

Radyr Cricket Club Official Opening of New All Weather Net Facility

On the 4th June, Radyr Cricket Club officially opened their new all weather outdoor net facility.

The new facility has allowed the club to provide practice opportunities equal to any in South Wales to all the junior and senior players during what has been a particularly wet summer so far.

The Club was awarded a substantial grant towards the cost of a three bay synthetic practice facility by the England and Wales Cricket Board. This grant along with support from Cardiff City Council and various Corporate Sponsors was added to funds raised through a host of fund raising events by the members and has enabled the club to fund the cost of £65000 in its entirety.

Peter Walker MBE, (Ex Glamorgan & England cricketer) cut the ribbon in the presence of Glamorgan Cricketers Graham Wagg and Aneuirin Norman as well as invited guests from the local Community, Cricket administrators, Sponsors and many of the club's members, parents and friends.

Youth players from the age of 7 to 15 showed off their skills to the guests under the close supervision of the Clubs Coaching team. Afterwards the

entire club celebrated with a food and drink in the sun.

The club provides cricket for four senior teams and over 150 junior cricketers embracing 10 junior teams and a girls team.

Peter Hybart, the Director of Cricket Wales, who supporting Radyr in their application for the ECB grant said "I was delighted that the Club was awarded the grant because they have an outstanding cricket development programme and they have worked hard to promote cricket in the local school and the community generally. Cricket Wales recommended the Club

because Radyr Cricket Club have enthusiastically embraced all the ECB development policies and the facility is key to further development of cricket in that locality."

Bruce Cruse, the ECB's National Funding and Facilities Manager said, "Investing in worthy projects like this one allows cricket clubs to make their facilities as welcoming and accessible as possible to members, players and spectators. Having high quality cricket facilities accessible to the community will be key to sustaining participation in grass roots cricket over the coming years".






THE DIAMOND JUBILEE PROM

RADYR LAWN TENNIS CLUB SET FOR BRIGHT FUTURE

Jonathan Davies has hailed Radyr Lawn Tennis Club after they unveiled a host of new facilities.

The investment into the club is the biggest in Welsh sport in sixteen years and will now offer year-round access at one of Cardiff's biggest outdoor clubs.

Upgrades to the facility include three artificial turf courts with parameter fencing, seven sets of floodlighting, modernisation of the clubhouse and a new bar.

The work was made possible thanks to a £99,000. loan from the Law Tennis Association (LTA) and a further £99,000. grant from the sport's governing body, while the club contributed £130,760. towards the £418,426. total.

And the rugby legend is eager to come and try out the new facilities. He said "It's a fantastic facility that the club now has and with my daughter having tennis lessons here as well, I think it will encourage not only me but plenty of other people in the Radyr community to join and play tennis at the club for years to come".

LTA Councillor Steve Clarke added "The significant financial support that the LTA have been able to provide Radyr LTC along with other partners, will enable to club to offer more all-year-round tennis and will no doubt contribute greatly to the increase participation".

To celebrate the occasion the club put on a free taster day with numerous matches being played on the new courts. The day's finale saw some of the club officers play an exhibition match with old white balls and wooden rackets.

Despite intermittent rain the new allweather courts allowed members to continue playing throughout.

The LTA makes financial support available through its resources and ensures investments will deliver the maximum return for British tennis through more people playing and across Britain. There will be an increase in the number and standard of facilities nationwide which will be available to the whole community at a reasonable, affordable cost.

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RADYR LIBRARY RE-OPENS!

After an eight month wait, the new extended and refurbished library opened to the public again on 23rd June. 278 people visited the library on opening day and enjoyed looking around and borrowing books. Representatives from some local organisations were on hand to talk about their work and tea, coffee and some of Anne's famous Welsh cakes were served to visitors.

So what has changed? The library is bigger, brighter and looks much more contemporary. The most popular comment was "How much more specious it looks". We now have a community area, a totally redesigned and restocked children's library, a great teenage corner and attractive seating areas for adults to sit and read or browse the newspapers. The reading house in the children's library has become a great favourite. Wi-fi access, a photocopier and an extra public pc have also been provided. For the first time we have an accessible public toilet with baby changing facilities.

