

From the Editors

As a new group of volunteers working together for the first time last autumn to produce the November edition, we have been thrilled with the overwhelmingly positive response to edition 274.

We learnt a lot last autumn and hope to build on our experience with this edition.

The word search was well received, so you will find this again on page 21. The competition for younger people to submit a spring theme drawing for the front cover sparked interest and we are grateful to the schools, Brownies and others who promoted the competition. Congratulations to Ayla, Abigail, Joseph, Joshua, Trisha and Will whose work features on the cover - we thought all your work deserved to be shown.

Editorial guidelines have been developed which we hope will help everyone who sends in items for The Chain as well as the Editorial Board in making decisions about the content and layout of the newspaper. When these are

finalised they will be available on the website and to be sent to anyone who requests them.

The handover of The Chain from the group of people who had run it for so many years is a work in progress. The Chain is set up as an Unincharitable purposes and we are following best practice and taking advice to ensure that we do this in the right way and will share more information in future editions - yes that's right.....future editions.

As the group of volunteers who met in September 2024, we agreed to try and produce two editions of The Chain. one in November and one in March. We have since agreed that we would like to produce further editions during 2025. We inherited a well-run process of six editions a year. As most of the new volunteers are working full or part-time, we are able to produce three or four editions a year. The best scheduling seems to have two main anchor dates - the Festival Fortnight every May and Christmas. When thinking about future dates for 2025, the Editorial Board are proposing to produce an edition in July and November. As we develop our systems and ways of working it is possible that we might be able to publish more frequently. Another consideration is the size of the newspaper. The Novem-

ber edition was a bumper one and this one is also full of content and adverts - as well as the welcome inclusion of the Festival Programme. If we produced more frequently, the editions would likely be slimmer, however, every edition requires a lot of work and that is why we thought we would settle on three editions for our first full year.

Other news is that we have had a positive response from advertisers, especially to the full colour production. As we want to maintain a good balance of articles and adverts, we have made the decision to set a maximum size for any new advertisers at 1/4 of a page costing £80.00. We are giving careful consideration to the inclusion of QR codes - or not. There are a few in this edition and this is under review.

The Radyr Chain aims to include diverse items of local interest from everyone in the community, sharing information, celebrating good news, flagging up issues and highlighting upcoming events.

Therefore in this edition we are really pleased to be able to include the programme for the Radyr and Morganstown Festival. For those who are new to the area, the Festival is organised by the Radyr and Morganstown Association, it has been running successfully for many years and the 2025 programme

features a varied range of activities aimed to bring the community together during the first two weeks of May.

During the Festival fortnight the 80th Anniversary of VE Day will take place on 8th May. Many communities across Wales, the UK and Europe will seek to mark this event. You might be planning something with your family or neighbours - if you have a story to tell about this, why not consider sharing it for the next edition of The Chain which we aim to publish in the summer. One of our contributors in this edition has chosen a theme with connections to World War Two through her article on Auschwitz. This contributor is a student at Radyr Comprehensive School and we are pleased to receive ideas for content from people of all ages across the community.

We welcome any feedback about this edition, ideas for the future and especially contact from anyone who has digital and design skills or time available to be involved in the varied tasks that we have found are associated with maintaining and developing The Chain as the valued community resource that it is. 

On diversity, compassion and equality

This year marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz - Birkenau, and an end to the genocide committed by the Nazis in the Holocaust. Although Holocaust Memorial Day passed on the 27th of January, the momentous occasion of 80 years having passed must stand as a reminder of the lessons the world learnt in 1945 all year round, for us in Radyr and Morganstown and around the globe.

Aside from the array of touching official commemorations of the anniversary in January, from charities, governments (notably our own Senedd in Cardiff Bay) and a plethora of other organizations, the importance of remembering the Holocaust and its estimated 6 million victims must remain with us in this community in our everyday lives, as our Radyr and Morganstown area must be a representation of wider reflection and resolution to honour this tragedy and oppose prejudice.

Over the last few years, I have had the privilege of hearing Holocaust survivor testimonies, visiting Auschwitz - Birkenau and Sachsenhausen former concentration camps, and visiting the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe in Berlin. The immeasurably moving stories of Eva Clarke **BEM and Paul Svest BEM** provided a far more profound understanding of the terrible acts of war they lived through and also displayed the incredible perseverance of hope and courage which managed to emerge from this brutal period of history.

