



If you require a particular format or are struggling to read the new-look Chain as we are publishing it then please get in touch to discuss your needs.



# WWI - Forgotten Black heroes of Britain

The First World War: forgotten black heroes of Britain

The soldiers of the First World War are undeniably venerated across the globe and, naturally, given every ounce of the respect they deserve here in Radyr. However, in recognition of Black History Month having passed in October, paired with our community's honouring of Remembrance Day this month, it's vital to draw attention to the truly diverse nature of the soldiers who fought in WW1 amidst the colonialism of the time. These are the profiles of just a select few black WW1 soldiers of Britain who contributed so vitally to the war's victory, as part of an effort to widen our perspectives on British history and ensure that no minority group is excluded from the stories we tell at this special time of remembrance.

### **Private Eustace** Rhone



Eustace Rhone was born in Jamaica, later living in Tiger Bay, Cardiff. Tiger Bay drew residents from a range of countries due to work available on the docks, and thus remains to this day a bustling, multicultural community: one of the best examples of our country's wonderful diversity. During the prejudiced time at which he volunteered to fight, however, the then - British empire had a problem; if they allowed black citizens to enlist, would they demand equality upon their return, dismantling the white supremacy of the era? The War Office created the Welch Battalion in 1915, which did allow black citizens to enter, but previously the Glamorgan recruiting headquarters in Cardiff denied them entry for a whole year of the war. Rhone's enlistment was thus a brave decision in a heavily racist period, and although officially black citizens were granted entry into the army from 1914, they were not accepted in aviation until later, highlighting the hostile atmosphere in Britain at the time.

Eustace Rhone became a Private in the 2nd battalion of the Welch regiment, volunteering in 1915, and was subsequently deployed to France, where he fought and came to be injured from chemicals which blew back on his cohort in the wind. Eustace died on the 27th of September of that year, two days after his injury from a later gas attack, and was posthumously awarded the

1914/1915 Star, the British War Medal, and the Victory Medal.

This hero of WW1 was awarded after he died, but in modern times this does not always guarantee that the memory of black servicemen lives on. There is still a prevalent narrative which excludes the non - white soldiers of the first world war, which I encountered via the scarcity of sources available on the subject whilst researching this article, resulting in the brevity of a profile on such a key individual of WW1.

#### Private Joseph **Edwards**

#### (No photo available)

Joseph Edwards was born in Barbados, 1894, and before the first world war he worked as a seaman in Barry docks. Barry at the time had a truly diverse population, with its fast - growing trade from the beginning of the 20th century encouraging settlement from a vast range of countries - the 1901 census recorded residents from Tobago, Barbados, Jamaica, Greece, Africa and more. The area was a multicultural hub, much like Cardiff, due to its multitude of economic opportunities. However, this period was still plagued with much discrimination, appearing in the form of the later 1919 race riots, including attacks on black citizen's property. Enlisting to defend a country

(then a colonial Empire) which at this time was rife with blatant racism was, therefore, a particularly brave act for a man originating from Barbados.

Joseph enlisted in the Welsh Regiment on the 11th of March 1915, serving in both the 12th and the 8th battalions, and later fighting in the Northumberland Fusiliers in the Second Garrison Battalion in the 1916 Battle of Gallipoli. This is often described as one of the first world war's fiercest battles and the first major amphibious operation in modern warfare, truly displaying the gravity of Joseph's service there. Joseph survived the war after contributing to the victory in Mesopotamia (now Iraq), and upon honourable discharge in 1919, he received the Silver War Badge, alongside his others including the 1914/15 Star, the British War medal and the Victory medal, much like Private Rhone.

Joseph Edwards is another clear example of a demographic whose role in the first world war is often forgotten in the historical narrative, and the fact that no photograph could be identified when composing this profile emphasizes this feeling. The sheer volume of medals that he received demonstrates the incredible bravery of so many black ww1 soldiers which we should be focusing on more in 2024 and beyond.

### Sergeant William 'Robbie' Clarke

As Britain's first black pilot,



Robbie Clarke is a prime example of Britain's rich historical diversity. Born in Kingston, Jamaica, he joined the Royal Flying Corps on the 26th of July 1915, and at the time there was a common feeling amongst Black Caribbean volunteers that they may gain increased respect and acceptance in a colonial, prejudiced nation if they proved themselves to 'King and country'.

