Radyr Geography Department Iceland Trip

February half term saw the Geography department's first trip to Iceland, the 'land of fire and ice', and it proved to be a truly memorable experience. From majestic waterfalls to giant tears in the earth's surface, from the vibrant capital city of Reykjavik to remote farms - we witnessed the constantly changing face of Iceland, and a community that has learnt to live with the constant threat of earthquakes and volcanoes.

On arrival at Keflavik airport we immediately transferred across a barren 'lunar' landscape to the geothermal baths of the Blue Lagoon. The milky blue waters are set amidst black lava, and despite slightly warmer temperatures than Cardiff (at first!) the 40 plus degree waters were a fantastic welcome to Iceland.

During the first half of the trip we visited several of Iceland's most impressive waterfalls including Skogafoss, a 25m curtain of water which thunders 60m down a basalt cliff (this was formed after the last ice age when the earth's crust rebounded once the weight of the ice had been lifted from it!). Pupils are seen here in front of Seljalandsfoss – a smaller but

IOLANTHE...as you have never seen it before!



In February, Radyr Parish Music Group re-visited Gilbert & Sullivan's operetta Iolanthe, after a gap of sixteen years. The new production was trailed as "Iolanthe as you have never seen it before" and so it proved to be.

The action was transferred from the 19th century to the 1960's, the time of hippies, flower power etc. and the combination of peers and politicised hippie/fairies proved to be very fertile ground for the cast.

The Director resisted the temptation to update the libretto to suit the more modern period, perhaps because of the difficulty of wholesale translation of W.S. Gilbert's inventive, but zany (particularly in this case) story lines. Nothing was lost by not doing so – the words seemed to fit the period perfectly, or at least as much as any

story about fairies could and the dialogue was as humorous as ever.

The introduction of hippies gave the ever-inventive Director, Gill Evans, many opportunities to fill the stage with all sorts of action. Perhaps one's only complaint is that one really needed to see the show three or four times in order to absorb all that was going on. I became so absorbed in watching a potted marijuana plant grow that I am sure I missed several little 'playlets' going on at the same time!

Musically the production was very good. In a show with plenty of good tunes and many soloists, the latter all acquitted themselves very well, including two newcomers in the form of Elizabeth Daghish as Phyllis and Paul Atkins as Private Willis. We were also treated, not unusually, to a small master-class by Brian Willis in the Lord Chancellor's very funny and difficult 'nightmare' scene, which

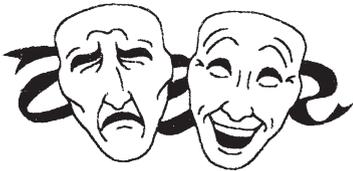
must have rung a few bells with any insomniacs in the audience. The Musical Director, Tessa Davies, also did a fine job with the Chorus, which is not always singled out for praise, but certainly deserved it in this show.

As we have come to expect, almost as if by right, the orchestra assembled, rehearsed and conducted by Simon Davison and ably supported by Pauline Gutteridge, was first class, one of the best ever, so error free that one almost forgot they were there (this comment is to be taken as a compliment) – astonishing when one considers the youth of practically all of the musicians.

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STORYTELLER

The Festival literary event will be a talk by Donald Sturrock on Roald Dahl. Sturrock's biography of Dahl, *Storyteller*, was nominated for a number of awards in 2011, including the Samuel Johnson prize and won the Spear Book Award for Biography. It also won great applause from the critics. The Telegraph called it "A superb biography", while The Times said "It is a measure of the greatness of this biography that Sturrock is able to get behind Dahl's fantasies and exaggerations without losing respect of sympathy".

In fact, Dahl's life reads like one of his own fantasies. Born in 1916, the family moved around Cardiff for a number of years. It was while the family were living at Ty Mynydd in Radyr that his sister and father died within a period of months of one another and are buried in Radyr's Parish Church, St. John's. Roald was left in the charge of his formidable mother, Sofie Magdalene.

