While our adult challenge had just a small enrolment, those who took part found some interesting and enjoyable books. The exact numbers completing the challenge are still being sorted out, but we will probably have a completion rate of 80%. So we need to say a big thank you to all those who took part and congratulations to all our finishers. As you can

imagine it is going to take some time to sort out all the medals and certificates but we will be going to all local primary schools to present them some time in October. If you missed out on joining the reading challenge or failed to complete it, don't worry, there will be another one next year. In the meantime, you can continue to enjoy the wonderful new books that are arriving every week in the library.

The summer holidays included several craft and story sessions on the Creepy House theme. These were well attended and the children showed great imagination with their crafts.

In October we will be running a free i-pad course from 10.30-12.30. The course will last eight weeks and will start on Friday, 4th October. Places are very limited so you do need to book. You will need to bring your own i-pad. Further details are available from the library.

Now the autumn term has started Jen is, once again, running the rhyme and story sessions on Tuesdays (10.15 and 3.15). Each session consists of story, songs and rhymes and a craft activity. All babies, toddlers and under 5s are welcome. Kate, who has brought such enthusiasm to setting up and running our Welsh language rhyme and story session, Amser Stori, is moving on to a new job. We will certainly miss her and wish her all the best. Until her replacement is in post we are hoping to continue the rhymes and songs with a Welsh learner. Your support and understanding during the interim period is appreciated.

Our monthly book group have invited Radyr author, Romy Wood, to come to our October meeting and talk about her first novel, Bamboo Grove and to introduce us to her second novel, Word on the Street, which is launched on 3rd October. 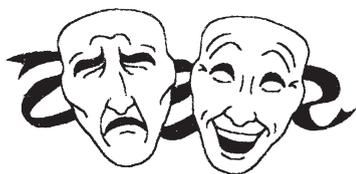

It has been left to the ever-enterprising Mid-Wales Opera to rectify the omission. This Newtown based professional company will be touring Benjamin Britten's delightful comic opera *Albert Herring* from Mansfield to Margate and from St. Asaph to Aberdare.

Called "the funniest opera written in the 20th century" it is set in the fictional town of Loxford in Benjamin Britten's beloved Suffolk. It is early in the 20th century and preparations are in hand for the May Festival. The committee, under the watchful eye of local grandee Lady Billows, have a major problem, they cannot find a young lady fit to be Queen of the May. Let's just say "country virgins, if there be such". In their desperation they set upon Albert Herring, the greengrocer's lad and decide upon a May King. This is the basis for Britten's delightful comedy.

Albert Herring is an opera particularly suited to Mid-Wales Opera, having a large cast of recognisable small town characters and it is scored for a small orchestra. It will be conducted by the company's Musical Director, the world famous Nicholas Cleobury.

Albert Herring can be seen at the Coliseum, Aberdare at 7.30pm on Wednesday, 6th November. You'll probably get to Aberdare quicker than you would to the Millennium Centre in the Bay. It has the advantage of a large car park alongside and with tickets at £12. or £7. concessions, it is a snip. Red Oak Creek

On Sunday 12th May Radyr Youth Forum went on an activity day to Red Oak Creek (Canada Lakes), a lodge set in the woods.

We started off the morning with some fun team building games that included sheep and shepherds, pipes and balls and making a bridge from sticks. For lunch Red Oak Creek kindly provided us with a BBQ, we all ate loads! After lunch the other Forums, Waterhall and Whitchurch and Radyr Volunteers talked about their Passport to Participation Social Action projects. Ours was about saving the tuck shop. The other



Forums had done things like a Band Night and running a Junior Youth Club. Some of the people from the Neighbourhood Management Team talked about what it was like to be on the Council. They gave everyone a task where we had to work together to solve problems that a local council might encounter.

