Twenty's Plenty

Tuesday 3rd of July saw planned disruption along Heol Isaf in Radyr and Ty Nant Road in Morganstown. The "Big Slow Down" involved thirty residents parking their cars – quite legally and safely – to create chicanes. It was done under the supervision of the South Wales Police who praised the organisation. Average journey time through the two villages increase from 7-10 minutes to 15 to 20 minutes. The police also issued four tickets to HGV drivers illegally travelling through R&M. The event was organised by the Radyr and Morganstown residents Group, a group created at a meeting in May when more than 100 residents living on Heol Isaf and Ty Nant Road came together to protest at the inability of Cardiff County Council to institute traffic calming and road safety measures.

Figures issued by the Group and compiled by GoSafe suggest that 81% of motorists speed in Radyr, 86% in Morganstown and that 36% of motorists between Min-y-Coed and Morganstown are travelling between 35 and 50 m.p.h. This compares with a RoSPA figure that nationally 51% of motorists drive within the legal speed limit. At the height of the rush hour nearly 1,400 vehicles were passing the Medical Centre each hour.


What does the Group want?

- They feel that R&M are being treated unfairly by Cardiff City Council where few traffic calming measures have been introduced compared with neighbouring areas such as Pentyrch, Llandaff or Fairwater.
- They would like to see areas within R&M where the speed limit is reduced to 20 m.ph, as happens in neighbouring areas.
- More raised pedestrian crossings, both to facilitate road crossing and as a traffic calming measure. In Radyr and Morganstown the gap between safe crossings is 500 metres, in Riverside/Grangetown

 where a child was killed by a motorist - the gap is 60 metres.
- In November our County
 Councillor reported a whole raft of traffic calming measures both agreed by the County Council and under discussion, none of these have reached fruition.

The problem is that the County Council has been caught out by the speed of the development along the Llantrisant Road, new residents are already moving in to some of the new houses and the problem will only get worse over the next months and years unless serious consideration is given to the problem.

On July 19th the Group, along with our County Councillor, delivered a petition signed by more than 650 people to Cardiff City Council asking for traffic calming measures to be introduced in R&M.



What can we as residents Do? We can be aware of the Residents Group and support them in any way

Group and support them in any way we can or feel appropriate.

Thirty years ago *The Chain* ran a campaign to encourage residents to drive within the legal speed limit. Perhaps its time for us all to watch our speed. If we drive at the legal speed limit, every vehicle behind us is also driving at the legal speed limit. But something still needs to be done about those drivers, usually at times of low traffic and at night, who thing that R&M is a speedway.


YMWELIAD Â STIWDIOS POBOL Y CWM



CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Parmesan and sage roast chicken Serves 4

4x250g. (8oz) bone in + skin chicken breast or 8x150g. (5oz) drumsticks 2 teasp. thyme leaves 2 teasp.sea salt+extra to taste 60ml. (3 fl.oz) olive oil 750g.(11/2lb) sweet potatoes 1 Tab.sp rosemary leaves 1-2 sage leaves per chicken piece 25g. grated parmesan

Place chicken+ salt + thyme + 1 Tab.spn oil in large bowl.

Mix, cover + place in 'frig. until needed.

Preheat oven to 220C, Gas 7. Peel and slice potatoes into 1 cm.rounds.

Place sweet potatoes + rosemary + remaining oil into roasting tin.

Sprinkle with extra salt, toss to coat using tongs.

Arrange potato rounds into even layer and roast 15mins.

Remove pan from oven.

Place chicken pieces on top of potatoes.

Press sage leaves into chicken.

Return pan to oven, cook further 15mins.

Remove pan from oven, move contents around.

Sprinkle chicken with parmesan. Return to cook further 15mins. until golden and cooked through.

Serve with salad or steamed green vegetables.

Radyr Comprehensive Battlefields Trip

On Monday 11th July 82 Year 7 students, 7 members of staff and two Governors From Radyr Comprehensive School embarked on a 3-day tour of the Battlefields in France and Belgium. It was a very inspiring trip that gave both the staff and students the opportunity to reflect the consequences of war.

On the first evening, we went to the Last Post Ceremony in Ypres, a very moving tribute to the courage and self-sacrifice of soldiers who died in defence of this crucial town. The ceremony has happened every night at 8pm since the end of World War One, only stopping briefly during World War Two.