After working as an air mechanic and being posted to France as a driver for an air balloon company, he was selected for aviation training in England in 1916 and qualified on the 26th of April, 1917. Robbie was subsequently promoted to sergeant the same year, joining the No.4 squadron in Belgium with the task of artillery observation and reconnaissance. This was to escalate when, flying over the Western Front shortly before the Battle of Messines, he and observer 2nd Lieutenant FP Blencowe were attacked by enemy aircraft on their photography mission: Robbie took a bullet to the spine, still miraculously being able to manoeuvre his plane to the ground before being hospitalized, and stoically returning to duty in November 1917 where he served in the RFC Reserve Depot and a mechanic in the No.254 Squadron in Devon.

After the war, the Sergeant returned to Jamaica and the building trade, later achieving even more prestige as Life President of the Jamaican branch of the RAF association. William Clarke passed away in April of 1981, and is buried in the Military Cemetery at Up Park Camp, Kingston. His story may be better documented online than many other black soldiers of the great war, but it is still a testament to how overlooked ethnic minorities of ww1 remain in the 21st century in the fact that his extraordinary story was only uncovered by chance during a volunteer project. Such a ground-breaking first for the military and for Britain in our first black pilot should surely have been taught for vears now in our schools.

It is our duty as members of a modern, more enlightened age to recognise our country's deeply flawed history, and to include black stories and voices in our narrative of the first world war to grant the heroes often forgotten the honour they deserve for their sacrifices. Stories like these are not rare, and I can only afford to do justice to a few in detail here; over 16,000 black soldiers served in ww1, and despite this impressive figure, researching the subject and combing military records is a task which yielded few fruits, and points to a larger problem with our current historical interpretation on the first world war. We must adapt our perspective of the great war to fit a modern Britain, in which can educate ourselves on the British Empire and the heroes of the first world war it often ignored so as to fully appreciate all the brave souls who gave their efforts and their lives for their country.

as they can and collect litter.



### Free fitness opportunity

Did you know that Age Cymru has a project all over Wales to promote regular physical activity in later life. I may have some issue with their criteria of 'later life' as it is over 50! The reasoning is sound - evidence shows that if people start moving younger they are more likely to maintain it as they get older. And the good news is that this means that anyone over 50 is welcome at all exercise classes run by Age Cymru - totally free of charge.

These classes are run by local volunteers within communities and tend to be small friendly groups, where connecting with each other is as much part of it as the exercise.

The project includes LIFT - Low Impact Functional Training (chair based exercise), Tai Chi, Nordic Walking (full training and poles given (free), Walking Groups and Walk and Talk (a one to one



service to help gain confidence to go out for a walk).

Radyr already has 2 Age



Cymru Tai Chi groups (generously housed by Radyr & Morganstown Community Council) and the Hubs regular walking group. All the other activity groups can be found in Cardiff somewhere (if you can travel to them)

### Some wise health related information from Age Cymru

Age Cymru's Spread the Warmth campaign is urging you to protect yourself with vaccinations now for this coming winter. Immunisation is as important in later life as it is in early childhood as we continue to benefit from getting routine vaccinations, especially in early autumn. Some of you will need additional immunisations as you may be at an increased risk due to your age, or you may have a certain health condition. This year if you're aged 75 or over, then you can expect to be offered a new vaccination called the Respiratory Syncytial Virus or (RSV) vaccination.

#### Respiratory syncytial virus

(RSV) - RSV infections can occur all year round, but just like most viruses, cases rise in autumn and winter. You can help protect yourself against serious illness from RSV by having the RSV vaccination when it is offered to you. The RSV vaccine won't be given at the same time as the COV-ID-19 and flu vaccinations. The vaccine will need to be given at a separate appointment.

Influenza (flu) and Covid-19 booster - The rollout of the Autumn/Winter 2024-25 influenza (flu) and covid-19 booster started from 1 October 2024. For those of you at an increased risk to complications of influenza, the annual flu vaccine is recommended.