Social Action Project (P2P)

Recently in Youth Forum we have been involved with the Passport to Participation (P2P) project. This involved us having to create a Social Action Project. For our project we decided to base it on the tuck shop in the Youth Club because in September a new law will come in and Schools will not be allowed to sell unhealthy items on the premises and as our Youth Club is on a School site, our tuck shop will have to sell healthier food. We knew that a lot of the pupils in our school would not like this so we took matters into our own hands and wanted to change this. We conducted surveys to ask people what they thought about the tuck shop closing. We even had a trial day where we swapped all of the unhealthy food for healthy food and a lot of people's reactions were very interesting. Most people said they preferred the unhealthy foods and would not come into Youth Club at lunch time if we sold healthy foods. We created a presentation to show to our teachers on our findings and what we would like to see happen. This would be for the tuck shop and lunch club to remain open possibly run by Welsh Bacc volunteers, just lunch club staying open but with no tuck shop or both close altogether. This is still ongoing. Watch this space!

RADYR, MORGANSTOWN & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

How different from last year! After a slow start the gardens and vegetable plots have enjoyed the warmth and we have been rewarded with a lovely show of summer flowers and fruits. Other crops are showing a promise of autumn colour and a good harvest.

Garden Club members enjoyed a day out on Wednesday, 19th June at Cothay Manor and Gardens tucked away in the Somerset countryside near Wellington. Cothay is a small medieval manor, parts of which date back to the fourteenth century and although it has been added to over the centuries it remains unspoiled and retains many interesting features. The house is only open to organised groups and the tour provided by the daughter of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Robb, gave a fascinating insight into the origins of the house, its various owners and its development through the ages.

After the morning tour and lunch in the tea room we were left to wander the gardens. The five acres of formal gardens were designed and laid out by Reginald Cooper who owned the house in the 1920s. He was a friend of both Harold Nicholson and Lawrence Johnson; the garden shows their influence and pre-dates Sissinghurst. A formal garden surrounds the house with lawn, lake, interesting planting, hidden courtyards and seating. However, the highlight is the 200 yard Yew walk with many garden rooms leading off, each with different planting. The remaining seven acres has many types of planting and provides a relaxing, colourful and in many places shady stroll down to the river Tone. There is so much to see and take in we all agreed that the garden would repay several visits.

On the Sunday immediately after the Cothay visit members helped out at Antonia Wigley's "Open Garden" in aid of Radyr Good Neighbours. We manned a plant stall selling plants largely grown by members and friends and managed to raise around £190. Many thanks to all those who provided plants, sold plants and bought plants.

Our summer programme concluded in July when twenty members and guests visited Cowbridge for an informal summer lunch followed by a conducted tour by Sue Duffield and other volunteers, of the Physic Garden. Despite the heat of the afternoon (or maybe the effect of a good lunch) the tour was enjoyed by all with the garden in full flower and knowledgeable guides to explain the groupings and historic medicinal use of plants.

Our 2013/14 winter programme started on Wednesday, 11th September with an illustrated talk by Sheena Crossley on "Capability Brown & Co". Sheena is an old

friend of the club having spoken to us on a number of occasions and as usual she gave an interesting, informative and yet amusing insight into the life and work of Capability Brown and his contemporaries.

Our programme continues in October and November with:

"A year at Aberglasney"

with Joseph Atkin, Aberglasney's head gardener, updating us on developments at Aberglasney and the work undertaken through the year.

13th November

"Good Companions"

with Aisling Judge who will talk about companion planting, the benefits and disadvantages.

Meetings are open to all and take place on the second Wednesday of each month from September to April (with the exception of December) with illustrated talks and demonstrations. Some speakers bring examples of the plants they talk about and others bring plants for sale.

Visitors and New Members will be made very welcome. You don't have to know the Latin names of plants or have green fingers to come to a meeting; few of our members would claim to be experts. We just share an interest in gardens, plants and generally growing things. So come along – you will be very welcome.

All meetings (apart from visits) are at the New Church Rooms, Heol Isaf starting at 7.30pm and are followed by refreshments.