On the second day we visited an area of the Somme in France. Over a million men were wounded or killed in the area, making it one of the bloodiest battles in human history. The group them moved on to the Theipval Memorial to the Missing, Lochnagar Crater and the Newfoundland Memorial Park. It was here that we also began to consider the role of women during the First World War, stimulating important discussions about the gradual emancipation of women as a direct result of contributing to the war. All of these historical sites brought home the sacrifices made by our ancestors and the scale of death and injury that took place. For example, the Lochnagar Crater is where an explosion occurred on 1st July 1916; 27 tonnes of high explosives went 4,000ft into the air, creating the loudest sound made by humans at that time. More than 6,000 soldiers were killed.

We also visited the Wellington Tunnels in Arras, this was clear insight into the planning and innovation of the battles. We were taken 25m underground on a twenty-five minute tour through part of the tunnels that were built by New Zealand troops during the First World War. It was amazing to see how the 20,000 soldiers who lived in the tunnels functioned on a daily basis. In the evening we drove to the Notre Dame de Lorette cemetery near Arras. This stands on a hill overlooking Arras and has 45,000 graves and

several very large ossuary's containing the bones of many thousands more French soldiers. This site also has the awe-inspiring 'ring of remembrance' – a new international memorial commemorating 579,606 men of all nationalities who fell in Nord-Pas-de-Calais during the Great War, which opened on 11th November 2014. Again, these two sites brought home the sheer scale of the 'war to end all wars'.

On our final day, we visited the Hill 62 museum at Sanctuary Wood, this was a fascinating experience where the students were able to experience first-hand original trenches. Here they were shocked to see the lack of space and poor living conditions that the soldiers would have faced.

We were incredibly fortunate to take a group of 82 impeccably behaved students, whom were a pleasure to spend 3 days with. One of our proudest moments of the trip was when two ex-servicemen who had both experienced Iraq and Afghanistan approached us. They commended our students on their respectful behaviour and one commented on how those who have

served in the military, appreciate seeing young people learning about and reflecting on the sacrifices made and the impact of war.

We were also fortunate to be accompanied by Mr and Mrs Wilson, whose previous expertise as a Head and Deputy Head was extremely useful. Mr Wilson's knowledge of the First World War is exceptional and the pupils gained greatly from hearing him speak so passionately about the relatives he lost.

Its was such as success that we intend to run the trip again next year. As a school we feel it is so important to inform our students of the life changing events of the past. We are tremendously excited about the Armistice festival and will be involved in many of the events that will be taking place around Radyr and Morganstown in November. Finally, we would like to say a huge thank you to Miss Smith (Director of Learning) for organising such a fantastic trip.

My Battlefield Diary

Day 1 - Monday

Today was the day 82 eager year 7's were going on a trip of a lifetime: to the WW1 battlefields of France and Belgium. Waving goodbye to our worried parents, we set off at about 6 am, split between two buses that we would be 'living' on for the next 3 days. We had a very friendly driver called Gareth on our bus (Bus 1.).

Later into the journey, loud singing echoed from the back of the bus...the tour's very own Oreo song! We stopped at the services in Reading at about 8.15. Here, many people bought their lunch for the day as well as many snacks and a few trips to the arcade! By now, everyone was happily singing along to the radio, blasting out songs and enjoying themselves with the people around them.

4 hours on the cramped bus felt like ever but finally we arrived at Dover, ready to catch the ferry to France. As we turned

the corner, many people aboard the bus screamed with trepidation! The White Cliffs of Dover gleamed in the sunlight as we made our way around the ferry port. When we drove up the ramp that led into the boat, the whole bus jumped up and down in excitement. We were left to do what we wanted on the ferry. I mainly chatted to friends in the cafe...and ate sweets!

When we got off the ferry, we made our way to Belgium. Out of the window, all you could see were potato and corn fields and many memorials for the British and French soldiers. Everybody was very delighted when Miss Smith announced, "We are just crossing the border between France and Belgium now."

Soon after, we arrived at a town called Diksmuide. Here we stopped at the Yser Tower, which commemorates the soldiers killed around the area in WW1. We went up 22 floors in a lift to the top of the tower. The view from the terrace at the top was spectacular! The land was really flat which made it harder for the soldiers to fight on. The whole tower was a museum and each floor was different. One floor was a maze of trenches. I really enjoyed it because I got to learn about the war in a fun way! After that, we visited Mr Gubb's greatgrandfathers grave at a memorial site. We watched from the bus as he lay a cross down in memory.

We had dinner in a restaurant in Ypres, a town in Belgium. After dinner, we attended a ceremony at Menin Gate. They held a 2 minute silence and people lay wreaths in memory. On the inside of the memorial were names of British and Commonwealth soldiers who were killed in Ypres and are unknown.

