The end of the Rue?

Members of the Radyr and Morganstown St Philbert de Grand Lieu Twinning Association met in December to discuss the future of the Association.

We normally visit the other country in alternate years and the French were due to come to R&M for the Spring Bank Holiday in 2020. Unfortunately the pandemic prevented this.

Patterns had been changing for a number of years, as members got older they were less inclined to short concentrated visits and more inclined to stay with their opposite numbers for a week or so.

Technically in the Vendee because it is east of the Loire, the Grand Lieu refers to an important freshwater lake and nature reserve on the outskirts of the town. It is a typical French market town with a large market square which still holds weekly markets, and has a Romanesque Abbey named after St Philbert.

St Philbert was a Celtic saint, first buried at the isle of Normountier on the coast about twenty miles from St Philbert. The arrival of the Normans meant that the monks moved his body to St Philbert. Unfortunately the Normans soon caught up and his body was moved for a third time.

The annual visits were usually a concentrated weekend of receptions, meals and visits. Over the years we have visited such delightful places as the Mont St Michel, Nantes and Angers on our visits to France while we have taken the French to visit the Newport Transporter bridge, Big Pit and the Glamorgan coast, which they always loved.

"They were great times and we had some good fun. With R&M being so concentrated one event the French always insisted upon were the "progressive suppers", said Maggie Roberts joint Chair of the Twinning. "We would start in one place and then we moved from house to house with each course increasing in number as we went along."

Our Twinning Association is one of the oldest still in existence. At the December meeting it was decided that we would put the Association on hold for a period - the connection and the signage will still exist. No formal exchanges would take place unless new members came along to revitalise the Association.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Welsh beef winter salad

Ingredients

- 400g Welsh rump steak 100g quinoa, cooked 160g tenderstem broccoli 2 oranges 100g spinach 40g hazelnuts 1 tbsp honey
- 2 tbsp olive oil

Method

Juice one orange into a bowl and mix in with the honey, olive oil and salt and pepper. Use half this mixture to marinate the steak and save the other half for the quinoa.

Lightly steam the broccoli until just cooked and mix in a bowl with the quinoa, the remaining marinade and spinach leaves. Toast the hazelnuts in a pan for a few minutes before chopping them.

Season the steak on both sides with salt and pepper and cook in a pre-heated and oiled frying pan to your preference. Remove from the pan and leave to rest for a few minutes before cutting into thin strips.

Peel and slice the other orange and add to the salad along with the steak and hazelnuts. Serve warm.

Radyr Drama Society Signal Triumphant Return in Madcap Comedy



Radyr Drama Society (RDS) completed the celebration of their fortieth anniversary year in November with a rumbustious performance of *The 39 Steps* which was rapturously received by full houses over three nights at Morganstown Village Hall. After gamely staging a challenging twohander, Happy Jack, in between pandemic lockdowns, and a one act comedy, Last Tango in Little Grimley, plus some dramatic monologues, shortly after the lifting of Covid restrictions, RDS began their return to operational capacity with a successful one off 'whodunnit' night at Christchurch New School Rooms in September. Their performance of The 39 Steps, however, showed RDS back to their sparkling best. Loosely based on John Buchan's 1930s tale of suspense, espionage and derring-do, brought memorably to the screen by Alfred Hitchcock, Patrick Barlow's adaptation is a comedy masterpiece. It provided a perfect vehicle for a versatile and accomplished cast, who clearly enjoyed themselves portraying a host of comic stock characters, complete with hilarious accents, disguises, and props, in a succession of outlandish set pieces. These included the lead exiting a moving railway carriage, navigating obstacles in misty Scottish moors, and jumping from the Forth bridge before fleeing his pursuers on to the stage of the London Palladium! Visiting director Pete Stickler brought his considerable experience



to bear in skillful staging of the set pieces, ensuring the actors missed no opportunity for a laugh. A minimal set comprising multifunctional elements was brought to life by clever use of sound and lighting effects. Visible costume changes and deliberately dysfunctional props added to the fun-filled mayhem, stimulating further laughter and audience interaction.