In August, we had a visit from Rotarian Christine Thorpe from Brynmawr Rotary Club. Since 2005, Brynmawr RC has promoted a portable water filter called Lifestraws®. Lifestraws provide effective access to safe and clean water, removing bacteria and parasites simply by sucking the water up through the straw. Small and lightweight, containing no chemicals or electrical parts, they can be easily carried and help to prevent the common diarrhoeal diseases that can occur from drinking contaminated water (more information is available from Brynmawr RC's website www.lifestraws.org.uk).

We have held a number of social events recently, including a bowls evening in Pentyrch and a walk around Cardiff Bay (which served as practice for our sponsored walk in mid September). We also held a membership information evening at the end of July, with a number of guests who we hope may wish to join us in the future.

RADYR & WW1

Dear Editor,

My father, Mervyn Charles Mathews, served in the Royal Artillery during WW1 in both the middle east and later, in France. Born in 1888, the son of Edwin (a Railway Inspector) and Sara (nee Matthews) living at 12 Junction Terrace, he was a member of the Mathews (variously Matthews and Mathew) family long associated with the Radyr and Llandaff area.

Prior to entering the service, he was briefly a student teacher (his uncle John Blethyn Mathew having been a headmaster at Radyr School) and then a Clerk with what was then the Taff Vale Railway Company. In 1911 he lived in "Bryn Derwen" with his sister Olwen (b. 1891 d. 1926) and mother (his father having died in 1907). Returning from the war he found that his mother had died in 1916. He and his sister then lived at Pen-yr-heol with Jack and Blanche Mildon (Blanche being his mother's sister).

He returned to service with the Taff Vale Railway Company (later Great Western Railroad company, then British Rail), eventually serving as Yard Master at the Radyr yard and later at Cardiff Newtown Yard (then the largest rail yard in the UK). He married Bertha Farrow in 1934, I was born in 1938, he died on 20th December, 1957 (in an unbelievable coincidence, Blanche Mildon died that same day) and my mother died on 8 June, 1983. While married they lived at "Ambleside" 6 Windsor Crescent and then at "Yardley", Number 66 and "Patterdale" Number 85 Heol Isaf (this last house probably still having the remnants of a massive brick and concrete air raid shelter that my grandfather had built during WWII).

Somewhere along the way my father acquired what is believed to be the original 1836 coat of arms of the Taff Vale Railway Company which now proudly hangs in my home in Pauma Valley, California, where I am honoured to drive a Porsche Panamera bearing the personalised license plate "Radyr".

Summer at Danybryn

Danybryn took the opportunity of the fine weather and an end to its building works to hold a Harvest fete on Saturday, 24th August, raising around £1,000. Our thanks go to all the people who organised the fete and all the fun that the residents and visitors enjoyed on the day. Special thanks must go to Lloyds TSB who arranged a corporate event on the preceding Wednesday to tidy all our gardens, plant bulbs and shrubs to give us colour in the gardens at other time of the years and supplied forest bark to help us manage the gardens in the future.

For some months Danybryn residents have been using Eye-gaze equipment from Tobii technology which culminated in an exhibition on 3rd September in the home for friends and families of the digital artwork they have produced. This new technology was supported by the Big Lottery Fund Wales as part of an Assistive Technology project. How it works – sensors detect eye movement, tracking which area the user is looking at on screen. This movement can be used for a number of activities such as selecting symbols to communicate, or to create a picture. There are a range of applications and games. Their use can be tailored to each individual depending on their ability and what they would like to do. First there are simple sensory lights and shapes on screen as means of stimulation, then with more advanced use there are distance communication aids (e.g. emails and Skype). The art applications have been a big hit with a lot of the residents. Even without hand use people can now be creative again, an achievement which is something that they couldn't have anticipated before the arrival of the new technology.

A resident at Danybryn with MS says "I love using the revelation art programme to be able to create shapes and add colour using my eyes. I haven't done anything artistic in a long time! It opened up a whole new world to me, being creative and of course a means to independently email my daughters to keep in touch". Alex Jones, Activities/AT Assistant, has been running the project at



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Danybryn with the help of a dedicated number of volunteers and comments "It's great to see the independence and higher involvement in activity that the residents here have achieved. My job varies from one to one teaching on how to use the systems, to set up and working with volunteers who support twice weekly music sessions. Here residents can play instruments on screen using their eyes on top of their favourite tunes!"

