
Celebrating the Peace

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Smoked Sausage Cassoulet Serves 4-6

A very tasty and satisfying dish

500g (good 1lb.) smoked or other tasty sausages, sliced diagonally

150g(5 oz) Chorizo, cut into chunks

4 slices dry-cured streaky baconchopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

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1 red and 1 green pepper, thickly sliced

1 chilli, chopped (optional)

1 litre(1³/₄ pt) chicken stock

1 tin chopped tomatoes or passata

1 small glass white wine

1 tin flageolet, butter or red beans selection fresh herbs-thyme and chives-chopped

1 bay leaf

Heat little oil in large heat proof casserole.

Fry onion,garlic,chilli, bacon and sausages.

When onions are soft and bacon and sausages are beginning to colour stir ingredients frequently.

Add peppers and chorizo.

When sizzling add stock, wine, tomatoes, bay leaf and herbs.

Season with little salt and pepper.

Simmer 20 - 30 mins.

Check seasoning, add drained beans.

Heat through.

Garnish with chopped parsley.

Serve piping hot with Jacket potatoes or crusty bread.


A further closure of about 15 minutes will take place at about 12.15 when the parade returns.

Ringing Remembers

Radyr Bell Ringers marking 100 years since the Armistice

As I expect many readers will be aware 11th November 2018 marks 100 years since the end of the First World War and there will be many events taking place across the country to remember those who fell.

As part of this at Christchurch in Radyr, there will be the normal Remembrance Day service with what we call 'half-muffled' bellringing to give a more sombre sound to the bells.

However, this year will be slightly different. Bell ringers across the UK have decided that this warrants some special ringing because of this year's Remembrance day being 100 years since the Armistice. Under the initiative 'Ringing Remembers', it was decided to try and get the bells ringing simultaneously across as many churches as possible. Therefore, at 12.30 on 11th November bells across the country will be rung as bell ringers mark this event. We will be part of this in Radyr, so please do listen out for us.

However, there is a second and bigger part of the 'Ringing Remembers' initiative. It has been established that across the UK a total of 1,400 bell ringers fell in WW1 and the Ringing Remembers project is aiming to recruit 1,400 new ringers across the UK in memory of those who fell. Again the bell ringers at Radyr are keen to be part of this initiative and already we have recruited one new ringer this year.

At Radyr we are lucky to currently have a band of some 12 ringers to ring our 8 bells, ranging across all ages from teenagers to octogenarians and roughly equally split between male and female. However, some our younger ringers are likely to move on to university in due course and we know at least one of our ringers is going to be emigrating to the sunnier climes of Italy. Therefore, we are on the lookout for new learners to keep our band thriving.

If you would like to learn a new skill that is both a sport and an art, a mental exercise and gentle physical exercise, bell ringing could be for you! Bell ringing is very much a team activity meaning than ringers also tend to be quite a sociable bunch and meet outside of routine ringing.

Many people might think that you have to either be musical or physically strong to ring bells; neither of these are the case! All you need is an enthusiasm to learn and we'll do the rest!

Traffic on Heol Isaf

Like most residents in Radyr, I have been following the debate about 'Twenty's Plenty' with interest. I think we all agree that increased traffic along Heol Isaf is not exactly welcome! However, with the number of vehicles and their use going up and up, there seems little likelihood of a major change occurring in the immediate future. But one other aspect I would like to highlight is pollution.

As a scientist with over twenty years research on lung(alveolar) function and disease and some thirty years research on global warming/climate change, you can see that I have a personal interest!

The main pollutants from vehicle emissions are particulates, hydrocarbons, carbon monoxide. nitrogen oxides and, of course, carbon dioxide. These affect everyone in Radyr and may have their effects for a very long time. Depending on details about how the test is carried out, the type of vehicle (or, indeed, the actual vehicle) as a generalisation this pollution is increased at 20 rather than 30 m.p.h. Moreover, any traffic calming measures have to be carefully thought out or they, themselves, may increase pollution. Certainly, speed humps are consistently recognised as being very bad, which is why they are being removed in many cases.

I don't have an immediately effective solution to suggest. The only place I know where car use has been reduced significantly are Copenhagen and other Scandinavian countries (where there has been concerted pressure from the population) or in Singapore, where the government has made it most unattractive to drive! In both examples (particularly Singapore) efficient, reliable and *inexpensive* public transport is available.

In the meantime, perhaps we can all do a little to help—do we really need to make that journey by car? We should drive steadily and try to combine several destinations in one journey. Moreover, when we change our car perhaps we can downsize and/or get a less polluting vehicle. After all, do people really need a luxury 4x4 or a Porsche 911 to drive along Heol Isaf?



Road Safety in Radyr and Morganstown…

An Update from the Community Council

On 8 August 2018, a meeting was held between Radyr and Morganstown Community Council and Paul Carter, the Head of Transportation at Cardiff Council, to discuss road safety.

This is what Cardiff Council told us:

• Cardiff Council is keen to reduce 'rat running' and speeding traffic in Radyr and Morganstown. These movements will be discouraged by traffic calming measures such as speed humps and the installation of footway crossings.

• As part of this plan, and a wider traffic management strategy, Cardiff is working with Rhondda Cynon Taff Council and the Welsh Government to provide a park and ride scheme to serve the A470. This will provide alternative travel choices for those travelling by car to Cardiff.

• In addition, Cardiff Council is delivering a separate, large park and ride scheme at junction 33 of the M4 (in liaison with other developers), to remove traffic from Llantrisant Road. This is a key priority for Cardiff Council - and is tied in with the Local Development Plan.

