On a cold Friday evening in January, 13 brave 1st Radyr Scouts and 5 Leaders had piled into two big white mini-buses and were headed down the M4 towards London. Our destination was *WinterCamp* 2019 at Gilwell Park. This was the first time that Radyr Scouts had ever been to *WinterCamp* at Gilwell Park and we didn't know what to expect, nor exactly how cold it was going to be, sleeping under canvas in the middle of winter; so maybe we were brave or perhaps a bit silly to even be considering it!

Gilwell Park is the Scouting HQ in the UK and is located north-east of London. It is also the home to *WinterCamp*, a nationwide Scout

camp that attracted over 4,000 Scouts, offering an amazing range of more than 60 activities. These ranged from quad biking and fairground rides to paddle boarding and ice-skating, as well as all of the usual Scouting activities such as fire lighting and pioneering.

The first night we got there we were pleased to be able to invest one of our Scouts and one of our Leaders in front of the bust of our founder, Robert Baden-Powell. The next 2 days were full of activities and those that we did included: archery, clay-pigeon shooting, quad-biking, ice skating, LaserQuest, four wheel drive, camp craft, mini-tanks, fire lighting, campfire cooking, axe throwing and others that I now forget!

My favourite activity was the quad bikes which involved driving around a course with lots of obstacles, at

Rector or Vicar?

The Rev'd. Vicki Burrows became the Vicar of the Parish of Radyr in February, previous incumbents have been Rectors. Since the middle ages, this meant that they had the income from the tithes and any glebe land within the Parish, although more recently they have been salaried.



That is apart from a period in the 18th and 19th centuries when the Earls of Plymouth "appropriated" the tithes and in effect became the Rectors of Radyr, appointing a poorly paid curate to look after the parishoners.

Changing times means changing needs and the church is now only appointing Vicars. This makes it easier for Bishops to move Vicars to where they are most needed.

It may be of interest to readers to know that Rev'd. Vicki has been licensed to operate in four parishes, the four parishes that will ultimately serve the huge Plasdŵr development. Nice to know that we have a forward thinker in Bishop June.

So the correct way to address Vicki Burrows is Vicar.

If you wish to hear the new Vicar in action she will be preaching in Christ Church at the Civic Service at 6 p.m. on Sunday May 5th, or on most Sundays. She will also be giving a talk to the Association on "How I became the Vicar of Radyr". Old Church Rooms 7.30 Monday June 17th. All are welcome.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Chocolate and Orange Marble Cake

A delicious, moist cake that would be good for Easter.

You create a 2 coloured marble effect throughout.
Approx. 10 slices

200g (7oz) softened unsalted butter or marg.

+ extra to grease

200g (7oz) golden caster sugar

3 large eggs

200g (7oz) S.R. flour, sifted with

1 level tspn. baking powder

zest and juice of 1 large orange

(choose orange with bumpy peel)

40g.(1¹/₂oz) cocoa powder, sifted

To decorate

100g.(3¹/₂oz) dark chocolate

(At least 50% cocoa solids)

broken into pieces

35g(1¹/₂ oz) butter, chopped

Use 900g (2lb.) loaf tin

Grease and line tin or use bought tin liner

Oven 190 C or gas mark 5

Easiest to use an electric hand whisk

to beat together butter and sugar

until light and creamy

Gradually beat in eggs.

Add a little flour if mixture curdles.

Fold in remaining flour, baking

powder, orange zest +juice.

Put ¹/₂ mixture in another bowl and

fold in cocoa.

If mixture is too stiff add little milk.

Drop spoonfuls of each mixture into tin.

Run a skewer through to create swirls.

Bake in oven 50-60 mins until a skewer inserted

into centre, comes out clean.

Cool on wire rack.

Melt choc.+ butter together in bowl resting over pan of boiling water.

Once melted, stir together.

When cool, drizzle over cooled cake.

Leave to set approx. 1 hour.

This cake stores well in airtight container.

Here is a bright new talent for our Community!

The traditional clever settings were there and the high standards of singing, acting and dancing expected of its predecessor group RMPG were immediately apparent but the choice and panache of the new young RMS took one's breath away! From the start it was all song and action and even although the first half was lengthy the continuity and enjoyment of the cast was infectious and the time flew past too quickly.

I had not heard of the show 'How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying' when the new Committee announced their choice last September but the Society had pushed the right buttons for a potential new future audience base in North West Cardiff by introducing something of an innovation, very much a young persons production.

Alex Brent shines brightly as the junior employee Bud Frump with high level connections but these fail in the end as Finch speeds his way to the top of the ladder.



