Cardiff West & Llandaff Deanery are in the process of fund raising to enable us to resettle a Syrian Family in Cardiff. We are doing this through the government Sponsorship Programme and working with Citizens UK. The family will have a home in which to settle & live comfortably & will be made to feel welcome & to make a life for themselves. We hope to achieve this by Spring 2018.

We need a bond of £4,500/adult & now have enough for 2 adults but may need more if the family brings a grandparent with them. We also need money for initial expenses, rent until the housing allowance arrives, food, clothing, language services & to generally support them towards employment & self-sufficiency over a period of 2yrs. To this end we decided to hold a Christmas Tree Festival at the start of Advent.

By autumn, most of the societies we had contacted had agreed to take part & were well into planning the decoration of their tree.

The festival took place on 1st, 2nd & 3rd December & by the evening of 30th November, Christ Church was buzzing. It was great fun & very touching to see how much effort people had made. Some trees were simply beautiful, others quite brilliant in their construction & yet others gave wonderfully novel & sometimes quirky depictions of the society they represented. It was a fantastic effort all round. Allan Cook, chair of the History Society, one of the groups who exhibited a tree, said "it was a lovely start to the Christmas season, people worked so hard and there was always a buzz in Christ Church. I hope that it's repeated next year".

We'd hidden a number of angels throughout the church for the children to count & to receive a small prize if they gave the correct answer. One young man, when asked by Jenny how many angels he had counted, replied "All of them" --- so of course he had a prize too!

Admission was free & we had a steady trickle of visitors enjoying the trees, refreshments, organ recitals & finally the Carol Service on Sunday Evening & the result was that we

collected a total of £881.

Next time we have a Christmas Tree Festival, we'll be certain to invite our Syrian family & are sure that they will be moved by the efforts everyone made to enable them to settle into a safer, more comfortable & eventually happier life here than the one they left behind.

War Memorial



Many readers might be interested to know what is happening to the War Memorial. Our County Councillor tells me that CADW and the War Memorial Trust have agreed a request by the County Council for the cleaning of the stonework, clearing out and repointing of the mortar, the cleaning of the bronze figures in accordance with CADW recommendations and the restoration of pathways. A review will also be undertaken of the security arrangements on the War Memorial.

A second stage will recolour the lettering with either lead or black lime mortar, depending on the findings of CADW as to the nature of the original. All work should be completed in time for the centenary of the end of WW1 in November 2018.

Radyr's War Memorial is the work of Royal Academitian Alfred Turner 1874 -1940. He made a number of statues of Queen Victoria and one of Edward VII, as well as several war memorials. His best known war memorial is at Delville Wood in France to South African Troops.

Radyr's War Memorial has a figure of the Goddess Fame holding a wreath in her left hand and a raised staff in her right, like that on Turner's memorial to Edgar Mobbs in Northampton. The child and shrine is identical with that on his war memorial in Fulham, London.

The cost of the memorials was paid for by local residents and unveiled in January 1921 by the Earl of Plymouth. In all some £800 was raised.

Alfred Turner was also responsible for the marble figure of Owain Glyndwr in Cardiff's City Hall which was unveiled by Lloyd George in 1916.

Welsh Gymnastics Disability Gymnast of the Year



On 11th November at a gala dinner, Sharmeela Bragg was awarded the title of *Welsh Gymnastics Disability Gymnast of the Year*.

Sharmeela began trampolining at the age of 5 she had no core strength and was unable to stand on her left foot for more than 3 seconds. She has worked very hard over the years on improving her core, and developing her trampoline skills and has transformed from a child who was very unstable and always leaning one way when she jumped, to someone who trains with elite performers and holds her own.

2016/17 was a fantastic year for Sharmeela and she was able to reap the benefits of all her hard work. November 2016 Sharmeela competed in the Welsh Schools Trampoline Competition in the elite group, and became Welsh Primary Schools Champion. This gualified her to compete against schools from the Midlands, Central and Eastern England in Cannock in February 2017. She was again successful, emerging as Zonal Schools Champion. In the British Schools Finals in Gateshead in March 2017 Sharmeela continued her unbeaten record and became British Primary Schools Champion.

In February 2017 Sharmeela was the only gymnast in Wales at a high enough standard to compete in the elite category in the Welsh Trampoline Championships, and therefore, after performing 3 very impressive routines, became Welsh Elite Disability Champion.

In March 2017, Sharmeela qualified to represent the Welsh region at Regional Team Finals in Birmingham in June, and ended up with yet another 1st place, scoring points for Wales and qualifying herself for British NDP finals in Telford in July. Sharmeela rounded off a very successful competitive year by becoming British Champion at NDP finals.