With all vaccinations, it's recommended that you get your vaccination as soon as it becomes available and is offered to you. The sooner you are vaccinated the sooner you will have immunity against the relevant circulating virus.

However, if you are already feeling unwell or have a fever, then tell the person giving the vaccination before you are vaccinated.

Also seek advice from a health professional about the different routine vaccinations that are available to you as an adult in your later years.

This information is available as part of Age Cymru's Spread the Warmth campaign which highlights the various ways you can keep yourself warm, safe, and well this winter. ### When one door closes another one opens or even two

The Trustees of the Radyr & Morganstown Good Neighbours scheme made the dif-

ficult decision to close at the end of July 2024. The scheme, sponsored by the Radyr & Morganstown Community Council, was set up to offer services to those in need of help and support, to help people connect with their community by telling them what is available and by providing opportunities for people to meet and help with transport.

In practice we found the need for additional support was not as great as was envisaged, and the recruitment of volunteers proved difficult. We also realised that other Charities provide assistance locally. We did, though, establish a regular 'Friday with Friends' Group meeting in the New Schoolrooms (see below).

We had some money left in the bank on closure of the charity. Some has gone to the Garth Ministry Area to pay for the hire of the New Schoolrooms for 'Friday with Friends' and 'Goldies' in perpetuity. The balance has been passed to the Charity 'Age Connects Cardiff & the Vale' (Charity No 1137821), with the request that the money is used to promote services in R&M.





Report from Allan Cook. Chair of the Community Council

Welcome back. We are extremely happy to see the Chain in print once again under a new younger Editorial Board and the Community Council wishes them a long and successful future.

Christmas is just around the corner and we are deep into preparations for the Christmas Market and Christmas Tree Lighting on Friday 6th December, Christmas Trees will be lit in the Granny Park Morganstown, The Sidings, Pentwyn Park and Windsor Gardens. The tree in Windsor Gardens will be lit by Santa himself at 7 p.m.

Children from the local schools will sing carols around the trees in the various locations from 6 p.m. onwards. #### From Councillor Calum Davies

Cardiff County Council meetings returned in September after the Summer break.
However, it was very sad that this meeting began without the Lord Mayor, Jane Henshaw, who passed away a few days earlier. Jane was a dedicated public servant and her presence at Council will be sorely missed.

Despite being in place for months now. I find that the so-called "teething problems" with the new recycling regime persist. Waste separated by residents sometimes continues to be mixed in the same compartments in the collection trucks, and rubbish still gets accidentally strewn across streets as bags and boxes are emptied. I continue to raise this with the Council leadership as we need strong consumer confidence in our waste collection, and we all want to prevent litter in our communities.

I am also regularly informed of cars parking on double yellow lines and dangerously close to junctions near to Radyr Primary School, particularly where Park Road meets Windsor Avenue. This will usually be at drop-off and collection times.

I also have reports of a significant increase in dangerous parking between the bridge leading to the Sidings and Radyr Station car park. Parking here creates blind spots in an area where there has already been a car accident in recent months, so I politely urge that people consider where they leave their car with this in mind.

It has been alarming to hear

more stories from residents about negative experiences with local buses in recent weeks. I encourage residents to send these to me so that I can then demonstrate to bus operators how people in the ward are not being delivered a sufficiently reliable or frequent service.

Ahead of every Council meeting, I have the chance to table five written questions to the Cabinet. I will aim to use up

find out information useful to myself as a representative of Radyr & Morganstown but also in my other roles on the Council, including the Conservatives' education spokesperson.

The new term has started wonderfully at Bryn Deri Primary school, welcoming new families joining us for the first time. September has started with a whole host of exciting learning experiences for the children from Roald Dahl Delicious Dress Up Day including visits to Ty Mynedd to see the real Golden Ticket and find out all about our local author Roald Dahl.

This year European Day of Languages saw the launch of our International Languages aspect of the curriculum with a dress up day! There was lots of cooking involved this year with the mouth watering smells of Pizza and pain au chocolat.

On 17th October, Year 6 visited Brecon Regimental Museum dressing up as evacuees for the day.

