

ITV Star to turn on the Christmas Lights

This year's Christmas Tree lighting ceremony will be on Friday 7th December – weather permitting – and we are delighted to report that ITV News Reader Kate Lewis, a supporter of *Action for Children*, our Charity for the year, will be with us to turn on the lights in Station Road. Kate has worked for ITV Wales for almost a decade. During this time she has worked as a reporter and producer on Welsh language programmes and, over the last few years, has become a familiar face both presenting the weather and reporting for Wales at Six.

Kate will be joined at the switch-on by the 'RCT Young Carers Choir' (also known as 'Young Carers Aloud'). The choir is a group of young carers aged 8 to 18 from Rhondda Cynon Taff whose lives are affected by their caring responsibilities for another family member. They will be singing a number of carols and we are delighted they will be with us.

Prior to the switch-on in Station Road, the Comprehensive School band will be playing Christmas music at the





lighting of the tree in Morganstown at 5:45pm, and the tree in Lychgate Gardens at 6:15pm. The action will then move to Windsor Gardens where a joint Choir from our two Primary Schools will sing carols whilst the tree there will be lit at 6:40pm. The Festival Queen and her attendants will also be there.

The lights will be lit in Station Road by Kate at 7:00pm precisely. Providing everyone has been good, Santa will arrive in his sleigh to talk to the young children. There is bound to be a bit of a queue so Santa will have some helpers around to keep everything in order. Every child will also be awarded a satsuma!

The Station Road stalls will be open from 6:00pm selling all sorts of goodies – crafts, gifts, jewellery and much more. Burgers, hot dogs and mulled wine will be available at the R&M Association stall and the WI will be dispensing tea and coffee. Many of the shops will also be open, including Cicchetti and our new refreshment outlets, Slice and Radyr Tap, so you will be able to do some shopping and even stay for a meal. Action for Children will have a stall and be collecting during the evening.

Do come along and enjoy the festivities, arranged jointly between the R&M Association and the R&M Community Council. It is a lovely way to start the Christmas Season and entrance is free.

Action for children This year's charity is Action for

Children. Nina Rice, the chief fund-raising officer for the charity tells us a little about it.



Nina Rice - Action For Children Co-ordinator

Action for Children are thrilled to be working in partnership with the Radyr & Morganstown Association for their forthcoming programme of events with the Christmas Light Switch On only a couple of weeks away.

Next year will see 150 years since Action for Children was founded as the National Children's Home, with the first home in Waterloo, London. The first National Children's Home in Wales opened in 1911 and the charity has continued to grow, supporting more and more children and young people across the UK in ever broadening areas of work to support local community needs, including support for families; support for children with disabilities; fostering and adoption services; amongst many others.

The mental health of young people is a growing area of work for Action

for Children. In 2017 Action for Children started the 'Blues Programme' supporting youngsters aged 15-18, in Wales this programme is currently available in Cardiff and Rhyl. Young people in a number of local further education settings are given a simple questionnaire to complete. It is then assessed by our 'Blues Busters' and those youngsters considered to be at risk of some mental health struggles are invited to take part in the Blue 6-week programme. This programme works through different situations and circumstances with the young people to help them better deal with situations in a more positive way. Feedback from the young people has been exceptionally good, with a high percentage feeling the Blues Programme has been invaluable to them, and will continue to help them into adulthood.

Action for Children's 'Guide Project' has also just gone live. This service will be working with schools across Wales (English and Welsh) to give training to teachers to help them spot the signs of mental health issues in those aged 13-15 and give guidance and support as required. This is in addition to the School Based Counselling services we offer at all Cardiff High Schools.

Additionally Action for Children has launched a campaign called 'Build Sound Minds' to build better mental health and emotional wellbeing in young people. We share resources and guidance for parents, from Action for Children's mental health services team. Find out more at www.buildsoundminds.org.uk

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Lamb Ragout with Smoked Paprika and Shallots Serves 6 1kg. (2lb.) shoulder of lamb, cut into pieces. Oil to cook. 2 medium onions roughly chopped. 2 cloves garlic chopped. 6-12 shallots depending on size.

4 sweet long red peppers.

(to skin the peppers, cut into flat quarters lengthwise,

remove seeds, place skin up under hot grill until charred,

remove and place in plastic bag for a few minutes, shake,

remove and skin then chop).

1 chilli pepper - de-seeded.

2 teaspoons smoked paprika (or more to taste).

1 tin chopped tomatoes.

2 tablespoons tomato puree.

1 tablespoon flour.

Salt and ground black pepper.

Heat oil in ovenproof casserole or pan.