We are still providing free internet access, newspapers, talking books, DVD hire and, of course, lots of books. You can also collect your recycling, food waste and dog waste bags from the library. The library is very much a "work in progress" and so there will be more changes in the coming weeks and months. We are expecting more new books, particularly adult stock and we will be having a scanner installed. We will also be finding out what sort of activities you want in the library and then trying to put those in place.

The big event happening now is the national summer reading challenge. Children enrol on this scheme and read six books across the summer holidays. This year's challenge is called the Story Lab and involves three levels – Bronze, Silver and, you've guessed it, Gold. Those who read six books receive a medal and a certificate. We are hoping that more children than ever before will join the Story Lab and make 2012 a summer of reading in Radyr.

If you are not already a member of Cardiff Libraries and would like to join, just come to the library with some form of identity, for example a driving licence, bill or bank card and we can enrol you straight away.

Jubilee Report from front cover

At this early stage events suggested were: -

- An Audio Visual night on HM The Queen's life at the Old Church Rooms
- A 50's fete on Mound Field;
- An animal blessing at Ty Gwyn farm
- People to share a Big Lunch at local street parties
- Sports events
- A dance and band competition
- A concert over two days at Parc Radur
- A children's party at Morganstown Hall

The original plans for Parc Radur were to put a marquee and feature Radyr Comprehensive youth orchestra, bands and groups on the Monday afternoon. The evening events were to include local Brass Band, Jazz & Pop Groups, classical music by students of the Royal Welsh College of Music & Drama (RWCMD) followed by the lighting of the beacon accompanied by fireworks. On the Tuesday we hoped to arrange for our local primary school children to perform "Peter and the Wolf" with the RWCMD.

There were lots of meetings before Christmas particularly about the concert. The proposed venue belonging to Cardiff County Council required special permissions, various acts needed to be confirmed, as well as the involvement of all local schools and the orchestra of RWCMD. The logistics of putting on such a large scale event were both expensive and mind-blowing...bearing in mind the limited access to Parc Radur and the safety and security concerns.

Then came the disappointments! The schools were on half-term during the Jubilee period and it was not feasible for them to be involved with staff living out of the area or away on holiday. We wondered if we would have a concert at all.

Thankfully a few days before Christmas I was approached by Dave Cargill (Treasurer of the Golf Club & RMA Committee Member) who suggested that the Golf Club may want to get involved and would I go and meet the Club captains, committee and manager?

The boundaries of putting on a free out door concert at the Golf club were not for the faint-hearted as the Golf Club would be operating as normal on the day with just the practice area closed. Also the area had to be cleared by 9 a.m. the following morning as there was a Ladies' match! From the offset we proposed to invite members of the public to "bring a picnic" to the event.

Now relocated at the Golf Club we sought and received their agreement to continue this policy alongside their commercial refreshments sales.

As we were now planning for this beautiful setting, we realised our Jubilee Concert would benefit greatly from a professional stage with lighting and amplification systems. We knew this would be expensive. The breakthrough came when the clerk to the RMCC (Helena Fox) managed to secure a very healthy grant of £4,750 from the "Big Lottery Awards for All Wales". Smaller donations were also received from The Blakemore Foundation (Spar). Pugh's Nursery (towards the Children's party) and a donation from the Lower Machen Festival for promoting their event. Finally, the trustees of the Millennium Lottery Advisory Committee agreed to the balance remaining in their account to help fund any events.

The other huge contribution came from Claire Barnett leader of the Radyr Youth Club. She with the aid of her team signed up and managed all the youth events including bands, singers and dancers for the Prom's afternoon session. If this wasn't enough she also signed up tribute singer Suzannah Jayne for our evening performance and with her team helped steward the event

Jubilee Events: -

Friday 1st June. An Audio Visual evening given by Mick Sullivan and Harry West showcasing events and people spanning 60 years in Radyr. After a short interval we watched a presentation of The Queen's Coronation which was fascinating. The evening was well attended and very well received. It was obviously a great deal of work for Mick & Harry who managed to select appropriate music for all aspects of a very successful evening.

Saturday 2nd June. Under grey skies there was an Animal Blessing at Ty Gwyn farm hosted by Val Allen, with the blessing given by the Reverend Keiron Webster. Unfortunately there were only a few animals to be blessed. Even so Keiron (although allergic to many of the animals) carried on admirably and each animal was blessed with their owners then receiving a very colourful rosette.

