

The three Wise Men will be riding their camels in to the heart of the city's shopping centre this Christmas, as Cardiff gets set

to pioneer a dramatic event, the first of its kind in the UK. Called Christmas - The Story, it's a nativity play - and more - which will be performed every day, throughout the day, from December 1-18. Forget tea towels and cute angels, this production will be a visual feast performed by adults and which aims to become as essential to every family's Christmas as a trip to Santa's grotto.

In future years Christmas - The Story will become a tradition, an annual event in towns and cities across the UK

The project was inspired by a shocking survey which showed that there was a woeful lack of knowledge of the nativity story among young people in the 18-24 age group, with 36 per cent of those interviewed not knowing Jesus was born in Bethlehem.

Now the mainstream churches of Cardiff, backed by the charity the Bible Society, have got together to fund and produce a 20-minute nativity play to bring back the Christmas story for new and future generations. English and Welshlanguage versions of the play will be performed inside Tabernacl Church on the Hayes, with market stalls and street entertainers adding to the fun outside

Christmas - The Story is the brainchild of Sally Humble-Jackson, a Cardiff church-goer, who in the past has worked both in theatre and as a writer.

"We think it's important that the nativity story is restored to our collective consciousness, and that a new generation does not grow up in ignorance - in the interests of social cohesion, if nothing else. Because we have the involvement of a major charity, it is planned that Christmas - The Story, piloted in Cardiff this year, will be replicated in town centres across Britain next year and into the future.

"The entire project is run by volunteers giving up their time and offering their services and areas of expertise for free. Obviously there will be certain materials, services and skills we will need to buy in, but these we anticipate being funded by the members of the Churches of Cardiff as a gift to the people of Cardiff. It will require a huge number of volunteers to serve as actors, technicians, stewards and so on but that in itself is an opportunity for a variety of disparate communities to work together for a common goal."



The Husky dog was witnessed leaving the field with blood over its face.

The sheep suffered a very severe attack on its leg and udder area which were severely damaged. The sheep had to undergo medical attention as a result of its severe injuries and was also extremely traumatised.

CARDIFF WEST ROTARY CLUB

Cardiff West Rotary Club is based at Radyr Golf Club and is the first club to be formed in the Cardiff area since 1997.

Friends of one of our newest members, 32 year-old Catherina, reacted in amazement when she told them that she had joined the Rotary Club. Their comments varied from "You're too young to join Rotary", "Only men join Rotary", "It's a lunch time 'men only club'" and they even thought it was a secret society!

So, WHAT IS ROTARY and WHAT DO THEY DO?

It's an organisation with 1.2 million people, both MEN and WOMEN of ages, in 33,000 clubs worldwide. Members volunteers who meet regularly for Fun, Fellowship and Fundraising. Cardiff West Rotary Club meets on a Tuesday evening at Radyr Golf Club and is looking to encourage new members especially young people! Our meeting takes the form of a meal (Fun & Fellowship) followed by a speaker, often from local charities. This gives us an insight into what is going on around us, which we probably wouldn't know. Another night we have a 'business meeting' to discuss and plan our own charitable work, which may be one of the charities spoken who has to (Fundraising), then afterwards back to the Fun and Fellowship.

In the first six months since the club was formed, in order for us to raise money for various projects (Fundraising), to date we have had a 'Fun Quiz' for members, family and friends which raised £788. and a collection at Asda for the Pakistan Disaster Appeal which raised \$800. We are also supporting Dyfrig House for which we have collected a number of bags of useful items for them, Cardiff Women's Aid for which we will be collecting toys and toiletries for Christmas. members agreed to sell raffle tickets for the Rotary Disabled Sports, which takes place annually

and last but not least, we've also helped with collection for the Danybryn Home in Radyr.

Some events we are planning are as varied as a sponsored walking over ;hot coals', a 'Poems and Pints' night, a Choral and Brass Band Concert and a Fun Quiz evening.

So, for a 'young' newly formed club we've done quite well so far.

Internationally, we support many projects in all parts of the world especially the ʻthird countries. We do this in many wavs. There is a Rotary Doctor Bank which sends a doctor [volunteer] for a month at a time to benefit from the skills they have to offer. Recently, a doctor from Cardiff went to a hospital in Uganda. We also provide help with health, sanitation, water aid, education and job training and help combat hunger. We have adopted minefields, supplied cows for families and also helped greatly with the world-wide project to eradicate polio by an immunisation

programme which, hopefully, is nearing its successful conclusion. Unfortunately, space doesn't allow the room to list the numerous other projects Rotary has worldwide.

