What a Year for Radyr Cricket Club Youth!

What a successful year for the children at Radyr Cricket Club! Over 170 youngsters, from the age of 7 to 17, have been enjoying their cricket at the club. And many have achieved considerable success.

Over the winter, many trained hard in winter nets. Sixteen boys and seven girls were successful in trials and were selected to represent Cardiff and the Vale. In addition, two boys and two girls played for Wales.

Early in the season, the Under 9s held a mini-festival of cricket in aid of the Radyr and Morganstown Village Festival. Burgers and home made cakes were sold on the day, enabling the club to present a cheque for ± 100 to the charity Latch.

We entered eight teams in total into the Cardiff and the Vale League. All did well, but three teams made it to the final. On a warm Sunday at the end of August, the Under 11 Greens and the Under 13 Greens both won, finishing the season as champions. The Under 11 Golds played exceptionally well, but narrowly lost by one run, thereby finishing the season as runners-up.

The local Radyr schools also had a great deal of cricket success. Bryn Deri won the 8 a-side 'kwik cricket' tournament for local primary schools, beating Radyr Primary in the finals. Both teams then went on to play in the Cardiff tournament and once again it was Bryn Deri and Radyr Primary who competed in the finals! The result - a win again for Bryn Deri! As a club, we are proud to say that all the players who represented both schools are members of Radyr CC!

Girls cricket is going from strength to strength in Radyr. We now have over thirty five girls as members of the club, and they are progressing very well. The Under 11 Girls and the Under 9 Girls played in the Cardiff and the Vale Mixed Leagues. There are only two clubs in Cardiff entering Girls teams into this League, and Radyr is one of them. The Under 11 Girls also won the Cardiff Cup and then went on to represent Radyr at the West of England finals in Bristol. Here they played extremely well and came a very creditable third out of six teams.

News from Radyr Library







REMEMBERING PHILIP LEE



Most of you will know or recognise Philip Lee: the hair and moustache, the more recent tortuous gait with walking stick, his old-world forms of address, his love of Shakespeare and the music of the 1920s and his regular involvement in Radyr events. Over the years he has been a familiar figure at the tennis and golf clubs, at the bridge table and the library and he also edited the Radyr Chain for many years.

I first met Philip when I opened the door on a Sunday shortly after we moved to a house in Danybryn Avenue. This was a very long time ago when the children who are now married with children of their own were daily going to Primary School. There was a welcoming gift from his wife Olive and lots of advice about who would deliver milk, who would get the building site garden into shape and how to join the tennis club. Inevitably this was coupled with lots of questions. These I later discovered were to do with how best to slot us into the category of 'town' or 'gown'!

With children at school and part-time nursing at Llandough Hospital, time passed quickly and we were slowly absorbed into parts of the local social Philip's son or daughter scene. sometimes did some 'baby-sitting' and I heard about their regular holidays to France and Llangrannog. We joined the tennis club and had the somewhat daunting task of taking a turn at the required format for sandwiches! Philip was more concerned to maintain standards of suitable dress for the club, although he himself was often seen with a colourful tie preventing his shorts from falling over his narrow hips!

Another of his loves was following the horses, both at the racecourse or at a local Point-to-Point followed by a very nice tea somewhere. He had several interesting prints of his favourite animals in his dining room and found it quite difficult to believe that others were not excited about the equine calendar of racing and other events, clearly enjoying a regular gamble! It is perhaps not surprising that when he suggested it would be fun to set up an investment group we were all pleased to see the steady hands of Rob McKerlich and Austen Leigh present to keep us on the straight and narrow which meant taking it in turns to make those difficult decisions about when and where our money should go and for how long!

The local Librarians will know of his fondness for reading a wide range of literature; his routine requests for anything that caught his eye in the regular book reviews was quickly devoured. He and his wife Olive regularly attended both concerts of national orchestras and those of Cardiff's music students and frequently supported the plays of Cardiff's College of Music and Drama. Philip would certainly know what was on at the theatre, concert hall or cinema and could be relied on to get tickets for anything that appealed. At the Machen Music Festival he could be seen either enjoying a glass of wine in the hospitality tent or finding some way to avoid the queue to become comfortable for the second half. His driving was legendary - always more concerned to maintain social communication rather than which turn to take, he never guite got the street plan of Cardiff in his head and how he got across the country to meetings in Bristol or Cambridge and elsewhere I will never know!

