Licensing of New Clergy

With all the changes within the Church in Wales over the past few years it is sometimes difficult to keep up. On the 1st of January 2022, the Bishop of Llandaff, Bishop June, signed a deed abolishing parishes throughout the diocese and creating "Ministry Areas."

Radyr and Morganstown is now in the Garth Ministry Area, which takes in the old parishes of Radyr, St Fagans with Michaelston-super-Ely, Pentyrch with Capel Llanilltern and Tongwynlais.

Radyr had already been downgraded from a Rector to a Vicar some years earlier, with the arrival of the Revd Vicki Burrows but unfortunately we lost Vicki earlier this year. So that means that virtually all the clergy in the Garth Ministry Area are new to the area.

The majority of the clergy for the new Garth Ministry Area were licensed at a special service held at Christ Church Radyr, on the evening of Sunday 24th July and it was hard to miss Bishop June's excitement and joy at licensing virtually the whole of the Garth Ministry team at on time.

As the shadows lengthened in mid September the cricket season at Radyr came to an end. The final knockings were a First XI league game on the main ground and a hugely raucous celebration of all things good in the Womens section on the second ground. At the end of the afternoon all the players, their families and the club's supporters collided at the front of the pavilion and the wonderful, joyful spirit continued well into the night.

The season overall was hugely enjoyable with some fabulous cricket played by all the Radyr teams, though one or two disappointing results in the end, made it generally an all round mid table year. The one exception was the Fourth XI, who were top of their respective division when I last wrote and I'm delighted to say that their form continued and with a week to spare they were crowned champions. The photograph taken before the final game of the season, which they won handsomely, shows the differing ages of the players, with the youngest at twelve and the oldest....well I better not say. The side led brilliantly by Dafydd Marsh, achieved promotion last year and they have flourished at



the higher level, showing the strength in depth the club has at present. The League Dinner will be a great event and RCC will attend in some numbers to celebrate the award of this latest piece of silverware for the club. A photograph will definitely follow in December.

The end of season Club Awards
Ceremony was a brilliant night. How
we managed to get almost a hundred
people into the pavilion, kept the bar
functioning and the event proceeding
in an orderly manner was a minor
miracle. All the teams announced their
players of the year with the biggest
cheer for twelve year old Abe Gould
who was the Fifth XI winner. The
largest and most prestigious trophy
awarded on the night and taking three
of us to hold it, as can be seen in the



photograph with yours truly, the Club Captain Jonathan Wilson and James Williamson, the recipient, was for the Michael Sullivan First XI Player of the Year: James scored a remarkable 912 league runs this season, more than any other Radyr player has ever done: in total he made five hundreds, including an undefeated 104 in the club's seven wicket win against MCC, my personal highlight of 2022.

The end of the season was also a poignant moment for a few individuals who had decided to call time on their particular roles within the club. The most emotional of departures was Jonathan Wilson, who after six years at the helm, decided to stand down as the Club Captain. Jon, Radyr born and bred, has left the First XI in far better shape than when he took over in 2017 and I'm delighted he will remain an influential member of the Management Board. Ironically on his final appearance as "the skipper" he batted as well as he had done for years: a huge six over the sight screen at the railway end will live long in the memory. Another departure was his father John who has stood down as the club's President after eighteen years in the hot seat. A fixture in the village for many years, John who has done a fantastic job, will still I'm sure, be one of our chief supporters into the future. To both the Wilsons, I and the club say a heartfelt thanks.

A third signing off was the club's Secretary, Nick White, who after ten years has decided to say bon voyage. This position is one of the more difficult roles to fill as he is the administrative eyes and ears of the club and in today's multi media age requires the most wide ranging of skills. He has been a wonderful presence throughout and it shows his commitment to the club, that this year, in addition to his secretarial duties, he took on the captaincy of the Sixth XI.

Hopefully we will see his unique persona at the club next season and for many years to come.