One central lesson that the

Lessons from Auschwitz project that the Holocaust Memorial Trust teaches is the importance of not generalizing the Jewish experience of the Second World War. The terrible scale of the 6 million figure should be commemorated without ignoring the individual Jewish communities and families murdered in Europe, and raising awareness of the Roma and Sinti people persecuted, as well as all other targets of Nazism: gay men, transgender people, political prisoners, members of the clergy who spoke out against National Socialism, and disabled people. These demographics must not be forgotten as we mark 80 years since the horrors inflicted on them.

and unique nature of pre-war communities and families, researching specific case studies is a useful tool, and I cannot urge Radyr and Morganstown residents to research survivor testimonies strongly enough. We must strive to remember that we are all a global community, regardless of faith, nationality or any other factors, and remember that all that separates us here from war is an accident of birth, both in a time and country in which

To appreciate the diversity

democracy lives. Utilising resources from the Holocaust Educational Trust, Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Memorial Day charity or any other reliable historical sources can mark an attempt made by all of us in the community to pursue a better understanding of the Holocaust and continue being informed, proactive citizens.

The bravery and resilience of the survivors and victims of the Holocaust serve to remind us not only to commemorate an immense tragedy, but each day to embody the values fascists tried to destroy. Diversity, compassion, equality; principles of a free and fair world, which Wales must remain indicative of. Principles we all must continue to uphold and defend within our democracy. I urge you all to honour this anniversary by being a symbol of unity, protesting against discrimination and extremism, to carry forwards the resolution of 'never again'.

Cardiff's Replacement Local Development Plan Radyr and Morganistown

Development Group

Cardiff's Replacement Local Development Plan (RLDP) has been approved by the Council and will now go out to consultation. It is excellent news for us all in Radyr and Morganstown.

The adoption of settlement boundaries being tightly drawn around the two communities (with the addition of the already approved Plas Dwr site) means that the two candidate sites which were being put forward by developers - Goetre Fawr (north of Llantrisant Road and west of the golf Course and Pant Tawel Lane) and Plas Dwr Uchaf (west of Crofft y Genau Road) have been dropped from the Plan. Even better, this land is now identified as "countryside to be enhanced and protected."

The proposed site at Radyr Station Car Park has also been dropped.

All undeveloped land north of the M4 (including all of Morganstown) is identified as a "Green Wedge" and no development will be permitted within this area. This includes the site at Cwm Farm, where the purpose of current land clearance activities is unclear.

However, further development is proposed at Creigiau where another 520 houses are proposed and this could have implications for health

care and education provision, with additional pressure on Radyr Comprehensive. Much of the additional land needed for the housing will be on brown field sites south of the City Centre where more than 4,700 units will be provided. You will have no doubt seen that many of these are currently under construction or have planning permission.

An interesting part of the Plan is the creation of a sustainable food system, requiring the provision of allotment space in all new large developments. This will also ensure that the allotments in Morganstown are secured from future development.

Both the Taffs Well and Ton Mawr Quarries are safeguarded from any development that would prevent their extraction and, in particular, an extension has been identified to Ton Mawr Quarry.

There are no new proposals to improve the transport infrastructure from North West Cardiff: all seems to depend on the improved train timetable under the Metro and better bus links with the railway. The proposed railway line from Fairwater to Creigiau is included with stations in Plas Dwr. Our view is that it is unlikely that any meaningful progress will be made on this before 2035 due to financial pressures.

We must remain vigilant, however. It is not clear why the above sites have been dropped. It is possible that developers will object to their removal and will seek to amend the Plan during the consultation period which will run from 18 February to 15 April.

After deposit with the Welsh Government, the Plan will be subject to a Public Enquiry later in 2025 and the development of these sites may arise then.

Consultation Process

Since this article was submitted the full Consultation on the "Deposit Plan" has been launched by Cardiff Council.

A meeting was organised by the Radyr & Morganstown Community Council and the RMLDG on Monday 10 March which was addressed by Simon Gilbert, Head of Planning for Cardiff Council.

Simon stressed the importance of people submitting comments, on any aspect of the plan - particularly those where we agree with decisions proposed.

Tribute to Val Allen

"It's coming out in Easter. Well, maybe before. It's a late Easter this year. But it will definitely be out before the Festival."

