

News from Radyr & Morganstown WI

At the time of writing, the second week of the annual Radyr Festival is about to begin. Our members have already provided refreshments at the crowning of the May Queen and the maypole dancing. The selection of cakes and their display was most impressive and the weather throughout the opening events of the festival was beautiful.

Many of our members are involved in a variety of festival activities through their links with other organisations in the village and this time of the year is always very busy.

However, on Friday May 11th, nine of our members visited the Viridor Cardiff Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) in Cardiff Bay. Housed in an interesting, wave shaped, building off Ocean Way and operational since 2014, it handles 350,000 tonnes of non-recyclable waste a year. It diverts at least 95% of South Wales's residual (mostly black bag) waste away from landfill and generates enough electricity for the national grid to power around 50,000 households. It was a fascinating visit with a tour, complete with hard hats and high-viz jackets, of the whole facility.



In complete contrast, the destination for our summer trip is Blenheim Palace. This has been booked for Thursday 12th July and, hopefully, will take place on a beautiful summer's day.

Looking back to our April meeting, the speaker was Charlotte Leek who is a "Colour Me Beautiful" Image Consultant based in Cowbridge. She gave a presentation showing images of women with different colour combinations of hair, skin and eyes and the colours which suited each

one. She then demonstrated this with some of the members, draping colour fabric swatches against them to show which colours were the most appropriate.

Also, during the April meeting, two "big" birthdays were recognised. The ladies concerned, one 80 and one 90, have both been long standing and loyal members. Each received a card and a flowering plant from the President. Their names are withheld to avoid causing embarrassment as neither of them looks their age!

Our May meeting takes place on Monday 14th May and this will be our Annual Meeting. Our President, Enid Brooker, is stepping down having completed her three-year term of office. We are all grateful to her for all her hard work. We wish the new officers and committee members all the best for the ensuing year. Of course, we don't know who they are yet as the meeting isn't due to take place for another 3 days.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Spinach and Cheddar quiche with a sweet potato crust.

A vegetarian quiche with a twist. The crust is very light and quite different to pastry.

1x23 cm. or 9" sandwich tin
oil for brushing tin
400g. (14 oz) sweet potato - grated
1 egg
pinch chilli flakes
50g. (2 oz) Cheddar Cheese - grated

Filling
150g. (5 oz) spinach
4 eggs
100ml milk
100ml double cream
s+p
3 spring onions, roughly chopped (optional)
100g. (3½ oz) Cheddar cheese - grated
1 Tb.sp chopped parsley

Brush tin with oil
Heat oven 190C/170C fan/Gas 5
Place sweet potato in sieve and squeeze out liquid
In bowl combine sweet potato, egg, chilli, cheese + little s+p
Mix well with hands
Press into tin evenly, as quiche crust. Keep a little back
Cook 15 mins. Patch up any holes with reserved mixture
Cook spinach in saucepan with few drops water until wilted
Chop finely
Crack eggs into bowl
Add milk+cream + little s+p. Whisk well
Add spring onions+parsley+spinach. Mix well
Sprinkle half cheese into sweet potato case
Add egg mixture
Sprinkle remaining cheese on top
Cook 35-40 mins until golden on top but still has a slight wobble
Leave to cool before serving

I have frozen portions and it defrosted perfectly.

What a great start to this year's Festival with the 'Memories Parade' and fete held in glorious sunshine. After the parade from the Methodist Church to the Old Church Rooms, organised by Raymond Rivron, the fete was opened by broadcaster Beti George. The children were entertained by a Punch and Judy show, while the adults enjoyed the burgers and hot dogs from the BBQ. The bar was run by the Twinning Fellowship, and tea, coffee and cake were provided by the local Alzheimers volunteer group, newly formed this year. There were lots of stalls and competitions including a photography exhibition by Imaging 2000. The fete was followed in the evening by an enjoyable choir concert, organised by Cardiff West rotary at the Golf Club featuring Cantorion Creigiau Singers and including a new tenor, John Hopkins.



There were three events on Sunday. A new triangular tournament took place early in the morning between Radyr Golf, Tennis and Cricket clubs ending with a BBQ at the cricket ground. A Festival walk was led by Allan Cook around the historic City of Llandaff. In the evening there was a Festival Civic Service at Christ Church, the last to be led by the Rev. Jenny Wigley before she retires. This was followed by a reception organised by R&MCC. Cheryl George and Paula Langston outlined the work of the Society and thanked the community for all their generous support.