Then we went back to the hotel in France. The bus was unpacked and everyone went to their rooms for a quiet night after a busy day!

Day 2 - Tuesday

We started the day off with a buffet breakfast. Pancakes, chocolate sauce and the bacon went down well!! First of all we went to Mametz Wood. Miss Smith played us a song the soldiers sang before battle before we arrived. We had a ceremony around the Red Dragon memorial and some year 7's laid a wreath amongst the others. A few teachers read poems out and we had a minute silence to remember the Welsh soldiers who died. Next, we went into the woods that they fought between. People had laid poppies and welsh flags hung from the trees.

After that we stopped off at Lochnagar Crater. It was formed by a bomb explosion during the war. I worked out that the circumference of the crater was 6,500m and the diameter was 91metres. The bus dropped David M and Miss Smith off at the grave while the rest of us went to Thiepval Memorial. After walking through the big arch in the centre of the memorial, there was a large area at the back full of soldiers' graves. One half were the French, the other the British. Before we left Miss Lewis took a picture of all of us under the arch! On the way back to the bus, some men from the military stopped us and complimented us on our excellent behaviour!

In the afternoon, a tour guide took us underground, through 20km of tunnels dug by the British and New Zealand armies. We learnt that the tunnels took 8 days to dig and we saw lots of drawings from the soldiers too. Many original weapons like rifles and objects like bottles and pots were kept there for us to look at. ...continued on page 15

We went back to Ypres where we spent the rest of the day. Firstly, we went to The Flanders Field Museum where we got given interactive wrist bands for the museum. The gift shop at the end was popular too! After that, the teachers let us explore the town and go in any shops we wanted. We bought lunch then headed off to a lovely chocolate shop where I came out with a big bag of chocolate treats! We met back up again and had a quick tour around ANOTHER chocolate shop where most people bought lots of goodies there too.

Finally, we got back on the bus and headed off for Dunkirk to catch the ferry home. Me and some other people had bought Gareth a box of Oreo's in memory of the oreo song! Road Safety in Radyr and Morganstown:

A Statement from the Community Council

Radyr and Morganstown Community Council strongly supports the need for improved road safety along the B4262 (from the Heol Isaf / Llantrisant Road roundabout to the Castell Coch roundabout).

Councillor Rod McKerlich (who serves on both the Community Council and Cardiff Council) has already held several discussions with officials at Cardiff Council responsible for highways and transport matters. Those discussions have focused on projects that could slow traffic (such as raised Pelican or Zebra Crossings) and new 20mph speed restrictions along all, or part, of the road.

The Community Council has actively engaged with Cardiff Council to promote road safety. Indeed, over the last three years, the Community Council has produced a report on Cycling and Walking recommendations and has held a meeting with the general public to discuss the Integrated Transport Map. All recommendations made have been passed to Cardiff Council. The Community Council has also sent many letters to Cardiff Council expressing their concerns about safety on Heol Isaf. In addition, several representatives from the community group that arranged the Big Slow Down have attended a full Community Council meeting.

The aim of all these submissions would be to make the road safer for pedestrians, motorists and cyclists. It could also lead to through traffic looking for alternative routes into Cardiff, leading to a reduction in traffic flows through Radyr and Morganstown.

The Community Council is considering establishing a working group which will focus on road

safety throughout Radyr and Morganstown (not just along the B4262). Members of the public and Community Groups will be invited to contribute to the working group's discussions.

As with any such project, money is a key issue - especially following years of austerity in relation to public finances. Even so, the Community Council will continue to work hard to make the B4262 a priority for Cardiff Council, in order to ensure that road safety can be improved as soon as possible.

Whilst the Council may not be able to support each and every tactic in the ongoing efforts of the Road Safety Action Group, we all agree that we want safer traffic conditions for our residents. The Community Council will use all the methods it has available to continue to bring pressure on Cardiff Council to improve road safety throughout Radyr and Morganstown.

Colin W.C. Pugh, 1932 - 2018



The sad passing of Colin Pugh on 8th April gives us the opportunity to reflect on the importance of the Garden Centre in our village. Colin's father, Sydney Pugh started Wenallt Nurseries in Rhwbina in the late 1940s; Colin joined the business after leaving agricultural college in the early 1950s. He decided to expand the business, which had been a wholesale fruit and vegetable garden gate business, to a shop. In the 1960s he sold the shop and moved the business to Morganstown for a fresh start.