Festival used to mean gymkhana and a dog show down in the Sidings, master-minded by Val Allen. She died this year and with her has gone so much of our history.

How do I capture Val for you? She did tell me how she was related to the Mathew family. And I believed her. The Mathew family go back to medieval times and were the Lords of Llandaff. Their first court, Radur Uchaf, was close to if not under the Sports Hall at Radyr Comprehensive. Maps in the 1940s show a building there and Val's brother David Povey told me there were two cottages side by side. They were what remained of the first court.

I often wonder if we did a Tardis job to Radyr Comp and took some of the pupils back in time, how they would find living in that medieval court. Would they realise how strategically well placed it was for a Norman Lord? If you peel away the houses on Heol Isaf and return the land to the Vile system of farming, you can stand outside the court and see up the Taff Valley for miles. Any marauding Welsh, what us? would be clearly visible as they advanced down the valley.

The Mathew family upgraded themselves to Radyr Court in Danescourt where the Ladybird Day Nursery is today.

Much of Radyr was turned into a deer park. It was trendy at the time. The Vile system went. So much for giving each person a strip of land and allocating them so that everyone had a fair division of good and not so good land.

There are poems in praise of a Mistress Mathew. She was wonderful to all the pilgrims who came to Radyr Court on their first night of their pilgrimage to Our Lady of Penrhys.

I see Val putting out bird seed and fat balls for the birds and food down for the vixen and she transforms into Mistress Mathew. I see her making sure the pilgrims have food and bringing lotions out of her dispensary to ease chaffed skin and other ailments.

With her high cheekbones and her chiselled features, her sparkling eyes, her ready smile and slim figure, even at her eightieth birthday Val was the most attractive woman in the room.

And the tales she told. She remembered Radyr and Morganstown when the farms were still farms. She would talk of Cwm Farm and of Goitre Fawr and the small holding in Radyr Woods, Radyr Lodge where they grew potatoes up the steep slope.

Generations of young horse riders attended Val's Pony Club. She used to say that if she had only helped save one child's life because they knew what to do, it would be worth the time and effort she put into making sure the sessions were fun and interesting.

We have lost a lady, a lady with standards, of kindness, of compassion and with a great sense of humour.

The next tranche of building will be next to Ty Gwyn where Val was born and where Val lived and died. The plans show a play area. We are asking for it to be Val's Park. It's the least we can do for an extraordinary woman.



Community Council News

Report from Allan Cook, Chair of the Community Council

By the time this edition of The Chain arrives on your doormat work will be well advanced on the installation of a lift in the Old Church Rooms. The work started at the beginning of February and is scheduled to be completed within fourteen weeks. This will be a lift capable of carrying some of the larger wheel-chairs and mobility scooters.

It will also involve the refurbishment of the toilets in that part of the building. To increase the number of toilets available and to reduce waiting times they will be unisex and some of the handwash basins will be in a communal area. Some of the toilets will have their own handwash basins and one or two will have mirrors.

The Old Church Rooms have three spaces for hire and they are heavily used. We currently have an online consultation to gauge views as to whether we need to add another meeting room and ways in which we can make the OCR more attractive for users. before they are progressed.

In the same way we are concerned about the future of Station Road. There are plans for retail outlets in the new Plasdwr development and we wish to ensure that our Station Road shops retain a competitive edge. We will be looking at possible "improvements" to Station Road, but again these will go out for consultation before any decisions are made.

We are also in discussion with the Co-op, whom we believe hold the lease on the old Spar, about the depressing prospect the old Spar creates at the entrance to Station Road.

Festival 2025

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of Val Allen of Ty Gwyn Farm. Val was born in the parish to a farming family and worked very hard for the community. She will be sadly missed for the Gymkhana and Dog Show which she organised for the Festival over a long period.

Which brings us to the Festival. You should have received the Festival brochure with this edition of the Chain and it looks an exciting one with plenty of variety. Can we wish the Festival Committee good weather for the outdoor events and good attendance at all the events.

Danger Deep Mud

In the last edition we flagged up a concerning incident at



the Kingfisher pond in Radyr Woods. A gentleman's dog became stuck in the mud and when he tried to get it out, he himself became stuck. Three fire tenders were sent to the Woods to get him out.

The Radyr Woods Wardens have put up danger signs at the Kingfisher pond and the fencing has been increased. With the return of lighter evenings people are reminded of this danger.