Fry lamb pieces gradually until brown.

Remove from pan.

Saute onions until soft.

Add whole shallots, garlic and chilli.

Fry for a few minutes, add paprika and flour.

Stir to mix then add meat and juices plus all other ingredients and cover.

Cook casserole on moderate oven until tender - approx 1 hour.

Taste and adjust seasoning.

Better if allowed to cool and reheated the next day.

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20'S PLENTY FOR WALES CONFERENCE REPORT FROM LOCAL RESIDENTS GROUP #20WALES #LOVE OUR VILLAGES

Local residents of Radyr & Morganstown wanted to find out the facts about 20mph. We self-funded ourselves to attend a conference of 100 delegates in Cardiff's Glamorgan County Cricket Ground. Attendees included representatives from Cardiff Council, Public Health Wales, respected academics and those with an interest in making communities safer for all.

The event was opened by Cardiff's Transport Minister, Councillor Caro Wild. Paul Carter of Cardiff City Council reported on their plans for rolling out 20mph limits across the city as a core policy.

20mph default is recommended by Public Health Wales in residential areas. Experts say it would save up to £94M p.a. in injuries and £61M pa in air pollution related ill healthhttp://www.20splenty.org/wale s_conf - _ftn1. A national 20mph default would pay back its investment in a matter of days. Public Health Wales was represented Dr Sarah Jones and conference chair Dr Chrissie Pickin, Executive Director of Health and Wellbeing.

Devolution means that the Welsh Assembly are able to vote to set Welsh national speed limits separately from Westminster. 20mph is a public health change that fulfils all seven of the wellness criteria in the Well-being of Future Generations (WFG) Act.

Rod King MBE of 20's Plenty for Us set the International context for 20mph as the developing norm – not just for road safety, but for population and environmental health, active travel, mental health, business and tourism.

Mark Ruskell MSP, the Scottish Green party spokesman on Environment, inspired listeners with the progress of his "Restricted Roads (20mph Speed Limit) (Scotland)

Bill"http://www.20splenty.org/wales_ conf - _ftn4. This calls for a National 20mph default and looks likely to be passed.

Paul Butcher, Calderdale's Director of Public Health reported that casualties have reduced by 30% in Calderdale on roads where 20mph has been implemented.

Prof Adrian Davis explained the Prevention Paradox, where small gains for the many add up to much more than a few people benefiting from large gains. 20mph as an area-wide scheme provides small individual, yet massive overall gains to the entire population of a place, and its visitorshttp://www.20splenty.org/wal es_conf - _ftn1.

Interestingly, the subject of emissions is contentious, however, where implemented:

It is likely to reduce the appeal of 'shortcuts' and so reduce emissions because less traffic.

Traffic calming measures (such as tabled crossings), means traffic moves more smoothly with less acceleration

Cardiff school girl raises money to support children with life-limiting condition

A school girl from Cardiff has raised money for a charity that funds research into a life-limiting condition.

Rowan Bailey-Lear, aged 10 from Morganstown has raised £130 for Harrison's Fund which is based in Surrey.

To raise money Rowan held a brunch at her house for her friends, selling tea, coffee, fruit juice, smoothies, and lots of food including banana bread, Mexican scrambled egg, bagels with cream cheese and salmon, apple muffins, croissants with homemade jam, strawberries, and melon and granola jars.

Carrie Lear, Rowan's mum said: "My best friend was at school with a girl whose daughter was in Harrison's class in primary school. She shared a post about Harrison's Fund, and I thought it looked like an excellent charity to support. Rowan loves science, and so she loves the fact that the charity directly supports scientific research to find a cure for Duchenne."

Harrison's Fund was set up in 2012 and funds research into Duchenne - a rare genetic condition which affects all the muscles in the body, causing them to waste away. Harrison's Fund's goal is to get as much money as possible into the hands of the world's best researchers, who are working to find a cure for Duchenne.

We hear that white smoke has been seen to come from the Bishop's Palace in Llandaff and that Bishop June was happy to announce that the Rev Vicki Burrows will be the new Rector of Radyr. She will take up her new position towards the end of February. As rector of Radyr she will be responsible for both Christ Church and the parish church St John the Baptist, now inexplicably in Danescourt, but still the parish church of the parish of Radyr.

Vicki said "I am absolutely delighted to have been offered the post as your next Priest-in-Charge in Radyr and am very much looking forward to living, worshiping and serving in the Parish.

I am a wife, mother and priest, born in 1961 and married to Billy. We have 5 sons who are 19, 25, 27, 30 and 31) and we look after two girls of 9 and 17.

