

CBBC Star to turn on the Christmas Lights

This year's Christmas Tree lighting ceremony will be on Friday 6th December – weather permitting – and we are delighted to report that Welsh actress Leona Vaughan will be with us to turn on the lights. Leona is a Welsh actress from Caerphilly, and a proud patron of Tenovus Cancer Care, this year's sponsored charity. She attended the Mark Jermin Stage School and starred in CBBC's television series 'Wolfblood' as Jana and in 'Stella' (written by Ruth Jones) as Cerys.

Prior to the switch-on in Station Road, pupils from Gwaelod y Garth Primary School will be singing carols before the lighting of the tree in the Granny Park in Morganstown at 6.00pm and Radyr Comprehensive School pupils will be singing in Lychgate Gardens before the lighting of the tree there at 6.15pm. The action will then move to Windsor Gardens where a joint Choir from our two Primary Schools will sing carols before the tree is lit at 6:45pm. The Festival Queen and her attendants will also be there.

The lights will be lit in Station Road by Leona at 7:00pm precisely. Providing everyone has been good, Santa will arrive in his sleigh to talk to the young children. There is bound to be a bit of a queue so Santa will have some helpers around to keep everything in order. Every child will also be awarded a satsuma!

The Station Road stalls will be open from 6.00pm selling all sorts of goodies – crafts, gifts, jewellery and much more. Burgers, hot dogs and mulled wine will be available at the R&M Association stalls and the WI will be dispensing tea and coffee. Many of the shops will also be open, including Cicchetti, Slice and Radyr Tap, so you will be able to do some shopping and even stay for a meal. Tenovus will have a stall and be collecting during the evening. We are also planning on having a special photo booth, a snow machine and bouncy castle if we can fit them in!

Do come along and enjoy the festivities, arranged jointly between the R&M Association and the R&M Community Council. It is a lovely way to start the Christmas Season and entrance is free.

Radyr Girls Solidarity for Charity

When Rosie Vetter heard last November that a much-loved close relative had prostate cancer, she decided to turn her worry and sadness into positive action. She committed to run a half marathon every month for 12 months to raise £5000 for research to develop better treatment. Prostate cancer UK supported her with promotional materials, and she ran her first, the Gloucester half marathon in December 2018.

This was followed by Leicestershire, Bath, Solihull, Litchfield, Swansea, the Black Country, San Francisco in California, Cardiff and Birmingham. She managed, while protesting her hatred for running, to do them all just over the 2-hour mark. Her run over the Golden Gate bridge in August with one of her brothers, Max, might have been the most memorable, but that was before her friends intervened for the Cardiff half on October 6th.

The evening before the half marathon she was delighted and moved to tears when five of her closest school friends, with two additional supporters and partners, appeared unannounced at her family home the evening before the run. They brought with them video messages collected in secret, of her previous runs and from her far-flung family sending their love and wishing her luck.

Not satisfied with this her friends then shocked her even further by showing her a training video of them all practising to get fit for the occasion and announced that they were all running the half marathon with her the next morning. One of her friends, Lara Hall, was sadly injured in the training, so unable to run on the day. Rosie has now exceeded her £5000 target, thanks to so many wonderful family, friends and Radyr neighbours. Her last two half marathons. Richmond and Pisa with her partner Kieran, will be greatly boosted by this wonderful show of strong friendship love and female solidarity. What amazing young women they all are. From the Rectory

The Light shines in the darkness As I reflect on the events of 2019 it is tempting to believe we live in a dark, dark world. This has been the year in which 39 migrants died in a refrigerated lorry and aid agencies told us one child dies of pneumonia every 39 seconds. War and want, floods and heat waves have driven us to ponder whether belief in God is possible or whether we just need to rethink how to live more carefully on this earth.