The redevelopment project at Danybryn Cheshire Home is now in its final phase. The second extension to the main house has been constructed and refurbishment of the existing building is well underway.

All of the new rooms benefit from ensuite facilities and are modern, light and airy. With the help of funds raised from the community and elsewhere, we have been able to install infrared sensors to bedroom doors which mean they can be operated by remote control. This feature will enable our residents to live more independently.

It is anticipated that residents will be moving into their new rooms in early January. When everyone is happily settled in, demolition of the old bedroom wing will take place. This last piece of work is this phase will be to upgrade some of the external features e.g. lighting and to provide a 'woodland walk' to the lovely gardens at the rear of the house. The gardens had previously been inaccessible to our residents; creation of the new path means they will be able to enjoy this area during the warmer months.

Thanks to Pugh's Garden Centre, we have also been able to create a brand new garden for the two storey extension which opened at the start of this year. Pugh's kindly donated a large number of fabulous plants and also the time and expertise of Lyn Davies, one of their garden designers. Once these plants are established, this area will be another asset to Danybryn.

The contractors should finally be leaving the site in late February 2011, leaving behind a much enhanced environment in which to live and work.

We enjoyed two very different talks in October and November. Firstly. Richard Arnold, with a talk entitled "Really Welsh Daffodils" gave an insight into the range of products produced and marketed by the "Really Welsh" company. It started with the daffodil; being the national flower of Wales why not grow, package and market them from Wales. The company has since then expanded into a wider range of vegetables and is looking for further expansion of its activities, with the ethos that if it is grown or produced in Wales, it should be processed, packaged and marketed from Wales.

Richard Arnold was followed in November by Linda Nottage with a talk entitled "Fascinating Fungi". Although she professed not to be an expert on Fungi, the talk showed her wide knowledge, fascination and enthusiasm for what is one of the largest classes of plant. We were shown slides and examples of a number of varieties and were amazed at the range of shapes, sizes and colours of fungi occurring in the UK. Included was a group of twenty or so different fungi photographed in the fields behind Morganstown a few days before the talk. Although a number of mushrooms are edible it takes an expert to identify these, so unless you know what you are doing the advice is to stick to the supermarket! The evening ended with Linda Nottage identifying and discussing samples that members had brought to the meeting.



The local community has recently felt the immense loss of one of its much loved students, family member and friend. The passing of William Rhodri Owen has undoubtedly shaken the lives of everyone who knew him and knew of him and it will continue to affect those who loved him and cherish his memory forever more. Known by his friends and relations as doting big brother, gym addict and owner of an infectious smile, there is no question that the hole that has been left in his place will never be filled.

The extent of the number of people's lives that he touched was made clear by the staggering number of tributes left for him and the mass congregation that gathered on Tuesday, 26th October at Christchurch in Radyr to pay their last respects.

Close friend and loyal companion, Rhys Vaughan, has had this to say of Rhod and the effect that he had on so many people's lives:

"The loss of a fellow student has been traumatic for all students at Radyr Comprehensive School. To his close friends it has been the saddest time of our lives. Rhodri was an outgoing person who took part in many sports, such as tennis and always took part in activities during school, such as sports day. He was a friend who you could always confide in and he will be greatly missed. I still half expect to come in to school and see his cheeky smile, or see him playing football at lunch or him asking me to go to the gym where he spent most of his time. Throughout Radyr Comprehensive School I can honestly say Rhodri never picked on anyone and was a friendly lad, who was very competitive from a young age when we played pool at lunchtime and out of school, he just couldn't resist gloating if be won and if he didn't, then he wouldn't accept it".

Lost but never forgotten, Rhod will continue to be present in many people's lives.

Would you like to help get faster Broadband in Radyr and Morganstown and possibly get £5,000? of computer equipment for a local community project?

At present, Broadband speeds in our community depend on our distance from the exchange; the further away means slower, the new BT system in effect pushes the exchange closer to our homes into the green street cabinets, meaning that Broadband speed will depend on our distance to the cabinet not the exchange. A person I know has just jumped from a 2meg connection to 38meg - nineteen times faster. This is what we could help our community achieve.