Amidst the soggy wet summer of 2012, our Institute has been a ray of light in the gloom as a varied programme of events has taken place.

On the 30th May (a rare hot sunny day) seven of us attended the National AGM in the iconic Albert Hall. During the day, WI members voted to launch a campaign to invest in the training and employment of midwives in order to tackle chronic staff shortages. We also heard from guest speakers Maggie Aderin-Pocock, a space scientist and from Downton Abbey's creator, Julian Fellowes. He revealed that some of his feistiest female characters were inspired by the strong women with whom he grew up.

After lunch a challenge was undertaken to promote the work of craft groups. Silence fell on the Albert Hall as more than 3,000 WI members prepared to break the world record for the greatest number of people knitting together in one location for fifteen minutes. Photographs and video footage of the event will be submitted to the Guinness Book of World Records for assessment. It was a varied and inspiring day though, as always, the stirring singing of Jerusalem and the anthems was the most memorable.

June proved a very busy month. At our monthly meeting, one of our members, Sue Duffield, gave us a very informative, superbly illustrated talk on her work at The Physic Garden in Cowbridge. We hope to arrange a group visit there some time in the early Autumn.

As many of you realise R&M WI is about for more than our regular monthly meetings, important and enjoyable though they are. A very special event took place on Thursday, 14th June in Christ Church School Rooms. The Vintage Tea Party, in honour of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, was organised down to the finest detail by our President and Committee Members and specially invited were served delicious traditional afternoon tea by pretty waitresses to the accompaniment of piano music played by David Thompson (Llandaff Cathedral organist and music teacher at Howell's School). The atmosphere was gentle and sophisticated and then three hunky builders walked in! Had the Committee lost the plot and arranged some alternative form of entertainment? However, their presence was quickly explained. They were representatives of ISG Construction, the firm involved in the refurbishment of Radyr Library. Each participating Institute has to walk/swim a total of at least 209 miles from April to July, 2012. This is the distance from the first British WI village to North Wales to London. Several of our members are so fit that they could do this with ease but the big

challenge is that every member has to take part, regardless of how challenged they are. The upshot of this is that everyone is involved even if they are covering short distances. Over the last few weeks, members have taken part in a guided walk around the quarry, a golf course walk, the Glamorgan Federation walk and a Treasure Trail walk around Cardiff Bay (this was a link group event). Thanks must go to our Secretary, Gaynor Leaf, who has the onerous task of recording and compiling a journal of everyone's efforts.

July has now arrived and like the schools, we approach the end of term. Our July meeting took place on 9th July when we were entertained by peter Gowan who read an eclectic selection of his own poetry which covered many themes, some rather surprising. Sufficient to say that he obviously didn't regard the WI as a stuffy organisation.

PIRACY

This article, taken from The Southampton Master Mariners, is reproduce in Radyr Chain in an attempt to bring attention to the dangers being faced and not reported by merchant seamen on a daily basis. The activities of the Somali pirates are occasionally mentioned in the national press, but piracy is also commonplace in other parts of the world e.g. West Africa and the China Sea.

One wonders whether the world would be as sanguine if such treatment was being meted out to several hundred passengers from a jumbo jet or cruise liner.

Another Iceberg

Since the advent of 2012 many people in the western world have been obsessed very understandably - with an iceberg and the loss of the White Star liner "Titanic" a century ago on 15th April, 1912. The story is legendary - a huge liner on her maiden voyage steaming too fast through a dark ocean where icebergs had been reported, the inevitable collision and the huge loss of life due to the lack of lifeboats. In many cities throughout the United Kingdom people lost loved ones and none more than the port city of Southampton where the casualty list of crew members was in excess of 500. The centenary of her loss was honoured throughout the country and many acts of bravery and sacrifice were recounted with pride and sorrow by the relatives of those who perished.

Undoubtedly, the ship will never be forgotten and the numerous plaques and memorials detailing the names of many of the crew members will be visited on the anniversary of her loss – and people will remember with pride the part played by loved ones so many years ago.

