The second half of our 2010-11 meetings programme came to an end on Wednesday, 13th April. Prior to this, in January, February and March we had enjoyed three differing illustrated talks on Growing Cacti, Dyffryn Gardens and Veddw House Garden. Tony Jukes illustrated the main categories of Cacti and explained Succulents and the conditions required to grow these and ways in which they can be propagated. The talks in February and March discussed and illustrated the development of two very different gardens. Dyffryn Gardens is familiar to many of us and the Gardening Club has closely followed the restoration which has taken place

over recent years. We were pleased therefore to hear of the plans for the next stage of development. Veddw House Garden at Devauden near Chepstow is probably less familiar. This is a garden that has been developed by Anne Wareham and her husband, Charles Hawes, over the last twenty or so years. The talk outlined the thoughts behind each of the individual elements of the garden and was illustrated with a number of photographs many of which were taken by Charles Hawes, who is a professional garden photographer, known through his photographs for "Gardens of Wales".

Our programme came to an end in April with the AGM, followed by an illustrated talk by Mary Gillham. Mary Gillham, who is known to many of us through her books on local flora and contributions to Radyr Chain, is a botanist who has studied plant life in many parts of the world

and gave the club a fascinating talk on Australian plants illustrated with many excellent slides. At the AGM, Jane Parry stepped down as Chairman, a position she has held for the last few years and our thanks go to her for the work she has put in during this time.

Finally, thanks go to all those who donated plans and those who helped man the Plant Stand at the Festival Fete.

MAY 2011 REPORT

Radyr Library Project: For several months we have been seeking agreement on the best basis of replacing the existing library with a new one on the Park Road site. It is now decided that a refurbished and extended library will be developed towards the end of 2011or in early 2012. There will be a display in the existing library but we attach a front view and plan of the proposed new library; it is envisaged that, in addition to creating more space, the new refurbishment will be well fitted-out to a high specification and it will be able to serve our communities effectively for many years and will give the staff much improved working conditions.

Building work will take about 6 months with probable completion in June to August of 2012; during this time when the library is closed we will hope to provide a mobile library combined with assistance to visit other local branch libraries where help is required.

Clearly this is not a major rebuild and it proved impossible to persuade the ruling coalition of Cardiff Council to fund a rebuild despite the efforts of your County Councillor, Community Council and R+M Association who worked together on your behalf. Indeed, even to secure this much needed new facility, it was necessary to relinguish the "community land" at the sidings. Taylor Wimpey, the main developer, insisted on their legal rights and refused to respect the spirit of the original agreement which allowed them to build and sell so many homes in the area.

We believe that residents will admire and enjoy this updated library and we look forward to seeing it completed as soon as possible

PS: since writing this I have seen the article written jointly by R+MCC and R+MA. They point out that this scheme has stalled since 2004 but I was only elected in 2008 and considerable progress has been made since then. I regret that the capital funding provided by Cardiff Council has reduced and I lobbied at all levels for reinstatement; I also pressed Taylor Wimpey in 2008 to agree a change in the wording of the agreement for community land and no other local representatives(including R+MCC and R+MA) had thought to do this. The wording was clear and it was obvious to

me in 2008 that the land might be lost. I do not exonerate Taylor Wimpey from blame; they built and sold a large number of houses and have reneged on the land offered in exchange; legally their position is sound but morally it is reprehensible.

In conclusion, I suggest that we should look forward and celebrate a refurbished, extended library built on a site our community selected.

Each month I post a newsletter which gives a balanced account of my dealings with Cardiff Council on behalf of our communities. It is on the R+M website but I will gladly send an individual copy to anyone who requests this

All-Weather Pitch: All necessary funds (nearly £500K) are in place and I await an up-to-date plan for completing the installation.

Local Development Plan: I cannot emphasise too strongly the risk that some 4000 houses may be built at the southern end of Heol Isaf. There is a meeting in Radyr Comp at 6pm on Monday, 6th June when the process will be explained; questions may be asked and the means of raising objections will be set out.

Drysgol Road and Bryn Derwen: The poor areas of roadway have been resurfaced which will please the innumerable residents who raised this with me.