In his book "The Magic Of Reality", Richard Dawkins, the well-known atheist, attempted to "demolish the Judeo-Christian myth" and prove that "science is better than religion". He says we should warn our children,

"against believing in fairy tales as well as God" because "novels about witches and spells have a pernicious effect". My own childhood was filled with fairy tales, myths and stories. Perhaps The Secret Seven, The Famous Five and The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe damaged me irreparably! Yet in this world of darkness I need to hear good news and imaginative stories. I could blame the tooth fairy, Father Christmas and a mother with eyes at the back of her head for wrecking my rationality but I give thanks for the ways in which stories have helped me see a world beyond my own. During Advent Christians watch and wait in prayerful expectancy. Advent means "coming" or "arrival." We begin in darkness on Advent Sunday and move falteringly towards the light as we tell stories of a Light that came to us once as a vulnerable baby, a murdered man, and who still comes to us daily and often quite unexpectedly in the weak, the vulnerable, the tortured and the one who forgives us and loves us when we least expect it.

I hope you will join us in Christ Church for on 22nd December for a Candlelit Christmas Carol Service -In words and music we will tell the story of God's unfolding plan, to save you and me from ourselves. Please come along with your children to our Christingle Service and Christmas Tree Festival at 5pm on 15th December when holding oranges, tied with blood red ribbons and glow sticks shining in the darkness we will wonder whether we can all be light in the darkness today. On Christmas Eve at 4pm bring children to our Crib Service dressed up as shepherds, angels or wise men to take part in the greatest story ever told. Perhaps you will hear a baby cry and see God is with us in the face of an infant.

At Midnight Mass at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve perhaps the stars will dance and the angels sing and a child will be born in your heart and mine. Just imagineand on Christmas morning I hope you will join us to celebrate at 8am or 11am.

If you prefer to worship in the wonderful atmosphere of our old parish church - St John's Danescourt do join

us for a Christingle Service and Christmas Tree Festival at 5pm on 8th December, for "Carols around the Crib" 6pm on 20th December, for our Christmas Eve service at 9pm and on Christmas Day at 9.15am

Whatever Mr. Dawkins tells us, many of us know that one small child changed the way we see the world by showing us that love is stronger than hatred. Light can and will overcome darkness.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Butternut Squash, aubergine and lentil moussaka with feta

A delicious , filling vegetarian dish that freezes well. Serves 8

For the lentils

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 large onion finely chopped
- 1 celery stick diced
- 2 garlic cloves crushed
- 250g. (9oz) puy lentils
- 2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes
- 1 bay leaf
- ¹/₂ tspn. dried oregano 5cm piece cinnamon
- For other vegetables

700g.($1^{1/2}$ lb) squash (peeled, deseeded, cut into pieces - $1^{1/2}$ cm thick) prepared weight 2 large aubergines + oil

For the sauce 75g (3 oz) butter 75g (3 oz) plain flour 600ml (good pint) milk generous grating of nutmeg 90g (3¹/₂ oz) Gruyere cheese, grated 30g (good 1oz) Parmesan, grated 115g (4oz) Feta, crumbled 2 large eggs beaten

Heat oil in pan Saute onion + celery till soft Add garlic, cook few mins Add lentils, tomatoes, bay, oregano, cinnamon + 250ml (nearly ¹/₂ pt.) water Season and cook approx. 25mins.

Place squash in roasting tin Brush with oil and season Roast in oven 200C, Gas 6 approx 20 mins until tender. Slice aubergines into rounds 1/2 cm thick Warm oil in large frying pan Cook aubergine on both sides in batches Drain on kitchen paper. Melt butter in pan Add flour, stir over med. heat. Gradually stir in flour and cook till thick, stirring all the time Add nutmeg and s+p Add half grated cheese Remove from heat Stir in beaten eggs Taste for seasoning Use a deep gratin dish or tin 23x31x7cm deep Pour lentils in first and smooth (remove cinnamon + bay) Cover with layer of squash + aubergines Pour over sauce Sprinkle rest of cheese Crumble over Feta Bake 30-40 mins until top golden . Radyr Medical Centre, Macmillan Cancer Support and Cardiff and Vale University Health Board have collaborated in commissioning the new role of Macmillan Cancer Wellbeing Coordinator, which is a wonderful example of our investment in the health of our community. Jane Breeze is available to see patients who have been diagnosed with or who are living with cancer, to provide support to them and family members/carers.

Patients need to be registered with Radyr Medical Centre, or at Llwyncelyn surgery, Whitchurch Village surgery or Bishops Road surgery to be eligible for this service.

Your GP can refer you to this service, or you can self-refer by completing a short form available at the reception in the four Medical Centres that are taking part in the scheme.