The new one acre site operated a market garden and pottery. By the 1970s it had further grown adding bedding plants, hanging baskets and garden fertilizers. It was at a time when householders were taking more interest in their gardens and were looking for a source for decorative garden plants.

The business became known as the Ty Nant Nurseries and was a very popular meeting point for local people. Colin's wife, Winnie, gave up her nursing job to join him in the business to administer and help with the buying. It was at this time that Colin started to import shrubs and plants from Holland.

In the 1980s his two sons, Graham and Ian, joined the business bringing

in new ideas and setting up links with local schools and the community. The centre began its expansion with the purchase of additional land to create a patio business and show site. The car park was expanded helping to increase the number of visitors and sales. By 1995 a number of concessionary operators were encouraged to set up businesses and today there are a number suppliers of clothing, aquatics, pet services, farm shop, window blinds, café, and a heating company alongside an enlarged garden centre.

Today the centre is a hive of activity with a unique shopping experience supporting the enlarged community, as well as local and national charities. Pugh's has been a major supporter of the Radyr and Morganstown Festival from its inception in 1988. Many of these qualities were first established by Colin with his ability to communicate and understand the needs of his customers. We look forward to working with the present and next generation of the family, wishing them every success in their business, which so many of our community value.

Former Radyr student awarded CBE



David Kinder, a former student of Radyr Comprehensive, has been made a Commander of the British Empire (CBE) in the Queen's Birthday Honours list. David attended Radyr Comprehensive between 1990 and 1997. During his time in Radyr, David was also junior captain of the Radyr Tennis club and a keen member of Radyr Golf club. On leaving Radyr, David studied Modern Languages at Leeds University and then took a Masters Degree in Political Science at Marne La Valee University in Paris.

In 2005 David joined HM Treasury. He moved to the Department for Energy and Climate Change in London in 2010 to concentrate on international carbon trading arrangements. On returning to the HM Treasury in 2013 he worked on Public Sector Pay and Pensions before being seconded to the World Bank in Washington DC, where, for the last two years, he has been the Alternate Executive Director (UK) engaged in negotiating contributions to the World Bank(WB) and agreeing WB loans and aid packages.

David has been undertaking a great deal of work on mental wellbeing, setting up help networks, mentoring colleagues and speaking at conferences to raise awareness of a subject that he cares deeply about. His citation for the CBE is "for public service and services to Mental Wellbeing".

More on Road Safety Matters from our County Councillor

There can be no question of the need for Radyr and Morganstown to have a number of traffic calming measures. The two local primary schools will have 20mph zones installed early in the forthcoming school holidays; speed-disclosing signs play a part in reducing the speed of thoughtful motorists but the rest require control that is more positive. As we see from the cavalier disregard of signs, prohibiting through transit of HGVs, it is essential that signs be supported by installation of pedestrian crossings (preferably tabled) or roundabouts. There are schemes to do this and funding comes from planning gain money but three issues arise:

Drawing up these schemes is taking too long which, of course, means that implementation is not imminent It is improbable that the envisaged planning gain money will be sufficient for the full range of necessary measures

The envisaged measures refer to Heol Isaf between Llantrisant Road

and Station Road; there are several other hazards, which we need to address; these are in other areas of our villages and on the other sections of our main road

It is vital that we do not make changes only to a section of Heol Isaf; there are serious hazards such as e.g. lower Kings Road and Radyr Station roundabout-the bend at the top of Windsor Road (where there is no pavement)-Bryn Derwen-the junction of Min y Coed and Heol Isaf (again there is no pavement on the east side). If we get measures to reduce traffic flow and speed on Heol Isaf, it is clear that this will increase the hazard on Bryn Derwen, which would become a "rat run". We need an early scheme, which is holistic, costed, and implemented. I welcome the support of residents in pushing for this to receive higher priority. In focussing in this article on highway matters, I accept that there are several other areas of local concern. I deal with these in my monthly report; I will send future copies by e-mail to any resident who requests this.

Cannabis Factory Discovered in Radyr

Police officers raided a house in Lychgate Gardens Radyr, in April of this year, where they found a large scale cannabis factory. Over 250 cannabis plants were being grown on the second floor. The defendant was an illegal immigrant who arrived in the UK 18 months ago in the back of a lorry. He was jailed for 20 months and is likely to be deported on release. He was living at the premises and was being supplied with food and drink by a group of men to look after the plants. The court ordered a destruction order of the plants which neighbours had started to become aware of a strong vegetation smell from the property.