Today, as the recent memories of that huge ship start to fade perhaps we should give thought to another much smaller ship - a relatively tiny roll on-roll off cargo vessel called "Iceberg 1" launched more than 35 years ago and owner by a small company in Dubai. On 29th March, 2010, the ship was on passage to the port of Jebel Ali with a cargo of cement, building materials and equipment. She had a multi-national crew of 24 comprising 8 Yemenis, 7 Indians, 4 Ghanaians, 2 Pakistanis, 2 Sudanese and a Filipino and although she was steaming in waters known to be frequented by pirates she was not in the recommended Transit Corridor where



she might have enjoyed some form of protection. Again, the inevitable happened and when she was approaching the port of Aden, in darkness, the pirates attacked and the ship was taken.

Under extreme duress the Captain was instructed to proceed to an anchorage off the Somali port of Hobyo and once there, the pirates sent their ransom demand to the owners in Dubai.

The entire crew of 24 was then incarcerated in a forward cargo compartment less than five square metres in floor area and in December 2011 some 21 months since the ship was captured - the Master, Captain Ali Saleh smuggled a message to a French news agency saving that they were existing on one meal of boiled rice daily and drinking unclean water. All of them are suffering physically and mentally. Unconfirmed reports say that six Indian crew members were released when their relatives in India managed to raise an adequate ransom payment but the owners of "Iceberg 1" in Dubai have gone into liquidation and there is no money available to meet the ransom demand. Recently, one man managed to escape from his tiny prison and committed suicide by jumping into the water.

Those of us who have plied the trade routes of the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean find it almost unbelievable that in 2010, a small cargo vessel en route some ten miles off the busy port of Aden could be boarded and captured by a gang of ransom-seeking desperadoes but unfortunately, it has happened several times since then. Another ship, the "Asphalt Venture" was captured in a similar manner and although her owners paid the ransom demand and the vessel was released, her captors retained about fifteen of her crew – and demanded a further ransom.

Today, insofar as is unknown, some nine ships and more than 236 merchant seamen are being held captive. Many of the seamen have been brutalised and others have been murdered. Reports from their homelands suggest that when those held captive are released and repatriated, they have been so damaged mentally and physically that many will never work again and little, if any, support is forthcoming from their erstwhile employers.

It would be untrue to say that today, nothing is being done to ensure the safety of vessels transiting the vast area of ocean threatened by these criminal activities, but it would not be untrue to suggest that it is a case of "Too Little, Too Late" and procrastination at all levels has allowed the malefactors far too much operational freedom – and little fear of the consequences in the unlikely event of their being apprehended.

Most worrying is the plight of the hostages – more than 236 innocent merchant seafarers endeavouring to enjoy their right of innocent passage on the trade routes of the world.

It is now more than two long years since "Iceberg 1" and her multinational crew fell into the hands of the Somali gangsters but their plight – and that of their fellow captives – goes unrecognised by the vast majority of people, many of whom recently sat with bowed heads and sombre thoughts as we relived the horrors of "Titanic" ... and that, earlier iceberg.

The Radyr Primary School Nature Trail and Conservation Area were opened on Saturday, 25th May by past pupil Rhodri Morgan as part of our annual family barbecue. To reflect the importance of the Olympic Games, the children passed an Olympic Torch along the Nature Trail to Mr. Morgan who lit the ceremonial camp fire flame. Families then enjoyed their barbecue whilst being entertained by the school rock bands who performed hits from the Black Eyed Peas, Jesse J and Bruno Mars.

The school's Parent Teacher Association (PTA) have worked hard throughout the year raising funds through a variety of fundraising events such as a Sports Evening hosted by rugby stars Jonathan Davies, Tom Shanklin and Ieuan Evans, a Rock Evening hosted by the headteacher's band, a Christmas Fete, Football Event, Family Disco, Halloween Homebake and Toy Sale, all of which helped us raise our target of £10,000. The children have planted a range of produce from runner beans through to strawberries and Mr. Thomas is currently finalising our 'Pop Bottle Greenhouse' (bottles donated by pupils and parents) which will provide further opportunities for pupils to develop their 'green fingers'. It is hoped that this work, along with the ongoing efforts of our eco and school council (who recently accompanied BBC Television's Iolo Williams to Radyr Weir to help launch Welsh Water's 'See It, Report It, Stop It' campaign) will stand us in good stead for assessment towards Green Flag Status in the coming school year.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

FISH PIE

A delicious main course – serve with green vegetables. If you plan to freeze, omit the eggs. Serves 6

900g/2lb baking or old potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks 150ml/¹/4 pint single cream 55g/2oz butter plus extra to grease dish