The art show was a landmark of the success of this project and all the prints are now going back to the residents as a keepsake in their room, or as a gift for their families.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Autumn Plum Crunch Cake

This is a delicious, seasonal cake/dessert. Either slice and serve as a cake or with a dollop of crème fraiche and extra poached plums as a dessert. Serves 8/10.

Cake:

200g (7oz) plums
140g (5oz) softened butter
140g (5oz) golden caster sugar
2 eggs + 1 yolk
140g (5oz) SR flour
1 flat tspn baking powder
Grated zest and juice 1 orange

Topping:

1 1/2 tbs lemon juice
200g (7oz) golden caster sugar
25g (1oz) rough sugar pieces crushed
(optional)

Heat oven 160/Gas 3

Line 1.2 litre/2 pint loaf tin

Halve and stone plums. Divide into two

Roughly chop half, cut rest into wedges

Beat eggs and yolk with pinch of salt
Cream butter and sugar until light
and fluffy

Add eggs little by little, beating after
each addition

Fold in sieved flour and baking
powder with orange zest and 2 tbs
juice

Fold in roughly chopped plums

Spoon into prepared tin and scatter
plum wedges on top

Bake 50 minutes until inserted
skewer comes out clean

Topping. Mix remaining orange juice
with lemon juice and caster sugar.
Leave cake to cool in tin for 10
minutes. Turn out right way up on
cooling tray. Spoon over topping and
sprinkle with sugar pieces. Leave
until sugar sets into rough icing.

To Do List

With winter setting in, there's plenty to be doing on the gardening front...

As temperatures begin to drop, bring tender, exotic plants indoors a frost-free greenhouse or conservatory is ideal.



Deadhead late season bloomers (such as dahlias and salvias) to allow them to flower until the first frosts.



Plant Spring flowering bulbs

Maintain watering of new plants (with rainwater or grey

water if possible)

Lift and divide herbaceous perennials to rejuvenate (re-planting immediately)

Take cuttings from borderline-hardy perennials to replace any that get cut down by winter frosts

Cover leafy vegetable crops with bird-proof netting.

Collect and sow seeds from perennials and hardy annuals.

Plant fruit trees (a huge variety of apple, plum, cherry, pear, peach and nectarine trees are now available at the garden centre)

Protect fruit trees by tying grease bands to the trunks to stop female winter moths crawling up into the trees to wreak havoc.

Try This...

Remove old bedding plants that have finished flowering for the year and replant with spring bedding plants such as wall flowers or spring bulbs.

As the soil is still warm, now is an ideal time to lift and divide perennials. Use a fork to lift the rootball, discard the centre of the clump and replant the young new shoots into well-prepared soil.

With autumn conditions fast setting in, don't forget to put out additional feed for the birds. At this time of year there should be plenty of nuts and berries in the garden or nearby countryside to



collect, and don't forget to keep their water topped up too.

As the first frosts arrive, be sure to protect your plants by covering them with cloth, fleece, nets or polytunnels.

Autumn garlic, onions and shallots require a cold period to grow well — so now is the ideal time to get planting. Start by pulling the bulbs apart and plant the individual cloves with the tip pointing upwards and firm in well. Keep an eye out for birds however as they have a habit of pulling the bulbs out of the ground.

Home Grown

Our top vegetables to sow now...

Onions and shallots

Plant in an open, well-drained spot with added lime (they will not thrive on acid soils) and a good helping of organic matter.



Growing onions from sets is generally easier and will encourage the crop to mature earlier. As the sets grow, onions will form a larger bulb, while shallots will split to form a clump of bulbs.

It's important to note that autumn planting is not suitable for heavy soils that are prone to water-logging.

Garlic

Choose an open, sunny site with well-drained soil with added lime (just like onions, they will not thrive on acid soils) and a good helping of organic matter.