At some point we moved to Abergavenny but retained contacts and when I returned to Whitchurch it was to find that Philip was editing the Radyr Chain and become a 'Friend' of the National Museum. Philip quickly involved me into regular bridge which he enjoyed to the end of his life and many of us realised that bridge really did provide an affective distraction for the back and other pain that plagued him. It wasn't long before Philip also sought my help after he had been persuaded to set up a Newsletter for the Friends of NMW (National Museum Wales) I learned that he had lots of ideas but the Printer received his efforts on assorted sheets of paper covered in his very difficult to read long-hand! Meetings were a bit difficult largely because he was so very untidy and frequently mislaid items. Т remember Olive saying more than once it was like having half a dozen children in I started by typing the house! everything and then supported his idea of obtaining a computer. Unfortunately, Philip wasn't the most patient of beings and if one key didn't do as expected he would try several more and we all know what happens then! The Newsletter was really an extension of himself and although he managed to get a few people to write articles for him, it was difficult to keep one page free of some reference to Shakespeare or to one of his favourite songs from the 1920s. To his great credit he won two national prizes from the British Association of Friends of Museums, certainly well deserved.

I am sure that many of you will have numerous memories of Philip so I will mention one or two of my favourites. There was a time he reported, in indignant rage, stopping to help a lady trying to change a car tyre along the Newport Road. He just could not believe it when she attempted to slip half a crown into his hand! Then there was the time at a party I gave when he attempted to help a Rural Dean of Llandaff to obtain better quality shirts from a recommended tailor!

In the latter part of his life when his health began to fail, he courageously put up with NHS attempts to keep his back pain under control and to alleviate a knee problem. I did try to explain to him that at a Pain Clinic he would not be taken very seriously if his priority appeared to be finding out what books the Consultant was currently reading! And he did not always remember to take his prescription drugs home - on one occasion he had left six bottles of significant pain relief on an out-patient chair. But he would always want to accept invitations out to lunches or to concerts and he remained a very competitive bridge player to the end and never forgot to collect his winnings!

We, his family and friends bade farewell to Philip on Thursday, 28th August. I had joined Philip and Olive with friends at the home of Dr. Joyce Davidson for a very enjoyable lunch only two days before he died. He was a 'one off character' who will certainly be greatly missed.



Over the last thirty years the number of people living with the effects of an acquired brain injury has increased dramatically. More people are surviving brain injuries owing to the advances in and medical knowledge surgical techniques. Survivors of a brain injury generally have a normal life expectancy. The Day Centre provides service users with an opportunity for peer support; to re-learn lost skills and find new ones; to regain confidence and self-esteem; to reduce isolation; to increase independence and to build a new social network. 1t provides survivors a safe, stimulating environment for them to share experiences, to practice strategies and to relax and have fun.

The volunteer role is to assist the staff team to engage the survivors in a wide range of programmed activities, offering support and encouragement where required.

Unless you live right in the centre of Radyr, you may not have paid much attention to the sound of the bells being rung in Christ Church on Sunday mornings before the 11am service or Thursday evening practice nights. But they have been part of our community's life for over 100 years.

The bell tower was the last part of Christ Church to be completed – the bells were first rung in 1910. They're rung regularly for Sunday services and of course weddings and there is the wonderful symbolism of the muffled bell when the community gathers at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. But from time to time something much grander is attempted and a peal, in which the bells are rung for three hours, has been rung to mark all major state occasions.

Trevor Lewis has been ringing in Radyr for 65 years and remembers ringing a peal for Winston Churchill's funeral and all sorts of state and royal occasions. But mostly these days the term rings a quarter peal, as they did to celebrate the induction of Rev. Jenny Wigley as Rector in 2006. Ringing for ? hour is certainly less intrusive for the neighbours in Heol Isaf!

When Tower Captain Trevor Lewis was asked what is bell ringing's 'appeal' (pun definitely intended!), he said simply "It's the team work and then the mental and physical challenge. You can continue to ring into very old age". And he's right – the oldest member of the tower is 86. And the youngest 13.

Radyr Bell Ringers are always looking to welcome new members. Training will be given, so don't worry if you have no experience – just come along to one of the practice nights. Thursdays at 7.30pm.

'Watch Out – there's a thief about!' How many times have you seen this? In an affluent society, it could well be imagined that the crime rate would decline. Unfortunately, the reverse is true. So, when you go away for your holiday, the professional or nonprofessional thief will be clapping his hands. If the opportunity is there – the thief will take it! Please advise the police before you go away – cancel the papers, milk and other deliveries; secure your house, lock all the doors and windows; leave a key with your neighbour and ask him to visit your house daily; deposit valuables or cash at your bank;

Finally, I would like to send a special message to the children – Learn your Green Cross Code! Use it, especially when walking to and from school. We don't want any accidents.