I served my Curacy in The Bourne in Farnham. I was a Parish with 4 churches, a strong choral tradition and a plethora of activities

I was then Rector of St Mary's Long Ditton for 7 years – the church grew significantly during this time and became an all age congregation serving the needs of the wider community.I was then Vicar of Royal Wooton Bassett, a community whose role in the life of the nation is well known, and I was also Area Dean of Calne in the Salisbury Diocese.More recently I was Vicar of Holy Trinity, Bramley and St Andrew's Grafham, two suburban and rural churches in Guildford Diocese until Bishop June invited me to live in Pendoylan and serve in the East Vale Benefice.I am thrilled that I now have the opportunity to build on Jenny's legacy and the many firm foundations in Radyr, but also that I will be working alongside so many committed and able Christian reaching out to all who live, work or learn in the parish. Whilst I recognise that the new housing developments and the establishment of a new ministry area may worry some of you I genuinely believe that the arrival of thousands of new families is our shared opportunity to grow God's Kingdom, proclaim the gospel in this generation and so joyfully share the story of God's redeeming love for all people.I can't wait to move into the Rectory and we are looking forward to getting to know you all. I hope we will arrive by the second week of February and that I will be installed later that month.I am holding you all in my prayers and just ask that you would pray for us too as we begin a new chapter in our shared journey of faith."

We welcome Vicki to our midst, the Rector is an important person in the life of the two villages to Anglicans and non Anglicans alike and we wish her a long and successful incumbency.

The decorations at Christ Church, the poppies all around the Monument and the set out at Windsor Gardens were exemplary. Furthermore, at the end of the commemoration diner, guests were treated to an excellent talk by Mr Ron Jones concerning the contributions our areas made in both World Wars.

The Old Church Rooms Management Committee are about to begin major structural repairs and improvements both inside and outside of the premises These developments are essential as the Hall is central to many activities under taken by all residents. Councillor Helen Lloyd Jones and her management of the Environment Committee has led to an enhanced ambience of many areas.

A delegation from your Community Council met for the second time with Mr Paul Carter of the Cardiff City Council Planning Department. Various options regarding Road Safety in our communities were discussed. These are recorded in an excellent paper produced by Councillor H Jones. The major outcome was that a draft plan incorporating a number of possible major Road Calming proposals along Heol Isaf and Ty Nant Roads was produced. This plan has been on display in both the Library and in the foyer of the Old Church Rooms.

There are two main actions required. The first is to comment on the draft plan and the second is to provide the necessary funding. The first issue is being addressed by the Community Council Working Group joined by local representatives and their brief is to consider Road Safety matters THROUGHOUT our areas. Their report will shortly be available. The predominant concern is the proposed introduction of a 20 m p h speed limit and traffic calming measures along these two roads. However, it was made quite clear at this meeting that to establish all possible measures would take both time and funding .

The delegation was therefore asked to consider all the possible measures at Council and to recommend the first TWO or Three measures they would like to see established as soon as possible.

In addition, road safety along Bryn Derwen and Drysgol Roads was considered . There is only ONE official crossing along these two roads and it is situated near the Guide Hall which is well used by all residents, both young and old. Furthermore, many residents including many children cross the motorway bridge to gain access to Bryn Deri School, the transport network and ,of course, the Guide Hall for a variety of activities.

There were also other road safety issues raised and discussed. These included the Station Car parks ,entry and exits onto Kings Road , Kings Road itself and the Monument Area. The lack of pavements at the corner of Windsor Road needs urgent correction .Residents will be kept informed of progress

The question of obtaining the necessary funding for all these developments was again discussed. It appeared that the City Council were currently unable to fund all measures immediately ,hence the proposed phased funding was the other option. The Community Council is most grateful that, following discussions between the City Council and Redrow, the latter has kindly agreed to the early release S106 funds of £300K. What now becomes of paramount importance is to try and ensure that this considerable sum is used in the most appropriate way.

Finally, may I wish on behalf of the Community Councillors a Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

Seasons greeting from all the team at Bridges Veterinary Surgery



We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our lovely clients and local community for supporting us in a time when it is harder and harder for small independent businesses to continue. We really appreciate your loyalty.

With all the excitement and hustle and bustle at this time of year, we can sometimes forget that many of our festive treats can be troublesome for our beloved pets. Here's a little reminder of the foods and seasonal items that can cause your pet to become very poorly.

Firstly, let's talk about food. This certainly is the time of year for indulging and our pets, especially dogs, will often try their best to join in!