Once planted, garlic requires a chilly period of around 0°C to 10°C for good bulb development — making Autumn the ideal time to sow.

On heavier, wet soils, garlic is best started off in modules, overwintered in a cold frame then planted out in Spring.

Hardy Lettuces

Though traditionally associated with summer, there are plenty of hardy salad varieties — such as lamb's lettuce — (ask in-store about the most suitable) that can be grown throughout the autumn months for a continuous crop of leaves!

For a steady supply, sow every four weeks in well-drained soil in a sunny, sheltered spot — and if a sudden dip in temperature is predicted, we'd recommend protecting the crop with cloche or fleece.

Rocket


This easy-to-grow salad crop is perfect for planting now, and will carry on cropping into winter if stored in a greenhouse or protected by cloches or fleece.

Sow thinly in rich, fertile soil (preferably in a sunny site) for a peppery crop that will be ready in approximately 4 weeks!

Hot Hues!

Autumn brings with it a fiery feast of colour to gardens of all shapes and sizes so we've rounded up our top ways to incorporate this season's warm seasonal palette into your very own outdoor space...

If your garden benefits from bountiful space, the widely spreading *Parrotia persica* (which can reach 8M) offers a long-lasting firework of colours that include splashes of reds, oranges, purples and golds; *Prunus sargentii* (which can reach a height of 12M) develops a warm combination of yellow, peach and coral leaves, while the fast-growing red oak, *Quercus rubra*, boasts striking red leaves that will last all season long.



But it's not just the larger varieties of trees that boast a brilliant display of colour throughout autumn — and many of this season's most coveted colouring trees are available in a range of sizes that will suit all types of garden.

If space is limited, the highly adaptable *Euonymus europaeus* 'Red Cascade' is known for its bright red foliage and can be trained as a small tree or shrub; the bronze-tinged leaves of *Amelanchier xgrandiflora* 'Ballerina' gradually change to an attractive display of deep red and orange hues; while Japanese maples provide a beautiful display of reds and can even be housed in pots or containers.

Planting your chosen trees in sheltered spots will allow them to hold onto their colour, but keep in mind that soil type and rainfall will also effect the colour and intensity of the foliage — meaning this can vary each year.

A whole host of berries and fruits are also displayed during the autumn months. Incorporating these into your garden will not only look great, but will also provide a tasty treat for birds and other wildlife.

Avoid being over zealous when tidying your borders as many perennials are also known for holding their colour well into the autumn months. For example, resist dead heading alliums and leave seed heads uncut to receive a striking display throughout the autumn months and even into winter.

Cyngor Cymuned Radur a Threforgan



As I hope you know, the Community Council pays very close attention to each stage of Cardiff Council's Local Development Plan (LDP). In September, some of the documents for the Deposit Plan, that is the final draft of the LDP, were released. More documents will be released in time for the public consultation which will run from October 15 to November 26. Cardiff will be running events to make it easier for you to study documents and submit comments. You can find copies of key documents, all our consultation submissions and statement on the LDP page of our website : <http://www.radyr.org.uk/7607>. We will be using the front page of the website to keep you up to date too.

We are working with our neighbouring community councils in Pentyrch and St Fagans, with the Llandaff Society and the RMA to pool our resources and expertise. We have taken legal advice on our submissions to date and were very pleased to know that we had prepared professional responses that represented the community well. We will be seeking a legal opinion on our Deposit Plan response before it is submitted to be sure that we have covered all

the essential points in the best way. Our overall view is that while we cannot challenge the housing numbers we will insist that infrastructure is put in to avoid traffic snarl ups.

You can be assured that R&MCC is doing everything it can to represent R&M's needs. By the time you read this we will have had a public meeting on October 7th at which local residents were able to give their response to this plan. If you have any questions, please contact me.

