Christmas in Radyr

Christmas 2021 was a great deal better for most people than the previous Christmas. We congratulate all concerned on two delightfully lit villages. Heading through towards the A470 you saw the Church tower, the Christmas trees and lights in Station Road and Windsor Gardens, The Old Church Rooms lit up and a tree and lights in Morganstown. There was also a tree in the Sidings.

Unfortunately because of a very stormy weather forecast, it was decided to cancel the lighting ceremony and the arrival of Santa in R&M. As the lights had been switched on already the event would have centred on the arrival of Santa.

In the event the weather was nothing like as bad as predicted.

Friday 10th December saw Santa, in his brightly lit sleigh, wind his way from Morganstown to the Llantrisant Road, a journey that took three and a half hours. The idea was that no one would be more than a three or four minute walk from a point where Santa passed. This year's charity was Headway, a charity for people affected by acquired brain injuries to rebuild their lives. Small charities are always grateful for money and Headway was particularly grateful for the £450 donated in the bucket collection on the night. Repair Shop

Over the past decade or so I think that we have all become fed up with being told we need to ditch an item and start again because a small part is broken. I think that is particularly true of items which have a sentimental over a cash value and is why programmes like the Repair Shop have become such a hit.

One of the most heartwarming stories we've been told in a long while is the experience of the Rev. Judith Holliman, the minister of our Methodist Church. Judith was brought up by her grandmother and when she was two she spent a long time in hospital with "significant skin burns". Her grandmother bought her an owl to comfort her in hospital which Judith named Wol after the owl in Winnie the Pooh.

Nearly half a century on Wol was "in a sorry state" and Judith said in one of her Sunday thoughts on Facebook how scared he was and how she'd like to have him repaired on the Repair Shop. Judith's grandmother, who lived to be 91, had repaired him several times already. One wonders whether some kind person had sent



Judith's thoughts to the Repair Shop because six months later she received an invitation to take Wol to the Repair Shop.

Judith and her son James visited the Repair Shop, which is situated at the Weald and Down Living Museum near Chichester, on two occasions. Once to take and once to collect the restored Wol. The photographs show Judith and James with the two fabric restorers at the Repair Shop, Amanda Middleditch and Julie Tatchell. Judith tells us that the team at the Repair

Shop were very pleased with the outcome.

One sometimes wonders how much some of the repairs cost, but Wol only cost Judith the petrol cost of travelling to and from the Museum, some things are worth more than money.

The programme was shown in early December, but with the popularity of the series and its frequent repeats you're almost certain to catch up with Judith and Wol.

Dr Bnar Talabani, 32, who lives in Radyr with her husband and daughter has been appointed an MBE in recognition of her above and beyond work during the Covid crisis.

This not only included work to help promote vaccine take-up in the Muslim and ethnic communities, you may have seen her on local television, but also combating anti-vaccine misinformation.

She volunteers to work with the British Society for Immunology and the international organisation Team Halo who battle to correct myths on covid vaccines. A particular tool they use is short videos on social media. This meant using TikTok as part of her tool kit to access younger generations. Bnar who is Kurdish, had to flee Iraq in 1998 with her mother and siblings, all of whom have established themselves as successful professionals here in Britain.

"This is going to be the best Christmas ever," one of our girls announced after she returned home from shopping in Cardiff. I asked her, "why?" I suspected she had seen a much longed for gift either in the shops and had a hunch she might receive it, or I wondered if she'd been peaking at the gifts wrapped up and under the tree. I was wrong. She explained, "this is going to be the best Christmas ever because I've bought some brilliant presents to give to the family." Out of the mouth of babes! She articulated that truth many of us discover as we grow up that it gives us great pleasure, fulfilment even, to see the look of delight on the face of another when they receive the gift we give them.

In the week before Christmas amongst the many cards we received there were letters written for the benefit of distant friends and family members telling the story of their journey through 2021. I was particularly touched by one letter as a close friend told amusing tales of their family's goings ons, but it was the story of how they had "entertained themselves" in lockdown and early retirement that got me thinking. Lawrence is a retired teacher and Belinda spent her working life as a physiotherapist in a children's head injury hospital. Happy Jack -

A Review...

It was a wild and windy November evening. In the darkness Storm Arwen was blowing strong and promising yet more. It was on such an evening that Radyr Drama Society opened their production of John Godber's *Happy Jack*, their first venture for two years. The audience arrived in good time and even before the actors appeared one could sense an air of eager anticipation; the drought was ending.

The choice of play was influenced by Covid considerations. A small cast with a simple set would reduce the number actively involved through rehearsal and performance which in turn would reduce the risk of Covid infection; one positive lateral flow test in the latter stages of rehearsal could derail the show. Gill Evans is a great admirer of John Godber's work and her selection of *Happy Jack* with a cast of just two actors was ideal in these unusual circumstances.



