We would like to give a big thank you to Chris Wills who has been the distributor since 2010.

Linda Turner has been the treasurer since issue 253 - April 2021 when she took over from Ellis Jenkins. Previously she had organised the advertising, dealing with new and existing advertisers. Thank you Linda for all of your hard work over the years.

Grateful thanks also to Allan Cook who has assisted with the editing, providing many interesting articles over many issues.

The Chain is financed solely by advertising and many of the advertisers within the magazine have been with us for many years. Without them the Chain wouldn't exist so our sincere thanks go out to them for their loyal support.

We have tried in vain to find someone to carry on production and hopefully at some point in the future it can be started again as it is a valuable source of information and advertising within Radyr and Morganstown.

Finally, thank you to all our readers for your input and support. Here's hoping that *Radyr Chain* will carry on in some form in the future.


Hollywood comes to Morganstown

Radyr resident at the Olympics


I think this is the first time that we have had the opportunity to wish a resident of R&M best wishes while they take part in the Olympics. Alistair Chalmers who lives in Parc Plymouth with his partner Ellie and dog Sam, will compete in the 400 metres hurdles on August 4th. Alistair, originally from Guernsey, graduated from the University of Bath and currently trains out of NIAC (Cardiff Met) with trainer Matt Elias.

Alistair did not make the road to Paris easy for himself. He failed to make the Olympic qualifying time at the Europeans Championships and then had a false start at the British Championships held at Manchester. He was asked to leave the track, but lodged an appeal on the grounds of noise at the start. He was allowed to run the race while his appeal was considered. He won the race with a personal best - which was within the Olympic qualifying time

At this stage he still didn't know whether he had been allowed to take part in the race officially and whether he would be going to the Olympics. Two hour, of what must

have been sheer hell, later, his appeal was upheld and his personal best and his inclusion in the British team was confirmed.

"I honestly can't believe it," he said, "it's the best day of my life. It's been the worst, but also the best - a stressful day."



Radyr Cricket Club

One of the things that you notice running a club such as RCC is the constant desire people have for information: it seems as if everyone wants a piece of you. The latest form I have to complete is from Cricket Wales who want to know, well, everything. Last year the gathering of these statistics and the submission on line, seemed to take days, but I'm sure that wasn't the case. However whilst I moan about this, I cannot avoid admitting that this 'snap shot' does actually show the direction that the club, and cricket in general, is travelling. The first statistic that leapt out at me, following my information gathering, was the twenty five percent increase in registrations that the club achieved in the All Stars/Dynamos programme, going to two hundred children: a quite remarkable figure, which is the second highest in Wales. It only seems the other day that CW lauded us for achieving one hundred. But what this means is that more facilities, coaches and administrators are required to keep all the children and their parents happy. That being said Friday evenings at RCC are like nothing you've ever seen before, with the dedicated individuals imparting their knowledge of cricket onto the youngsters, who are having a ball.

Looking further into these figures there is no doubt that the better organised the junior section has become the more youngsters want and are able to play the game. This applies not just to the youngest but those up to the age of eighteen, where the club now runs three sides in most age groups: this is almost a fifty per cent increase in the last two years. Cricket is clearly growing and this applies especially to the girls and womens game. At RCC this is one of the club's priorities to expand a part of the game which has been sadly lacking for far too long.

The senior season is now well over the half way stage and all our eight sides have seen both 'triumph and the very rare disaster'. Currently the most successful of the sides are the Second XI and the Womens Second XI, who sit astride their respective divisions. It is hoped these two sides continue on their path and others improve just slightly to push themselves into the promotion positions. It is also very encouraging that the numbers of youngsters playing senior cricket is on the increase: this week's Sixth XI consisted of five under eighteens, whilst a few weeks ago all the ten wickets taken by the Fifth XI came from this age group, including leg spinner Will Lamb, whose figures were an amazing 6-21, his second five wicket haul of the season. Clearly giving youngsters their opportunities is paying dividends for the various teams and is an example of why RCC puts so much energy into youth development.

On Saturday the club celebrated another wonderful Vice Presidents Day, where a superb luncheon, coordinated by Helen O'Neil, the President's wife was enjoyed by all those present. Again the President put on an amazing display in the marquee of some of his cricketing memorabilia and a number of the jackets worn by former Australian cricketing greats were a sight to behold. It was also good to meet up with old team mates and reminisce about games past and raise a glass to absent friends. It was quite humbling to realise that some of these people managed to keep the show on the road through both fires and floods, otherwise the great strides made by the modern generation would not have been possible. The VPs are great supporters of the club and their financial backing is vital in keeping the club at the forefront of recreational cricket in south Wales. A tour of the ground, led by Peter Sullivan, was greatly appreciated by those who joined the line and as they snaked around looking at all the nooks and crannies, their rapt attention made him look like a modern day Pied Piper.

