



THE CORN IS GREEN

Many theatre goers were disappointed that the professional Swansea-based theatre company, Fluellen, did not appear at this year's Festival. Instead we saw Rhodri Miles's excellent one-man show *Burton*, now happily established in Hollywood. Fluellen have been a regular at the Festival for a number of years bringing excellent productions like *The Odd Couple*, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, *Under Milk Wood* and *The Caretaker* to Morganstown Village Hall. They had to give this year's Festival a miss because their summer production did not open at Swansea's Grand Theatre until early June.

Happily they have been persuaded to return to Morganstown Village Hall this September with Emlyn Williams's best known play, *The Corn is Green*. George Emlyn Williams was born in Mostyn, Flintshire into a coal mining family and *The Corn is Green* is semi-autobiographical. It tells of how Morgan Evans escapes from the pits to study at Oxford through the efforts of a spinster school-mistress, Miss Moffatt. A pattern which Emlyn Williams himself followed.

Miss Moffatt is a part much loved by actresses and has been performed on film by both Bette Davis – herself of Welsh extraction – and Katherine Hepburn. In fact, *The Corn is Green* is rarely out of production, being almost more popular "across the pond" than in this country.

Emlyn Williams went on to become a famous actor and playwright. Among his other best known plays is *A Night Must Fall*. A young actor – Richard Burton – made his west end debut in his play *Druid's Rest* and Emlyn Williams directed Burton in the film *The Last Days of Dolwyn*.

Emlyn Williams appeared in such films as *Jamaica Inn* and *The L-Shaped Room* and wrote the screenplay of

Hitchcock's *The Man Who Knew Too Much*. One of the auditoria in Clwyd Theatr Cymru's home base at Mold is named after him.

The Corn is Green can be seen at Morganstown Village Hall at 7.30pm on Thursday, 23rd September. Tickets will be available from early August.

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A New Library for Radyr and Morganstown

The front page article in the April edition of Radyr Chain set out the two options for the construction of a new, larger library for Radyr and Morganstown. Residents were asked to return a yellow slip setting out their preference; 319 favoured building a new library in Park Road while 180 wanted it to be built on the site in the Sidings. Two competing petitions were drawn up and the one favouring the Park Road site had 750 signatures which were considerably more than the petition in favour of the Sidings site. These results were in line with the views expressed by respondents to the Village Plan survey. I have to conclude that the overall wish of the community is that the library should be situated in Park Road.

When I was elected as your County Councillor in May 2008, I discovered that the Council Executive had decided in 2005 after some local consultation that the library should remain in Park Road; this was broadly in accord with the wishes of the Community Council and Community Association who supported this position but also wanted the land at the Sidings to be used for a community purpose. For a variety of reasons, no progress was made in any of these projects between 2005 and 2008 but a sum of approx £400K in planning gain is available to partially cover the cost and this must be spent by October 2012. I am now anxious to move on, after all necessary consultation, and build our new library in Park Road. I understand the disappointment of those who favoured the alternative site (and there were good arguments in favour of either site) but now we must move on together to plan the new build, get planning permission, make interim arrangements for library facilities and accommodate as many desirable, new features as possible. To set this in motion, I will meet Council officers in early June to initiate the project.

If we are unable to persuade the developer, Taylor Wimpey, to

change the legal agreement, it is probable that the Sidings site will be lost to our community. In my view, Taylor Wimpey is adopting an unworthy position; the offer of land was contingent on their obtaining planning permission to build and sell a quantity of homes. They have built more than in the outline plan; the homes are selling well. Why should they seek additional, undeserved profit at the expense of our community? I will look for the support of our community in advancing this argument forcibly.

If any resident wants to meet me to receive further information, my contact details are below; if the numbers are large I will arrange a public meeting. As this is a matter of considerable local interest, I will ask the Editors of the Chain for space to give further updates.

A TRIP TO STACKPOLE - A pupil diary

On Monday, 19th April, a coach arrived at Radyr Primary to take us and 37 other pupils to Stackpole in Pembrokeshire. After about an hour, most people were getting hot and needed a toilet break. So we stopped off at the services in Pont Abraham. When we got back on the coach, we waited another hour until we got to Stackpole.