The role of the Wellbeing Coordinator is to provide advice on a range of NON-MEDICAL topics, and to signpost the person to relevant resources. This includes health and wellbeing programmes, support groups, learning and social opportunities such as singing groups or art groups, practical support such as welfare advice and money management, emotional support or even to discuss a number of

THE EXORCISM

The Radyr Drama Society's autumn production was **The Exorcism** by Don Taylor, not to be confused with the Exorcist. The Exorcism was completely new to me, I have never been aware of it being produced anywhere in the UK and as such I am grateful to the RDS for bringing this interesting play to my attention. From the programme notes it seems to have been first produced er the BBC in 1972 in a series called The Dead of Night. A spine chilling ghost story for Christmas.

Taylor's basic idea is that houses can develop malign feelings from what has happened within their walls. Dan and Margaret are spending Christmas day with their friends, Edmund and Rachel, at their newly restored cottage somewhere deep in the country. A lovely set by Raymond Rivron and Dave Burgess. At first everything goes well, then as Edmund starts to carve the turkey the lights go out. Edmund thinks that the wine is blood and all are affected by stomach pains after trying the turkey.

Things get worse, Rachel plays a piece of music she doesn't know, with dreadful forebodings. They cannot open the doors nor smash the glass in the windows and it is unnaturally dark outside.

Director Gill Evans made the most of this tense drama with the help of some spine chilling music and effects conjured up by Tony Watson and some atmospheric lighting by Geoff Davies.

This was a four hander and the actors were onstage for most of the time, no mean feat in a play that lasts two hours. They are to be congratulated for at no time did I feel that they had lost or were about to loose their lines. With acting of this caliber the tension built and I often felt the hairs on the back of my neck tingle.

Towards the end, Rachel is taken over by the spirit of a previous occupant of the cottage, a woman



who had lived there one hundred years earlier, around 1870 - the play is set in 1970. She had watched her husband hang and her children starve to death. The curse that she puts on the area and the landed family who owned the "big house" nearby seems to drip from the walls. Melanie McLeod is to be congratulated for the way she handled this long and difficult monologue.

In fact all the actors. Patrick Baker, Peter Griffiths and Helen Blundell are to be congratulated in the way they paced this difficult spine chilling drama.

It had a good audience the night I attended, but RDS can always do with more people in the audience and those of you who missed it missed a real treat.

The RDS's next production will be Bullshot Crummond at the end of April 2020.


A 'Slice of the Good Life'

How the smallest of spaces is having a big impact in Radyr village. Rebecca Lewis-Chapman, Director at The IAD Company, Radyr. Following the closure of the old sandwich shop in Radyr village we were left for what felt like months to speculate about what the new owners would do with the space. Rumours were flying, whispers had intensified in to quiet (but still dignified) chatter and still we were none the wiser. Well, we are now 18 months on from the grand opening and I think it is fair to say that nobody could have predicted what a success story the new venture would turn out to be.

Speaking as both a local resident, and a local business owner, it has been an absolute pleasure to watch Radyr's newest deli, Slice, go from strength to strength as a fledgling business over the course of 2019. The energy, enthusiasm and fun that Gam, Matt and their team bring in to work with them every day is infectious, and I find it impossible to leave without a smile on my face every time I drop by.

I can still remember Radyr village as a youngster in the 1980s, it was the kind of place you travelled through to get somewhere, rather than a destination in itself. The difference between then and now is like night and day. From the gorgeous window displays at Ener-Chi, to the hub bub and chatter of friends meeting up for drinks at Radyr Tap and the constant stream of people coming and going to Cicchettis, Radyr village has really transformed into somewhere we can all be proud of – with Slice right at the heart of it.

As anybody who has eaten there will tell you, the food that Slice has to offer is delicious. From meaty snacks to veggie friendly treats there is something for everyone, and it is always worthwhile checking out the daily specials for something a little bit different. Whatever your dietary needs nothing is too much trouble. When I spotted a Thai green curry (my favourite) on the specials board I was devastated to find out that the only filling was chicken. Sure enough, the very next day a vegetarian option had been added to the menu. That kind of responsiveness, personal service and genuine care for the customer is absolutely typical of what the Slice team offer.