The past year has been an amazing year for Sharmeela and we are all very proud of her achievements. Dr Liz Bragg

He invited volunteers to demonstrate how to place someone in the recovery position and took questions from members about other first aid emergencies, including bleeding, burns, choking and how and when to use the automatic defibrillators now situated at various point in Radyr. His talk was interesting and very informed and even trained first aiders felt that they had benefited from his expertise.

So, with the first meeting of the New Year over, we look towards future events. This year our Institute is the host for our Social Link Group and a Beetle Drive afternoon is planned for 21st March. The annual St David's Day Walk will take place on 26th February involving all the WIs in the "Taff Trailers" link group. ROASTED SAUSAGE AND POTATO SUPPER DISH

Serves 4

2 tbspns. olive oil

2 large white or red onions, sliced into 8

2 red peppers, deseeded and chopped

2 garlic cloves, chopped

1 tbsp. fresh thyme or 2 tspns. dried

500g/1lb 2 oz baby roasting potatoes, halved

12 good quality sausages, pricked with fork

200ml/7fl oz white wine or chicken stock

S+P

Heat oven 200 C or Gas 7

Place all ingredients except wine into large roasting tin

Turn over to coat with oil, season

Ensure sausages are on top

Roast approx. 35mins until golden brown

Remove from oven, turn it all over, and pour in wine

Return to oven to cook further 20 mins or until

sausages are brown and potatoes tender

Serve with green vegetables

Remembrance Sunday 2017

It's not quite clear as to how it happens, but the annual commemoration at Radyr War Memorial on Sunday 12th. November, in memory of those who served their country, was again blessed with a dry, sunny morning.

Many of the local Radyr and Morganstown community turned out to take part in the outdoor service and wreath-laying. The service was led, as customary, by Canon Jenny Wigley of Christchurch, Church in Wales, the wreath-laying led by Colonel Guy Clarke, Deputy Lieutenant of the County of South Glamorgan (also son of the late Mrs. Lorna Clarke of Heol Isaf, Radyr).

Although minus the usual contingent of Air Cadets, the parade to the War Memorial still included a good number of ex-services personnel, as well as representative groups from the local youth organisations and schools. Wreaths were laid by representatives of all the key local and services organisations, with one or two new groups being commemorated this year, such as Prisoners of War and Radyr Cricket Club.

Total monies received through local poppy sales/collections and wreath payments/donations, amounted to a contribution to Royal British Legion funds by the Radyr & Morganstown community of £3,996. Although poppy collections alone realised somewhat less than last year, the total sum still represents a significant amount. It will, no doubt, be well used in supporting ex-services personnel who in need, by Royal British Legion. Thank you to all those who gave generously to achieve this; also to those volunteers who made door-to-door collections and helped in other ways to organise things and make sure the commemoration ran smoothly on the day.

Remembrance Sunday next year, will be on 11th. November, and mark the centenary of the armistice signed on that day in 1918. As such it will be an event of considerable significance, albeit still commemorating the sacrifices made by members of our armed forces in many more-recent conflicts . Radyr & Morganstown World War 1 Commemoration

Knitted Red Poppies Radyr & Morganstown WW1 **Commemoration Committee** have met to consider how best to mark the ending of the Great War in November 1918. Although numerous ideas were put forward one suggestion in particular stood out and that was to cover the grassed area of our war memorial with poppies. With thanks to numerous local volunteers including both Radyr & Treforgan WI's, approximately 800 + red poppies have been knitted to date. We still need hundreds more and are looking for volunteers to swell this number. Shaw's sell Marriner (DK) in Red for £1.00 per 100gram ball (will produce 18 to 20 poppies).

Knitting instructions: No. 9 knitting needles, red double knitting.

- Cast on 120 stitches.
- Rows 1-4 knit in garter stitch.
- Row 5 knit 3 together across the row (40 stitches).
- Rows 6-9 knit in garter stitch.
- Row 10 knit 2 tog, across the row (20 stitches).
- Rows 11-14 knit in garter stitch.
- Row 15 knit 2 tog across the row (10 stitches).
- Cut a tail of wool approximately 20 cms. and with a darning needle thread through the remaining stitches, drawing the poppy together. Sew the open side of the poppy and with black wool sew a black button in the centre

From Bowls to Defibrillators

Earlier this year a heart defibrillator was acquired and placed on an interior wall of Morganstown Village Hall. This piece of medical apparatus is used on a person who is suffering from a cardiac arrest. If used correctly and at the right time it may save the life of the person involved.