Happy Jack relates the story of Jack and Liz Monroe and was inspired by John Godber's grandparents. Jack, played by Peter Griffiths, and Liz, played by Pauline Watson, are coal miner and wife and typical of their generation. The play opens with the couple in old age and successive scenes gradually take the audience back through time to the characters



in their courtship days. Their love for each other is glimpsed in flashes, but all too often hidden under a stereotypically tough approach to life.

It would feel wrong to differentiate between the performances of Pauline and Peter. Both are highly experienced actors and they both exhibited that experience in very demanding roles requiring their continuous presence throughout the play. Their mime actions were particularly well performed, as in their entry to a crowded cinema and also in the grandson bathroom scene. Yes, those actions were shown by two actors with minimal set and props and with total credibility. The reverse aging process was clearly shown in voice and body variation. It will have taken much concentrated rehearsal time to achieve such standards

The minimal set was most appropriate in term of period and action. It allowed for seamless movement between home life and external scenes with simple furniture moves quickly effected by the actors. Costumes matched set and cast, with changes indicated by subtle variations in hat, coat or scarf, Lighting effects were most effective with gobo images setting the colliery outline and Blackpool tower illustrating how simple and well-timed effects can add to audience

understanding and enjoyment. The musical contributions were similarly well judged to indicate period and character preference.

The contributions of cast and production team all clearly benefited from the leadership and experience of director Gill Evans.

All involved can be proud of Radyr Drama Society's first steps towards the Covid recovery world. The audiences showed how much they appreciated their evening of live theatre and it is to be hoped that future productions will be rewarded with larger audiences as infection fears diminish.

Lack of toilets...

In December members of the Community Council were invited to visit the Transport for Wales (TfW) base in Taffs Well to see the new tram/trains which will be running on the Valley's Lines from 2023 onward. The latest round of Covid restrictions has delayed the opening of the exhibition and we'll let you know once it is open to the public.

While the tram/trains are very comfortable one point is very clear, the ones that will run through Radyr will not have toilets onboard. Toilets will be built on some stations and Radyr is one of those where a new toilet is proposed. But travellers needing to use the toilet during their

journey will need to get off the train and catch a later one. TfW argue that toilets will not be necessary as they will cut the longest journey from Merthyr to Cardiff - to a little over fifty minutes.

On the other hand travellers on the Rhymney Valley Line from Rhymney to Cardiff will have toilets. Here TfW quote the time from Rhymney to Barry - nearly one and a half hours - although the journey time from Rhymney to Cardiff is not noticeably longer than from Merthyr too Cardiff. One wonders why our Assembly Members and our Assembly Government have allowed this strange situation to arise.

YOUR LOCAL CONSERVATIVE PARTY CANDIDATES FOR THE COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTIONS (MAY 5th 2022)

Radyr and Morganstown Conservatives have selected their candidates for this year's Cardiff City Council elections.

Calum Davies, 25, and Christopher Harries, 32, were chosen to contest the ward, which goes to the polls on 5th May, by local Conservative members back in November.

Following boundary changes, Radyr ward residents will elect two councillors rather than one, reflecting the increasing population of the area.

Incumbent Cllr Rod McKerlich is standing down, giving his full backing to Calum and Christopher to succeed him.

Rod said: "It has been an honour to represent the people of Radyr and Morganstown for 14 years but I feel the time has come for me to stand aside.

"Calum and Christopher have already shown their keenness to fight for Radyr and Morganstown residents, knocking on nearly half the doors in the ward between their selection and Christmas, asking if they had any problems they or myself could help with.

"Both will bring the energy, passion and determination of fresh, new councillors. They are determined to put Radyr on the map by getting as much out of the Council as possible for people here while making their concerns heard."

Calum is a communications officer with experience working in the housing sector. He comes from a farming family who also run a small tourism business, and is a Welshspeaker. He moved to Cardiff four years ago after graduating with a first-class degree from Manchester University and stood in last year's Senedd election.

Calum says the Local Development Plan is clearly the main concern of residents, saying:

"Christopher and I have already spoken with scores of people in this beautiful part of Cardiff who are worried it is going to be permanent entry-point for HGVs and Redrow reps.

"The LDP is easily the most popular source of contention in the ward. It is not even about housebuilding in itself, but the sheer scale and pace. The Plasdwr development is already an enormous undertaking, so proposals to expand when they've barely started is totally unacceptable.

"Schools, GP surgeries, and shops need to be in place before further development. Infrastructure is creaking and Heol Isaf is starting to feel as congested as the city centre.