Monday morning saw the erection of the maypole in Windsor Gardens in glorious weather and whilst this was going on the fun runners were completing their 5km along the Taff Trail and back to Radyr Primary School.

In the afternoon the Festival Queen, Joy Lee, was crowned by the Chair of the Community Council, Dr Ralph Vaughan. The Queen and her party were then supplied with copious amounts of cake, squash and tea prepared by the ladies of Radyr WI before moving on to the Children's Tea Party in MVH. More cake and soft drinks! Wednesday evening featured one of our new events, the 'Summer Kitchen' with International Chef Angela Gray giving a talk whilst demonstrating her skills and providing samples of her delights for the audience. The event was sold out and was thoroughly enjoyed by all.



The Tenovus Festival Quiz was held in the New School Rooms with quiz master Nick Holmes. As usual it was hotly contested with 10 teams of 8 competing. This year, for the second time, the team from the RMA snatched the trophy in the last round holding it for another year! Friday saw the first of the lunchtime concerts from the Wales Academy of Voice. The audience was entertained by Monique Simon and Henry Ngan, accompanied by Llyr Simon on the piano. Another very professional performance. In the evening, we were entertained by Cube who produced their excellent mix of jazz, organised by the Twinning Fellowship and Raymond Rivron.



In glorious weather at the Concert in the Parc, organised by Tom Evans and Nick Cook, we were entertained by the local school orchestras and choirs, the big band from Radyr Comp, and a variety of local bands including the Radyrcals, The Filharmonics, The Fairly Awesome Five. The programme was headlined by The Dunlops. The BBQ, the real ale, provided by VOG Brewery and lager sold out and a great time was had by all. It was good to see a large crowd picnicking in one of our local parks.



The week end was rounded off with the Open Garden event, which this year also included a plant sale at the OCR. Dan y Bryn discovered a rare wild flower with a visit from a local botanist. After school on Monday a very closely contested Boules tournament took place between Radyr Primary and Bryn Deri schools. 3 teams from each school played in brilliant sunshine. The score for each team ended at 12-13, Bryn Deri scoring 13 each time with Radyr Primary closely on their heels. Radyr Primary adult team retained the cup they won last year. Despite the good weather the film buffs turned up to watch film 'Gumshoe' shown at the OCR under the direction of Eric Blackwell. A crowd came to Morganstown Village Hall for a wonderful performance of 'The Lady Vanishes' performed by a large cast of Fluellen. The packed audience really enjoyed the comedy drama and the evening was a great success.



The Audio Visual evening on Thursday was organised by Imaging 2000. Mick Sullivan showed digital images of the Festival activities. A video was shown as a tribute to Gilbert and Sullivan and showing productions by the Parish Music Group during the 90's. There were also presentations of framed photos to the Festival Queen and her Attendants. On Friday lunchtime we were treated to a return visit from guitarist Rishiart Arwel in the Methodist Church. He produced a spectacular performance. Playing a selection of music which included pieces specially adopted for guitar from Spain and South America.

The final weekend of the Festival started with fine weather which we had enjoyed throughout the Festival. The Gymkhana numbers were down considerably due to a clash with the Royal Wedding at lunchtime. Meanwhile the Vintage Tea Party organised by Karen Wright and Tom Evans watched the Royal Wedding on a big screen and consumed posh cakes and sandwiches.



In the evening there was a hog roast and barn dance, organised by the Twinning group. The French visitors all joined in. Goronwy Jones, the caller, managed to get most people onto the dance floor. The dances started fairly simply but then got a bit more complex. Explaining what to do in a mixture of English, French and Welsh did make it a little bit tricky but everyone had great fun. The final day of the Festival started with a Hog Roast at the Golf Club. The patio was crowded for a performance by the Porthcawl Ukulele Band. The band even managed a few local tunes for our French visitors.

The evening was crowned with a Festival concert for Alzheimer's Society Cymru. We were treated to performances by Owain Llyr, Bree Evans, Hannah McCormack, Jacky Webbe and the One Voice Choir which had the enthusiastic audience clapping along. They sang some of the selected favourites chosen by local residents. During the event, the Festival Draw was made and the Chair of the Festival committee, David Silver, presented a cheque for £18,500 to Cheryl George on behalf of the charity. This sum includes funds raised by the community, donations and the local Alzheimer group fund raising. A tribute was paid to David Cargill, who was Festival Committee Chair for the first 30 years of the Festival, and he was presented with both the Ken Innes trophy and an engraved tankard to recognise his contribution to the community.



