R&M's Woodstock

The Radyr and Morganstown Festival returned at almost full strength after a gap of three years. Fine warm weather for most of the Festival meant that the outdoor events were particularly successful. The Concert in the Parc on the middle Saturday, felt like a major Festival, more like Woodstock than Glastonbury. There wasn't enough mud for it to be Glastonbury.

Nearly five hundred people sat out on the natural amphitheatre in Parc Radyr enjoying the music, the excellent hot dogs and burgers and the exceptional selection of beers. Queues were constant for five hours at the Bar, BBQ and ice cream van until the Bar and BBQ ran out for the second time.

Both the Fete on the first Saturday in the Old Church Rooms, and the Dog show in the Sidings on Bank Holiday Monday were similar successes, residents taking the opportunity to show off their dogs and enjoy the vintage tractors on display.

Attendance at indoor events was a little down on previous years and we feel that residents are still a little



wary of congregating indoors, which is a pity as there was much excellent fare on offer.

The Festival kicked off with an excellent choral concert by the Castell Coch Choral Society in Christ Church, which was also the venue for the closing concert by the Porthcawl Community Orchestra with an exceptional soloist, Stef Harvey-Powell. Not many soprano's would be brave enough as to open with the Queen of the Night's fearsomely difficult aria from

Mozart's Magic Flute.

Another highlight was the visit to Morganstown of Ivor Novello's formidable mother Dame Clara Novello Davies, the original mother from hell. Rosamund Shelley conveyed this dragon with a great deal of humour and sang many of "dear Ivor's" songs accompanied by Gavin Roberts.

We must not forget the excellent lunchtime concerts in the Methodist Church on the two Fridays of the

Finding Aikido Cardiff: Aikido Gakko Ueshiba

In my 20s, I used to be quite a gym-goer, but I was never what would be considered sporty. In my 30s after becoming a mum and a desk job, my fitness levels could only be described as sub-par.

I have always been into martial arts since I was an adolescent, growing up watching badly subtitled Kungfu DVDs brought back by friends from Hong Kong; to watching shows where MMA fighters would take on other martial artists around the world. I was always fascinated how the human body moves.

I have been practicing Tai Chi on and off for several years but really wanted a martial art that has some external



applications, both defensive value and conditioning ability. I read a few forums on different styles and settled on Aikido. Aikido teaches you how to adequately deal with an attack, but it also teaches you how to safely move your body, even if you fall. The one thing that constantly surprises me is how co-ordination of all our limbs is something that needs to be trained. Some of the more experienced practitioners at the club look like they are almost flying.

On the mat, you learn many techniques whilst working closely with a partner as it is a contact discipline. For me it has been extremely mindful as you need to focus throughout the class.

Our Aikido club, based in Morganstown, Radyr, would be considered one of the more physical clubs. There is focus on practicality. However, we can adapt our personal training to our own health and mobility requirements. I approached the club earlier this year to see if they would allow me to train within my own limitations and the club has been incredibly welcoming and inclusive. It is always a little nerve-wracking to go somewhere new, but I spoke to Sensei beforehand and as soon as I met the club I felt completely at ease. I have noticed a remarkable improvement in my own mobility, fitness and even my Tai Chi practice.

If you're on the fence about trying something new, taking up a new discipline and wanting to improve your physical and mental health, I cannot recommend our club enough. Come and give us a try, everyone is friendly, and we even have post-training drinks in the pub on a Friday.

Radyr Cricket Club

The 2022 season is now well under way and I am pleased to give the readers of the Radyr Chain a scoop: you are the first to know that the club has decided to run a Sixth XI in the League on a Saturday. I believe that this has never happened before in Wales and the decision was taken due to the large influx of players during the winter, and in fact they are still coming. It means that the side, which will be a combination of older and younger players, will give competitive cricket to more people, as friendlies are nowadays rather unpopular: players want to have a formal structure and see where their efforts take them on a weekly basis in a league table. It shows that RCC are once again leading the expansion of the game and developing the club in a way that our forefathers would have found unimaginable and it is humbling to see that so many men, women, boys and girls all want to be part of a great club.

The only drawback with this side, as with the Fifth XI, which is in its second season, is where to play. Currently both sides use Pontcanna and ironically this season, they appear to have fixtures on the same day and on adjoining pitches: a real home from home. However, as I've mentioned in previous articles, this is not a sustainable solution and the club are mindful that it will be necessary to bring these teams home, sooner rather than later. The Management Board have appointed an individual within the club whose role is to prepare a feasibility study on how this can be undertaken. It is not an overnight job, but given what has been achieved in the last decade, I am certain that with a bit of help from the club's friends, a solution in the village will be found.