The same imaginative flair, attention to detail and quality delivery that has made Slice's sandwiches become prized treats (within my office at least!) is also evident in how they have chosen to use the space that they have available to them. When you arrive at the shop the first thing you will notice are the meticulously cared for plants outside the front of the shop. From there you walk on in to the cosy and functional shop front where you will be warmly greeted by Joe, while Gam works her magic in the prep zone everything has a purpose, everything has a function, and everything works.

Back out again and through the gate in to the (not very) Secret Garden Seating Area. Here you will find yourself in a family-friendly covered courtyard area filled with bench style seating and an outside bar. The space has a family friendly atmosphere which adds to its appeal, with children encouraged to have fun and play whilst their parents enjoy the lovely food and drinks on offer. During the summer it was lovely to see the children enjoying imaginative play and building little dens, while their parents watched on.

When dropping by in the evenings you will be treated to a great playlist which is always set to a volume that creates a fun atmosphere without requiring you to raise your voice in order to have a conversation. Getting older alert!

At the back of the space stands Slice's latest addition, the Cabin Bar. This gorgeous timber structure was erected at the beginning of the summer to

house the bar and allow the business to extend its hospitality offering into the evenings. The space has a distinctly 'après ski' feel to it, with chunky timber and warm intimate lighting dominating the interior. There are seasonably appropriate blankets strewn across the seating and if that's not enough to keep you warm, one of Joe's generous G&T's is sure to do the job.

The bar itself is made out of a single slab of timber, which still has all of the natural dents, knots and undulations from when it still stood in the ground. This has created a stunning centre piece for the cabin but is not always conducive to easy drink making – Joe can sometimes be overheard proudly bragging that he has only ever spilled one drink as a result of his challenging work surface.

Through a series of small, incremental changes Slice have created a destination for us all to enjoy. They have repurposed the land to really take advantage of their central village location, which has previously sat unused. They have put in hard work, passion and vision and the results are fantastic.

This small but mighty independent coffee shop has only been open for 18 months and has already made a huge difference to village life in Radyr. I can't wait to see what they are going to do next!

Community Council News

There can be little doubt that **traffic** problems have hit the headlines over the past few weeks. Local social media sites have been busy with complaints about delays for motorists, especially during peak travel times. This is, of course, primarily a matter for Plasdwr and Cardiff Council. We have, however, had frequent discussions about this issue with the developers whilst posting any fresh information on our website. There is, of course, a degree of inevitability about this situation - as 7,000 homes are built as part of Plasdwr, on our doorstep - but the failure to deploy adequate, sensible, optimally timed traffic lights at the road works on Llantrisant Road constitutes a significant low-point for Plasdwr and its contractors.

As we reported on our website (in June) these road works on the Heol Isaf roundabout will be with us until at least the summer of 2020. We will press Plasdwr for a 'lessons learned' report, arising from the serious inconvenience caused to residents in recent weeks. We will also ask them about future, scheduled works along Llantrisant Road, and how they will seek to keep the inevitable disruption to a minimum.

In the meantime, we continue to liaise with Cardiff Council about **road improvements** within Radyr and Morganstown - with a view to making our roads safer - and making as pleasant as possible the public spaces through which our main roads pass. To this end, we have developed ideas with regard to the Station Road area which we hope to share with the community in the near future.

Many readers will have seen the new **Nextbikes** station outside McColls on Station Road. This is aimed at encouraging more of us to chose an active travel option as we move around our community and the city. Have you used Nextbikes? Let us know way you think, by contacting us through our website.

Our work to improve the **children's' playground near Drovers' Way** continues. We recently held a site meeting with Cardiff's drainage officials, following which a solution to the problem of mud and water flowing



across the playground was developed. This work should be undertaken before the end of January - and then, at last, the new play equipment will be installed.

At the same time, Cardiff Council has agreed to undertake a feasibility study, to consider altering the tarmac playarea (near the Drovers' Way playground) into a 3G **Multi-use Games Arena**. This would be fantastic news for children and youngsters across Radyr and Morganstown.

We have also issued invitations to local organisations and experts to work with us to develop ideas with regard to providing facilities and opportunities for our **young people**. An important part of this work will be engaging with youngsters across the community - to find out what they think of Radyr and Morganstown - and what they think should be done to improve life for them.