There has been plenty of performing arts celebrated in the school with pupils commencing Violin workshops, tasters from shine Theatre school, a wonderful Harvest Assembly by Year 1 and beautiful singing performances by Years 2 and 3 at the Macmillan Coffee afternoon, raising approximately £300 for Macmillan Cancer.

It is exciting to report that Year

4 have enjoyed their first ever residential and the first since lockdown! It was a fun packed few days of challenging activities and Welsh. We are super proud of their positive attitudes in overcoming challenges!

Year 2 pupils have begun their 10 week whole class violin lessons with Cardiff and Vale Music Education. Year 4 have also begun music performance lessons as part of a funded cluster choir.

We are delighted to say that the school library renovation is now complete and looking wonderful. This process has taken quite a few years but we are finally finished including a new floor, bookcases and wonderful mural painted by staff with the Forest theme chosen by pupils. The PTA has contributed £12,000 in total for this refurbishment. The next long term goal regarding much needed renovation is to transform the school's IT Suite.

At the PTA's AGM in October, a new Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary and Treasurers were elected to the PTA and exciting plans for the future including an adults only special event in 2026. We would like to thank the previous committee





for everything that they have achieved including the first Saturday Summer Fayre last term which proved to be a real highlight, alongside the ever popular PTA Sports Day BBQ. A huge thank you to our PTA and Community Council for the purchasing and installation of our community defibrillator. Also special thanks to the Brown family for offering their services and time freely in installing this. This will be a real benefit to our school and the wider community.

The PTA is essential to assist Bryn Deri primary school provide the full range of activities and support to our children. The PTA is funding many elements:

- £100 per class for the teachers to spend on supplies such as art, cookery ingredients and scientific experiments.
- Additional funding due to the expense of the school Christmas pantomime trip to the Riverfront Theatre.
- Whole class music lessons and drama/ dance workshops.
- Part funding the new Defibrillator and ongoing costs.



- The PTA want to assist the school with the short term goal of replacing the no Mow area and providing much more outdoor equipment.
- The long term goal is raising enough to (quickly) renovate the IT suite.

Children go home tired after some amazing experiences but looking forward to the next round of enrichment days when they change activities and experience another enriching opportunity...




At the end of the Radyr Primary school year Layth was so happy and proud to receive a trophy donated by Eva Tatum for his love of nature.

# We are there, just in case

The Radyr Division of St John Ambulance Cymru (SJAC) has been operational in Radyr since 2016, when it was reopened after a small advert looking for volunteers appeared in the Radyr Chain.

Since then the division has grown from strength to strength with both adult and Cadet divisions, meeting on Tuesday nights in the Old Church Rooms.

Our members come from all walks of life and on a weekly basis meet to learn new first aid skills based on a modular approach, starting with CPR & how to use an AED (defibrillator)

Current information states that less than 1 in 10 people who suffer a cardiac arrest outside of a hospital environment survive. Our mission is to improve that number and create a community of lifesavers. 'Save a Life September' is a key month which involves us teaching all



ages the basic CPR skills required to keep someone alive until professional help arrives.

We shared these skills with over 100 people at St Mark's in Gabalfa, Deri Stores, the Food Festival at St Fagans and in the OCR over this period.

This followed a busy 3 months over summer, with Radyr Division members on hand to provide first aid cover and CPR training at events all over the area, ranging from Radyr & Morganstown Festival, Creigau Carnival, Pentyrch Hill Race, Cardiff Half Marathon, the National Eisteddfod Genedlae-

thol, football and rugby matches, as well as and concerts at the Principality Stadium.

Being named the RMA's Charity of the Year 2025 is an exciting opportunity and we are currently putting together our plans for the year which include wellness clinics as well



as sessions on falls - how to prevent them and what to do, childhood illnesses and burns.

You too can learn these skills by becoming a volunteer with Radyr Division. You will learn lifelong skills (many of our younger members develop careers in healthcare having gained valuable experience with us), gain new understanding of how the body works, what you can do to look after yourself and your family, as well as enjoy attending the events on offer.

We are the St John Ambulance Cymru's Radyr Division and we are there, just in case.

tend church on Sunday to join together for a relaxed afternoon in the woods. Forest church was born.