However, there is a clear need for a link-up between the bus service and the railway. I still have the words of one of our residents ringing in my ears: "it hurts my knees going down to the station and my heart can't cope with walking up from the station". We need a regular service to the railway station.

Splitting it down into the smallest steps, we know that when the Community Council asked years ago for a link, the answer came back that it was impossible to turn the bus at the railway station. We know that is no longer the case, but it is important that TfW keep that space by the ticket office so that one day, (because it will happen) there will still be a turning point for buses.

Another of the problems we have is that it is cheaper to use the train from Radyr than Taffs Well so people from locations north of Taffs Well choose to drive to Radyr and then use the train. Can we work to get parity on fares between the two stations so there is no advantage driving on to Radyr?

Another suggestion to improve local services could be to have a shuttle bus, maybe minibus size going into Radyr Gardens in Morganstown and into the Sidings (with a stop at the station) and then going down to Danescourt where other buses can be caught. I worked with Cllr Davies on this idea, but we have heard nothing back.

Drovers Way

The lights have arrived in the alley way between Plymouth Drive and Drovers Way playground. We are looking to see if we can find funding for some more lights along the path. Parc Radur Management Company are leading the search.

The fields that belonged to Cwm Farm

This has upset the people who live close to the fields and others, dog walkers (that includes me), ramblers, residents in Morganstown. Despite all the Councillors in Pentyrch and Radyr and Morganstown doing their best, there are no laws that the Council can call on to stop the work that has been done which has destroyed a lot of habitats. I would very much like a meeting with the owner of the fields to find out whether he has done this work with the aim of improving the land agriculturally.

Youth clubs

Now the new maths block has been built at Radyr Comp, the Cardiff Youth Services CYS will start holding a Youth Club there on Fridays starting on 7th March. The Monday session at Radyr Hub will close after Feb 24th and the Thursday Session will continue to be held in the Radyr Hub. Huge thanks to the Community Council for the commitment they have shown to providing youth facilities in the ward.

Local Development Plan

I am very pleased that the next stage of the Replacement LDP has been released, revealing that none of the candidate sites in Radyr and Morganstown have been taken to the next stage.

This is a huge victory for the community and fulfils a major pledge I made during the election.

The three sites were totally inappropriate for development: Goitre Fawr marked our ward's only green space

and ignored the enormous progress that will be made at Plasdwr over the coming years; the rail station car park is a new and well-used amenity that reduces the need to drive into the city; and land north of the M4 is generally regarded as a green wedge for Cardiff.

I must commend the R&M Local Development Group for their hard and expert work as well as the Community Council for this victory. The Deposit Plan has gone out for consultation so please do engage with it.

Drovers Way Park

I am pleased that the Council has now installed the lights along the path that links the park to Plymouth Drive. These were a much-needed addition in the community and I'm pleased they are finally in place. This will help residents with mobility and sight issues, and, hopefully, help people feel safer than before. I have been calling for this for a couple of years and am glad we now have what we need.

Cardiff Petanque Club

Looking for a new hobby?
To find a sociable activity, to make some new friends and play one of the fastest growing sports in the UK, then look no further than the Cardiff Harlequins Pétanque Club based at the Whitchurch site of the Cardiff Harlequins Rugby Club.

The Harlequins Pétanque Club was formed in December 2023 by a group of friends who shared a love of the game of pétangue and wished to play in a friendly and welcoming environment. Pétanque, or boules, is a hugely popular game in Europe, particularly France. It is a very straightforward game where opposing players seek to have as many of their own boules, as opposed to their opponents, closest to the 'jack' at the end of each play.

The pistes (as the playing surfaces are known) that were located at the Harlequins Rugby Club had fallen into disrepair and lay dormant since COVID. They needed to be cleared, repaired and resurfaced to enable the new club to come into being and start actively playing.

The hard work necessary in this endeavour was carried out and completed by its own members, giving up their free time to ensure everything was perfect for the first season.

Everyone 'mucked in' doing what they could, using whatever skills they possessed in this common endeavour. There

were curses and moans, and aching muscles, but the task was completed in a remarkably short period of time. From commencement of work, the initial 'chuck in' (the first game) took place within a week.