With the cricket now finished the grounds team take over. The covers and sight screens will be stored, the internal elements of the net facility removed and cricket memorabilia placed in the loft, all ready to reappear next April. The top soil and seed are already in place waiting for the two squares to be dressed, to ensure that when the 2023 season commences the surface will be as good as any in South Wales. The wicket ends have been repaired and it is now left to the club's members plus the contractors to complete the finishing touches, so that the ground can effectively be put to bed. However the works don't stop and there is already a list of jobs as long as your arm that need completing throughout the winter: every Wednesday morning in the close season is a hive of activity, as methodically the requirements of the grounds team are ticked off one by one. Radyr Cricket Club never stops.

So what happens next. Well the club will have its AGM when the new captains and officers are elected, which is quickly followed by the League Dinner mentioned previously and then in November the League AGM, which finally puts the seal on the season. As always RCC has been a brilliant place to be throughout this remarkable summer and I hope you've enjoyed reading about it in these articles. To the club's members, sponsors and the wonderful people of Radyr and Morganstown thank you for your kindness and wonderful support. I can't wait to do it again in 2023.

Update on the Replacement Local Development Plan (RLDP)

The Radyr & Morganstown Local Development Group (RMLDG) can report that the next stage of the RLDP has been delayed. This stage is the publication of, and consultation period for, the Council's 'Preferred Strategy' which will now take place in the New Year rather than in October as originally intended. We believe this decision has been influenced, at least partially, by a report submitted by the Group in August which analysed the latest Census figures, showing that the population of Cardiff is not growing at the previously expected rate. We have received confirmation that this latest data, together with other information due to be published soon by the Office of National Statistics, will be taken into account when preparing the Preferred Strategy for the RLDP.

We have also been offered a meeting with Cardiff Council Planning department to discuss our concerns, which we will be following up in October. Over the coming weeks we hope to be able to persuade the planners that there should be no additional growth allowed for, over and above that already included in the current LDP. We would also like to see a commitment to no development of sizeable greenfield sites, in accordance with the Council's published policies which include a Fairer, Stronger, Greener Cardiff. Sadly there is already evidence that promises made in the current LDP are not always adhered to as time passes, so we must endeavour to make certain the Council are held to account in the future.

Our local Councillors have continued to be very supportive to the Group and have managed to obtain a commitment from the Leader of Cardiff Council to meet with us in the near future. We will use this opportunity to brief him on the issues which we are discussing with his Planning Officers as above. We will also reassure him that we understand the need for more

affordable housing in the city but do not believe the solution lies in further destruction of open countryside which provides recreational and health improvement opportunities for local residents.

We are currently seeking a grant from the R&M Community Council which will enable us to engage professional assistance with a major PR campaign over the next few months. We also continue to accumulate evidence for opposing the progression of Candidate Sites in our area at the more detailed stages of the RLDP, should that become necessary. This includes environmental aspects such as loss of woodland and open space, drainage, transport problems, air pollution, lack of local services etc. Contact us if you think you can help with any of this (see website, below).

Now is the time to act to raise awareness of the issues at stake with our representatives at higher levels of governance. If you find yourself in agreement with our aims please consider writing to your local Senedd Members and MP. The Welsh Government does not become directly involved in the RLDP process until the later stages but if we can keep drip feeding our concerns along the way then we stand some chance of influencing the eventual outcome. A public meeting has been organised by the RMA for 21st November to fully brief you all on our progress -Old Church Rooms 7.30pm.

Please **take action now** to protect the last remaining green space between Radyr and Rhydlafar before it is too late.

The Group has become a member of the Cardiff Waste

Strategy Group and is contributing to the City's Litter and Waste Strategy. The recent first meeting reported that the Pilot Recycling Collection which some of us are benefiting from (Red and Blue bags!) has improved the percentage of recycling from 65% to 94%. The problem with the green bags is that there is a lot of cross contamination from unwashed and unsuitable material - also the 28 million green bags given out each year are single use plastics - contributing to the problem which we are all trying to solve.

Cllr Calum Davies – September report

The Death of HM The Queen

I was deeply saddened by to hear that Her Majesty The Queen has passed away. She was a great leader of the British nation and will down in history as our greatest monarch. Her service and devotion to the people will be an enduring inspiration to us all. I have signed the Book of Condolence in Cardiff City Hall and the one organised by the Community Council. I also spoke in City Hall as the Council was recalled to pay tribute to the late Queen, which can be viewed here. God save the King.

