Nature Notes

The exceptionally hot weather seems to have been enjoyed by our butterfly population. Jeff Saunders tells us that he spotted a Duke of Burgundy Fritillary in his garden in Castle View in mid July.

Despite its name it is not a true fritillary. Usually seen in much of northern Europe and southern counties of England its presence in grassland depends of the availability of the food plants for its larvae, primroses and cowslips. It is normally seen from May to July and can have two broods.



Football Festival

others not so good, though the cricket itself has been amazingly exciting: if I had a weak heart, RCC on a Saturday afternoon would be a place I would avoid. In the last few weeks alone we've had victories by two runs, three runs, one wicket and a few weeks ago the ultimate drama of a tie: 222-7 plays 222 all out. The chaotic scenes at the end of that game had to be seen to be believed, as nobody, not even the umpires, seemed to know what had happened. However I'm glad to say that after the passions had subsided, everybody had a convivial beer, on what had been a very hot afternoon.

The one side that currently sits on top of its respective division is the Fourth XI. Last season the side won promotion on the last weekend of the season but this year they have taken to the higher standard of cricket, "as if to the manor born". In fact they have not dropped a single point on the field this year, giving them 160 out of 160. They are the only side (there are 138 teams in 14 divisions) in the League with this record. The side is a combination of young and not so young and it is great to see the experienced individuals passing on their knowledge to the more junior members: and don't be fooled into thinking that the cricket isn't highly competitive, as it can get quite feisty at times. Hopefully when I next write I will be able to confirm their ultimate success.

The Women's section goes from strength to strength and I'm delighted to say that RCC were recently crowned South West Regional Champions and go forward later this month to represent the region and will play their next round in Basingstoke: a brilliant effort by

all the players. In league terms the season hasn't really got going, with only two games played so far, with the weather being so unkind: even the weekends where Saturday was fine seemed to deliver a downpour on the Sunday. Allied to this there have been a number of games cancelled as the opposition have defaulted leaving the season with a stop - start feel. That being said the fixtures over the next few weeks will come thick and fast and I have no doubt that the cricket will be tough but enjoyable.

One other piece of news tied in with the Women's section is the brilliant news that Anna Harris, an RCC member, has become the youngest person ever to umpire international cricket. For those of you who follow the Women's game you will invariably see Anna, who most recently stood in the games against India and lately South Africa. A medical student at Cardiff University she has joined RCC as a playing member and has been an integral part of the Women's XI, whilst at the same time umpiring around the country. I suspect we'll see an awful lot more of Anna over the next few years and the club is absolutely delighted, as she is one of our own.

The third photograph shows the final evening of the 2022 All Stars programme which recently concluded. Here you can see 43 youngsters between the ages of 5-8 enjoying cricket for the first time. Friday nights at the club will now, up to a point, calm down as the All Stars and the Dynamos take a rest as the holiday period starts. The enthusiasm and sheer joie de vivre of over a hundred cricketers all doing things at a million miles an hour will live long in the memory and really the club can't wait until next year arrives. Thanks must go to the dedicated individuals who freely

give of their time, to pass on to the youngsters their knowledge and love of a game that will hopefully continue to be part of their lives, long into the future. RCC was one of very few clubs in Wales who reached the magic century of participants and it is something that will stand us in great stead in the future and something we are incredibly proud to have achieved.

Whilst RCC will always be judged by the results on the field, the success of a club is also viewed through the lens of the social activity that occurs on a Saturday evening. This year a number of individuals have bitten the bullet and produced a programme of events which I can't remember being bettered throughout my long association with the club. Already we've had the French night, the Italian evening and then activities accompanied by Thai food and fish and chips: the latter two saw brilliant mobile vans setting themselves up in the club car park. The fish and chip van was such a hit, with not just members but walkers as well, that they ran out of fish very quickly: yours truly was left with a fish cake. The members dressed up in some weird and wonderful costumes and the flowery shirts of the Benidorm evening left very little to the imagination. I wait in awe for the next event as I find it difficult to believe that the previous ones can be beaten.

The 2022 season is in full flow and the club would be delighted to see visitors join us on a Saturday or a Sunday. Remember the bar is open from mid afternoon whenever there is a game and there can be no better way to enjoy a sunny afternoon than watching cricket with a picnic and a drink.

This donation from Bellway had a meaningful impact on both the club and the people involved, helping to cover the cost of the various activities throughout the day.



Art in the Woods



CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Smoked Trout, Fennel & Apple Salad

Serve as a light starter or lunch with some wholemeal bread Serves 4, Prep 15 minutes



Ingredients

250g smoked rainbow trout fillets juice and finely grated zest of 1 lemon

- 1 large bulb fennel
- 1 Granny Smith apple
- 150g radish, thinly sliced
- 1 large bunch watercress or rocket, thick stems removed

For the dressing

3 tablespoons Sour Cream 2 tablespoons horseradish sauce 2 tablespoons rapeseed oil Halen Môn Pure sea salt and pepper

Method

- 1. Halve the fennel bulb, remove the core then slice thinly and mix with half the lemon juice and all the zest, and toss to coat.
- 2. Quarter, core and thinly slice the apple and add to the fennel. Toss everything together then set aside. Slice the radishes and add to the fennel along with the watercress, and toss to combine.
- 3. For the dressing, whisk together the remaining lemon juice with the sour cream, horseradish and oil and season with salt and pepper.
- 4. Spread a little dressing onto 4 serving plates and pile the salad on top.