Disused Railway Bridge and Footpaths between Sidings and Llandaff: The cost of repairing the bridge is estimated at £250K, but the funds to do this are nearly in place and we will go out to tender soon. I have applied for a special grant to resurface several paths in the area and early indications are hopeful. This will give access to Llandaff by foot or cycle to Sidings residents but it will also create

an excellent circular walk linking with the Taff Trail near Hailey Park. I have drawings which I will share with anyone who asks. The total project cost will come close to £500K if we do all the planned areas.

Bryn Deri and Radyr Primary: Bryn Deri will have a major staffroom extension and Radyr Primary has had constructed a number of outdoor teaching areas. The approximate cost is £130K and this follows £100K of projects completed last year using planning gain funds.

Malfunctioning Speed Indicator Sign: The only suggestion have received is to relocate this further north between Bryn Derwen and Morganstown on Heol Isaf to slow traffic going north towards Morganstown.

Boot Camp: People will have noticed signs advertising this to take place at Mound Field. I investigated this at the request of Radyr Rangers and found that it was completely unauthorised and the signs are fly posted.

Gullies: Recent heavy rain has made it evident that we have a number of blocked gullies which I have reported.

Radyr Festival: Sue and I have attended a large number of Festival events which have been well organised and most enjoyable. This reflects great credit on many people but David Cargill and Allan Cook in particular. I hope that Good Neighbours profited to a substantial extent.

Grass Cutting of Cardiff Council owned land in our Ward: I am seeing a senior officer to arrange a sensible basis for R+MCC to take over some grass cutting from the Council.

RADYR LIBRARY

We now know the future of the library in Park Road. In the April 2010 edition of Radyr Chain (available on line on the Radyr website www.radyr.org.uk) we reported that Cardiff Council had £600,000 in its capital budget which would be added to £400,000 planning gain (from the Sidings development) to finance a brand new and much bigger library. We asked you where the library should be built and you chose to have it remain in Park Road. We have effectively been waiting (not passively) to have plans approved. At a meeting on 9th May in County Hall we were eventually told what would be happening.

Cardiff Council have decided to refurbish the current library and not to build a new one. In essence, Cardiff Council have reallocated their capital budget for our library; what little money there is in Cardiff's overall library budget is to be spread thinly across a number of Cardiff communities. The planning gain money now stands at £457,000 and we have been fortunate in also gaining a Welsh Assembly Government grant of £120,000, which requires Cardiff Council to provide match funding of £12,000. Cardiff say that this £12,000 will be their minimum contribution but with £589,000 to spend, we find it hard to imagine that they will need to contribute more.

You might think that £589,000 would buy quite a sizeable building but such are the costs estimated by Cardiff Council that the proposal is only to refurbish the existing building and provide a new extension and entrance. Due to the provision of (agreed to be necessary) back room areas, the actual public space in the library will grow by about 17m2. The building will be gutted and will be refitted to what will undoubtedly be a high standard. We have been promised involvement with the planning of that There is no promise of extending the opening hours, although these will be reviewed. The library will be closed for approximately six months with a possible opening date of August 2012. A mobile library may be provided on alternate Fridays with Tongwynlais, although visits may be possible to sheltered housing.

We place on record our severe disappointment with this outcome. For many years, Radyr & Morganstown residents had been promised a new and bigger library for our increasing population. This was implicit in the

'Section 106' agreement signed in 2002 which designated the Community Plot in Radyr Sidings as the potential site. Although our community has grown significantly, Cardiff tell us now that our library is of sufficient size.

We did contemplate challenging this decision but timescales are against us. Deliberations by Cardiff Council have taken so long that, unless the current proposal is accepted, we risk losing all because both the Planning Gain and WAG monies will expire in 2012.

So, reluctantly, we have agreed in principle (we suggested some minor amendments) to the plans put forward by Cardiff Council. The refurbished library will undoubtedly be better than the present one, and we delight in that fact. But Radyr & Morganstown, who contribute vast sums to Cardiff Council via the Council Tax, find yet again that we get little back. We have also lost the Community Plot on Radyr Sidings, which Cardiff Council are returning to the developer. We had hoped that that area would have been the heart of the Sidings community but it will soon be covered with more houses. We do not blame Taylor Wimpey for the loss of that plot; they could have been more generous but they have acted as would any business. However, we do feel that the community of Radyr & Morganstown has been badly let down by Cardiff Council in view of the reallocation of the library budget and the loss of the Community Plot. We would have thought that Cardiff would have been able to renegotiate the planning gain agreement once they knew the plot would not be used for a new Library or Health Centre. Surely we deserve better than this.