In February a scheme was launched in Cardiff to install (free) door chains in the homes of elderly people in an attempt to prevent unauthorised persons entering their property for bogus reasons.

The title Community Council is peculiar to Wales as in England they have retained the title of Parish Council. The first council was formed in 1974, following the Local Government Act of 1972. The first Chairman was Cllr Maurice Hendra and Mr Linton Leonard was Clerk to Council.

At that time there were only three year groups and second and third year pupils had been 'adopted' from other schools. The school had been built around them, with cement and bricks everywhere.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Ricotta and Amaretti Cheesecake with Baked Plums

This is a very light, baked cheesecake with a topping of seasonal plus. Serves 8.

120g (4¹/₂ oz) amaretti biscuits 100g (4oz) shortbread biscuits 50g (2oz) unsalted butter – melted

Filling:

400g (14oz) ricotta or mascarpone 250g (8oz) cream cheese – softened

75g (3oz) caster sugar

1 tsp grated lemon rind

2 eggs

1 egg yolk

For the baked plums and syrup: 5 ripe plums – stones removed and halved

1 vanilla bean, split and seeds scraped 1 stick cinnamon

90g (3¹/₂oz) brown sugar

Loose-bottomed flan tin – 26cm or 10" circumference Light oven 150C/Gas mark 2

Place amaretti and shortbread biscuits in food processor.

Blend until coarsely chopped.

Add butter, process to combine. Use back of spoon to press mixture into base and sides of tin.

Place in fridge for thirty minutes

Place ricotta, cream cheese, sugar and lemon rind into mixer. Beat for 3 minutes. Add eggs and yolk and beat. Pour mixture into shell. Bake for 35-40 minutes until just firm.

Set aside to cool. Refrigerate for one hour.

Increase oven to 180C/Gas mark 4

Place plums, cut side down with vanilla seeds, bean, cinnamon and sugar in shallow ovenproof dish. Cover with foil and roast for fifteen minutes. Turn over and cook for five minutes if needed.

- Cool a little.
- Place plums on top of cake.
- Drizzle with plum syrup to serve.

RADYR, MORGANSTOWN & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

A warm and sunny day in July saw 26 members and friends visit The Laskett Garden, the private garden of Sir Roy Strong. The garden, which is situated between Ross and Hereford, reflects Sir Roy and his late wife's (the theatre designer, Dr. Julia Trevelyan) interest in the arts, antiquities and design. Everyone enjoyed the visit and had much to discuss over lunch; we all agreed that the garden warrants a further visit.

Our 25th season got off to a good start with the September meeting and a talk by Rosie James (Landscape Officer for Cardiff Parks) who spoke about Cefn Onn Parc. The early history and the development for the Prossers is well known. Rosie James noted that the period from the mid 1920's up to the acquisition by Cardiff City was sketchy until a chance encounter with a relative of Tom Jenkins, head gardener at this time, put her in touch with his daughter and family in Australia who were able to fill in a lot of the gaps! She also discussed the effect of "sudden oak death" on the rhododendrons and other planting and the work that Cardiff City Parks have put in to combat this and the future proposals they have for the ongoing restoration and development of Cefn Onn.

Our meetings for the rest of 2014 are :

8th October - "Microscopic Algae" with Dr. Ingrid Juttner of National Museum of Wales. Dr. Juttner will illustrate types of algae and how they affect the garden. She will be brining microscopes and has asked for samples of algae for her to identify and for us to look at in detail.

12th November- "Miraculous Mazes or Mazes, Maths and Magic" with Lindsay Heyes. Mr. Heyes will cover the history, myths and legends of mazes as well as showing recently constructed mazes.

Full details of these talks and the rest of the programme are available on the Radyr website.

Kesho Kenya

From February to April this year I volunteered with VSO ICS in Kilifi on the east coast of Kenya. ICS is a scheme run by the department for international development which funds young people to volunteer abroad for approximately three months, working alongside volunteers from the host country. As an ICS volunteer I both lived and worked within the local community, perhaps my most enjoyable and rewarding work placement was with Kesho, Kenya.

Kesho (meaning tomorrow in swalhi) is a charity that aims to increase access to education and improve social mobility by supporting children from the poorest 4% of backgrounds through school. Kesho both supports the children's learning and provides for the essential books, pens and school uniforms for them to attend through their own individual sponsors. The majority of these sponsors come from developed countries.