Flake the trout over the salad and drizzle with the remaining dressing.

Cardiff Replacement Local Development Plan.

An update

In the April edition of the Radyr Chain, the Radyr & Morganstown Local Development Group (RMLDG) highlighted the 'candidate sites' within our community being proposed for development in the Replacement Local Development Plan. We also reported that Cardiff Council may be working on incorrect population figures. With the publication in June of the 2021 Census figures, this suspicion has proved to be correct. Specifically, the Census shows that, in 2021, there were 147,300 households in Cardiff against a prediction of 165,523.

Why is this important? Cardiff's Replacement Local Development Plan (RLDP), covering 2021-2036, uses the higher figure as a starting point for the plan and continues to predict a higher rate of growth than has been the case. The existing LDP assumed a 42% rise in Cardiff's population for the period 2008-2033 and a 33% rise for the Plan period 2006-26. In fact, the population increase over the last decade (2011 to 2021) was only 5%. Clearly, Cardiff is not growing as fast as the planners predicted.

In short, these figures show that no further land needs to be allocated in a revised plan to meet Cardiff's housing needs up to 2033. House building has progressed at a much slower rate than forecast by the planners and so there is plenty of land already allocated to meet future demand for housing in Cardiff.

The RMLDG has contacted the press and also asked Cardiff Council to comment, but our fear is that they will plough on regardless and, potentially, agree that further land in NW Cardiff can be designated for development.

What might be the impact of that? Apart from the despair many people report feeling when they look at the green fields around Radyr being occupied by rows of apparently identical houses built too close to one another and – in many cases – hard on the Llantrisant Road, there



are already issues with traffic congestion, sewage overflows, and a lack of available infrastructure.

Plasdwr paint an image of a beautiful community-based development, but that is not what it looks like at the moment. And the RLDP will potentially expand the permitted development area before even half the present allocated land has been used. Why? Who is driving this rush for more development if it is not needed?

A scientist on the RMLDG team has produced a report on the likely pollution impact of more traffic. Don't be lulled by the suggestion that the move to electric cars will solve that. They produce nonexhaust emissions (from tyre wear etc) which are comparable to those of conventional vehicles. Valuable green and recreational land is being lost, bringing a loss of biodiversity and even a potential for problems with water management in some areas. If Plasdwr had been designed around the new Metro as opposed to being car-based, some of that would not be the case.

The RMLDG put out a flyer across a lot of NW Cardiff alerting people to these threats. A copy is available on their website -

https://radyr.org.uk/clubs/rmldgro up/. The response has been good and lobbying of key people has begun. Recently, we met with Simon Gilbert, head of Planning for Cardiff Council. The message given at that meeting was that we should not be too concerned, 'the community is being listened to'. However, that is not what people feel.

Our new Councillors – Helen Lloyd Jones and Calum Davies – say they are as concerned as everyone else. They need our support and the RMLDG will continue to use every avenue to make sure common sense prevails. If you can help in any way, then look at the above website and get in touch. We are particularly looking for help from people with PR/marketing skills. We all need to work together to protect the green heritage of North West Cardiff for future generations.



Recollections of a Tragedy



The death of Aryan came very early in the term of our two new County Councillors. Helen Lloyd Jones spent a great deal of time with the family and here are her recollections of the tragic event.

The heavens had opened. No one in the right mind would be out in such a downpour. But you were. You stood there in the rain, heads bowed, hands in the Indian Namaste greeting and waited for Aryan's hearse to go past.

It meant such a lot to his family to see you all paying your respects and doing what you could to surround them with love and support.

There were so many little things that I will always remember. The speed with which Cardiff Council found us an Indian flag. It was on my doorstep



the first evening. Mike Clarke organising the Welsh and the Indian flag to fly at half-mast in Windsor Gardens. The books of condolences in Christchurch and St John's.

The school turning themselves inside out to ensure they respected Aryan's family's culture and religion while doing everything in their power possible to help his friends and classmates cope with their loss. The tree his classmates created for him.

The realisation by so many of us, that Aryan's friends were going into Windsor Gardens just to sit and handle their grief and so, people made a point of picking up the litter to make it as nice as possible for the youngsters.

Will the young people ever realise that we tried and we are trying to surround them with our love? We know they are dealing with a grief no



young person ever expects to experience. We know they will never forget and they will carry Aryan with them throughout their lives. We know that life is not always easy and our hearts do get broken. Life is not always fair, but it is still a gift and we want them to know they all matter to us.

Thank you all so much for the acts of kindness. It is truly an honour to represent you all.