Many activities take place at the village hall and people of all ages take part in these activities. One such activity is Short Mat Bowls which has more than twenty members. This activity takes place in the hall on both a Saturday and Wednesday between the hours of 2pm- 6pm. Those who are above the age of twelve years and wish to become new members are welcome to visit the sessions and observe how friendly and enjoyable they are.

At one of the club's meetings the defibrillator was mentioned and it was pointed out that nobody in the group knew, either the reason for its use, or the methods of how to use it in an emergency.

Fortunately, one member had knowledge of the Welsh Hearts (The Heart Charity of Wales). Sharon Owen (Charity Director) was contacted and Sharon kindly organised a demonstration for twenty members of the bowling club.

The demonstration was carried out on Wednesday 11th October for one



hour at the end of the bowling session. Liz Evans, a qualified nurse, gave an excellent and informative presentation to the members. This was well received and in the discussions afterwards it was obvious that a defibrillator was a very important part of any organization that runs classes, in a variety of activities, for all age groups,

Also, it was obvious from the information imparted, that a defibrillator is an essential tool belonging to the first aid equipment of any organisation that deals with groups of people. However, this piece of equipment is of little use, unless at least one member of the group knows how to use it effectively. NB The demonstration was given free of charge, although the Welsh Hearts would welcome a donation for their services.

Other activities that use the Morganstown Village Hall apply to St. Johns Ambulance for their training in the use of the defibrillator.

A REPORT FROM RADYR & MORGANSTOWN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

There were certain issues in the last letter to the Chain which needed a follow up in the February 2018 Edition . I fear that the main problems that your Council will face this year are primarily to do with the domestic expansion in the surrounding areas. Despite many objections by your County Councillor, your Council, the Radyr and Morganstown Association, the North West Group plus individual residents, it would appear that all these objections have not influenced the Planning Authority. Consequently, there appears to be no immediate and definitive positive responses to the concerns which have been raised.

The common theme raised by all respondents has been the lack of infrastructure. The transport problems, the questions regarding the education of the younger residents, the medical and dental services plus the availability of hospital provisions do not seem to have been considered. Currently, there have been three sets of temporary lights established along the A4119 to allow developers to remove hedgerows. These lights are causing delays to through and local traffic. In addition, the proposed the modifications of the junctions using permanent traffic lights between the A 4119, the exits from Parc Radyr and Heol Isaf are currently at the planning stage. The January report by County Councillor R Mckerlich, which is available on the Radyr Website, goes into much more detail regarding these issues and residents are encouraged to read this report

If one was also to consider the proposed development at the Radyr Sidings, such a development can only add to these considerable difficulties. This proposed development is being opposed by the County Councillor, the Community Council, the Association and, of course, the Sidings Residents. Your Council will reinforce the submissions made by the Sidings Residents and County Councillor McKerlich. The application for the development at Radyr Sidings will probably be heard at the Planning Committee on either March 7 or April the 11th. Again, your Council will totally support all the submissions opposing the proposed developments.

The Community Council finances a large number of important local activities. These include those in the Old Church Rooms, the purchase and erection of Christmas Trees, the Radyr and Morganstown Annual Festival . The Environment Committee participate in the management of the local assets such as Windsor Gardens plus the Dan-y-Bryn and Radyr Woods. Grants have also been awarded to develop local youth organisations. In addition, the Council is supporting the initiative to increase the lunch club for our more senior residents.

The Council are about to agree the 2018-9 budget and prepare the application for the precept which is likely to be at the same level as the current year. If therefore, any resident wishes to suggest a project which would enhance and develop our communities, please contact the Council Clerk in the first instance .It would be most advantageous if the any suggestion would be accompanied with an offer to assist in delivering the project.

Residents will have noticed the scaffolding that has been erected around the Monument. The monument is to be professionally cleaned and any deficits in the structure repaired. The funding for this project comes from CADW and the War Memorial Trust. The restoration work will probably be completed before next November in time to commemorate the end of the First World War. The Council are most grateful to these organisations.

There has been excellent news in the sporting field. The Juniors at Radyr Golf Club have achieved an unique and historical success winning the Glamorgan Junior League and becoming runners up in the Welsh Junior Interclub Championship. As a consequence of these achievements, they will represent Wales at the Home Nations Junior Championship in Portugal in March, The Council congratulate the Juniors on this achievement and wish them further success in Portugal.

Constant Dog Barking

In the Windsor Road area of Radyr there is a resident that allows indiscriminate dog barking starting extremely early in the mornings, various times during the day and also very late at night.

This is a concern to a number of residents living in that vicinity. There are either quite elderly residents or younger parents with small children who are constantly woken by regular barking at inconsiderate times. We are sure that if the resident responsible for this noisy dog were to read this in the Radyr Chain, they might well take some action to control the barking.