As we all know the Broadband situation in Radyr and Morganstown is a rather mixed bag. Our exchange is classified by OFCOM as "Market 1" which means we have BT Wholesale as the sole provider of Broadband services. There is some Virgin cable available in certain parts of the community, but it's limited and they have no plans to expand.

Given our exchange is a small one (2,254 lines), BT have no incentive to improve our Broadband provision any time soon unless we give them When ADSL (the current standard Broadband) was introduced, BT targeted the largest exchanges first: these also tend to be the exchanges with the most competition from other Broadband providers. After they selected the large exchanges they were faced with the dilemma of which order to do the smaller exchanges in, so they allowed people to register an interest in receiving Broadband. They used this information to draw up the plans for ADSL roll out. Over the next five years, BT is rolling out superfast optic Broadband across the UK in a similar fashion to the original ADSL roll out.

BT has announced it is to launch a nationwide survey to see how much potential demand there is for fibre Broadband. The survey will run until 31st December, 2010 enabling communities to express their desire for the service. This will help BT identify "hot spots" where demand is

high and influence the company's future deployment plans.

As an extra incentive, BT is running the survey as a competition - the "Race to Infinity" - with BT Retail promising funds - if needed - to enable the five exchanges with the highest demand by early 2010 at the latest. This could see commercially viable exchanges brought forward to the front of the queue or non-viable exchanges added to the deployment plans. BT is also pledging to engage with any community that expresses a high level of demand so that all avenues can be explored to see if fibre Broadband can be brought to their area.

BT Group is also pledging to engage with any community that gathers 75% of possible votes for their exchange but hasn't won the competition. This is in the hope that those exchanges can either be included in future commercial phases – if the exchange is deemed commercially viable – or enabled as a result of either public sector or community support as has already happened in some parts of the UK.

We are not on the announced roll-out plan. The Race to Infinity gives our community the opportunity to fast track our area into getting BT Infinity next.

The five areas with the largest percentage of votes by 31st December, 2010 will win the chance to bring superfast Broadband to their area. BT will also donate £5,000, of computer equipment to a local community project. At the time of writing we have 85 votes out of 2,254 which is 3.77% of the after campaign exchange а consisting of a poster in the Library and a few helpful shops. We can do a lot better.

UPDATE FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

New Sports Pitch: I am delighted to announce that £400K has been approved to construct a floodlit all-weather hockey and soccer pitch at Radyr Comprehensive School. We hope to commence construction in May 2011 with completion in September of that year. Of course, this is a tight timetable, but I will report progress to interested parties. It is planned that this will be available for community use in evenings and at weekends.

School Reorganisation Plan: This does not propose any change to Radyr Comprehensive and this will be a relief to pupils, parents and staff. Considerable work has been done on the school roofs and new boilers have been installed.

Boundary Commission: The draft report intended that Radyr and Morganstown for council elections would be part of a three member ward called Pentyrch and including Radyr, Morganstown, Penrych, Gwaelod and Creigiau. The final report envisages us being linked Tongwynlais in a two member ward called Radyr and Tongwynlais. I believe that best quality of care comes from a single member ward which elects a local resident as its councillor, but I recognise that R+M, with nearly 5000 electors, is far bigger than the guideline of about 3200 electors per councillor. I shall not object to the plan unless urged to do so by local people, as I believe that the new plan is less damaging than the original plan to which I submitted an objection. To become effective, the Welsh Assembly has to approve it and the May 2012 Council Election may be run on this basis.

Used Batteries: These are pernicious if sent to landfill but they will be properly recycled if deposited in the bin at Radyr Library. This new facility has come partly as a result of dogged campaigning by the joint editors of Radyr Chain.

I will take up any issues you raise with me and advise you of the agreed outcome. I report major ward issues on a monthly basis to leaders of R+MCC, PACT and R+M Association and I attend meetings of these bodies where I am open to personal enquiries. We were a little startled to find that our first contribution to Radyr Chain for some time was inadvertently omitted from the last edition of Radyr Chain. However, we have forgiven the Editors and hope that many of you will have read the article anyway on the R&M Website or will have received it directly as Association members. Just in case this is not the case, this article does duplicate some of the previous material.

2010 has, as ever, been a busy year. Not only did we run another successful May Festival (our 22nd), which generated £4,000. for Ty Hafan but, we ended it by establishing a new framework (together with the Community Council and the Station Road shopkeepers) for Christmas celebrations. [Please note we are brave in writing this. Deadlines mean we have to put things on paper which have not yet happened. We do hope it went well and that everyone enjoyed it!]. The Festival and Christmas celebrations are at the heart of what the Association does – making R&M a great place to live and assisting all the local organisations to be successful and prosper.

