

Pilgrims Way

It might come as a surprise to many readers that Radyr sits on an important pilgrim route between the cathedral at Llandaff and Penrhys. In the middle ages, hundreds if not thousands of pilgrims would have walked from Llandaff to Penrhys, especially on the four Festivals dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

So important was the statue of the Virgin Mary of Penrhys that at the Reformation, it was taken to London to be publicly burnt, along with her equally important sisters of Walsingham and Doncaster.

The footpath winds for 21 miles though some of the most beautiful countryside in Glamorganshire. Llantrisant is about half way on the footpath and makes a useful point at which to break the walk into two days.

For several years the Penrhys Pilgrimage Project has been working to re-establish the route, and walkers will notice the distinctive blue and yellow waymarkers going up on footpaths through Radyr.



The Way will be officially opened in March 2020 – which happens to be a year of pilgrimage in the Diocese of Llandaff - although it is entirely accessible before then as it follows public footpaths for the whole of its way.

If you visit the lady chapel in Llandaff Cathedral, the reredos behind the altar shows plants associated with the Virgin Mary and one of these is the snowdrop. It is planned to plant examples of these

plants at various points along the path.

Over the spring children from Radyr and Bryn Deri Primary Schools planted snowdrops on the open space at the junction of Ffordd Las and Bryn Derwen. The photograph shows the children hard at work. We look forward to next spring.

A web site, which will give detailed maps of the pathways is in the course of being prepared.

My name is Tom Hughes, I am 17 years old and attend Radyr Comprehensive School and was lucky enough to be selected by Project Trust to travel to Nepal to teach Information Technology (IT) in the foothills of the Himalayas. Project Trust has sent young people abroad to teach since 1967. They have provided me with an opportunity to gain invaluable skills and an unforgettable experience.

What am I doing?

Last summer I travelled to Zambia and Botswana to undergo several tasks including building houses for AIDS orphans. Ever since coming back I have looked for my next task. I came across Project Trust and saw the opportunity I could potentially have. I'm hoping that this experience will give me lifelong memories whilst giving back to those who haven't had the same opportunities as myself.

How will I do it?

For me to be able to undergo this journey I must raise a total of £6,200; all before July of this year. If I reach this goal, Project Trust can



send me to Nepal to teach IT to secondary school students. Whilst I may have to teach IT without even having a computer, I believe I am providing these children with countless future opportunities. To be able to fund this, I have already started planning a series of events and fundraisers that will all take place before July. 
Why me?

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Smoked Fish Pie with Lemon and Herb Mash
An extremely tasty fish pie with a difference. Perfect for freezing
Serves 6

- 1 kg. (2lb) floury potatoes, peeled and cubed
 - Knob of butter
 - 350ml. (3/4 pint) semi-skimmed milk
 - Zest of 1 lemon
 - 2 tbsps dill- finely chopped
 - 1 tbspn parsley-chopped
 - 60g(2 1/2oz.) plain flour
 - 60g(2 1/2oz.) butter
 - 200ml(1 1/3 pint) creme fraiche or double cream
 - 2 t.spns Dijon mustard
 - 2 tbsps chives- chopped
 - 350g(12oz.)smoked haddock - deskinmed and coarsely cubed
 - 400g(14oz.)oak roasted salmon-flaked
 - 200g(7oz.) cooked peeled prawns
- Simmer potatoes in pan of boiling water until tender.
- Drain and mash with butter+ 50ml. of milk.
- Stir through lemon zest, dill, parsley, s+p.
- Taste for seasoning. Set aside.
- Light oven 180 C or Gas 4
- Poach haddock in remaining milk until cooked
- Strain off milk and keep.
- In separate pan melt 60g. butter.
- Add flour and stir to make roux.
- Gradually add the milk from haddock + creme fraiche, to make a thick white sauce.
- Stir in mustard, chives, s+p. Taste.
- In medium, ovenproof pie dish gently combine haddock, salmon, prawns and white sauce.
- Top with the mash, dot with butter.
- Bake until golden brown.

Following my installation as the first Vicar of Radyr in February, a number of people have asked that I write something about myself. So, whilst I would much prefer to meet you personally on 17th June when I shall be telling my "story" at the Radyr and Morganstown Association meeting, I will attempt to share something of my life with you in print.