After a period at private school, then Repton College, he ended up working for Royal Dutch Shell which finally took him to Africa. A crash landing in the north African desert in 1940 ended his active war time

service as a fighter pilot and he joined military intelligence at the British Embassy in Washington, where one of his contemporaries was Ian Fleming, the author of James Bond. It was while in Washington that he started on a literary career, first with short stories for magazines.


Dahl's life sometimes seems to have been idyllic, but it was not without its low points. The sudden debilitating illness of his wife, Patricia Neal, the Hollywood star and the death of his seven year old daughter must be counted among these.

Sturrock was given exclusive access to Dahl's papers by the family, including hundreds of newly discovered letters.

Dahl might have said of himself "I don't lie; I merely make the truth a little more interesting". Sturrock didn't need to make the truth more interesting. "We simply don't live lives like Roald Dahl's any more".

equally beautiful fall. Pupils also trekked up Stori Dimon, a steep sided extinct volcano that offers a 360-degree panorama of the Eyjafjallajökull floodplain, created after its last eruption in 2010 (by the end of the trip most had mastered the pronunciation of this particularly tricky volcano- it's the one that grounded flights across Europe).

Next, a visit to the Solheimajokull glacier (or 'sun house' glacier)- an outlet glacier from one of the mighty icecaps. Sadly it is retreating at the rate of 100m per year due to global warming, but it is still a force of nature that is shaping the landscape of Iceland. The glacial melt waters flow out towards the town of Vik, and the black sand beaches and basalt columns at Reynishverfi- we made sure to keep well away from the huge Atlantic swell and the normally inquisitive seals also kept their distance.

The second half of the week saw plummeting temperatures and heavy snow, which added to the beauty of the island. Needless to say, every available opportunity was taken to pelt Mr Jowett and Mr Rebane with snowballs, and with odds stacked heavily against us (40 versus 2 if memory serves me well) we had to accept defeat.... several times!

The 'Golden Circle' of Geysir, Gulfloss and Thingvellir was a mixture of blizzard conditions and stunning blue skies, Geysir erupting every 7 minutes did not disappoint.

The final evening saw a trip to the 'Hamburger Factory' - Iceland's answer to TGI Friday. The restaurant keeps a running tally on the number of births on Iceland, and helped them celebrate 2 new additions to Iceland's population.

All in all this was a truly memorable and inspiring trip which did not fail to fire students enthusiasm for learning about the world around them, and how we interact with it. Watch out Michael Palin!!

Concern is still being raised regarding the NatWest Bank's decision to close the Station Road branch on Tuesday's and Thursday's and a reduction in hours on the other working days. Neighbourhood Watch in Cardiff has been merged into one new association. The police and volunteers have regenerated activities around the city with a large number of new street based NW groups being formed. Our village watch continues as an email based link and if

The Old Church Rooms has now been equipped with new chairs in both halls. There are a few used stacking chairs available if any person or organisations require them. All the halls in the area are available for hire and there is increasing interest for bookings from outside the village. LUNCHTIME CONCERT

Continuing their policy of showcasing the vast amount of talent that resides within the two villages, this year the Festival Committee have invited Tomos Xerri to give the lunchtime recital on his harp.

Morganstown based Tomos joins several other local residents who have performed at the Radyr & Morganstown Festival, including Helen Field, Sian Winstanley, Jeremy Huw Williams and Simon Davison.

Tomos is an all-round musical talent having reached Grade 8 on harp, piano and flute with distinction. He has won numerous gold medals and prizes at Festivals as diverse as the Urdd and National Eisteddfod, where he won both senior harp and piano competitions in the same year; and the International Harp Competition in Paris.

As well as being a talented instrumentalist, Tomos is also a singer, having been a member of the Llandaff Cathedral Choir and the Eton College Choir, with whom he toured Japan. In 2004, Tomos sang the treble solo in Karl Jenkins' "The Armed Man a Mass for Peace" at the St. David's Hall to celebrate the composer's 60th birthday, which was televised and appeared as a DVD.