We have worked hard on our Village Plan projects, producing the booklet 'What is there to do in R&M?' which went to every house in our community R&M (and is on website, www.radyr.org.uk). We will keep that document up-to-date on the website so you can download new versions whenever you want. We have also produced a new very full 'Welcome Pack' that will be distributed to new residents via the Neighbourhood Watch network and also be held in the library in Park Road. We would be interested in having feedback from any new resident who has received the pack. Was it Were there any critical omissions from your point of view? We can only improve things if you tell us!

Another VP project which is just getting underway is to provide assistance (where required) to all the many R&M organisations in making them more successful. We are aware that a number of our organisations are flagging in a similar way – ageing members and too few 'new recruits' from people who have recently moved here (notably in the new estates). It is sad to see an ageing and dwindling membership of some organisations and even sadder to hear new residents say either that 'there is nothing to do' or they 'didn't know a

group existed'. So do get involved – and even tell us if you think something needs changing or creating.

We successfully applied for a grant from Cardiff Council for the replacement of the windows in the main (Garth) Room and also the front door of the Old Church Rooms. We found that the windows taken out were the original ones, fitted in 1880, so they have lasted well. But the new ones will make the room much less draughty and more comfortable. They will also save money on heating bills.

At our AGM in April, we were delighted to make George Carroll the first winner of the annual 'Garry Newbould Award', which recognises young people who have demonstrated leadership and commitment in enhancing community life. All too often the young people in our Community are criticised for bad behaviour, or 'upsetting the residents'. We do not think that all youngsters are saints, but the vast majority are hard working, polite and talented. We should rejoice in that. We are still trying to form a youth branch of the Association (let us know if you are interested).

Don't forget that we are going to change the format of our regular public meetings. We do not meet often - just four times a year, including the AGM and we have a stalwart number of followers who come to them. We would like to see a much greater attendance and so, from 14th February, the date of the next meeting (put it in your diary now); each meeting will feature a guest speaker on a topic of relevance to our community. In February, Dr. Chris Partridge (Cardiff Tidy Towns Officer) will talk about 'Keeping R&M Tidy', which we know is an issue with many people. Do come along.

Finally, the R&M Executive would like to take this opportunity of wishing everyone a very happy forthcoming Festive Season and a successful New Year.

The weather summary - by John Trenchard

It appears that several forecasts for this coming winter have already been published, but they offer different kinds of winter weather for us. The trouble is that seasonal forecasting is still a very young science with teething problems. But the oceans do give tantalising clues to future weather because they change temperature slowly over months.

For this coming winter, one of the big factors is La Nina when the tropical seas of the Pacific turn cooler. This La Nina event could turn out to be the biggest on record and its impact might be strong enough to influence the winter over the British Isles. Another huge influence on our winter is the Atlantic Ocean. Depending on which parts of the Atlantic are cooler or warmer, the British Isles can have vastly different kinds of weather.

Cardiff's winds during October at 0900 showed a marked contrast with only five days from SW or W but twelve days from N or NE, whilst the first thirteen days of November have seen seven days from the W. However, by the 14th November there were already signs that the Atlantic weather systems were once again weakening and that easterly winds may well return to the British Isles within a week or so, bringing much less rain to most regions in contrast to this November, when Cardiff recorded rainfall on each of the first thirteen days. (A rainfall day is for the 24 hours up to 0900GMT when 0.2 millimetres or more is measured). Last October's rainfall in Cardiff was 104.5mm (74%).

Since July 2009, there have been only three months with above average rainfall. This year's rainfall to 31st October has seen 800.2mm (979%) compared with 951.9mm (94%) for last year. For Cardiff's temperatures, the average of the day maximum and the night air minimum has been 11.2C (-0.7C) this year, compared with 11.9C (0.0C) for last year.

RADYR & MORGANSTOWN COMMUNITY COUNCIL VILLAGE PLAN PROJECTS UPDATE



When the Village Plan was published earlier this year, we undertook to update you at intervals on the progress of the various projects listed in the plan. Work has now started on many of them and a few have already been completed. Here is what has been done.

A booklet publicising what there is to do in Radyr and Morganstown has been printed and circulated to all households. This was in response to residents who said in the Village Plan Questionnaire that they did not know what was available.