Now, a couple of years on, our forest church congregation has grown, and several parents take turns to lead the monthly sessions. We've held several special events, including a pumpkin party and a Shrove Tuesday Forest Church (which ended up with us back at the manse for pancakes!).

During the winter (when it was getting dark early), we had a star-gazing session. We set up telescopes and one of our church stewards came along to share her knowledge of the planets. There was great excitement (and not just among

the children) when we lit a firepit and toasted marshmallows!

Hannah, a regular attender, told me recently: "I love that Forest Church allows children to be their loud, busy, energetic selves – something that can be stifled in a formal church setting. They can learn, first hand, about God and their creation while having the freedom to behave in the way that they were created to."



It's gone so well that we have just launched an adult forest church called, *And...* breathe..out.., where we meet to find God in creation and to enjoy the companionship of being together. We are meeting on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November to create a Remembrance mandala by bringing together red leaves.





# From the Crease

As the rain tumbled on the first weekend of September, the cricket season at Radyr came to a rather damp end and I wonder how so much was packed into just over four months. The 2024 season was not without incident and as I heard myself constantly saying, "there's never a dull moment at Radyr Cricket Club." But throughout it all the one pervading feeling I got was a love for the club, which means so much to so many people.

The season brought the club so many highs that I have spent the last few days trying to put them in some order. I know that not everyone will agree with my top ten but here goes.

1. Top of the tree has to be the Second XI who won the Third Division of the South East Wales Cricket League, the competition where all six of the Saturday senior sides ply their trade. Led brilliantly by Ben O'Neil, who scored two centuries and finished as the division's top scorer, the side only lost one game early in the year and won their last

eleven games. I can't remember a Radyr side ever being that ruthless or consistent.

- 2. One of the successes of the last few years in youth development has been the All Stars scheme. This initiative is for the youngest of cricketers, up to and including those who are eleven years of age, and is brilliantly organised for us by Richie Burnell and his rather large band of helpers. Two years ago the club was delighted to have a hundred children signed up to the programme, but this year it was amazing to see the numbers rise almost daily and double that number. I still keep looking at the ECB certificate with a tad of wonder confirming the two hundred.
- 3. Our awards night on the final Saturday of the season saw a vast array of trophies won by the various players of the year, with the event topped off by a raffle to raise funds for the club. What stuck out for me on the night was the cap I awarded to my dear friend, Peter Sullivan, to signify that he had played at the club for the last fifty years. In that time he has been Club Captain, played as many games as anyone

and been up there with the amount of runs scored. Unfortunately his efforts on this day were a tad more modest and the Sixth XI duck he scored were, according to the skipper, James Hodkinson, one of the most elegant he'd ever seen!

- 4. Talking of the Sixth XI skipper brings me to my next highlight: his face after his side won their first game of the season. The look of pure joy confirmed to me, if I ever doubted it, that winning is one of the ultimate feelings a human can experience. If you could have bottled his and the team's expressions you would be onto a winner. All of them stood around the clubhouse after the game, holding their drinks, with the look of sublime contentment, accompanied by the occasional cheeky smile. Unfortunately whilst I don't want to burst the euphoric bubble, that triumph turned out to be their only win of the season. But I have no doubt that 2025 will provide another victory or two and many more smiles.
- 5. For as long as I can remember playing Llanarth, a team from deepest darkest Monmouthshire, used to bring

Radyr captains out in a mixture of hair loss and boils. Every year the side went on their travels with great confidence only to reappear with their tails firmly between their legs. That is, until this year. Firstly in late June that rarest of triumphs, a victory at Llanarth gave a sense of joy and, if I'm honest, disbelief. Then on the final day of the season, and with talk of the opposition coming fully loaded, the Third XI rose to the ultimate challenge. After Llanarth reached 60-1, Radyr's bowling was inspired. Llanarth were blown away and it was a home victory by eight wickets. The double was achieved and maybe, just maybe, that Llanarth hoodoo has been finally laid to rest.