I am delighted to be able to tell you that the Community Council has agreed to buy part of Radyr Woods from Plymouth Estate. While most of the area we call Radyr Woods is owned by Cardiff Council, about a quarter of it (mostly the steeply wooded section) was

owned by the Estate and had been leased to R&MCC for twenty five years. When the lease expired, we had hoped that Cardiff Council would buy the land so that this much-valued part of our community was under one ownership. However, Cardiff did not want to take on the woodland. The Radyr Woods Wardens had considered buying the land but the legal and insurance implications became too complex and expensive. So the next best way of protecting the land for the long term was for the Community Council to buy it. Fortunately, we have agreed to purchase the woodland for the nominal sum of £100.00 and hope to complete the legal process shortly.

The Radyr Woods Wardens celebrate 25 years of maintaining Radyr Woods in 2011 and during that time they have transformed it from an over-grown and neglected area into the lovely mix of open meadow and woodland that we see today. The paths, steps and boardwalks have all been put in and maintained by the Wardens using several thousands pounds of grants they have raised alongside annual support from R&MCC. If we could add up the thousands of voluntary hours they have given to the community it would be an impressive number. The community certainly owes them a debt of gratitude and we will be celebrating their achievement later this year.

Cardiff's Local Development Plan proposes significant growth for the coming decades; how much new housing that will lead to is yet to be determined. The Community Council is active on your behalf in responding to all the consultation phases of this lengthy process: the final document should be adopted in 2014 if all goes smoothly. It is possible, perhaps likely, that the fields either side of the Llantrisant Road and the land at at Gelynis Farm will be developed. Cardiff's website gives considerable detail and I am always to happy to answer questions, where I can.

The weather summary - by John Trenchard

The rainfall shortage in the last two months of March and April over much of Britain has amounted to 75-125mm (3 to 6 inches), so a good deal of more rain is necessary before we can say that the drought is properly over.

The rainfall of March and April over England an Wales was exceptionally low, amounting to 39mm (1.54 inches) which is just a quarter of the normal amount. It was the driest March/April – indeed it was the driest pair of calendar months at any time of the year – since 1938.

April rainfall in Cardiff was 24.4mm (25.4mm = one inch). However, since 1990, it was drier in 2007 with only 21.3mm, whilst the combined March and April totals came to 54.3mm. Since 1990 the driest any two months was 68.7mm in March and April in 1990. Rainfall this year to 30th April has only been 321.9mm 80%.

So far this May to the 15th, Cardiff's rainfall has been 37.2mm. Reliable rainfall records over the British Isles only go back to 1860. Then George Symons with a great interest in the weather, produced the first edition of the book "British Rainfall", which contained the records from 168 observers. By the time of Symons's death in 1900 the network of observers had risen to 3500 in just forty years. Up to 1860 the rainfall records showed there was lack of uniformity in instrumentation, the siting of rain gauges and in the observational practice.

No doubt you noticed the rapid growth during April in the garden and allotments due to the 4C above average temperature. The daytime maximum temperature was 17.3C ps4.5C, whilst the night time minimum air temperature was 9.3C ps3.4C. However, in 2007 taking the average of the daytime maximum and night time minimum air temperature it was 4.7C above the average. April sunshine was 310.2 hours (136%) this year but 237.6 hours (154%) in 2007.



I was good friends with someone for several years but a few months ago we began to bicker about trivial things every time we met and then eventually we had a full blown argument. Whilst I think I've accepted that the friendship is over, I get angry thinking about some of the things she had said to me during that time. I also keep worrying that I am going to bump into her as we both live locally. It's beginning to affect my enjoyment of just popping to the shops.

I do sympathise. Friendships can be very precious and it can hurt when any relationship ends. However, it sounds as though you are still using your time and energy going over old ground and also thinking in a negative way about 'What if' ... you see her again. Perhaps you could change the scenario so when you picture yourself seeing her, imagine smiling, saying Hello and walking on. If you are a relatively assertive person, you may want to consider arranging to meet her and just talking about how you feel and also giving her the chance to tell you how she feels. If you already believe the friendship is over, then you have little to lose by trying to at least clear the air. Alternatively you may want to write her a letter, which you don't have to send, but at least by expressing some of the hurt and the tensions that you are still experiencing, you may be able to start to let go of these feelings. A technique which some clients find helpful is just to remember all the things that you enjoyed about the friendship and all the good qualities that you saw in her when you were friends. You then may be able to finally remember her with kindness and let go of the anger that you are still carrying. Your body doesn't know the difference between a thought and reality so by thinking pleasant thoughts you may at least have a better day!