A newcomers' Welcome Pack has been developed and the final contents are currently being agreed. This will give a lot of useful information to new members of our growing community.

We are about to start work on one of the bigger projects, the Gap Analysis of Radyr and Morganstown. With this we will consider all the facilities we have and compare this with what we think a community our size should have. We will be looking at community planning guidelines from both Cardiff Council and the Assembly.

The Radyr and Morganstown Association (RMA) is running a project to support local leisure groups and will be contacting them all to see what help, if any, they would like.

An initial meeting on the future of the Mound Field has been held, organised by County Councillor Rod McKerlich.

The Webteam have redesigned the website and have been working hard to encourage all local groups to create web pages and have a presence online. They have checked and updated the online contacts.

The Community Council organised an environmental community event in Pentwyn Park and over sixty residents attended. Bird and bat boxes were built by local children and adults to be sited in their gardens or in Pentwyn Park. Six hundred Welsh daffodils were planted in four beds and a wild flower area was sown. Boules pitches are now planned for the park, to be built by the Twinning Association, the RMA and the Community Council. These will be in place for the May Festival 2011 for both adult and school competitions and we hope this will be the start of a well-used facility.

A Friends of Danybryn Woods group has been set up with around twelve members. They have been meeting every two weeks throughout the summer and have cleared large areas of bramble and planted some 150 Welsh daffodils. The pathway along the top of the wood has been kept a little more open and the weeds on either side of the main path scythed. In December, there will be coppicing of hazel and removal of seedling ash and sycamore.

A cycle and walking route from Radyr

Sidings to Hailey Park is being built and it will create a new circular route as well as new access to the Taff Trail. It is being paid for by community gain money from the developers of the Sidings.

The future of the community plot at the Sidings is still unknown. A lot of work is being done by local groups to try to secure it for us all.

The Community Council and RMA have been working with the Police to increase attendance at PACT meetings. In a project run by the local Police, a survey of local residents looked at major issues and the results were published. The report is available on the PACT page of the website.

A Youth PACT has met for the first time in R+M and youth involvement in the 2010 May Festival went well. There will again be a large number of events for young people in May 2011.

On road safety, yellow lines have been painted on the corner of Kings Road and Kings Avenue following representation from both the County Councillor and R&MCC. They make this dangerous junction a little safer. Yellow lines have also been painted on the lower end of Station Road to stop parking down to the station.

The International Business Park plans at J33 of the M4 have now been withdrawn so there is now nothing to do on this unless new plans are submitted.

The RMA are now working more closely with local shopkeepers. A result of this is a Christmas Lighting event based around Windsor Gardens and Station Road, planned for 2nd December and jointly organized by the RMA, shopkeepers and R&MCC. This year the Community Council will give a third large Christmas tree sited on

the community plot at the Sidings as well as those in Morganstown and Windsor Gardens.

The project to install hanging baskets on Station Road is well on the way to completion and we can look forward to next summer's flowers.

Both the Community Council and RMA will be supporting our County Councillor on the new library project in Park Road. This will be a major enhancement to our community.

R&MCC tried to have the Village Plan adopted as Supplementary Planning Guidance but have found that no one area of Cardiff can have its own SPG. However, we will be submitting our Village Plan as part of the evidence used in the production of Cardiff's Local Development Plan. We will use that consultation to highlight important local issues such as housing, traffic and public transport.

I hope you can see from this long and diverse list how much work has been done by man people. We have made progress on many of the projects, others are starting and some have yet to begin. We knew there would be a range of timescales for completion of projects, but I am heartened by the progress we have seen in such a short time and look forward to giving more details in future.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has, or is, working on any of the projects.

HEDGES

We like hedges and autumn/early winter is a good time to cut them back, if necessary. The aim is not to obstruct the pavement or the highway or the view of drivers and if you want to consult the law, it is the Highways Act, 1980 Section 154.

Readers with hedges/trees on their boundary with the highway are asked to look at what they have got. Clearance to the road needs to be 16ft or more for overhanging trees. For hedges overhanging a pavement, a clearance of 6ft to the pavement is a minimum so that pedestrians can walk past without interference and they must not extend to the road at this low height. The associated pictures show good and bad examples.

House occupiers are obviously in the best position to cut back hedges themselves, or to arrange for it to be done by a professional, without recourse to the heavy hand of the law. However, Cardiff City Council will take action against persistent offenders – but well before such action is initiated neighbours should really talk about the problem with the occupier.