- 6. During eight days in May, the Womens First XI played two remarkable league games against the same opposition, Cardiff CC, beating them by 207 runs and 273 runs. On both occasions the captain, Lydia Clements, scored a century and dominated the bowling to such an extent that you felt she could have batted for ever. An amazing week for a talented cricketer and her wonderful team.
- 7. Since 2015 when the club started playing against the MCC, the world's most famous club, it has always been the policy to pick the First XI. This year it was decided to change that and ask all the members who were available if they wanted to play. As a consequence the side chosen better represented the wider club, with players chosen from the top four sides. It clearly wasn't as competitive a side as it had been in the past, but not going

out to win at all costs made it a much more pleasurable day and meant so much to the team. Radyr made MCC, who came with a very talented side, work hard for their victory and the evening that followed was as convivial as anything we'd witnessed for quite some time.

- 8. This particular highlight relates not to a single moment but to a season wide feeling of great pride in the two grounds that are where Radyr plays. Over the whole year, from well before the start of the season, a dedicated group of individuals, rolled and cut, marked wickets, laid top soil and fertiliser to produce the two wonderful grounds we are lucky to call home. As a number of people have said, has it ever looked better? That's unlikely, and the membership know how lucky they are. Allied to the two grounds are the fabulous changing facilities which past members would have looked at in awe. With the enclosed feel made by the fences, the grounds and all the facilities certainly take some beating.
- statistics it is always nice to find that the results on the page confirm what you have always thought. Well this is very true when it comes to the wicket keepers in the First Division, for this season the top stumper is our own Isaac Gould. With thirteen catches and six stumping he has shown what a brilliant wicket keeper he is. No-one who saw his leg side stumpings against Newport or Llandaff (the batsman certainly didn't) will question that this young lad is a master of his craft and the best in the league.

10. And finally the most important was the resurrection of the First XI over the last four weeks of the season. At the start of August, a heavy defeat at Malpas, who eventually ended the season as champions, meant the side had won only one of the last five league games and had slipped into the relegation positions. The team was determined to avoid the drop, and under stand-in skipper Jon Davies, the next two games were won and probably a third would have followed if the weather hadn't intervened. However, these three wins saw the side sit in fifth place going into the final Saturday where we were due to play Whitchurch Heath at home. As all the games started at 12.30pm, supporters and club members had their eyes and ears on what was going on at Radyr and elsewhere, where strong nerves and a full iPhone battery were a prerequisite. Unfortunately as is the way with technology, Play Cricket (the recreational players BBC) decided to stop working. For an hour we were flying blind, relying on just what we saw and when the latest scores started trickling in it wasn't particularly encouraging. But slowly and surely, in the way that cricket does, the scores, including at Radyr, were forming and slowly the picture changed. We were destined for a comfortable victory and thus the other results didn't really matter in the end. We ended the season in fourth position. A brilliant effort by the team and something to work on for next year.



# **Supporting BFTA**

In July 2015, I was offered the opportunity to spend some time in Bethlehem being hosted by a Christian Palestinian family, the Rishmawi's. The family live in Beit Sahour or as we call it Shepherd's Field. They were so very welcoming, and I was taken to meet many of their friends and visited by many others who were intrigued to meet a female minister.

Layali Rishmawi works for Bethlehem Fair Trade Association (BFTA) as an embroiderer. BFTA is an organisation that brings together crafts people who are of Christian and Muslim faith and enable them to use their gifts to create traditional crafts to sell to the tourists who visit Bethlehem. Unfortunately, at present the tourist industry has dried up and Bethlehem, the city of Christ's birth, stands as a haunting reflection of our current reality. Once a vibrant and bustling hub during this season with pilgrims eagerly waiting in line to enter the Church of the Nativity, the streets now lay silent and empty. The festive atmosphere that should have been building towards Christmas, a time of unity and joy, has been replaced by a sad stillness.

The impact of this crisis particularly affects the skilled artisans whose crafts have long been a symbol of Bethlehem's rich cultural heritage. The blockade and restrictions have severely compounded the challenges facing the community. The limits on the movement of people and goods and make it increasingly difficult for artisans to access markets or showcase their work.

I have therefore placed an order directly with BFTA and am hoping that it will be shipped in time for our Christmas Charities Fair in Radyr Methodist Church on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> November. Please do come if you can and support the stall it would be much appreciated.
