To our surprise and delight, forty one years later, we received emails from Helena Fox (Clerk to R&MCC) and Mary & Bob Pearce (Editors) telling us they had received an email from Ibrahim in his bid to locate us. To our knowledge he had not known we were moving to Radyr and he



had moved to London. He had actually returned to our Pontypridd home searching for us. Anyhow, we replied to his emails and as he and his family were flying to Britain on holiday and we were in Warwickshire at the time, we had a wonderful reunion.

With formalities out of the way, the fun was about to Continued on page 7








VOLUNTEERS WANTED TO VISIT THE ISOLATED ELDERLY

AgeConnects (the new name for Age Concern in Cardiff) is seeking additional volunteers for the next phase of its Health and Active Project (HAP) across the city, including in **Radyr**,

Morganstown and Danescourt. The project aims to reduce the social isolation of elderly people who live alone (or as a carer) and who have few visitors, if any. The scale of the problem is growing all the time for a number of reasons e.g. demographic change as life expectancy is rising so fast, changes in family structures, location and work patterns, illness, disability etc. For these reasons, the level of demand is likely to continue to rise so we need more volunteers to meet that demand.

The HAP project is city-wide and we currently have a waiting list of clients in all areas waiting to be matched with a volunteer. The commitment which we are seeking at AgeConnects is for volunteers to visit an elderly client as a befriender for up to two hours a week on average. There is no element of personal care, assistance with medication, cleaning, washing or food preparation involved. Although most of our clients are unable to go out, a few are physically and psychologically able and keen to do so. Therefore, some of our volunteers take their clients out for a coffee or to the supermarket or the local park just so that the client can enjoy a change of scenery, get some fresh air and feel less of a prisoner within their own home.

The feedback which we have received from clients already on the scheme and therefore having regular visits from a volunteer has been very positive. Isolation and loneliness in the elderly can be an additional burden when people are already at a vulnerable stage in their lives. They can contribute to poor health and depression. Social contact with an interested member of their own or a nearby community can really make a difference. One lady in Radyr who was very isolated before she met her volunteer this Spring talks of "having a new least of life" and enjoys her weekly trips to the coffee shop at a well-known local garden centre. Her volunteer reports that she puts a CD on in the car and that her client then sings her heart out!

We are not looking for any qualifications or specific experience in our volunteers: simply the desire to make a contribution to the community of a couple of hours a week. There is an induction procedure to make sure volunteers have the information they need before they start and ongoing support from the Volunteer Manager who would also be happy to talk to anyone who was thinking about becoming a volunteer if they had any questions. She was dressed in the "Plain Quaker" costume of the mid-19th century and looked remarkably similar to the image on the back of our present day £5. notes. Through this interesting presentation we learnt that Elizabeth Fry accomplished her reforms in spite of having given birth to eleven children by the time she was in the forties. She seemed to have been a woman far beyond her time as she left her husband in charge of her huge household when away campaigning or constantly badgering the then Home Secretary, Lord Melbourn, who must have wished her in Botany Bay!

As well as helping to keep our neighbourhood tidy, this is also an opportunity to show W.I. at work in the community.

FILM NIGHTS