Leading the cast of seven, RDS veteran Peter Griffiths gave a masterful performance as raffish hero Richard Hannay (37!). On stage throughout the play, he provided a reliable foil for the other characters and timed each of his comic oneliners to perfection. He was ably supported by Melanie Macleod, who played with confidence and gusto both the spy and femme fatale, Annabella Schmidt, and Hannay's feisty hostage/companion/love interest, Pamela Edwards. The comic talent of experienced actors Tony Allan and Graham Perkins was plain to see, particularly as, in one scene, they swapped characters and costumes mid-scene at breakneck speed, and in their portrayal of the eccentric highland hotel keepers, Mr and Mrs McGarrigle, which brought the house down. The production also benefitted from confident performances by Phil May as chief villain, and Helen Blundell as a discontented crofter's wife. Special mention should be made of the performance of Drew Heusch, who, though a long-time supporter of RDS, was making his acting debut. In addition to brief turns as a

'heavy', a charlady, a police inspector, a professor's wife and a bumbling election agent, his hilarious portrayal of a puritanical Scottish crofter was among the highlights of the production. Given the complexities of staging such an ambitious production, the backstage crew deserve the highest praise. They comprised Tony Watson on Sound, Dave Burgess on lighting, Stage management by Nicky Webber and Maria Round, and continuity and costumes by Gill Evans and Sandra Green respectively.

Replacement Local Development Plan (RLDP) Update

The R&M Local Development Group (RMLDG) held its first public meeting in the OCR on 16th January – all previous meetings have been on Zoom. It was well attended with representatives from R&M, St Fagans, Rhydlafar and elsewhere. The meeting was addressed by Peter Fortune, who set out the current position of the RLDP, and Nick Hawkins, who talked about the plans for the Group.

The meeting had been timed to follow a meeting of Cardiff Council's **Environmental Scrutiny Committee** (on 12th January) at which the 'RLDP Strategy' was due to have been debated and approved. To explain briefly, the RLDP process involves initially defining how many dwellings need to be provided in the plan (which runs from 2026 to 2036), and receiving submitted sites where they might be located. Those two parts have finished although the required number of dwellings has been thrown into confusion by the results from the 2021 census which demonstrated that Cardiff's base figures had been grossly overstated. In itself, that has caused a delay to the RLDP timetable but we expected the 'Strategy' paper - which will set out the framework for the RLDP (e.g. where and for what purposes houses should be built, the policy on the protection of the environment, etc) to be published in time for the meeting. But it has not appeared and the RLDP timetable is yet again delayed.

Knowing the underlying RLDP Strategy is key to the RMLDG deciding what to do next. Peter Fortune reported that, in a meeting with Cardiff's Chief Planner, Simon Gilbert, it had been suggested that the main problem was the lack of Social Housing in Cardiff and the Strategy might call for around 7000 houses to be built with an emphasis on the City Centre. It could even mean few, if any, allocations of land in NW Cardiff. If that is the case then the RMLDG will have fulfilled its main purpose. However, the fear remains that more land adjacent to the Llantrisant Road will remain open for consideration in the final stage of the RLDP, which will define specific sites for development.

Nick Hawkins said that the RMLDG needed to prepare for a significant campaign if the further development of NW Cardiff remains 'on the cards'. The problems that will arise if that happens are already well defined (see the RMLDG website www.radyr.org.uk/clubs/rmldgroup /) and the difficulties that have already arisen in the development of Plasdwr illustrate the dangers of inadequate initial planning. To this end, the RMLDG is seeking to increase the number of people involved in the campaign, both by adding to the Group's address list and setting up a WhatsApp Group. The Group also has the assistance of a professional Public Relations expert.

If you want to know more about the RLDP, particularly if you have specific concerns or expertise to offer, then do contact the RMLDG Secretary

We suspect there will be a number of battles to be won to ensure that Cardiff fulfils its own stated policy of being 'stronger, greener, fairer', and those battles are not just for NW Cardiff. Specific skills in mounting a Social Media campaign are especially welcome.