Since the founding of the Club, it has continued to make rapid progress. At the beginning of 2024, membership to the Welsh Pétanque Association (WPA) was made and accepted, enabling those members who wished to develop their playing skills and pit themselves against other local pétanque Clubs the opportunity to do so. In the Spring, the Club entered three teams into the WPA National League on a competitive basis, playing against some of the best players in the country. We have certainly put the Harlequins on the map with some fine results achieved, with some of the players qualifying to represent Wales against the Home nations.

Of course, this element of the game is not for everyone. Many of our club members simply like to play boules with their new friends in a comfortable, relaxed environment that our various Club days during the week provide.

During the Summer of 2024 the club was delighted to be selected to host both the WPA National Mixed Singles and Mixed Doubles Competitions; and plans to work closely with the WPA are progressing to enable us to stage further competitions and establish the club in the wider world of Pétanque.

Any club is of course only as strong as its membership. The Harlequins are very keen to recruit new players to its club. Previous experience of playing is not required, it's a very easy game to pick up and the playing rules are relatively straight forward. Age is not a restriction, we have players of all ages including some in their eighties. An additional bonus if one is considering taking up the game, is that little is required in way of equipment, just a set of boules going forward. We are able to help newcomers with the opportunity to play with different sets before making a decision about buying. Compared to other sports such as golf and bowling, this is a very affordable pastime.

Cardiff Rivers Group: Making a difference since 2009

No-one walking along the Taff trail can fail to notice that the river carries quite a lot of litter. It's especially bad after heavy rain, such as Storm Bert, when a lot of rubbish is washed downstream.



The river banks are strewn with all kinds of detritus, from plastic bottles to shopping trolleys and tyres. Tree branches overhanging the water are festooned with plastic and sewer-rag.

Fortunately, there is a valiant bunch of volunteers who for 16 years have been dedicated to improving our waterways and their surroundings. Cardiff Rivers Group (CRG) often descend on the Taff at Radyr together with the Radyr and Morganstown Litter Pickers, bringing up to seventy willing folks to blitz both the river and Taff Trail of the accumulated detritus. Some of CRG's volunteers are specially trained to work safely in the water in



waders or even in their little boat to get at litter that is inaccessible from the shore.

As well as litter-picking, Cardiff Rivers Group volunteers also undertake habitat management. Under the direction of Cardiff Council's urban park rangers, they're frequently found cutting back reeds, removing self-set saplings or 'balsam bashing' - pulling up the invasive Himalayan Balsam.

CRG's previous visit to Radyr Weir was during the Big Cardiff Tidy last autumn when volunteers removed 56 bags of rubbish and loads of bulky fly tipping from the area. Their services are in demand all along the city's river banks, but they're sure to be back to Radyr soon and anyone can get involved - there is more than enough litter for everyone! It's a great way to make a difference to our city, as well as being a perfect opportunity to get some exercise, meet people and socialise.







Review: A Bunch of Amateurs

November 2024 saw our local drama group perform A Bunch of Amateurs which was written by lan Hislop and Nick Newman.

It was originally written for the big screen and premiered in 2008 at that year's Royal Film Performance. It boasted a big name cast that included Burt Reynolds, Derek Jacobi, Imelda Staunton and Samantha Bond and was an immediate hit with H.M. The Queen, so much so that she asked for a further screening at Sandringham that Christmas.

It tells the story of washedup Hollywood action hero Jefferson Steel, who hopes to re-ignite his waning career by accepting an invitation to play King Lear at Stratford. But he discovers on his arrival in England that he will not be performing with the RSC, but with the Stratford Players at Stratford St. John in Suffolk, who hope that Steel's presence in their production will help raise money to save the local theatre from being bulldozed for executive homes.

The play has threads of Shakespeare's "King Lear" running through it, but it is clearly character driven. The characters are clearly drawn, and you

may recognise some of them, but each person does represent the types of people that you can find in some groups - but not all I hasten to add!

This production, directed by Peter Stickler, was slick. The pace was good, the timings for the comic lines and action were perfect. The male lead of Jefferson Steele, was played by Jonathan Wheeler, sporting a dubious "rug". He kept the pace going and used pauses effectively. Alongside Jonathan, the female lead was played by Mel McLeod. She had the air of the "suffering in silence" / "The show must go on" director. Trying to soothe Hollywood egos along with overexcited members of her group.