We were starting to pass lots of fields with cows and sheep, which must have been a sign that we were in the countryside. When we finally arrived at Stackpole, we were greeted by a lady named Louise. She instructed us to take our belongings out of the coach. When we got off, she also told us to take our cases and leave them on the grass in front of the centre. Then we sat on the grass and she told us what life would be like for the next five days.

We were in a room called 'Rabbit's Warren'. We were sharing our room with Rhianna and Ellen. There were two sets of bunk beds and two wardrobes (one was extra large, big enough for two people's clothes). There was one window with a breathtaking view of the pond and a nice radiator in the corner. We soon heard a knock at the door, with a few of our friends desperate to see our room. When we had unpacked and worked out where we would sleep, we were told to go down to the common room.

When we were in the common room, after a yummy meal of rolls and fruit, we were told what activity we would be doing first. We were all going to explore the area around the Stackpole centre. We walked down the hill of doom and visited the 8-Arch Bridge. There was a very pretty river flowing underneath it and Louise told us about the Cardors of Cornwall. They were a Scottish family who lived in a big mansion across the river. They owned the Stackpole estate and did lots with it.

Here's a funny story they told us! One day, Mr. Cardor woke up and looked out of his massive window, which looked over the Stackpole Estate. The Fog Show was also the best ever with 45 dogs on show from the waggiest tail to the prettiest legs – they were all winners. It's a big thanks again to Val and Tom Allen who raised over £500. on these two events.

The Association team dashed from the Gymkhana to Parc Radur for the Concert in the Park. Thanks to our sponsors Taylor Wimpey, our Staging Experts MAC Scaffolding, the Tennis Club for their electric power, St. Leger for the professional connections and to Beverley Lewis for her organisation. Over 300 residents turned up with their picnic baskets, some contained mainly liquid refreshment! Welcome to our newest councillor, Ed Watt of Gelynis Farm. We are delighted to have him on the council with his energy and enthusiasm!

On June 23 there may be an election for the Community Council in Radyr South ward. This would be the first time there has been an election since the late 1980s. The elected councillor will bring the number of councillors to 12 which gives us 4 councillors for each of the three wards in R&M; the others being Radyr North and Morganstown.

Every council vacancy is advertised for election but it is rare that there is more than one candidate. If only one person stands they are elected unopposed. If no one stands, the Community Council must then co-opt by further advertisement and interview.

Only the electors in Radyr South can vote in this election. You are in Radyr South if you vote at the Methodist Hall in Windsor Road. Poll cards will be sent out by Cardiff Council Under the 1983 Representation of the People Act, the Community Council is responsible for the cost of the election although the process is managed by Cardiff Council. The cost for this by-election will be some £3,000 and we have money in reserve to cover it.

The Village Plan will be delivered to all households shortly. At the back is a list of projects identified from the Questionnaire and good progress is being made on many of them. The Plan has provided some focus for a number of things that people would like done and the RMA, R&MCC and Cllr McKerlich are working together.

As one of the R&MCC projects we are planning a community event in Pentwyn Park in the early autumn. This green space between Pentwyn and Cae'r Graig is owned by R&MCC. There was a small play area there but it was removed a few years ago after repeated vandalism that made it dangerous for little children to use, cost tens of thousands of pounds to repair and residents' understandable complaints. We plan to plant bulbs and put up bird boxes and will be inviting you to attend, particularly if you use and live near the park.

The future of Radyr Library has been a controversial issue. There was a good response to the article in the last Chain and some 500 emails and reply slips were returned. There was support for both keeping the library in Park Road and moving it to the community plot at Radyr Sidings. Overall, the support was 2:1 in favour of Park Road. This information has been given to Cllr McKerlich along with a petition in favour of the Sidings signed by 114 people. 750 people signed a petition asking R&MCC to support the Park Road site. The Community Council and RMA supported the Sidings site as a way of spreading our community facilities throughout R&M to encourage the integration of the new areas with the long-standing ones. The final decision has always lain with Cardiff Council. R&MCC supports Cllr McKerlich in achieving as quickly as possible, as large a new building as is possible on the Park Road site, with the best facilities for our community.

The weather summary - by John Trenchard

The daily weather article in *The Guardian* newspaper on 10th May this year refers to our rainfall, saying "The spring continues to unfold more slowly than usual because of the prolonged cool spell, disguising the fact that low rainfall is also threatening a summer drought. It is easy to forget after a series of wet summers that over abstraction from the aquifers for drinking water is still drying out the upper reaches of most of the rivers of southern England. The flows for the last three years have only been maintained by heavier than normal summer rainfall".

