The R&M Film Club

Our new season starts with “**Mary Shelley**” on our regular fourth Thursday in the month, 27th September. It is a romantic period-drama set in 1814 during the Regency period. The film is about Mary’s first love and her romantic relationship with the married poet Percy Shelley that was complicated by her stepsister Claire. This episode in her life was the inspiration for Mary to write “Frankenstein”.

In October we have another French language film with English subtitles - **La Belle et La Bête**

(Beauty and the Beast). It is a re-rendered (now in high definition) version of Jean Cocteau’s classic 1946 film. The story is of a gentle-hearted beast in love with a simple and beautiful girl. She is drawn to the repellent but strangely fascinating Beast, who tests her fidelity by giving her a key, telling her that if she doesn’t return it to him by a specific time, he will die of grief. She is unable to return the key on time, but it is revealed that the Beast is the genuinely handsome one. A simple tale of tragic love that turns into a surreal vision of death, desire, and beauty. A treat not to be missed on Thursday 25th October.

The November film is a light-hearted comedy starring Donald Sutherland and Helen Mirren in “**The Leisure Seeker**”. The Leisure Seeker is a ‘recreational vehicle’ or what we would call a ‘motor home’. John and Ella Spencer take one last road trip from Boston to the Hemingway House in the Florida Keys before old age and infirmity can catch up with them. Put the date in your diary – 22nd November.

WORLD WAR I COMMEMORATION

This year, of course, marks the 100th anniversary of the end of WWI. The R&M WWI Committee have been organising events for the last four years and major things are planned for the commemoration of the end of the war in 1918. We understand that a special edition of Radyr Chain will be produced shortly giving full information, but here is a quick foretaste of what is to come; it just so happens that Remembrance Sunday this year actually falls on 11th November.

Remembrance Sunday Road Closure.

The attention of members is drawn to the closure of roads in central Radyr on Sunday 11th November to facilitate the Remembrance Day parade and service at the War Memorial. Heol Isaf from Christ Church to Station Road and Windsor Road and Kings Road from Taff Terrace will be closed from 10.15 to 11.15. Station Road from its junction with Windsor Crescent will be closed for 15 minutes from 10.15 to 10.30. A further closure of about 15 minutes will take place at around 12.15 as the parade returns.

All residents are welcome to attend this evocative event, both in Heol Isaf, where the focus is on a minute’s silence at 11:00, and the following service in Christ Church.

Remembering the Peace.

After commemorating four years of the First World War it will be a pleasure to celebrate the Peace. Elaborate preparations are being planned by the Community Council and the WWI Committee to celebrate the event. The days leading up to 11th November will see a showing of the film Oh! What a Lovely War, with an all star cast including Maggie Smith and Laurence Olivier; a tea in the Methodist Church; a dinner in the Golf Club; and a concert on the Saturday evening, featuring the Radyr Comprehensive School Choir, the City of Cardiff Melingriffith Brass Band and soloists.

Many knitters in Radyr have been working tirelessly to produce poppies which will be laid out around the War Memorial and will cascade down from Christ Church tower. Those who took part in the Great War will be given individual recognition in an exhibition in Windsor Road Park.

Finally all primary schoolchildren will be given a commemorative mug. These will be distributed through the two primary schools. **If you have a child of Primary School age who doesn't go to school in Radyr, please contact the Clerk to the Community Council at clerk@radyr.wales**

COMMUNITY CHARITY 2019/20

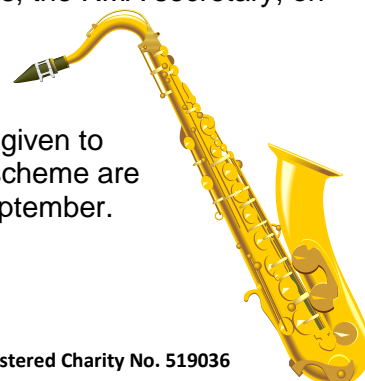

SPEEDING, TRAFFIC AND PLANNING

We note with pleasure that the Community Council have agreed to set up a Road Safety Advisory Subcommittee. The Subcommittee, its terms of reference, work tasks and membership are being formed and will meet soon. This, along with the welcome introduction of 20mph zones around our primary schools, shows that action is at last being taken to try to get things under control.

Having said that, we look with increasing dismay and alarm at the further despoliation of all the countryside on our boundaries. Where once there were fields and hedgerows we now see vast areas just laid bare. We note the pretty visionary pictures put forward by Plasdŵr and we hope – for their and our sakes – that the emerging wider community is as harmonious as is made out. In the meantime, we are all having to suffer the dirt, traffic delays, and inconvenience of a major development; and it will go on for years.

Even more alarmingly, at the last meeting of the North West Cardiff Group (of which the Association is a member), it was reported that the latest map of the proposed South Wales Metro no longer shows a line between Fairwater and Creigiau. This is the line that was planned to go through Plasdŵr. Does that mean that Plasdŵr will never be served by a rail line and all future traffic must inevitably be by road? Questions are being asked.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HISTORY SOCIETY