I always considered myself to be a confident person, but recently I have found it increasingly difficult to make a decision and I find myself dithering about the slightest thing. It's getting to the stage where I dread thinking about booking a holiday or buying new clothes as I know that I won't be able to decide what I want.

Every day we are bombarded with messages about what to wear, what to eat and what the 'In' colour is for this season's fashions. It's hardly surprising that we question our own ability to make a decision any more! In fact, it's even been given a label - FOMO – Fear of Missing Out. Any decision you make means that you are closing the door on your options. Years ago, most of our options were restricted by little choice and limited budgets. Nowadays some people are experiencing the

stress of too much choice and have lost touch with what they actually want. You may want to try reframing your decisions so that they are for 'this time' only. For example, write down three holiday destinations and three options for the type of holiday you might like - perhaps sight-seeing, or relaxing, or an activity holiday. Tick your preferred choice for 'This Time' and only look at three web sites or Tourism companies to find one that is good enough. There are no guarantees for a perfect holiday (or perfect food, perfect outfit ...) yet we always learn something from our experiences. As you begin to feel more comfortable accepting a decision for 'this time' and allowing the outcome to be 'good enough', you will begin to experience more pleasure in your choices, rather than focusing on the options that you didn't choose. CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

RHUBARB AND GINGER BEER JELLIES

Refreshing, delicious and interesting – serves 6

1lb (450g) rhubarb

1 heaped teaspn. freshly grated ginger

2oz (50g) golden caster sugar

1 (135g) pack orange jelly

2 (275g) bottles Fentimans ginger beer

1 (200ml) tub crème fraiche Few pieces preserved ginger

Wash and chop rhubarb.

Place in medium pan with sugar and fresh ginger

Cover and cook over low heat

until poached and soft – 10-15 minutes

Allow to cool.

Break jelly into cubes and place into microwaveable measuring jug

Add 3 Tbs. water – heat on full power for one minute

When jelly has dissolved make up to 18fl oz (510ml) with ginger beer

Combine liquid mixture with cooked rhubarb

and pour into six glasses

Place in fridge to set

Top each one with spoon of crème fraiche

And a little chopped ginger

He sang at the opening concert at the Wales Millennium Centre and received the inaugural Sir Geraint Evans Award from the Welsh Music Guild, given to a person or persons who have made a significant contribution to Welsh music.

His programme will include Purcell songs, some of George Butterworth's settings of A.E. Housman's *The Shropshire Lad*, some rarely heard settings of Welsh folk songs by Haydn and arias from three of Mozart's great operas, *Don Giovanni*, *The Marriage of Figaro* and *The Magic Flute*.



At both the Academy and the Guildhall he won every prize and award available for piano accompaniment and has since been appointed an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music. MURDER HE WROTE

This year's literary event moves from the world of poetry to the world of murder. Professor Bernard Knight is best known for his medieval mysteries featuring "Crowner John", but more recently he has started on a new series based in the Wye Valley. Still technically historical, the series is based in 1955.

Forensic pathologist Dr. Richard Pryor uses his 'golden handshake' from Singapore to return to Wales to set up in private practice. The story, based partly on the author's own past experience, carries the stamp of authenticity, as well as capturing the atmosphere of the fifties, when Britain was recovering from the effects of the Second World War.

After nearly fifty year's as a writer, Professor Knight is still amazingly prolific. In 2010 he produced both a Crowner John and a Richard Prior novel. He is the second longest-serving member of the Crime Writer's Association and was for a number of years one of the judges for their Silver Dagger Award.

In another life he is both a doctor and a barrister. He was one of the Home Office's most senior pathologists and he has been involved in hundreds of homicide cases, for both prosecution and defence, including Fred and Rosemary West, Mary Bell and Vatican banker Roberto Calvi.

It will be interesting to know why someone who must have been so abreast with current developments in forensic medicine, decided to write of periods before such scientific evidence existed.

Professor Knight will speak at the Old Church Rooms at 8pm on Thursday, 12th May. Tickets £5., £4. concessions, £2. students from the Festival Box Office.