Tomos is currently studying the harp at the Trinity Laban College of Music in Greenwich, London. Next year he will spend the year at the prestigious



Music Conservatory in Zaragoza, Spain.

He has already appeared at venues as varied as St. David's Hall, The Millennium Centre, The Festival Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, Llandaff and Southwark Cathedrals and Windsor Castle.

His repertoire for the lunchtime concert will contain works by Handel, Sphor, Chopin, Faure and Hindemith. Tomos will be at Christ Church on Thursday, 17th May at 12.45pm. GILL'S OPEN GARDEN

On Saturday, 12th and Sunday, 13th May, Gill Evans will be opening her garden at 2, Ty Mynydd Close, Radyr.

All proceeds are in aid of Velindre Cancer Research, for which her daughter, Kate O'Connor is raising money with a 19-day, arduous, Charity trek through the Himalayas from Lukla (allegedly the most dangerous airport in the world), to the high altitude of Kalapattar (5,550m), a peak overlooking Everest Base Camp, which is situated at the foot of the Khumbu Icefall.

Kate has previously, very successfully, raised money for Velindre hospital when she trekked to the summit of Kilimanjaro in 2010, raising a massive £7,000. which she is hoping to exceed with her latest venture in November this year.

His talk, "Eyes Along the Coast" explained the work undertaken at Nell's Point, Barry which is manned by fully trained volunteers who keep a daylight watch 365 days a year. Did you

know that the tidal high in the Severn Estuary is 40 feet and the second highest in the world? It is only exceeded by a 42 feet high off the coast of Nova Scotia. Many of us hadn't realized this even though we live so close to the estuary.

Later in the evening, two of our members, Sue Duffield and Linda Goodwin, reported on a visit to Denman College. Sue was this year's winner of our annual Denman bursary which she shared with Linda. The Community Council is thrilled to have been granted £4,750 from the Big Lottery Fund : Awards for All to help us celebrate the Diamond Jubilee with a Jubilee Prom on Monday June 4th. This free event will take place at Radyr Golf Club which will be open to the public for the day.

However, once that work has been completed the boards must come down. If a trade sign is left up after work is completed it becomes an advertisement and, surprisingly, that is a criminal act. The board can be reported to Cardiff Council's planning enforcement team who can remove the sign. If the sign is on the highway, eg a grass verge, then the highways department can remove it.

Cardiff Council's system of receiving information via its C2C service works very well, I find. You can contact them by phone (20872087) or C2C@cardiff.gov.uk. The more people who report something, for example a street light that has failed, flytipping or missed waste collections, the faster the response. If you do not wish to make a report yourself I am always happy to do it on your behalf.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Bara Brith

I thought everyone had a Bara Brith recipe, but I have recently been asked for mine. It is really easy but you must plan ahead.

This quantity makes two cakes – it freezes well and is best served sliced and buttered.

1 pint (20 fl oz, 600ml) cold tea.

I collect tea leaves for two days and keep them in a Pyrex jug in the 'fridge. Add more fresh tea leaves and boiling water to 1 pint and leave to cool.

8 oz (225g) sultanas

8 oz (225g) raisins

(You can add more variety by chopping up some dried apricots, prunes or cranberries)

10 oz (275g) brown sugar

1 large egg beaten

1 1/2 lb (675g) SR flour

2 level teaspoons mixed spice.

Prepare 1 pint cold tea

Place fruit and sugar in mixing bowl

Pour tea over, stir and cover

Leave overnight

Heat oven – Gas 3 ,325F or 160C.

Line 2 x 2lb loaf tins – easy with paper cases

Stir egg into mixture

Sieve in flour and spice

Mix well

Consistency should be quite soft

Add milk or sherry if too solid

Divide between two tins

Bake approx. 1 to 1 1/2 hours

Cakes should be well risen, golden brown, firm to touch and stopped 'singing'

Cool in the tins.