Talking Rubbish! Radyr & Morganstown Litter Pickers JANUARY

RED & BLUE BAGS

Many more of you are now using the Council's new recycling system which has raised a number of questions. In particular, you ask why are we having to sort out our recycling and then it is all just dumped into the crusher cart. The aim of the new system is to make us recycle better. Cardiff's recycling performance in the last couple of years has been one of the worst in Wales because the green bags were not working; there was a lot of contamination in particular because waste was not being washed. Further, the green bags were costing almost a million pounds a year and were single use plastics. The Council is fined by Welsh Government if the amount of waste which is recycled falls below a certain level.

We have, however taken issue with the Council's Assistant Director of Street Scene about the paper and cardboard which is being left behind on the road by the new kerbside collection lorry. This appears to us to be due to the compartment of the lorry being too full and the opening for the bag to be emptied in being too small for the operators. It is depressing for our 43 pickers to being going out cleaning up Radyr and Morganstown when the Council is actually creating litter.

We have picked almost 1,000 bags of litter since we started in the summer of 2021, which is 3 tons of litter. A fantastic performance but one which is at the same time quite depressing; hot spots continue to be Heol Isaf from Woodfield Avenue to Llantrisant Road, Radyr Station car park and Bryn Derwen up from the motorway bridge.

A view from the touchline

It's said that a week is a long time in football, and so it holds that a heck of a lot can happen between issues of the Chain! So while the last update from the football club was toasting the success of one of our 'old boys', Tom Lockyer, being selected for the Cymru squad for the Qatar World Cup, the football club has unfortunately faced a disappointing and frustrating spell over the winter. While the kids loved watching the exploits of their heroes in Qatar (it felt like Lionel Messi was on our TV screen more than Father Christmas this December!), unfortunately this was the closest our kids could come to actually playing themselves.

Radyr Rangers has over 300 junior and youth members, the vast majority of which are local children from Radyr & Morganstown, as well as a senior men's team, which means there are up to 36 Radyr Rangers teams taking to the pitches across Cardiff every Saturday. The club holds its winter training at Radyr Comprehensive, and the astroturf pitch couldn't cope with the wet weather this year. The heavy rain in November & December meant the pitch was deemed unsafe and unusable, so our 300+ players, the vast majority of which are local children from Radyr & Morganstown, have been left with nowhere to train for over a month. The school pitch has been showing its age for quite some time, and so whilst this was exasperating for the club, coaches and players, it was not a major surprise to many. It does, however, highlight a paucity of sporting and play facilities for the local children. The vast majority of

similar alternative facilities, at other schools and the local universities, are heavily booked up during the peak weekday-evening slots. It has meant that any budding Tom Lockyers, or indeed Gareth Bales, have been forced to sit at home and watch football, rather than having the opportunities to get out and play. This has been accentuated by the icy weather leaving many matches cancelled due to frozen ground making grass pitches unplayable. Whilst many other high schools in Cardiff enjoy modern 3G/4G astroturf pitches, and other areas of the city benefitting from all-weather games arenas for community use, Radyr has seemingly been overlooked. Whilst Radyr is undoubtedly blessed with excellent facilities for tennis, cricket and golf, we have been left behind our local neighbours in the city when it comes to suitable and practical facilities for football (and rugby) for the biggest participation sports in the country.

If you feel that our youngsters deserve better, then please lend your voice and share your views with our local councillors and MP to highlight this issue. Radyr Cricket Club

The end of 2022 brought a bit of cheer and a tad of disappointment to those involved in the club. Leading up to Christmas it was decided to arrange a collection for those less well off and Jonathan Wilson



organised a collection for the local Food Bank. I was amazed at the kindness of all the members and the photograph shows the amount collected. A few days later however the warm glow disappeared somewhat, as it was discovered that a pipe in the pavilion had frozen and subsequently burst. That however didn't stop the club enjoying ourselves, though as the Festive period dawned with cries of Happy Christmas, it became clear that some of the members had gone down with the lurgy; some with the flu and a couple catching Covid. For yours truly, whilst I stayed fit and well, my ninety six year old father fell, broke his hip and spent his Yuletide in the Heath Hospital.