There are several fine actors/singers on stage and Phil Davies as the President of WWWC leads a talented company that includes Lesley Collier-Roberts, Gareth Hurman, Emily Beach, Emma Allfree, Simon Carter, Bethan Sims, Kevin Smith and Dan Collier-Roberts. everyone of them deserved the enthusiastic applause when the curtain came down on a splendid show. Bev Jones as Director can be most satisfied that, as also Chair of the new Society, she is taking music and dance in Radyr to an exciting new level!

Well done all who took part on stage, behind the stage, in the foyer and under the expert baton of Ben Pinnow the Musical Director. Given perhaps rather better visible advertising around the locality in future I'm sure that your next production will be a sell-out! it certainly deserves to be!

Radyr Festival 2019

This year the Radyr Festival runs from the 4th to the 19th May. It is the usual mix of well loved and new events. Quizzes, concerts, plays, films, tea parties, the concert in the park and much much more. See the brochure in this edition of the Chain for full details.

The Festival is book ended by two choral concerts. On Saturday 4th May in the Golf Club at 7.30 Cantorion Creigiau Singers will give a concert from their extensive repertoire. They were so popular last year that a return visit was booked on the spot.

The closing concert on Sunday 19th May at 7.30 in Christ Church will be given in aid of the Festival charity, Action for Children. This will be the first visit to the Festival by Amici, although they sang at Christ Church in February and are part of that excellent Choir, Cantemus, who have performed at the Radyr Festival on several occasions.

Several events have a decidedly Welsh flavour. The novelist and television presenter, Jon Gower, will give a talk entitled Living through books, Tuesday 7th May Old Church Rooms at 7.30; while the television cook and Great British Bake Off finalist Beca Lyne-Perkis will demonstrate from her latest book. Old Church Rooms Weds 15th May at 7.30. This event is already heavily booked.

The two lunch time concerts on the two Friday lunchtimes at the Methodist Church feature singer's from Dennis O'Neill's Wales International Academi of Voice. English lyric Soprano Lucy Elstan, and Swedish lyric tenor Stian Okland, will sing popular classics from opera and musicals. The second lunch time concert involves the talented Welsh harpist Eleri Darkins, who will play works by Handel, Haydn, John Field and David Watkins amongst others.

This year the Festival will show two films. On Tuesday 14th May, they will show a new print of Charlie Chaplin's silent classic THE KID,

films in the Old Church Rooms at 7.30.



"Urban, residential area maximum speeds of 20mph are increasingly being advocated for and implemented to reduce crash and injury risks as well as many of the other negative factors associated with cars; noise and air pollution, physical inactivity, community severance and personal isolation and loneliness."

I am sure that your correspondent's views are sincerely held. However, I do not respect the use of single, highly selective pieces of evidence to make such strong assertions, especially on a matter of such importance.

These last three months have seen a great deal of activity. Council were delighted to welcome the First Minister, Mr Mark Drakeford, to the January meeting. In his introductory remarks, the Minister stated that he would be recommending a 20mph speed limit in all residential areas, towns and cities throughout Wales. Several prepared questions were asked. All were pertaining to our areas. These questions included road safety and transport infrastructure, the possible increase in both atmospheric and noise pollution, health care and education facilities associated with the forthcoming increase in the local population, the future role of Community Councils, housing and the position of landlords who provide tenancies for vulnerable people. He would consider these questions and send responses. Some have arrived and are available for residents at the Council Office. He also accepted an invitation from the Council that Mr Kevin Brennan, the local MP and he, held two political surgeries every year in our community as well as those regularly held at the Cardiff West Constituency Office. The dates for these surgeries have now been confirmed as Friday, the 5th of April and Friday the 4th of October 2019 between 17.00pm and 18.00pm at the Old Church Rooms. Further information can be obtained from the Council Secretariat or at the Cardiff West Constituency Office.

Road safety THROUGHOUT Radyr and Morganstown remains a Council priority. In the last newsletter, I reported that a Council delegation had met with Mr Paul Carter at the Planning Department. As yet, there has been no further correspondence. However, following several complaints, I met with Mr Gavin Colman from the Highways Department and inspected three sites. The first was the hedgerow running from the motorway bridge upwards towards the Scout Hall. The hedge needs cutting back as it has grown onto the pavement. Secondly, the area on Windsor Road where there is neither a pavement nor an official crossing. Thirdly, the dreadful state of the pavement from Ffordd Las down to the entrance to the Golf Club. A report is awaited. The state of Bethel Chapel and the graveyard alongside is not only an eye sore but also an insult to those who have been interred there. Councillor Mckerlich and I have dispatched letters to those who are responsible for this quite disgraceful state of affairs.

It is a pleasure to report that the Council has supported various local developments. Grants have been awarded to the Parents Teachers Associations at both primary

schools and to the very successful Cricket Club. The latter have plans to increase their facilities and the Council will assist with a grant of £13,000 - which will cover 10% of the development costs. It is a pleasure to record that several of their female playing members have been awarded national honours. All the local schools have received books written in English and Welsh regarding World War One. Lastly, your Council is supporting the Radyr and Morganstown Festival which will commence in May this year.