Salt and pepper Pinch grated nutmeg

225g/8oz skinless, boneless haddock fillet

450/1lb salmon cut from tail piece (thinner), skinless and boneless Good pinch mixed herbs or teaspoon freshly chopped dill

Juice ¹/₂ lemon 2 large eggs

For the parsley sauce 60g/2oz butter Large bunch parsley, finely chopped 30g/1oz plain flour 570ml/1 pint milk Salt and pepper

Cook potatoes in boiling salted water Gently lower eggs into pan and cook for 8 minutes

Remove eggs and cool quickly in cold water

Test potatoes. When soft, drain well and mash

Add cream, butter, salt, pepper and nutmeg

Taste and set aside

For the sauce, heat butter in pan, add parsley

Cook gently for five minutes Add flour, stir and cook for few minutes Gradually add milk, stirring well Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer for five minutes

Taste and add seasoning.

Pre-heat oven 200C/400F/Gas 6
Butter a deep ovenproof dish
Cut salmon and haddock into bite sized pieces and lay in dish
Squeeze over lemon juice and sprinkle over herbs
Pour hot sauce over the top
Shell and quarter eggs, push into sauce
Spoon over mashed potatoes

Spoon over mashed potatoes
Bake 35 minutes until top is brown
Serve at once

Apart from the miserable weather, the things that occupied most of my time since the last issue of the Radyr Chain were the Jubilee events held over that first weekend in June. Elsewhere in this issue is a report by Cllr Mike Diment who led the Jubilee Committee and I would like to thank him for the huge amount of

work he put into the project. There was a lot to plan and coordinate and between R&MCC, Radyr Golf Club and Clare Barnett at Radyr Youth Centre and we were delighted with the weekend and the Prom Concert in particular. I was very pleased to have received a grant of £4750 from the Big Lottery which covered the cost of the impressive professional stage and sound system. We were also grateful to receive £400 from the Lower Machen Festival for promoting community engagement with music, £150 from the Blakemore Foundation through Spar and £50 from Pugh's towards the cost of the children's tea party. Last issue I told you about the new members of the Community Council and you can find their contact details on our website at www.radyr.org.uk. Cllr Tyrone Davies was elected Chairman for a second term and Cllr David Silver is the Vice Chairman. Our web pages also have copies of all the council's minutes and dates of future meetings.

A few years ago a skateboard park was installed by Cardiff Council in the Moundfield and it has been a great success. We have been approached by a group of young people who would like a BMX track. In case you don't know, BMX stands for bicycle motocross and involves riding a push bike over obstacles. It became an Olympic sport in 2008. R&MCC is always keen to support young people's ideas, particularly when they involve a group effort towards a community benefit. As you may know, there is a plan by Cardiff Council to install two Archimedes screws to generate electricity at Radyr Weir. The development will also rebuild the fish ladder and is an opportunity to improve the community facilities there. There is already a BMX area that young people have made out of the existing landscape and we support the idea of improving this at the same time. Cllr Rod McKerlich will be leading on this as both a Community and Cardiff Councillor.

As many of you know, the Community Council recently bought part of Radyr Woods to ensure and preserve its community use. As part of our care for the woods a dangerous beech tree has recently been felled as part of our management agreement with Cadw who are helping us preserve the Bronze Age burnt mound.

In June the Community Council held a joint meeting with the Radyr and Morganstown Association to discuss greater participation in the community. This was a very well-attended meeting with many positive suggestions and opinions expressed. Both organisations are now distilling suggestions before acting on them.

JOTTINGS FROM THE R&M ASSOCIATION

The last meeting of the Association on 18th June was held jointly with the R&M Community Council and looked at Volunteering. It was really well attended and there was a lot of discussion (in groups) on the underlying issues. We have had a look at all the suggestions made and come up with the following initial set of actions that we think should be taken:

- 1. Pass findings re communications in R&M to the Webteam for consideration.
- 2. Consider setting up a Facebook page for the RMA.
- 3. Update the publication 'What is there to do in R&M?' and set in place a mechanism for its regular update. Review the distribution network of the publication and/or promote it more.
- 4. Consider additional public Notice-boards and what could be put on them.
- 5. Set up meetings with the Head Teachers of all three R&M schools to review Community involvement.
- 6. As above, but with the Youth centre.
- 7. Consider resurrecting the Youth Forum (as initiated by Marion Drake). It was noted that the R&MCC is already working with youths on the matter of the location of a BMX track and a more general and on-going Youth Forum could arise from that action.
- 8. Work together with the new Library to promote them as a pivot of Community Information.
- 9. Develop a marketing plan to promote RMA and R&MCC awareness and understanding of the roles and responsibilities.
- 10. Speak to organisations individually about their future, how they can be promoted etc the theme being taking further the discussion at the joint meeting. Stress the need for the involvement of families.
- 11. Consider insurance possibilities and assistance to organisations in Health & Safety, Disability legislation and CRB checks matters etc.
- 12. Pass findings re Festival to the Festival Committee.

We will be discussing this list with the Community Council over the next few

weeks, but you will see that the emphasis is on promoting both the Association and the Community Council (many people do not know we exist or what we do) as well as helping existing organisations to prosper.

On another matter, we will once again be taking part in the Civic Trust for "Open Doors" month, repeating the walk that took place during the May Festival. On Sunday 16th September, Allan Cook will lead a walk looking at the Danescourt end of the Parish. He will show how the Mathew family grew into being the Lords of the Manor of Radyr and their involvement in the Pilgrimage to Penrhys in the Rhondda. The walk will look at Radyr Court, St John's Church which will be specially opened for the occasion - the two early hamlets within the Parish, toll roads and Rachel's cabin. The walk will start in the car park outside the Radyr Court pub in Danescourt at 2.30 p.m. relatively easy walk of about two miles on footpaths and will take a leisurely two to two and a half hours.

Radyr, Morganstown and District Gardening Club

It would be an understatement to say that, so far, this year has not been the easiest for Gardeners. The high rainfall and lack of sunshine and warmth has meant that many flowers and crops have not given of their best and we can only hope for an improvement in the autumn to give a decent show in the garden.

However, Garden Club members enjoyed a dry day on Wednesday 4th July visiting the historic garden of the University of Bristol Goldney Hall of Residence in the morning and the University Botanic Gardens in the afternoon.

Bristol University, through past benefactors, is custodian of a number of properties which have gardens of historic interest, the jewel in the crown being the grade 2 listed Goldney House garden. Thomas Goldney III (1696 – 1768) the son of a wealthy Bristol Merchant and himself an entrepreneur inherited the estate in Clifton from his father in 1731. He took an active interest in the development and planting of the garden and set about transforming the garden into an "Arcadian Wilderness" dotted with notable buildings which act as focal points; the highlight is subterranean grotto. knowledgeable and enthusiastic guide for the tour set the garden in both its historical and geographical context and introduced us to each of the features as we walked around with surprises at every turn. The tour culminated in the descent into the Grotto, an amazing cavern with several unique features and decorated with

minerals, shells and corals. This is one of the few complete ornamental grottos surviving intact and has Grade I listing. Because Goldney House is a Hall of Residence in use throughout the year the garden has very limited opening for the public and the Club was privileged to be one of the few groups to be given a conducted tour this year.

After lunch at the Bristol Harbourside we moved on to the Botanic Garden and a tour by two very knowledgeable volunteer guides. The Botanic Garden has only been on its present site for 6 years although the garden has been in existence for many vears and provides an educational and research facility for the university. The curator, Nick Wray, has spoken to the Club on two occasions the second being about the garden and its relocation so it was interesting to see what has been achieved over the past 6 years. Among its many the garden demonstrates the relationship between plants pollinators, plants and climate, plants and location and in particular those specific to the Bristol area such as the Avon Gorge. The afternoon passed all to quickly and all agreed that both gardens are well worth a further visit.

Our thanks go to the University staff for organising and providing us with a enjoyable and informative day.

September 12th - Glamorgan Heritage Coast and Dunraven Gardens, an illustrated talk by Helen Mills.

October 10th - A Core History of Apples an illustrated talk by a local Pomologist (speaker to be confirmed)

November 14th - Christmas Trees a talk by John Hunt relating his experiences of commercial "farming" and marketing of Christmas trees.

Meetings are open to all and take place on the second Wednesday of each month from September to April (with the exception of December) with illustrated talks and demonstrations. Some speakers bring examples of the plants they talk about and others bring plants for sale.

All meetings (apart from visits) are at the New School Rooms, Heol Isaf starting at 7.30pm and are followed by refreshments.