Although the Kenyan government is now able to provide free primary education universally, the standard is far, far below what we are used to, as well as that of Kenyan private schools. One big problem in Kenyan state schools is the lack of resources available, whilst British primary schools are used to interactive white boards and felt tip pens, Kenyan kids are lucky if there are enough exercise books to last the term. The pupil to teacher ratio is also exceptionally high; it is quite normal to find just one teacher with a class of perhaps ninety children. In such circumstances, children are fortunate if their teacher can find time to learn their name or even to mark national exams. Therefore, Kesho volunteers spend a lot of time working one-on-one with the children to make sure they stay on track at school and work on skills like English and ict, which in Kenya, would usually only be accessible to children attending a private school. Indeed much of my time as a volunteer was spent reading with the children in English. By providing extra opportunities for the children, Kesho hopes to give some of the poorest children a fairer chance in life and the opportunity to build a career that can lift them out of poverty and maybe even change Kenya for the better.

Having worked with a number of different institutions in Kenya Kesho and its staff really stood out as one of the most professional and hardworking organizations. Their help and the sponsors' money really does go directly to the children in need and truly transforms their lives.

Dear Editors,

I write to you with much excitement as I have been fortunate enough to be offered one of 22 places at the Arts Educational Schools London on their fulltime foundation course in Musical Theatre. With no government funding available to me, I am seeking sponsorship and financial support with a view to continuing my education in the performing arts.

A little bit about me ... Originally from Cardiff, eighteen years of age and now living in London. At age seven I was diagnosed with Wolff-Parkinson-White syndrome, a heart condition for which I have to take daily medication. I have since had several surgical procedures without success, with another procedure due on 15 August at a major London heart hospital. Whilst difficult, I have never let the condition set me back from my ambitions. If anything, it has been the route of my drive and determination.

I was able to leave high school with 8 A*s, 4A's and a B grade at GCSE and during my time at Radyr Comprehensive School, I was lucky enough to perform in three Welsh National Opera productions which toured the UK. From the age of 16, I have been in constant employment. From a barista at a snail-themed village deli to a Christmas elf at Hamleys toy store. I have worked wherever and whenever I can in order to support myself. Currently, I am working for Serve Legal, a company that helps to reduce the sale of age-restricted products to minors. I also regularly work in TV and film as a background extra. This past academic year, as opposed to studying for A Levels, I have attended Arts Educational Schools on the parttime foundation course in Musical Theatre, which I managed to fund through my own efforts. My successful audition for the full-time foundation came as a result of hard work, dedication and expert tuition during this past year.

The course ... The full-time foundation course will be beginning its second year this September and I have been extremely lucky to gain a place given that there are only 22 new students per intake. With a syllabus that is recognised by City University, tuition runs from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday and is intensive to say the least. I will attend classes in jazz, tap, ballet, acting technique, as well as receiving invaluable private vocal tuition, all led by industry professionals.

The fees ... Training of this calibre is not available elsewhere. With the average singing lesson in London costing around £60. for an hour's tuition and dance classes at around £10. per class, excluding monthly membership fees (a steep jump from the £2. a week drama groups in the draughty village halls of Wales), it would be impossible for me to fund and attend enough external classes for me to reach the standard required for degree course training. A lack of government funding in the arts means that no financial help is available to me for this foundation course and the fees for the year stands at £9,320., not taking into account the cost of living in London and the cost of the dancewear and equipment I will need to purchase prior to the commencement of the course.

I have taken a huge risk in accepting my place on the full-time foundation without having the funds readily available to me and having only received my acceptance letter last week, I have a very limited timescale in which to raise the fee. Over the past few days I have created a crowd-funding campaign where £165. was donated to me in the first 24 hours and set up a Facebook page to raise awareness. I also plan to begin video blogging to engage my audience. I realise that it is very unlikely that I'll be able to raise the full amount by September. However, if I am able to get the first terms' fee (around £3.100). I will be able to start the course and continue to work hard and fundraise the tuition fees.

DICKENS THE CHIMES




Developers have submitted applications to start building before the LDP is adopted. There is little chance that they will be refused and we have and will respond to them. All

We expect the application for the rest of the site to come in around October/November. Developers are already exceeding housing numbers recommended in the LDP and we will be watching this closely.

We objected to the application to build 1,500 dwellings and other buildings at Strategic Site D south of Creigiau. We argued that unless all the deficiencies about transport are addressed this site cannot be sustainable without the Metro because residents will be reliant on cars to reach anywhere outside the development.

We responded to a Llandaff Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) report, pointing out that it did not take into account all the development proposed in NW Cardiff (11,650 dwellings), nor the proposals for the BBC site. Air quality in Llandaff on and around Bridge Street has been monitored for

Tennis & Golfer's Elbow

"Tennis elbow" and "Golfer's elbow" are common terms for tendon pain in the elbow and can occur from overuse of arm, forearm and hand muscles. You don't have to play tennis or golf to get it, but the terms came into use because it can be a significant problem for some sports men and women.