The Festival was a great success with a mixture of old and new events. During the week there were numerous competitions – literary, photographic, painting and colouring. Prize giving has taken place at the primary schools and a list of all the winners of all the competitions is shown on a separate page in Radyr Chain. Its thanks to the organisers of the competitions – R&MCC, Sue Mckerlich, Dave Hardman, Mark Partridge and Keith John. Special thanks to Maggie Roberts, the Festival Queen and her attendants, the barbecue team – Ian Thomas, Ralph Vaughan, Chris Wills, Alan Buckle, Terry Fitzgerald, Cyril Williams, Allan Cook and the bar team – Nick Hawkins, Tom Evans, Raymond Rivron and Bob Roberts, who worked hard at every function. Bob Roberts is standing down as Treasurer of the Association this year after 30 years and becoming Festival Cashier, handing over to Ellis Jenkins. Thanks to him for all his hard work. Thanks to the Festival Committee and all our volunteers who help with electrics, gazebos, transportation, staging, music, selling tickets and advertisers in the programme. All are a great help and more are welcome.

A REPORT FROM THE RADYR AND MORGANSTOWN COMMUNITY COUNCIL – MAY 2018

At the recent Civic Service followed by the Reception, I was able to convey Radyr and Morganstown Community Council's sincere thanks to the members of all the societies whose hard work and dedication makes our villages such a pleasant place to live and to bring up families. It was also a privilege to welcome to these events our local M P - Mr Kevin Brennan and A M, Mr Mark Drakeford and to thank them both for their efforts on our behalf.

There were two causes for celebration. Mr David Suthers had just completed 40 years of service as a local councillor and has made a significant contribution to the Council. The second was to congratulate Councillor Rod McKerlich on his appointment as the Deputy Lord Mayor of Cardiff which is a tremendous achievement. I am sure we all wish both well in the future. In addition, the Reverend Canon Jenny Wigley officiated at her last Civic Service before she retires in July. I am sure that all residents would wish me to thank her for her dedicated pastoral leadership over the last ten years.

There have been two improvements at the Old Church Rooms [OCR]. The first has been the paving of the area in the courtyard and further developments in the Twinning Garden. Council has also appointed Mr Karl Craddock as our new Handyman whose duties involve maintaining the OCR and caring for the several park areas which are the Council's responsibility. There remain a few problems, the most important of which is the construction of a retaining wall on the north side of the OCR and repairs to the roof.

It is disappointing to report that the weekly Nat West Banking facilities, which were available at the car park of the Methodist Church, have been withdrawn. This is the second occasion that this bank has withdrawn from Radyr. Customers will now have to travel to Insole Court to access this facility. Again this move ignored the protests from all local bodies and is particularly inconvenient to our older residents.

The development from Danescourt to Groes Faen continues apace. It involves road works, destruction of green land, house building and increases in both traffic delays and pollution. To add insult to injury, the Cardiff City Planning Authority has approved the development of 36 domestic units at The Sidings, despite both opposition by local residents and the submission by an appropriate professional consultant. This will undoubtedly lead to an increase in traffic along both King's Road and Heol Isaf and will most certainly include Heavy Goods Vehicle. This has already raised additional concerns regarding safety, particularly in reference to those attending the three schools. It does make one wonder if any consideration is given to the many objections?

However, it is apposite to note that a public meeting was held at the Methodist Hall on May the 9th to consider how to control all aspects

involved with heavy traffic along Heol Isaf. Many interesting points of view were aired. Councillor R Mckerlich spoke to the meeting, giving an update on the current objections that have been submitted to Cardiff City Council [CCC]. It is hoped that these objections will induce the CCC to revisit the current problems and seek possible solutions. Further meetings have been proposed.

It is a pleasure to report that your Council has supported several developments in regard to the future of junior groups in Radyr and Morganstown. Grants have been awarded to the Tiny Tots, the Pony Club, the Radyr Rangers and recently, to the junior academy at the Radyr Golf Club.

Finally, as I come to the end of my year as Chairman, I would like to thank most sincerely the great help I have received from fellow councillors and, in particular, from the Clerk Ms Ceri Mortimer and the Assistant Clerk, Ms Julie Hopkins.

Lord Arthur Saville's Crime



Audiences were delighted by the Drama Society's April production, Lord Arthur Saville's Crime.

This was a play that was ideally suited to the Society. Based on a story by Oscar Wilde and adapted for the stage by Constance Cox, many of the lines contained the typical Wildian wit.