Here in Cardiff since August, 2009 there has only been one month with above average rainfall when there were 237.7mm, 79% of the 1970-2000 average. April 2010 produced another month of low rainfall with only 36.5mm, 49% of the average. During this month of May a lot of dry days seem likely. Cardiff's longer term rainfall has been 294.5mm, 73% up to 30th April this year, compared with 327.6mm, 81% for the same time last year. Over a longer period of time from 28th July, 2008 to 30th April, 2009 there has been 1024.1mm, 97% whilst up to 30th April, 2010, there has been 2315.0mm, 99%.

The nights of the 2nd, 3rd, 11th and 12th May threatened a ground frost in places as the temperature just above the surface of the ground varied between 1.1C to 1.8C. Looking for any frost damage on the 13th on my allotment, only a few of my potatoes had been damaged a little whilst my strawberry plants in flower had no frost damage. However, in frost-prone locations, the frost damage may well have been much worse.

Nevertheless, spare a thought for those people in the frost-prone parts of the British Isles, especially gardeners in Yorkshire on the morning of the 13th, who suffered a lot of frost damage when the air temperature fell to minus 3C to minus 5C, whilst several degrees C lower just above the ground surface. No doubt, inland areas of Wales would have had a frost. For example, in south Wales at Sennybridge in Powys, the air temperature fell to minus 2.3C, but lower just above the ground surface.

SWEENEY TODD – REVIEW –

[Performance on Saturday, 24th
April, 2010]

"Ladies and Gentlemen, I fear that what I am going to say will spoil your appetites; but the truth is beautiful at all times".

With an in-the-round set that included the stage, together with twenty-eight speaking parts, we were promised a spectacular staging of director Allan Cook's adaptation of the 1846 Penny Dreadful, *The String of Pearls*, famous for its central character, Sweeney Todd. And so it proved to be. The production was set in the context of music hall, with audience contributions to booing

and hissing the villain encouraged by the cast who stood round the auditorium when not actual performing and with apposite scene-setting by a master of ceremonies who periodically left his dais to enter the action himself.

The broad outline of the plot is well known: barber murders customers whose bodies are then recycled as the filling in suspiciously delicious meat pies. Along the way a devoted sweetheart investigates the mysterious disappearance of her lover, in the process dressing up as a boy to infiltrate the barber's shop where the finger of suspicion in the form of her lover's dog seems to point. Prompted by greed and self-preservation, the barber 'polishes off' one and all, poisons his baker accomplice and incarcerates his young assistant in a madhouse. The full horror of

Todd's murderous activities is uncovered in the crypt of St. Dunstan's church adjacent to the barber's, the villain is arrested, the assistant liberated, the missing lover found slaving in the pie-shop to be re-united with his girl.

The cast clearly relished the opportunities afforded by such a fantastic plot. Roger Page as Sweeney exuded dark malevolence punctuated by a wonderfully telling laugh, his strong central performance moving the action at a brisk pace; Helen Windsor gave us a splendidly grotesque Mrs. Lovatt; Sarah Jones played the religious fanatic Mrs. Oakley with great conviction; Gill Evans was a suitably sinister proprietor of the lunatic asylum. John Hopkins, Martin Jeeves and Brian Willis demonstrated their versatility in playing multiple characters. The cast also included a number of younger actors who gave assured performances: Emily Cade as the determined Johanna Oakley; Gareth Powell as the Colonel; Will Fox in a variety of parts. Special praise must go to Charlie Jones for his sensitive portrayal of Todd's assistant, Tobias Ragg. Other members of the cast lent solid support.

As mentioned above, the production utilised the space in an innovative way. The set was imaginative and the lighting and sound contributed to the atmosphere of gloom and doom. Mention must be made of Hector, created and operated by Dave Burgess who in all respects, brought the dog to life.

At one point, Sweeney Todd haggles with a dealer in jewellery over the price he is seeking for the string of pearls. The dealer claims that they are not the real deal. This production, like the pearls, was a real gem.

All those seeds that were sown and nurtured earlier in the year are ready and anxious to be planted out. Whilst waiting for conditions to improve, it gives some time to reflect upon the past year's activities of the Gardening Club and look forward to future activities. 