Planning application 21/02465/MJR In June, I objected to a planning application for the development of 50 dwellings made on the land north of Clos Parc Radur. This has returned following a response from developers. I felt obliged to oppose the application again as it did not sufficiently answer the queries I had previously raised regarding the pressure that could put on Radyr Farm Road that has little capacity as it does and the density of housing. However, my objection did secure a staggered rail/barrier on the access onto the bridleway to improve safety for its users, should the development go ahead.

Additionally, I noted how the developers were only offering around £31,000 in Section 106 money when the Council had requested over £210,000. Finally, I objected on the basis that the sewerage smell issues in the area have not been addressed and, therefore, no development should take place before that is resolved.

I met with residents and representatives of Redrow and Walters to discuss issues affecting the former as a result of the house-building nearby. I was glad to see the developers meet local people like this and accept some shortcomings, although it would have been preferred if this meeting happened earlier.

One Million Mentors

One Million Mentors is a community-based mentoring programme based in Cardiff looking for volunteers to support young people aged between 14-25 years of age. All they ask is for you to complete a brief registration and online training as well as a workshop within 3 months of sign up. You will then be paired with a mentee who you will support for just 1 hour

per month for between 9-12 months. If this is something you are interested in you can sign up here www.1mm.org.uk.

For further information on this fantastic opportunity please contact Richard Jones, Regional Manager - richard.jones@1mm.org.uk. I met with Richard as part in my role as Shadow Cabinet Member for Supporting Young People to discuss the scheme and had a very insightful meeting about how mentors and mentees are matched up. The scheme in Cardiff is short on the former so if any residents feel that they have something to offer, do get in touch with Richard or visit the website.

Planning Applications 19/01023/MNR

I met with local residents on Springfield Gardens and Teamans Row in Morganstown to hear their concerns regarding plans to build seven dwellings at the rear of 30 Springfield Gardens. I believe there are legitimate concerns regarding the lack of parking in the vicinity as it is and that adding further properties in this area would make this worse. I also believe there would be serious flood risks and drainage issues should the development go ahead too. I am minded to object to this application – already rejected twice on similar grounds as outlined above.

Cwrt Brynteg

After being contacted by a resident at the complex, I wrote on behalf of residents to First Port – the management agency for Cwrt Brynteg. Concerns were raised regarding the absence of a fulltime manager there and the consequences of this for residents – e.g. looking after injured residents, etc. I am pleased to have received a reply that ameliorated some concerns and I remain in contact with residents in case further involvement

on my part is necessary.

Sewerage smell in Clos Parc Radur I asked Barratt's for an update on the progress being made in addressing this issue. They replied:

"We have been topping up the chemical monthly but we have now reached the time that we intend to progress a different strategy with the intention of stopping the odour permanently. At the end of August, we reached the point at which all plots contributing to our pump station were legally exchanged such that, in effect we have full design flow to the pump station. This such that we can alter the pumping in order to flow without septicity and thus without the odour. We met with DCWW last week with a view to providing them the proposed operating details by the end of this week. We would then target the installation and operation of the new operating gear by the end of September. In the meantime, the chemical dosing will continue."

I am pleased that we are close to a resolution and will monitor the situation to ensure there is no unnecessary delay so residents here can have some peace-of-mind.

I want to send my congratulations to all those at Radyr Comprehensive School who received their A-level, GCSE, and BTEC results in August. Students have had a very difficult two years during the pandemic – indeed, pupils in Wales lost more school days to Covid than any other British nation – and deserve to be commended. CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Spicy chicken with roast vegetables

A speedy one pot meal and you can replace the vegetables with any others in season.

Ingredients

- 4 chicken legs
- 4 tbsp past harrisa paste
- 350g small new potatoes
- 300g vine tomatoes
- 2 red onions
- 1 yellow pepper
- 1 bulb garlic
- 1 lemon
- 2 tbsp olive oil

Method

Preheat the oven to 190C/Gas 5. Make deep slashes in the chicken skin with a sharp knife and rub the harissa paste all over and into the holes. Release the cloves from the garlic bulb and put (skin on) in a roasting tin with the chicken.