We are still interested in hearing from local people who would like to contribute in any way to the commemoration of the start of WWI. We recently heard from a man in California who has Radyr ancestors and has given us new information on his family history. People are working hard to research the servicemen named on the War Memorial and have found some names that seem to have been missed out. A recent car boot sale find is a silver Vesta case engraved 'Radyr Grateful 1914-1919' and the initials 'CG'. Some of you will be living in houses that were built then and some may even have relatives who were living in R&M a hundred years

ago. If you have any family memories or objects that relate to this important time in history do get in touch.

We commissioned a tree survey for all the land we own and manage and have now completed the first round of work in Radyr Woods, Pentwyn Park and Danybryn Woods.

Last year, we were able to arrange for daffodil bulbs donated by Cardiff Council to be planted in Parc Radur, Radyr Gardens and at the War Memorial. This year we have asked for bulbs to plant at the entrance to R&M from the Llantrisant Road. There is a wide grass verge on the NW corner which we think could take a big planting and look colourful in spring.

MOTORING

Are you aware, new penalties for careless driving came into force on 16th August, 2013?

Changes giving the police powers to issue fixed penalty notices for careless or inconsiderate driving have come into effect.

Now careless drivers who put other road users at risk by committing offences such as tailgating or poor lane discipline will face on-the-spot penalties.

Existing fixed penalty point levels for most motoring offences which include using a mobile phone at the wheel and not wearing a seat belt have been raised to £100.

The fixed penalty for careless driving is now £100. with three points on your licence. The most serious examples will continue to go to court, where you may face high penalties.

The police will also be able to offer educational training as an alternative to endorsements as they already do for speeding offences. You will still be able to appeal against any decision in court.

Although most motoring offences fines have changed penalty points remain the same for the offence. Fixed penalties notices for parking, waiting and obstruction offences remain unchanged.

- Non endorsable offences (no points on licence) have raised from £0. fixed penalty to £50.
- An endorsable offence (points on licence) and £60. non-endorsable have risen to £100.

- An endorsable £120. fixed penalty notice has risen to £200.

- The fixed penalty notice for driving without insurance has risen from £200. to £300.

Graduated fixed penalties, mainly for commercial and passenger carrying vehicles, including offences like driver's hours and overloading have also increased as above.

If you are closer than two seconds from the vehicle in front did you know you are tailgating?

We need this gap to allow for thinking and braking distance to ensure you don't hit the vehicle in front.

If it's raining increase gap to four seconds, snow and ice leave ten times the gap or don't drive.

If somebody is tailgating you, don't concentrate on behind, that's not going to make them drop back, concentrate in front. Don't react by hitting your brakes, putting your lights on, use hand gestures, this will only annoy the driver behind.

Don't speed up, that's what they want. Double the gap in front of your vehicle by just easing back of the accelerator slightly and now you are back in control. Brake earlier and smoother; if you need two seconds to think and react, so does the vehicle behind you! You are now doing the thinking and reactions for them.

If you are still feeling intimidated, pull over and allow the vehicle to pass.

How often do you see cars hogging the middle lane on a motorway or staying in the

outside lane of the A470 for several miles before deciding to move over? Not only is this inconsiderate driving, it can also be classed as dangerous as some people can get frustrated and start undertaking.

When you've overtaken a vehicle give them a two second gap then pull back into the left hand lane.

Plan ahead, make sure you are in the correct lane at the right time and most importantly for the correct reason.

So how can I become a safer driver?

If you drive for work, speak to your employer. They should be aware of their responsibilities under the Corporate Manslaughter and Health and Safety at Work Acts and how it affects work related journeys. Some companies may arrange for a fleet training company to come in, assess you driving and then give you some advanced driving training which would be beneficial for both parties.

If this is not possible or you don't drive for work, why not have an advanced driver trainer look at your driving. It may not be as expensive as you think. It's certainly cheaper than a £100. fine and don't forget how much your insurance will go up by. It'll also make you a better, safer driver and could save yourself up to 15% on your weekly fuel bill, so the cost of training could be recuperated in a few weeks.

BBC TO LEAVE LLANDAFF!