The story involves a rich young man about to get married. At the time London Society is agog with its newest protege, a palmist. Lord Arthur's future mother-in-law insists that he has his palm read and he finds out that, at some point in his life, he will commit a murder.

Unfortunately Lord Arthur is as inept at committing murder as he is at everything else. An attempt to poison his aunt with a box of chocolates threatens to wipe out the whole of his family, while an exploding umbrella gets thrown out of a window before it has time to kill his uncle.

With such an overall excellent cast it is difficult to pick out individuals, but I must mention Peter Griffiths as Lord Arthur and Roger Page as the butler; while Jane Sinclair gave an excellent



performance as the dragon like future mother-in-law.

Peter Griffiths also directed and he

was ably assisted by Raymond Rivron (sets) David Burgess (lighting) and Tony Watson (sound)

Crowd Pleasers

The Arts events at this year's Festival proved to be particularly popular and drew large audiences. This year's innovation, a talk and demonstration by chef Angela Gray from her latest book SUMMER RECIPES, was sold out and the Festival hopes to bring a similar event in future years. Both the Friday lunchtime concerts were highly successful. One wonders where the Wales International Academy of Voice finds their students, as the standard seems to improve from year to year. As well as loud



applause for the two soloists, mezzo-soprano Monique Simone and tenor Henry Ngan - is Henry heading to become one of that rare breed a Wagnerian tenor? - there was a great appreciation for accompanist Llyr Simon. The second lunchtime concert saw a delightful and relaxing concert from guitarist Rishart Arwel.

Both the opening choral concert by Cantorion Creigiau - we hear that they've been asked to appear at next year's Festival - and the closing concert for the Festival Charity, were both popular and great successes.

An undoubted hit of the Festival was a performance of THE LADY VANISHES by professional theatre company Fluellen from Swansea. They had adapted the novel previously adapted by Alfred Hitchcock into a film. This version was, apparently, closer to the original than the Hitchcock version. A thoroughly delightful evening.

Update - June 2018

The next of Plasdwr's Radyr community drop-in sessions will take place at the New School Rooms on Heol Isaf between 4pm and 7pm on Thursday 14th June.

This is the sixth drop-in since lead developer, Redrow Homes started work at Parc Plymouth, off Clos Parc Radur, just over a year ago. The sessions are organised to ensure local residents and developers have a chance to meet and discuss local issues and plans face-to-face.

Drop-in sessions have also taken place in Llandaff and Pentreban and more have been set, including in Creigiau (see below for details) with Danescourt and Fairwater meetings also being planned.

Taking shape over the next 15 years, Plasdwr will be a garden city for the 21st Century bordering Radyr, Fairwater, Pentreban and St Fagans.

40% of Plasdwr's 900 acres will be open green space. Up to 7000 homes will be created along with four primary schools, a secondary

school, shops, offices, health and leisure centres, pubs and restaurants.

Plasdwr will be created in a number of phases, starting with the development of homes and transport infrastructure bordering existing communities. Lead developer, Redrow Homes, is underway with the first of these at Cae St Fagans, Pentreban Road and Parc Plymouth, Llantrisant Road. At time of writing, a second developer is shortly to be announced who will start work on the parcel of land between Parc Plymouth and Heol Isaf later this year.

Katie Powis, community liaison manager, said: *"Good relationships with our neighbouring communities are key to the success of Plasdwr. Some of these are already well established, and we look forward to growing more over the coming months and years."*

No funds to repair children's playground

Cardiff Council has confirmed that no money will be made available to repair the children's playground near Drover's Way, in Clos Parc Radur.

The play-equipment, and the safety surfaces, are in very poor condition. Indeed, some equipment has been removed, because of safety concerns. And all at a time when Clos Parc Radyr is welcoming new families, and more children, as new houses are built nearby.

Community Councillor Huw Onllwyn Jones, who has been campaigning for improvements, expressed his disappointment at the Council's decision.

Cardiff Council's leader, Huw Thomas, told me that he was keen to help' said Cllr Jones 'But it seems that these were just empty words. And to make matters worse, I am told by the Cardiff Council that the remaining equipment may need to

be removed within twelve months, because of safety concerns. At which point, our children will not have a playground of any shape or form. And this is at a time when the Government is becoming increasingly concerned about childhood obesity - and fitness and health in general.

In the meantime, Redrow Homes has offered to contribute to the cost of

repairs. 'This is very welcome' added Cllr Jones 'But it does make Cardiff Council's lack of support even more frustrating'.