I was born in London in 1961 and spent my childhood in Epsom, Surrey. My mother also grew up in Epsom where her father was a well known jockey and racehorse trainer. My father was born in Poland but his family came to England seeking asylum when he was a toddler. My sister and I attended a girls school near our home whose mission was to "educate daughter's of gentlemen" - very few girls went on to university however we all learned how to cook, sew and get into a sports car without showing our undies! I spent my teenage years riding racehorses and occasionally studying. After A'Levels and a year acquiring some book-keeping and office skills, I worked for a well known jockey and trainer before eventually joining our family dress manufacturing business where I worked for many years.

I met Billy in Kitzbuhel and we married in 1984 - we have five sons - William 32, Jack 30, Peter 28, Sam 26, Charlie 20, and we look after Rhianna 17 and Jasmine 10, along with 7 dogs! In my spare time I show Rough Collies and was thrilled to win Best of Breed at Crufts this year.

My father was born into an Orthodox Jewish family and married "out" when he met my, nominally Anglican, mother. So faith did not play a part in my childhood. Since

religion had been a taboo subject at home I began to explore faith in my early 20s. I bought a bible and read it as I commuted each day from our first home in Norwich to London - I was converted and was confirmed soon afterwards in Norwich Cathedral, expecting our first son.

Soon after returning to live in Epsom with our first child I was invited to lead the children's group at the parish church. I had no teaching experience but over many years the Sunday Club grew and flourished and many people encouraged me to offer for ordination.

After three years training I was ordained Deacon in 2004 and priest in 2005. I served my curacy (training post) in The Bourne in Farnham. I was then Rector of Long Ditton, Surrey, Vicar of Royal Wootton Bassett and Area Dean of Calne, Vicar of Bramley and Grafham. We moved to live in Pendoylan last September where I served in the East Vale Team whilst learning about the Church in Wales after years serving in The Church of England.

I feel honoured to have been called to Radyr to follow in the footsteps of those Rectors whose ministries have touched the lives of people here. I hope that in the years ahead I will make a difference too. Whilst I would love to see our churches filled to bursting, I want you to know that I am not here just for the religious but to serve all who live and work in Danescourt, Morganstown and Radyr.

In each of the places where I have ministered, my focus has always been on working with others to care for and resource the whole community - Jesus did not come to build a church but the Kingdom of God - which, in English, means a community where individuals love their neighbours and treat others with respect and compassion. To be a Christian is not to believe in the impossible but to say that we've seen a love that conquers evil in the life of an extraordinary human being, whom we call God, and that we are inspired by his life and try (and often fail) to be more like him.

I really look forward to meeting you - please do introduce yourself if you see me in our community and please

do not hesitate to contact me if you are in any kind of pastoral need, would like to explore faith or wish to suggest how our church could better serve our neighbourhood.

In the evening the final concert was given by the superb harmony singing of the Amici Choir performing at Christ Church.

cautious about some of the proposed traffic measures in Radyr and Morganstown. I looked at as many scientific papers listing *primary data* about air pollution for vehicles at 20 versus 30 m.p.h. as I could. In *every one of these papers* emissions were noted to be greater at 20 m.p.h. (If people require confirmation, I can give examples of such papers, on request).

Nevertheless, as I pointed out previously (to be accurate) the increases varied depending on which pollutant was measured and also the vehicle examined. To make doubly sure that my conclusions were correct, I consulted two world experts who work specifically on vehicle emissions. Both agreed with my assessments.

Of course, I fully accept that any accident is tragic and that being hit by a vehicle at 30 m.p.h. is likely to be more damaging than one travelling at 20 m.p.h. Nevertheless, as an elderly Radyr resident, I will do my best not to be hit by any car, van or bus—at any speed!

Unfortunately, I cannot avoid breathing in polluted air, which is widely recognised as one of the major causes of ill health in the U.K. and worldwide. Pollution affects everyone, not only for respiratory or cardiovascular diseases but also, for example, development in the young and dementia in the old. Thus, I urge that nothing is recommended that could increase air pollution and that includes many 'traffic calming' measures.

In addition, with the large housing development on the A4119, our current pollution is likely to increase significantly. The best we residents can do seems to be to get less polluting vehicles when we purchase anew, drive steadily and minimise the journeys we make by car.