Llandaff has been the home of BBC Wales Broadcasting House since 1966 when their prestigious headquarters building, designed by Sir Percy Thomas Partnership opened in the grounds of what was formerly Baynton House at Llantrisant Road. Subsequently the fortunes of BBC Wales have prospered and it has become a centre of excellence in the fields of both radio and television, with its splendid news and current affairs coverage and creative television drama recipients of many awards.

The success and related growth of Cardiff as a creative media centre has led to the removal of BBC Welsh Orchestra to the Millennium Centre, followed by its television drama, including 'Pobl y Cwm' transferring to new waterfront premises at Pwll Teiger, in Cardiff Bay. Hence it was only a matter of time before the replacement of its Llandaff Headquarters came onto the agenda. It has now been announced that BBC intends to leave Llandaff and is actively looking at four alternative sites in The Bay.

The Llandaff Headquarters will be offered for sale in the Autumn. It is most likely that this prospect will be eagerly seized by national house builders and or out of town retail developers anxious to capitalise on a windfall opportunity in desirable Llandaff. With the City of Cardiff Local Development Plan already threatening 12,500 new homes out along the Llantrisant Road, redevelopment of the BBC headquarters can only exacerbate the strain on local infrastructure and traffic congestion.

Councillor Kirsty Davies says: 'It's obviously a good thing for the BBC but I am not sure it is good news for the people of Llandaff! We've a huge traffic problem already and if housing and/or retail units are built on the site it is going to add to them. There's a particularly bottleneck with traffic coming across the river bridge from Llandaff North and then turning right into Llantrisant Road. I'd like to see a road built across the current BBC site to relieve the pressure'.

Commemorating World War One

You may have heard that the Government in Westminster has decided to commemorate the centenary of First World War from its inception in July 1914. Cynics claim that it is because they don't expect to be in power to celebrate its ending.

A committee has been set up and is hard at work researching Radyr and Morganstown's part in the war. We have an exceptionally fine War Memorial for a community of our size and work is in hand to find out more about the names on it.

I have been working on the records of the Parish Council. Within a few weeks of war breaking out the Chairman reported that he had sent a telegram of condolence to the Earl of Plymouth and his family on the death of one of their sons.

Equally important is the declaration by Mr. D. Rupert Phillips, later Captain Phillips, son of the vicar and Chairman of the Council, that he would no longer be able to attend



Council meetings as he had enlisted. Happily, Captain Phillips returned from the war to lead the Council into the 1920's.

One of the suggestions under consideration is an exhibition of photographs and memorabilia relating to the war. One of the committee discovered a silver Vesta case given by the community to returning soldiers, in a car boot sale. The silver match case cost the princely sum of 10 shillings and 2 pence – about 51p in today's money.

If you have any photographs, memorabilia, or stories of the First World War we'd be delighted to see or hear them.


Morganstown Motte

The weather on Sunday September 15th couldn't have been more unkind for the Open Day at the Motte. The weathermen were predicting a major storm with high winds and the event had to be brought to a premature end. Our apologies to those who turned up to find the Motte closed.

It wasn't all doom and gloom however. The Woodland Rangers were on hand to show the two dozen or so people who turned up early what they had achieved so far. I can never remember seeing the Motte and Bailey looking so attractive. The grass on the Bailey had been cut and should have been raked to create a hay meadow. Rand Richard Cormock told us of the large number of wild flowers that had already re-generated in the area, including cowslips. We saw how quickly the undergrowth was re-generating on the Motte now that the tree cover had been felled and more vigorous species will have to be kept in check to allow the wild flowers to spread. With the spread of plant species helpful to birds and insects it will become another wildlife haven. He also told of future plans for the woodland in the area.

A Friends Group for Morganstown Motte is in the course of being set up. It's aims are:

1. To help the Woodland Rangers maintain this attractive site, there are only two of them to cover the whole of Cardiff.
2. To secure funding to protect and investigate further this important historical site.



On Monday November 18th at the Old Church Rooms at 7.30 pm the Chair of the Friends of Forest Farm will be speaking to the Community Association to tell us about this very successful group and what they do. Why not come along then.