• £600k of developer funding will be available (under a Section 106 developer-contribution agreement) to pay for road safety improvements in R&M, including Heol Isaf.

• Cardiff Council will explore the possibility of bringing forward the Section 106 money to enable the earlier delivery of mitigation measures - like traffic calming - ahead of the formal developer trigger points that require a certain number of houses to be built before funding is normally released (in line with planning conditions).

• Cardiff Council is committed to develop and deliver a strategic plan to reduce the volume and speed of traffic travelling through R&M, from the A470, via Pugh's roundabout, to Llantrisant Road. This will be achieved by a combination of park and ride schemes and road safety measures.

• A draft plan for traffic calming works in Heol Isaf and Ty Nant is

planned to be available for consultation in late October / early November 2018

• Work to begin installing traffic calming measures could begin in April 2019, and be completed during 2020, subject to the early release of Section 106 money being agreed in dialogue with developers and the Welsh Government

• The aim would be to slow traffic as appropriate - and reduce the volume of traffic

• Steps would be considered to prevent other routes in R&M being used as rat-runs to avoid the new traffic calming measures

• Safe passage for cyclists would also be considered as part of the strategic plan

• The plan would also cover Kings Road down to Radyr Station and the section of Windsor Road with no pavement

• A nextbikes stand is also being considered, to be installed at Radyr Station

• The possibility of extending the Coryton line to the other side of the river from Radyr Station is being considered as part of the long-term Metro proposals. It might even be possible for the line to cross the river and continue through Radyr, back to Cardiff Central but this is subject to working with Welsh Government and the new franchise operator.

• Tabling of the road at zebra crossings and at junctions is preferred by Cardiff Council to speed bumps and chicanes

• Traffic lights at the exit from Clos Parc Radur would be timed to ensure that traffic leaving the estate would be given greater priority onto Llantrisant Road during peak times - enabling local residents to have the advantage over regional traffic that will, in any case, be encouraged to use the proposed park and ride facility at J33 as an alternative. Traffic light timings could be fine-tuned to ensure that this happens

• Cardiff Council, like R&MCC, have asked Arriva Trains to change their ticket pricing to introduce the same ticket price into Cardiff from Radyr and Taffs Well. This could help reduce the volume of traffic through Radyr, to the station. Speaking after the meeting the community council's chair, Cllr Ralph Vaughan, said:

"It was good to hear that quick progress is proposed, to improve road safety in Radyr and Morganstown - and the community council looks forward to seeing Cardiff Council's strategic plan later this year. All members of the community will have an opportunity to comment on the plan - and the community council will work with Cardiff Council to ensure that the plan is made as widely available as possible".

"I was also delighted to see the recent introduction of 20mph zones along Park Road and Cae'r Graig, making the roads safer for pupils attending Bryn Deri and Radyr primary schools. The Community Council has long campaigned for these improvements - and a special thank you must go to Councillor Rod Mckerlich for his work in lobbying for the new zones".






We also did two water activities which were raft building where we built rafts out of rope and barrels and then we went on the reservoir with our rafts and had lots of races. The girls won all of them!

Although the three youngsters have grown up in land-locked Radyr their mum, Siân, grew up in the Vale of Glamorgan with days spent on the beaches thus developing a life long interest in the sport of surf life saving. A truly multi-disciplined sport where "Everything we do is focused on saving a life, being prepared to act in a split second and able to respond when needed" it takes place in the pool, on the beach and in the sea. With close ties to swimming, athletics, kayaking, rowing, surfing and power boating the sport is based on the equipment and skills of lifeguards. Surf Life Saving Sport competition is a fantastic display of athleticism and an ultimate test of speed and fitness. Two years ago Siân enrolled her three youngsters, Amber, Aimee and Dominic with the Nippers section of Rhoose SLSC. The club runs weekly in-season training on Barry Island Beach and during out of season there are weekly training sessions at Fontygary Caravan Park, Rhoose.

One glorious summer day on Barry Island 10-year-old Aimee became the Welsh National Champion in the Beach Flags for her age group. She was thrilled when she received her gold medal.

Holywell Bay SLSC, Cornwall hosted the GB National Surf Life Saving Championship, for the second year running, during a week in August. 700 members from twenty-nine clubs nationwide completed and the host club organised all Masters, Youth and Nippers events as well as a full programme of evening entertainment, including film, music, food and drink. Unfortunately the heat wave broke the week before but that did not deter Amber and Aimee.

Although unused to strong surf both girls entered and completed various water races. Eight year-old Amber came 10th in the Board Relay for her age group whilst her older sister came 7th in the Girls Surf Relay and 10th in the Board Relay in her age group. On the beach Amber, in her age group, won a gold for the Beach Flags, a silver for the Beach Relay, a bronze for the Beach sprint and came 5th in the 1km run whilst Aimee, in her age group, came 4th in the Beach Flags, 4th the Beach Relay and 6th in the Beach Sprint.

Eleven-year-old Dominic decided not to enter competitions this year but concentrated on all that Bryn Deri could offer him and supported his fellow pupils in school and his mum and sisters outside of school. In July at the end of the Year 6 concert Dominic was awarded the "Spirit of Bryn Deri" award – an award presented by Bryn Deri Primary School to the Year Six pupil who during their time spent at the school embodied the vision and values of the school "to develop happy, caring and confident children with a positive attitude towards life and learning".