Cut any large potatoes in half and add to the chicken. Peel and cut the onions in half then into 4 wedges and add to the chicken with the roughly chopped pepper. Squeeze the juice from the lemon all over the chicken and vegetables and leave the skin in the tin. Season with salt and pepper.

Cook the chicken and vegetables for 20 minutes then add the vine tomatoes in small bunches around the other ingredients then return to the oven to cook for a further 20 minutes until the chicken and vegetables are all cooked thoroughly.

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
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Transport for Wales

Two of the brand-new Transport for Wales (TfW) trains set to modernise the Wales and Borders network are being showcased at the world's largest rail industry trade fair. The FLIRT (Fast, Light, Intercity and Regional Train) tri-mode and CITYLINK trains, both built by leading manufacturer Stadler, will be unveiled this week at the biennial Innotrans trade fair in Berlin.

More than 150,000 rail industry professionals are expected to attend Innotrans across four days this week (September 20-23) at the Messe Berlin exhibition grounds.

A spokesperson for TfW said "These are modern trains, with high quality features that will offer our customers more accessible, reliable and greener transport." In addition to the strong environmental credentials of both trains, they will also significantly improve the customer experience with level-boarding, air conditioning, power sockets, wi-fi, up-to-date passenger information screens, bike spaces and spaces for those with reduced mobility. Noise and



vibrations will be kept to a minimum, with the new trains quieter than TfW's current fleet. TfW has ordered 24 of the FLIRT tri-modes (electric, battery or diesel) and 36 CITYLINK tram-trains, with a further 11 bi-mode FLIRTs (electric and diesel).

The state-of-the-art tri-mode trains will be powered by electricity to the north of Cardiff and diesel to the south, providing seamless cross-city connectivity. The technology also reduces the need for costly electrification extensions and infrastructure upgrades.

Adapted to suit the tram and rail network serving the South Wales Metro, the CITYLINK tram trains can travel on both rail tracks and tram lines and have a driver's cab at each end.



TfW is investing more than £800m in new trains for the Wales and Borders network, the first of which are being introduced in Autumn 2022. The FLIRT tri-mode and CITYLINK trains are expected to enter service in 2024.

Forest Farm Allotments has achieved the prestigious Green Flag Community Award in recognition of its dedicated volunteer involvement, high environmental standards and commitment to delivering great quality green space.

Located adjacent to Forest Farm Country Park, the site is owned by Cardiff City Council but locally managed and used for growing fruits, vegetables and flowers by members of the allotment. As well as the individual allotment plots, there are extensive hedgerows and mature trees, wildflower banks, insect hotels and a wildlife pond on the site.

The Chair of Forest Farm Allotments Society, Lin Dimond said: "We are very proud to have won a Green Flag Community Award which recognises the hard work of the allotment community. Not only are allotments great places for people to grow fruit, vegetables & flowers, they also provide enormous mental and physical health benefits in a beautiful tranquil green space. Allotments also enhance local biodiversity by offering an environment

with a wide range of habitats for a variety of wildlife species".





159 community managed green spaces across the country have met the high standards needed to receive the Green Flag Community Award. This means that Wales still holds a third of the UK's community Green Flag sites.

The Green Flag Award Programme is delivered in Wales by environmental charity Keep Wales Tidy, with support from Welsh Government. Independent green space experts volunteered their time in early autumn to judge applicant sites against eight strict criteria, including biodiversity, cleanliness, environmental management, and community involvement.

Welsh Government Minister for Climate Change, Julie James said:

"Our local green spaces have a vital role to play in connecting us to nature. These awards go to prove that Wales' parks and similar areas are doing a wonderful job in providing quality places to relax and enjoy.

"The standard required to achieve Green Flag status is very high so I



want to congratulate all of the sites recognised for providing excellent, year-round facilities to local people and visitors alike.

"It's fantastic to see we still hold more than a third of the UK's Green Flag community sites in Wales – especially as the last two years have taught us all of the importance of nature and green spaces on our mental and physical wellbeing."

"With more visitors than ever enjoying our green spaces, I'd like to congratulate the hard work of staff and volunteers who have maintained excellent standards at these sites."