We have met with several officials across Cardiff Council to discuss the ideas we submitted for their infrastructure ideas list. These ranged from installing proper bus shelters to a new community hall on the Mound Field. Times are very hard, financially, of course, but we will keep you posted about any developments. And we will continue to liaise with Cardiff Council to ensure that our proposals are borne in mind as and when money becomes available. You can see our infrastructure proposals on our website (just search for 'infrastructure' on our site).

We have a **new piano** at the OCR! The old one had a broken sustain pedal and was beginning to sound very muffled! We hope that groups using the OCR will enjoy the new instrument!

Our **lunch club** continues to meet at Radyr Golf Club - where we always receive a very warm welcome and some very tasty meals. This meets on Wednesday lunchtimes, twice a month. Lunches are followed by a talk (we've heard about the work of GCHQ, the history of maps and much more). Please contact our office if you would like to attend. You will be very welcome!

We continue our work at **Pentwyn Park**, where steps have been taken to

clear the footpath of the large puddles that collected there following rain. We are also working to rebuild the wall between the park and the car park situated behind the adjacent flats.

Work at **Radyr Woods** continues, also. This is a hugely valuable resource - but we are short of volunteers to help develop and maintain the site. Please contact us if you would like to help.

We objected recently to the **proposed development of 45 homes** in woodlands behind Danescourt. This woodland is part of the glorious wooded footpath that leads from Radyr to Llandaf. You can see our objection on our website (search for Taff Housing).

Some of you might have noticed that a new speed limit has appeared between the Ty Nant and Ynys Bridge. Up until now there was a 40 m.p.h. limit sign just after the Ty Nant heading north, this has been taken down. The 30 m.p.h sign still exists at Pugh's heading south, although a new 30 m.p.h sign has appeared on the Ynys Bridge. The road between the Ynys Bridge and the Ty Nant



heading south seems to be in some kind of no mans land. No indication has been given as to if and when the new regulation will come into force.

Since the Chain went to press a sign has appeared along the road between the Ty Nant and Ynys Bridge conforming that it is now a 30 mph limit with immediate effect.



Dear Editor

I note from reading the October 2019 copy of the Radyr Chain, RCM's insistence on pursuing a statutory limit of 20 mph throughout Radyr and Morganstown. Has no one taken any notice of the letters from Professor John L Harwood on the subject of pollution relative to speed? He is an expert in the field, as his letters in previous copies of the magazine clearly show.

Many areas around the U.K. justifiably and correctly have a speed limit of 20 mph approaching schools for safety reasons. Many have lights that flash around school entry and exit times, but the speed outside these times is at 30. Could this not be considered as an alternative?

I drove from the Ynys bridge along Heol Isaf this morning and a car, three ahead of me had clearly decided to travel at 20. I followed it out of interest to Llantrisant road before turning back to Radyr. It was mid morning and not a busy time. When checking my rear view mirror at Radyr Comp, vehicles were tailing back as far I could see. Maybe the pollution levels could be checked at both speeds. Would a compromise at 25mph outside of school starting and leaving times be a possible compromise? Perhaps Professor Harwood could advise on this.

Finally, I note when driving around that the percentage of homes with the 20's Plenty sign in the garden is very low. I have been asked and refused to put one in mine. Presumably, so have many other residents. Is this a case of the usual ignoring of the silent majority? May I ask that this is looked into further before a decision is made to go ahead with the plan.



As 1919 dawned the British Government had a new problem, how to record and recognise the carnage that had gone on over the previous four years.

Fabian Ware had been too old to volunteer for the army in 1914, but had quickly enlisted with the Red Cross. Early in the War he became aware that the provision for recording and marking the war graves was insufficient. His work led to the creation of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

It was largely on Ware's suggestion that the British Government decided not to repatriate the fallen of the First World War. This was contrary to the wishes of many of the families of the fallen who had wanted their loved ones near at hand.

As part of the commemoration of the end of the War in 1919 the Government commissioned Edward Lutyens, probably the leading architect of the Edwardian era, who was responsible for the grandiose Imperial buildings in New Delhi, to create a Cenotaph in Whitehall. He first created a temporary structure of wood and plaster but so many thousands of families of the fallen came to lay their floral tributes at the Cenotaph in 1919 that the Government had to rethink and convert it into a permanent structure of Portland stone.