The rest of the characters were made up of Nigel Dewsbury (played by Chris Locke), Denis Dobbins (played by Tony Allen) Lauren Bell, (played by Ceri Murphy) Jessica Steele (played by Hayley Wilkin) and Dorothy Nettle (played by Helen Blundell)

This bunch of amateurs (literally!) helped with comic timing and keeping the pace going. There were some excellent accents, characterisations, subtle underplaying which

added to hidden backstories (in particular Ceri Anderson's performance was incredibly sensitive to her back story)

Whilst I've highlighted the two leads, I have to stress that this was once again an incredible ensemble team. If there had been a weak link, the play would not have worked.

The audience enjoyed it immensely, picking up the wit before the line was given or laughing and applauding at the comic antics, in particular Tony Allen and his eyes!

The set was basic but served the purpose of multiple locations. The lighting and sound were both good.

If there is one small niggle, it would be that the scene changes were a bit long. I appreciate there were a lot of props and costume changes that needed to take place, but I would suggest that a dark blue light and not closing the tabs would have allowed the audience to watch some action, showing them the value of the backstage team, who in this case was Nicky Webber, Gill Evans, Andrew Huesch, Tony Watson and Dave Burgess, and how important the backstage crew actually are to a production.

One last note, even the director got in on the act with a small cameo - well done!

All in all, this was one play that highlighted the art and pain of amateur theatre and hopefully explained to the audience why Radyr Drama continue to perform plays of high standard.

Côr y Gleision was formed in 2006 as part of the S4C series "Codi Canu", which aimed to encourage rugby supporters to bring traditional Welsh singing back onto the rugby terraces. Many members had never sung in a choir before, but found the experience so positive that, although "Codi Canu" ended in 2008, the choir continued to grow and develop. The choir now has more than 100 members.

A joyous occasion

On 20 December 2024 Marcelle Davies was ninety years old, and the following day she celebrated in the company of family and friends. As we chatted, I understood that Marcelle's late husband Glyn Davies, paid for the first issue of the original Radyr Chain. Marcelle and Glyn came to live in the then new Castle View Estate in January 1970, and later moved to Windsor Road, Radyr.

Glyn Davies was Group Scout leader in the village for several vears, and Marcelle ran jumble sales and bazaars to raise money for the Scout Group. She was Church Secretary for thirty years. After retiring as a French teacher in industry (at Dow Corning in Barry), Marcelle volunteered with several charities including Life for African mothers and BAWSO. Here she has kindly agreed to share some of her memories.


From Marcelle

I was born in 1934 in the commune of Boitsfort on the outskirts of Brussels, near the Forêt de Soignes that leads all the way to Waterloo. I lived a happy childhood with father, mother and two older sisters and my paternal grandmother ('Bonbonne' to me). My mother was English, born and brought up in London, and my father was a French-speaking Belgian. Bonbonne spoke Flemish. We three girls spoke all three languages, though educated in French.



It was a very happy childhood until the Second World War broke out when the Germans invaded their neighbouring countries. My family attempted to go to England to meet up with my mother's family. On the first day we reached Ostend, but whilst we waited for the boat, a German bombardment destroyed the port and the electricity supply. There would be no boat nor train to reach France. We spent the night in a cinema opened for the considerable number of refugees. Overnight my father had decided that we would walk to the next port, Calais, but when we reached a point in sight of it in France, we could see that Calais was on fire. So, we went on the road to the next port in Dunkirk.

Yet more walking, then sleeping on the road. We were tired and hungry. German planes were striking the civilians on the road and frightened us. After that long, long journey we were too late - the British forces were now retreating from France, and Dunkirk was under bombardment.



We were given refuge on a farm slightly inland for three weeks or so until, after travelling in the back of a German lorry, we were repatriated to Belgium.

I will not speak of the suffering we all endured in one way or another until Brussels was liberated in September 1944 by Welsh and Irish Guard regiments - our area by the Irish Guards.

I was ten years old in 1944 when we heard that the British forces had landed in France. People on the streets began to dance when this news arrived, but when I went to tell my mother I found her crying. She explained that so many young boys had lost their lives in order to help the people of Belgium. And, strangely enough, in Italy that day her youngest brother was killed in the battle of Monte Cassino.

Gradually life improved and my family was much helped by our friends from the Irish Guards. Six years later, in 1951, sadly my father died when he was 55 years old. It was then that my mother and I came to live in Cardiff with my sister Irene and her husband Eric Brace. Irene had married the soldier she loved - a Welshman from the Glasgow Highlanders.