Moving into the New Year there has already been a great deal of activity, primarily around the arrangements for the indoor nets, as a preparation for the forthcoming season. Unfortunately this did not prove as straightforward as one would imagine. For as long as I can remember the club has used the nets at Sophia Gardens, but over the last few years the demand from all parts of the cricket fraternity for these facilities has increased exponentially. As we have to accommodate seven senior sides it proved almost impossible to match our requirements with the available space. So in the end a decision was made to split the nights with certain teams on a Wednesday and others on a Thursday. It is not the ideal solution, as the club has always prided itself on being one entity, but we have become the victim of our own success. So it is a pragmatic answer

and we should be thankful, as we are only one of four clubs to have been allocated space in the Sophia Gardens indoor net facility this year.

The interesting thing about this saga is that South Wales and Cardiff in particular, has a lack of these facilities. With the interest in playing cricket having increased enormously, as more youngsters and especially girls discover the joy of the game, Cricket Wales and Glamorgan are desperately trying to figure out how to put the proverbial pint into a quart pot. This lack is also mirrored in the fact that there are virtually no spare pitches in the whole of the city, which means that new sides have to travel some way to play their home games. Our 5th and 6th XIs are based at Pontcanna, which while acceptable in terms of distance, means a disconnect with the other parts of the club. As I've said before in these articles, there is a Radyr based solution, but it will require the public bodies and the cricket authorities, together with RCC to make it happen. The joy of sport and the benefits it brings to society should never be ignored and my hope is that the powers that be realise that too.

Another feat of organisation currently being managed is the club's Winter Luncheon that has always taken place on the last Sunday of January. Covid unfortunately intervened with the tradition and this year will be the first time since 2019 that we've been able to meet for this most convivial of gatherings. It is an opportunity for the Vice Presidents to mingle with the players and it's an interesting fact that the older you get the better player you were!!!!! This year will be more poignant than most, as the intervening four years has seen the passing of a number of people who were stalwarts of the club and the Luncheon. It will also be the first opportunity for the new President, Nick O'Neil, to speak to the VPs, who are such an integral part of the club's DNA.

The next big event will be the issue of the fixtures by the League. This is later than usual as the number of teams who have to be incorporated, has this year increased by over ten. This means that these sides need to be accommodated at the appropriate level, ensuring that there are as few mismatches as possible.

Unfortunately it is not the easy task it once was with only thirty teams: today it is one hundred and thirty, and arrangements have to be made regarding ground availability, who will play on Bank Holidays or Sundays and where can additional games be fitted into the calendar. However the frisson of excitement when one knows who your first opponents are, still leaves a few butterflies in the stomach, even at my age.

Youth cricket today is so important to the development of the game and the clubs themselves, that there is a constant need to ensure that those that coach are also improving. It is the sporting equivalent, I suppose, of CPD. The way RCC does this is by a series of master classes run by one of our very talented young coaches. The aim is to show best practice and to ensure that what the coaches are saying is relevant to the youngsters in their charge. To RCC it is not just about the technical side of the game but also to impart information on routines that the juniors find fun. So for a number of weeks at the Comp the club's coaches will be put through their paces: at RCC no-one is allowed to rest on their laurels.

Finally a trip down Memory Lane. It is now just a few days from the third anniversary of Storm Dennis, when on February 20, 2020, South Wales suffered its worst flood in decades. For RCC it meant complete devastation, with the main ground severally damaged and the second destroyed. It is only due to the complete dedication and staggering hard work of the members and our friends that the club is as it is today. As the rain pours and the level of the Taff ebbs and flows, nervous glances are directed at the gurgling mass that thunders past the rear of the clubhouse. For some of us the Natural Resources Wales website has become essential viewing, as we look through our fingers at the hourly changes in river levels, with the dearest wish that the 2020, forty year flood, is just that.