"Proposals to build on fields near the golf club and on Radyr Station car park fly in the face of the 'nature emergency' announced by Cardiff Council as green land is built on, hedgerows are gutted, and public transport is undermined.

"With little green space left in the ward, we will oppose and organise against further housing in the area. We are already canvassing opinion and have started a petition which I would urge anybody who wants to register their own opposition to sign."

Christopher works in Compliance for a Financial Services provider. Originally from Pembrokeshire, he originally moved to Cardiff to study at University and chose to return to the city to build a career.

Christopher has highlighted that although the LDP is clearly the biggest issue in the forthcoming election, both he and Calum know there is more to do, adding:

"Councillors are the first port-of-call for residents and so that means more than just organising against overdevelopment. It means getting the potholes filled, the bins collected, and supporting local groups and projects.

"Other issues we know that are worrying you is the pressure on school spaces, anti-social behaviour, and the Council and developers not making right on improvements promised years ago.

"We are also proud to label ourselves as pro-driver and pro-road safety. Some councillors like to demonise car owners. We believe they have every right to drive, and they do so because of the poor standards of public transport in the city. We will stand up for drivers but ensure that road safety is upheld, whether that be tackling speeding or poor road lighting.

"And we cannot ignore the issue of council tax: while we emerge from the pandemic, the last thing we need is further pressures on incomes. Constant rises by the Council punishes the poorest and youngest in our society the most. We would resist the inflation-busting tax rises of recent years."

History Society

Hopefully most Societies are slowly emerging from the various stages of lockdown. After more than a year of events via Zoom the History Society is looking forward to live interaction once again. One lasting effect of the pandemic will be that even when live interaction is possible once again, talks will still be available on Zoom.

Thursday 10th March will see the The Society's post Christmas lunch, postponed from January.

The Annual General Meeting on Thursday 17th February will take place via Zoom. As the AGM is usually quite a short event, the Chair and a few friends will do a short presentation to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the burning of Ruperra Castle - between Newport and Machen. The Chair had prepared a programme based on eye witness accounts of the momentous events in December 1941. Ruperra Castle, built in the Stuart period, had once belonged to the Morgan family of Tredegar House who had used it largely as a hunting lodge. By the early 20th century it was surplus to the families requirements. At the beginning of the Second World War it was taken over by the War Office and a fascinating array of military units, from army bakers to Indian Army soldiers were billeted there.

Pat Jones-Jenkins, a local historian, had prepared a book based on the memories for the 60th anniversary of the fire and Allan Cook has dramatised it. Pat has succeed in bringing to life this fascinating period which was visible throughout the lower Rumney Valley and as far as Newport. You see the number of local girls who married soldiers, the arrival of the Indian Army at Machen Station and even the imprisonment of German soldiers there.

Thursday 10th March will see a talk by Richard Britton on Medieval Cardiff hopefully live as well as via Zoom and on the 14th April Gwerfel Gardiner will give a talk on William Goscombe, John the Cardiff born sculptor who has many examples of his work around Cardiff. Both the



talks will begin at 7.30 in the Old Church Rooms and all are welcome to join us.

Looking further ahead the committee are actively planning summer visits to places if interest.


Updating the LDP.

Revision of Cardiff LDP

Residents may be aware that at the beginning of December Cardiff Council opened a ten-week consultation period on the strategic options for a revised Local Development Plan (LDP). The Council has also recently invited applications from landowners/potential developers for Candidate Sites to provide more housing and

other development within the LDP area

There are 2 applications for Candidate Site status within our community, one at Radyr station and the other a much larger area of the fields bounded by Pant Tawel Lane, the Golf Club, Rhydlafar and the M4.

This latter site is in the current LDP as an area of "potential future expansion" and many may feel there is no justification for changing that status to a Strategic Site for development in the next revision of the LDP as, amongst other considerations, annual housing targets are not being met and there are sufficient sites within the existing land bank to meet current projections.

The current consultation is at a high level, seeking views on the strategic options for future housing and jobs growth in Cardiff in the period 2021 – 2036 and there will be further consultations on the Preferred Strategy and the Replacement Plan in the coming months.

The R&M Community Council and the newly formed Radyr & Morganstown Local Development Group (RMLDG) both intend to submit formal responses to the consultation and they will be available on the RMA website. Individual residents who wish to add their views can access the relevant documents at www.cardiffldp.co.uk/consultation The official consultation period ends on February 8th.

The Radyr and Morganstown Local Development Group (RMLDG) is an independent group of local residents which has come together to be informed and take positive action on matters relating to Planning Consent and the revision of the Cardiff Council Local Development Plan, with particular interest in how it will affect both the area of Radyr & Morganstown and those who live there. 