Tennis elbow (lateral epicondylitis) affects the tendon on the outer side of the elbow and golfer's elbow (medical epicondylitis) affects the tendon on the inner side of the elbow. The pain is due to inflammation and micro trauma to the tendon.

Both tendons are involved in wrist movements – bending the wrist back in the case of the lateral tendon and down in the case of the medical tendon.

Tennis elbow can occur when playing tennis, perhaps as a result of overuse or hitting a ball awkwardly, but it is more common during other activities that require repeated gripping and twisting movements such as painting and cleaning windows, or as a result of a sudden strain caused by lifting.

Golfer's below may be caused by an acute injury or by repeated strains sustained when playing golf, but it is more commonly associated with other activities which involve a bent wrist such as gardening or racquet sports. Both problems can come on for no reason and are more common in the 40-60 year age group as the tendons become less flexible.

Symptoms are tenderness and mild swelling at the affected area. Wrist and elbow movements can be painful. In severe cases pain may persist at rest.

Treatment Options

To prevent the inflammation from getting worse, it is important to avoid repetitive movements of the wrist and elbow as well as any other movements that seem to increase the pain.

- If it comes on after or during a specific activity then it is important to check your echnique.
- Ice can help reduce inflammation wrapped ice packs applied for 5-10 minutes twice a day can ease symptoms.
- Oral or gel-based non-steroidal anti-inflammatories.
- Stretches regular wrist stretches to lengthen the forearm muscles to reduce the pull on the affected tendon can ease symptoms.
- Physiotherapy identifying the specific tendon which is giving you pain and localised treatment to kick start the

healing process, such as deep massage/ frictions to the tendon and ultrasound.

- A forearm support brace can reduce the tension of the tendon for specific activities or sports.
- If the pain is not relieved by any of these measures, then your GP may suggest a corticosteroid injection which may be given directly into the tendon to reduce inflammation.

Once the swelling has reduced, exercises to strengthen the forearm muscles will help to prevent recurrence. Repetitive movement of the tendon should be minimised or avoided.

RADYR CRICKET HISTORY – CAN YOU HELP?!!



In the summer of 1890 a group of young Radyr men came together to play cricket: friends enjoying each other's company, playing their favourite sport at Rectory Field a local spot in the heart of their village. And so was born Radyr Cricket Club. Formal fixtures with other clubs soon followed and in 1908, a magnificent new ground was opened at Riverside, courtesy of the Earl of Plymouth.

Here we see the successful side of 1908 posing for an end of season photo; men and boys of all backgrounds, joined together by a love of the game of cricket.

Next year Radyr Cricket Club will celebrate its 125th anniversary. With more than 300 junior and senior members, it has built on the legacy of those early cricketers. It continues to be a major part of the social fabric of the village.

For any community cricket club, providing health exercise, competition, friendship and participation for 125 years is a special achievement and something to be very proud of. It needs to be recorded permanently. To do this we aim to write a history of our club. We want to commemorate our past, to honour our previous players, to recognise the support that so many families have given to us over so many years and to leave a record for future generations.

But writing the history of Radyr Cricket Club will not be easy. Many of our records were lost in a tragic fire in 1973 when our clubhouse burnt down. Such treasures cannot easily be replaced. Instead, we must rely upon the memories and mementoes of those who played for us and of their relatives. It is here that we need the help of the community of Radyr and Morganstown.

Do you have old photographs, scorecards, fixture lists or other documents in your attic? Would you be willing to spare us some time to share your memories with us, to tell us about your experiences at the cricket club or those of your forefathers or relatives? Are you related to one or more of the families (such as Grover, Leaves, Ray, Foreman, Samuel, Aldridge and Holland) who supported the club in its early years before the Great War, between the two wars, or in the 1950s and 1960s? The photograph in this article was found in an attic; someone gave it to the club and some our history was brought back to life.

DR. WILLIAM PRICE



The last talk of this year at the local History Society will be given by Dean Powell, author of an extensive biography on the subject of Dr. William Price.

Dean calls his talk "Eccentric" but William Price was much more than that. Born near Caerphilly in 1800 his long life filled the nineteenth century. He was a physician, nationalist, Chartist, druid, early vegetarian, proponent of equal rights and of cremation.

He was the first person to conduct a cremation in the UK in modern times when he burnt the body of his son, Jesus Christ Price, on a mountain top near Llantrisant. He is often pictured wearing a "Davy Crocket" hat.

A statue has been erected to William Price in the centre of Llantrisant.