It is also the second year of the club's relationship with the University of South Wales CC and it is a brilliant match. Unfortunately whilst they have lost a few of their fixtures to the weather, as they did last year, their players are now fully integrated into the club and can be seen turning out in the various sides on a Saturday afternoon. They have also entered, as good students do, into the social life of the club: some of their costumes at the recent Italian night, had to be seen to be believed. They, like the Women's XI, have added to the overall dynamic of the club and it is to be hoped that we'll be seeing the USW CC students at

RCC for many years to come.

For the eagle eyed visitors to the club and the pathways around the ground, you may have seen that all the sides, from Under 13s upwards, are now playing in coloured kit. The original idea was to have everybody in their new shirts from the first league game of the season. Unfortunately like all good plans, they go slightly awry, and due to the demand from cricket clubs around the country, the delivery was delayed by a month. This has now been rectified and I'm pleased to say that all the players now look resplendent in their new kit. Thanks must go to the Community Council who contributed towards their purchase, Michael Graham Young, the primary shirt sponsor (who also advertise in the Fixture Card) and CGI, whose logo can be seen on the arm.

Can I also take this opportunity to thank all the other sponsors who contribute enormously to the finances of the club. These include Pugh's Garden Centre, who have taken two boundary boards and advertised in the club's Fixture Card. They are always a joy to work with and I'm personally delighted that they have again supported the club. The solicitors Rees Wood Terry who have been associated with RCC for over fifty years, ION Strength & Conditioning, Radyr Garage Limited, Jon Griffiths Personal Wealth Solutions, Q Design and Cambrian Alliance Group. Should there be anybody who wishes to advertise in or around the ground please make contact with myself or my fellow members.

The club is also about to launch its new website. Unfortunately the previous one was hacked to such an extent that it was completely destroyed and almost fifteen years of content, lost. As those of you who have built one from scratch will know, to either replace or merely start anew, it is not a simple exercise. Therefore for those of you who did use the previous one, or those who wish to use the new one, please bear with us, as there will undoubtedly be a few teething problems, before it's perfect. The address is still www.radyrccricket.co.uk and please do not hesitate to give me your feedback.

Whilst providing the best facilities we possibly can, it ultimately comes down to the players on the field. So far this season the signs have been encouraging and the members are

clearly enjoying their cricket and setting a few new records on the way: long may that continue. Finally if you are not a member of the club but would like to watch some cricket on a Saturday afternoon please come through the gate, bring a picnic if you wish and join us: the bar will be open from 4.00pm onwards and I think once in, you'll be wondering how you ever managed to live without a visit to RCC.

Her son is a nutritional expert and could answer many interesting questions from the audience; while her daughter plays rugby for Wales. In addition we have collected a further 84 bags of litter in April, including those collected by 15 of us at the Cardiff Rivers Group pick on 23 April.


Our next group pick is on Tuesday 7 June, meeting at 10 am at Windsor Gardens and finishing at the Hub for refreshments at 11.15.

Allan Cook shares memories of working with the BBC



John Emyr: *Thank you for agreeing to my request to interview you. When did you start working with the BBC?*

February 1, 1971. I started as assistant floor manager. The BBC, especially in London, liked to appoint people who had experience of working in theatre. For the first six months, I worked exclusively on the programmes *Wales Today* and *Heddiw*, working with Robin Jones and Alun Evans.

What was the nature of that work?

Assistant floor managers, as a rule, ran the news studio. They also worked on different programmes. For me, it was a new experience to work on children's programmes with Dewi 'Pws' Morris and Huw Ceredig. It was I who gave the series its title, *'Nôl Mewn Pum Munud*. Working with Dewi 'Pws' is an incredible experience. Subsequently I had other interesting experiences: for instance, the second and third series of *Fo a Fe*, with the crew of that series. I worked for a while with *Ryan a Ronnie*. At the time, I thought my future would be with light entertainment, due to the fact that most of BBC Wales in those days was devoted to light entertainment. Meredydd Evans was head of the department – an extremely gifted person. The department was replete with new developments.

You were there at a vibrant time.

Yes, it was a time of great excitement and vitality. And, of course, television was evolving in that era. When I started working with the BBC in Cardiff, the programmes being

produced were all in black and white, and only a tiny minority of them were recorded. Recording was a new thing. The title of one of the English shows was *Late Call*, and I remember having to spend eight hours editing one of the tapes – which contained recorded material – to secure a short three minute item at the end. That shows the complex nature of recording work in that period.

You've had the experience of working with very talented people. Which ones stand out in your memory?

People like Ronnie and Ryan, of course; the humourist Gari Williams; Bryn Williams and Myfanwy Talog. It's strange to think how many young talents we have lost in Welsh-speaking Wales. They had so much more to offer.

Was there much fun and laughter to be had in their company?

Yes, that was often the case. It was also a time of significant challenges. We all had to work within the technical limitations and union constraints.

What memories do you have of the formative period of S4C?