Many may already know that chocolate is very dangerous for dogs. It contains a chemical called Theobromine which is very toxic and can cause a range of symptoms from severe tummy upsets, tremors and seizures to serious problems with the heart. Generally, the darker the chocolate, the more Theobromine it contains, but all chocolate should be avoided and veterinary attention should be sought as soon as you've realised it's been eaten by your pooch. Don't forget that even though white chocolate doesn't contain enough Theobromine to be toxic, when eaten in large amounts (or even if tiny dogs or dogs with sensitive tummies eat a small amount) the fat content may cause digestive upsets and even pancreatitis.

Many luxury foods contain raisins. Raisins are so toxic to dogs that they cause severe kidney failure, even if eaten in tiny quantities. Christmas puddings, mince pies, fruit cakes and chocolate coated raisins (double toxicity whammy here) really needs to be kept out of reach. Seek immediate veterinary attention should any of these be consumed. A lot of these items will also contain nuts. Macadamia nuts which although not as toxic as raisins, can cause tremors, joint stiffness and lethargy.

Turkey and other meats on the bone usually take centre stage during the festivities for us meat-eaters. Dogs will often do all they can to get their chops around a turkey carcass. However, the bones can cause severe gut problems from nasty irritation an pain, perforations, obstructions to severe constipation.

Cooked and uncooked onions, garlic, shallots and leeks can be toxic too. They often cause vomiting and diarrhoea, but can also cause anaemia (low blood cells).

For those of us who enjoy a sherry or three, alcohol has a similar effect on dogs and cats as it does on humans. It is quite common for dogs to help themselves to alcohol, if given the chance! Signs include wobbliness, but if drunk in excess can even reduce a dog's state of consciousness, sometimes resulting in a coma.

Artificial sweeteners (xylitol) are found in some festive and popular sweets, chewing gums, mouthwash and toothpaste. It is very toxic to dogs and symptoms include tiredness, vomiting and seizures.

So, in a nutshell, watch out for those leftovers on the kitchen worktops and make sure those bins are emptied regularly! Also, keep luxury foods well hidden – at a height if possible and don't hang chocolates from the tree.

Other items to watch out for during the party season include cigarettes and e-cigarettes. Nicotine is toxic to animals and it is not uncommon for dogs to eat cigarette butts or chew on an e-cigarette. Symptoms of toxicity include diarrhoea, excitability/agitation, excessive drooling, rapid heart rate, collapse and seizures.

Plants, include mistletoe, holly and poinsettia often cause mouth irritation, vomiting and diarrhoea. Ivy can cause tummy upsets too but also skin irritation if animals are in contact for a long time.

With the widespread use of antifreeze during the cold weather, it is important to note that the ingredient in anti-freeze (ethylene-glycol) is severely toxic to dogs and cats. If drunk, even small amounts will cause symptoms of incoordination, vomiting, weakness, tremors, seizures and loss of consciousness. Treatment is aggressive and can take a long time, and unfortunately can be unsuccessful. Keep it well hidden and clear up any spillages as soon as they occur.

Most of the toxicities above can be treated, but the quicker you get your pet to the vet after ingestion, the better.

Hopefully, the information above will allow you to plan your pet-friendly festivities and for them to pass without any unplanned visits to the vet!

If you have any concerns at all, give us a call at the surgery and we can advise on the best course of action. Treatment often involves making them vomit, activated charcoal and sometimes hospitalisation and a drip and any other medication necessary.

We hope you have a lovely time with your family and pets at this wonderful time of

the year. We wish you all a merry Christmas and a healthy happy New Year.

Look After Your Valuables!

A recent report presented to Radyr and Morganstown Community Council focused on a small number of break-ins across the community.

In several of the incidents, forced entry was not required, because the house owners had left doors and windows open. A random check by law enforcement officers in and around the community revealed that a surprising number of households do, in fact, make entry to their homes very easy to accomplish, simply by not locking doors (especially rear doors) or securely closing windows.

So, even in suburban Radyr and Morganstown, the message is to make life difficult for those who wish to help themselves to your possessions. And here are some helpful suggestions:

• Fit an alarm - if you have an alarm, arrange for it to be serviced from time to time

• if you go out for the evening, leave a light on upstairs

• also, leave a radio playing, or use a fake television light somewhere in your house (these cost around £10 online - and it looks as if someone in the house is watching the television)

lock your doors (and check that you have great locks)

• close and secure your windows

• tell your neighbours to keep an eye on your house whenever you go away for a while

Although, in general, the level of crime in Radyr and Morganstown is lower than in other parts of the city, it's as well to take precautions.