The European Championship ultimately ended in disappointment for England which was a sad turn of events for many of the club's members from across the Severn, who have made south Wales their home. However some months ago one member, Joseph Jones, came up with the brilliant idea of organising a club sweepstake for not only the winners but also the Golden Boot: this not only raised funds but brought a lot of fun to the proceedings. It was very pleasing to see the names of all the winners and Joseph is to be commended for his superb organisation. A lot of the members watched the Final in the clubhouse partaking of a pre game barbecue, having watched the Fifth XI play a re-arranged League game. Again another incredibly busy weekend at RCC.

Finally as we enter the latter stages of the season the club's Fantasy Cricket competition is entering the business end and regrettably yours truly is most definitely mid table. My little victories earlier in the season seem to have gone west and I think I might need some crampons to stop me spiralling into oblivion. This great competition, organized by Scott Clode, plus the Euros mentioned above shows the great commitment people have to include all members in off the field activities and raise money at the same time. RCC is a wonderful institution, full of amazing people and it is a privilege to lead.

CHAIN COOKERY CORNER

Blackberry ripple ice cream

No need for any special equipment to make this simple, creamy ice cream and you can vary the recipe by using any seasonal fruit.

Ingredients

250g blackberries2 tbsp caster sugar600ml double cream1 tin (397g) condensed milk2 tsp vanilla essence

Method

Put the blackberries and sugar along with 2 tablespoons of water in a saucepan over a medium heat and leave to cook for 7-8 minutes until the fruit has cooked but still retaining their shape. Divide the mixture in half and liquidise one half until smooth then add to the other half. Leave to cool.

Pour the cream, condensed milk and vanilla essence into a large bowl and whisk until stiff and until a spoonful falls easily off the spoon.

Pour half the cream into a 12 x 20cm x 6cm deep container suitable for the freezer and pour a third of the mulberry sauce over swirling gently for a ripple effect. Repeat with the rest of the mixture (keeping half of the mulberry sauce to serve) finishing with the mulberry ripple. Cover with a lid and freeze for 6-8 hours or overnight.

Remove from the freezer at least 30 minutes before serving and pour over the mulberry sauce to serve.

Goodbye?

RADYR CHAIN

This is the last edition of the Chain that the present team will produce. The Community Council and several individuals and groups are working to see whether it can be saved in one form or another.

One of the problems has been that over the years the base on which The Chain rested has eroded. It now needs more than one person, a printer, an editor, someone who understands desk top publishing and layout, someone to look after the advertising, someone to look after the circulation, as well as a Treasurer.

Over the past week I have spent some time in the Library/Hub looking at back copies of the Chain. The Library/Hub has a complete set of The Chain, most of them are bound.

It started in April/May 1979 - the first edition does not have a publication date, but the first event noted in the *What's On* section is dated May 2nd. It was eight pages including adverts, it was black and white and was printed in typewriter type. In those days producing it was much more difficult than it is today as the printer would need to know the type face and size - nowadays we can juggle the print size to fit a space, enlarging or reducing type face by as little as 1/2 a point at a time.

The early editions explained the origin of the name. In those days the Old Church Rooms were still owned by the church authorities and contained a tree stump and a length of chain which has been the toll gate at the top of Waterhall Road during the 19th century. Carts and wagons were stopped by the chain until they had paid the required toll. The chain was removed to St John's Church, Danescourt when the Old Church Rooms were sold to the community.

In the second edition Seward and Co., then the leading Estate Agent in

R&M had a map of the new developments printed. The new developments were Castle View and Loughor Gardens - now more commonly known as The Trees. Seward had an office in Castle View opposite Bryn Deri School.

It included a photograph of those leaving the 6th form of Radyr Comp. that summer, they had been the first intake of 11 year olds to the school when it opened in 1972. Another piece was by our regular policeman P.C. Mike Jones.

Other early editions looked at some of our craftsmen, Bert Chapman, a cobbler who repaired shoes in Station Road, and Master Baker Selwyn Newman, who sold bread from his bakery in Springfield Gardens, Morganstown.

It is interesting to note that back in the late 1970's Radyr had a Symphony Orchestra and a Choral Society, and Morganstown Rugby Club. Otherwise items were similar to today, the cricket and tennis clubs, Christ Church and the Methodist Church, the schools, the Adult Education Centre, Remembrance Day and Christmas arrangements; and the charities, including the NSPCC, which we lost a few years ago.

The Scouts and Guides were strong then and in a world before recycling became fashionable, were in the forefront of recycling newspaper. This was started by the Scouts and taken up by the Guides to help pay for the new Guide Centre on Bryn Derwen.

It was a lovely wander down memory lane to a very different world nearly fifty years ago.