Prior to 1951 I had spent holidays in Cardiff and had made friends there, so I adapted easily to my new life. I attended : Ely, and in 1956 I married my childhood friend, Glyn Davies.

We were happily married for over sixty years and were blessed to have three children: a daughter and two sons. All of my children were married at Christ Church, Radyr, by our family friend the Rev. Bill Barlow. Sadly, my husband died in 2017 of pancreatic cancer.

I live with my daughter Giselle and son-in-law David Warren, and am lucky to be looked after so well living in the Coach: House of their house "Weir House". Also living in Radyr are my much-loved son Chris and my daughter-in-law Teena Davies. My younger son married a Polish girl and they live in Brussels. Simon and Justyna remain attached to his family and visit often.

With my friends in the Knit and Natter group at the Radyr Hub, I enjoy knitting and crochet, making baby blankets, hats, teddies, and related articles, and I remain a Soroptimist. That gives you a brief survey of my life aged ninety.

Say hello to the "New Vicar"



My name is Mary Evans, and perhaps I can go on saying I'm the 'new vicar' of Christ Church Radyr and St John's Danescourt for a bit longer: it gives me the opportunity to introduce myself which is very welcome.

I grew up in eastern Canada but have now lived in the UK longer than I lived there, so my accent comes and goes a bit! I grew up going to church and have never left it, singing in the choir and serving from very young. I became a lay reader when I was in university, and studied music, as well as playing ice hockey. I came to the UK in 1999 for what was meant to be a gap year, but my plans quickly changed and I'm still here now. I'm sometimes asked if I would ever return to Canada but with three children here, I don't see it happening any time soon!

I've lived in Brighton, Oxford, and Weymouth, and settled in Swansea in 2007 where I began training for ordination through St Michael's College. I was ordained in Brecon in 2012 and served my curacy on the Gower in the Parish of Three Cliffs, which I enjoyed very much. My children were still very young, so I was non-stipendiary.

In 2015 we moved to north Wales, where I had care of Holy Spirit, Ewloe, a church in the Hawarden Benefice, itself going through a transition to a ministry area. My sons began singing in Chester Cathedral choir, which was the beginning of a happy association with the cathedral over several years.

I've had a break in ministry, and immediately before coming here I worked as a verger in Chester Cathedral. My chief responsibility was looking after its live-streamed worship on YouTube and providing onscreen texts to enable Sunday worship to be 'paperless'. I found worshipping online via Zoom and YouTube fascinating and I've changed the subject of my ongoing doctorate to study it more.

I interviewed to come here in January 2024 but with

various steps to take to return to ministry, and for my younger two children to finish the school year, we only moved to Cardiff at the end of August. They have begun at Bishop of Llandaff High School which they're enjoying, and my eldest is studying music at Royal Holloway.



Radyr Hub

Books are wondrous things to me, and I have always loved libraries. They're open doors to a wide world. I was very fortunate where I lived as a youth as I had access to four well stocked libraries, which helped my studies enormously. We are very fortunate to have our own library in Radyr and Morganstown, Radyr Hub, which was opened by Glamorgan County Council in 1973 (see image) when there was considerable housing development here.

South Glamorgan took it over in 1974 and now the Hub is run by Cardiff Library Service with support from the Council's Wellbeing team.



Completely refurbished in 2012, Radyr Hub, managed by Karen (on left in image) with support from Becky, is open every day except Thursday and not only lends written and audio books but offers access to a range of Council and other services, including housing and schools, bus passes and blue badges. Suzanne (on the right) supports the team by organising community activities including a walking group, Knit and Natter, a Bridge Group, Welsh, French and Italian conversation and much more.

You will receive a warm welcome from the staff and the eight volunteers, who help the team and organise community groups and weekly story times. Computer access, printing, study areas and a scanning station for uploading housing benefits evidence are also available. There are community spaces with comfy seating and a cosy children's area, complete with book den. One feature, welcomed by many, is the ability to order books online and direct with the team.



The Council also delivers youth services from the Hub two evenings a week and provides period dignity products via the Hub and a service for identifying STIs.

The hub is open from 10am-1pm and 2pm-6pm on Monday, 10am-1pm and 2pm-5.30pm Tuesday and Wednesday, 2pm-7pm on Friday and 10am-1pm on Saturday. Please call in and find out more. You'll be surprised by what you find!