Residents will recall that your Council supported the establishment of the Radyr Tap. Not only has this venture been successful but it also provides an additional service to the Community. With this in mind, a letter is being sent to the person responsible for the old Spar shopping area, to encourage the development of the premises to bring another service to the Community.

There are several developments about to commence at The Old Church Rooms which is much used by residents and many societies. The first are repairs to the roof which has developed a leak. The second is to replace the carpet in the Garth Room which is much used by many different groups. The third is the replacement of apparatus in the all important kitchen. Finally, a new retaining wall will be built at the east end of the building. At times, car parking can be a problem at the OCR particularly at school times. It is of particular concern during the times when the Nursery School Pupils are in residence and later in the day when the after school activities commence. Residents are respectfully asked to consider these activities and avoid parking in the OCR car park.

The environment activities in the community are reduced due to Springtime and, in particular, by the onset of bird nesting. However, the work at Pentwyn Park continues so that the pathways are free of large puddles. A retaining wall behind the commercial area is in the planning stage. Furthermore, work continues on the Pilgrims Way as it traverses Radyr. It is hoped that this way, starting in Llandaf and ending at the site of the Holy Virgin at Penrhys, will be opened later this year.

The improvements at the Drivers Way Play area are proceeding albeit at a slower pace than anticipated. The organisers, who have worked hard and raised considerable funds, are still awaiting confirmation of an input from Redrow. Your Council will also contribute financially to this development with a



grant of £5,000. The civil engineering works at the south end of Heol Isaf continue to be a source of frustration to residents who need to travel to their places of work. It is hoped that the delays experienced by residents and other motorists will decrease in the near future.

The 50+ lunch club, held on alternate Wednesdays, continues to welcome its many guests. All are welcome. The lunch is usually followed by a talk from a speaker on his/her favoured subject. What is required currently, are more volunteers to pick up and return attendees to their homes. Council are very grateful to Councillor Huw Jones and Mrs Hashumati Patel for their enthusiasm and dedication which has led to the increasing popularity. Further information can be obtained from the Council Office.

It is a pleasure to welcome the Reverend Vicki Burrows to the Parish. I am sure that all residents will look forward to meeting her and hope that her term of office will be both pleasurable and rewarding.

This will be my last newsletter to residents as Chairman of the Council. I do hope these letters have been of benefit. I would very much like to thank my fellow councillors for their considerable help and support over the last two years. Finally, I am deeply indebted to the senior clerks, Mrs Ceri Mortimer and Ms Lynne Thomas. I would also like to pay my considerable thanks to our Assistant Clerk, Mrs Julie Hopkins, who ran our office most efficiently between the departure of Mrs Mortimer and the appointment of Ms Thomas.



Correction...

In the article 'Radyr Comprehensive School' in the last issue of *Radyr Chain* "Oxbridge Success" it stated that 6 students had interviews and 5 were offered places and that this was the highest in the school's history.

A reader correctly pointed out that, in fact, in the academic year 1986/87 there were 9 students who gained places at Oxbridge. *Ed.*

Radyr & Morganstown 1939

As family and local historians know censuses are a gold mine of information but due to the 100 year rule the latest available is 1911.

However the national register drawn up in October 1939, not being a census as such - although it is hard to spot the difference - has been released. It gives details of the occupants at a specific address including their date of birth and occupation. This was compiled by enumerators as the basis for the National Identity Cards issued on the spot after the start of the Second World War. Interestingly that same register, updated, formed the data base for the newly created NHS in the late 40's.

The records are available on fee-charging websites such as Ancestry and Findmypast.

As the base is national, searching by person is laborious unless you have more detail or an unusual surname. Pick "Jones" and half a million appear!

To get to Radyr I asked Allan Cook, Chairman of the History Society, for suggestions on more unusual

surnames who may have lived here in 1939. He came up with several, one of which in Glamorgan caught my eye being a railway plate layer. Sure enough he lived in Junction Terrace so I had located where Radyr was, enumeration district XLAD. I found further records for Radyr and Morganstown in XLAE. You can then view a scan page by page of the individual register which contains over 1000 names.

Heol Isaf was the road for professionals in medicine, education and law with a smattering of live-in domestic servants.

Now vanished occupations from 1939 include a safety lamp maker, a steam tram operator, a junior wireless* mechanic and two men living in Gelynis Terrace who were dolomite stone getters [sic].

In Radyr the blue collar railway employees were in the Terraces, the white collar clerks up the road in Windsor Crescent.

Some of the information is redacted, eg some persons who are currently not yet 100 years old but nevertheless an interesting resource.