In the early days of S4C, we saw little difference because, at that time, the BBC was responsible for seven hours a week of programmes in Welsh, and HTV was responsible for three hours a week. Therefore, for each week, the total number of Welsh programmes being broadcast was ten. And in those early days, S4C was allowed to use Channel 4 programmes to fill any gaps. Things were developing all the time. For example, in the early days of S4C, the channel was not allowed to use commercials in the middle of *Pobol y Cwm* (People of the Valley). And the programme schedule was constantly evolving.

What role did you have in searching for programmes from other countries?

After finishing in the role of assistant floor manager, I worked as director and then as producer in the children's programmes department. The head of children's programmes was the gifted and versatile Dyfed Glyn Jones. I worked on numerous children's programmes: *Bilidowcar*; *Pili Pala* for the younger children, and so forth. Also I bought in numerous programmes, and I liked in particular programmes from eastern Europe.

Many of the best programmes were made in Slovakia. My practice was to visit Prague every two years because they had a festival in February every other year. I would buy cartoons they had created. And at the time, Cardiff was ahead of London in the technical field of dubbing, because we had a dubbing studio. Also, due to the fact that we had experienced actors, we could dub at pace. Also, experienced writers like Dyfed Glyn could turn out the scripts at speed. I remember overseeing the task of dubbing a hundred minute drama for Christmas; the work was completed in about a week, because we had people like Gareth Lewis and Dilwyn Owen coming in to complete the work in no time at all. In that early period, Dyfed Glyn created *Yr Awr Fawr*.

Those children's programmes were very influential.

Yes, they were important because Welsh-medium education was developing at the time, and such programmes were needed to entertain the children after school. I was in the children's department for about fifteen years, and while I was there I launched four series of plays for children. Two of them were written by the Corwen-based author, John Selwyn Lloyd. Two other series were written by Dyfed Glyn. We filmed one section in the Beacons and another section in Hong Kong, and I enjoyed preparing those series.

A part of the work came to the attention of John Hefin, and he asked me whether I would be willing to do some of the episodes in *Pobol y Cwm*. So I started to be involved in *Pobol y Cwm* when it was a weekly, Sunday night programme. In those days, *Pobol y Cwm* was broadcast 26 or 27 times per annum. The producer and editor was Gwenlyn Parry, and I started doing two of the programmes for Gwenlyn. For some reason I was given responsibility for the episode that went out on March the First. The entire crew was there: Harriet and Rachel and Gaynor and Dilwyn. It was quite an episode. Following on from that, for a long time I was responsible for about a third of *Pobol y Cwm*. The work involved producing and directing.

Many thanks for sharing some of your valuable memories.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Summer Fruit Torte



Make the most of the seasonal berries around at the moment with this simple, easy to remember recipe using the same quantities of each ingredient. These are delicious eaten hot or cold and perfect for a picnic!

Ingredients

- 150g butter
- 150g ground almonds
- 150g plain flour
- 150g caster sugar
- 1 egg
- 150g each of raspberries and blueberries

Method

Preheat the oven to 180C/Gas 4. Place all the ingredients except the fruit in a food processor and mix until it forms a ball.

Divide the mixture in half. Press one half into a lined 18cm square tin to cover the base. Sprinkle over the fruit.

On a lightly floured surface roughly press out the remaining mixture to the size of the tin and place over the fruit and press down lightly.

Put in the oven for 40-45 minutes or until golden brown and firm to the touch. Allow to cool completely before cutting into 16 squares and dust with icing sugar before serving.

James Douglas Hogg OBE
9th August 1941 – 1st May 2022



Douglas had a zest for life and his contribution to Radyr village life was immense. As Chief Architect for CADW he was responsible for the conservation of many of our most treasured buildings in Wales but it was his humanity, his interest in everything and his calm reassuring presence that most of us will remember.

Having been born and educated in Troon, he qualified in Glasgow then in 1978 moved to Cardiff as an architect in the Conservation and Land Division of the Welsh Office. Over the following 25 years, Douglas made significant contribution to the management and care of ancient buildings and monuments in Wales. As Chief Architect for CADW he led a team of well over 100 experts and he was renowned for the support he provided to members of staff. He was awarded an OBE for Services to Historic Architecture in Wales.

Away from work, he and his wife Val enthusiastically joined in all aspects of village life. As Chair of the Radyr Parish Music Group, Douglas encouraged the company as it produced many musical shows in the village. He sang with the Llandaff Cathedral Choral Society and more recently with the Cathedral Consort. He danced with the Scottish Country Dance group in Whitchurch.

Following his retirement in 2003, Douglas continued his involvement with architectural conservation as a member of the Cathedral Fabric Committee at Llandaff and as Chair of the Fabric Advisory Committee at Wells Cathedral.

With typical stoicism, Douglas coped with the loss of Val, his initial cancer diagnosis in 2009 and then the loss of his daughter Vicki. Even during his most recent illness he made trips to Malaga, Lisbon and Edinburgh, determined to live life to the full.


