furness,



Chichester and Bristol. More importantly, the raised over £1200 for the Marie Curie Cancer charity.
