Starting as normal with the Fete where there were performances from both local primary schools and we had more stalls than in previous years, in the first week there were three very successful and well attended events: our Wine and Cheese evening, Science with a pint, held this year in the OCR, and a lunchtime concert, performed by David Thomas,

to celebrate the new organ at Christ Church. Party in the Park took place on the middle Saturday in the grounds of Radyr Primary School with great performances from some very talented individuals and groups. Thanks go to the school for letting us use their grounds for both this event and the fete.

On the Sunday the pace dropped with a stroll around the Open Gardens. This year we had even more gardens opening and we would encourage other people to open their gardens in future years. With the plant stall in the Old Church Rooms this event alone raised over £1,500 for the charity.

A highlight of the second week was the Friday Jazz evening by Cube, always a well attended event. The Festival ended on Sunday evening with a charity concert in Christ Church by Côr Y Gleision.



Unfortunately, three events had to be cancelled this year due to low ticket sales, nevertheless we still managed to raise over £5,000 for the charity. St John Ambulance Cymru are our charity for the year, not just the festival, so we will be collecting for them throughout the year, including all the Christmas events

Roadworks of interest

Golf Course Lane

The bottom end of Golf Course Lane (nearest Llantrisant Road) has been closed since mid May and is expected to remain so until the middle of the Autumn. This is to allow contractors associated with the PlasDŵr developments to work across the lane without dealing with any traffic.

Whilst this lane has been closed to vehicles for over 4 years now it was regularly used by many as part of their walking routes.

Access between Bryn Derwen and Llantrisant Road is still possible on foot for those who are able to negotiate the public footpaths across the bottom of the Golf Course.

Fairwater

A 70-year-old culvert under St Fagans Road in Fairwater will be replaced this summer to ensure the water from the stream, which flows alongside Fairwater Road, can pass freely underneath the carriageway.

The water from the stream then passes through private land by the Fairwater public house, south along Cartwright Lane before being discharged into the River Ely.

To ensure the culvert can


be replaced between July and September this year, on Wednesday (June 11th), lane closures were put in place on St Fagans Road between Cartwright Lane and Fairwater Road for five weeks so utilities can be diverted.

Once the utilities have been diverted, St Fagans Road at the junction with Cartwright Lane will close between July 25th and September 2nd so the culvert can be replaced.

Cllr Norma Mackie, Cabinet
Member for Waste, Street
Scene & Environmental Services at Cardiff Council said:
"This scheme involves essential work on the highway to ensure that water from the stream can be channelled under the

road. Due to the age of the structure, it must be replaced to ensure that it does not fail."

"Due to the possible disruption this work will cause, the culvert is being replaced during the summer holidays when there is less traffic on the highway network. A diversion route has been put in place for local residents to navigate around the works and we have also been working with bus companies to reduce the impact on their services. Those who do not live locally are advised to use main routes, such as the A48, Cowbridge Road West, Western Avenue and Llantrisant Road. We would like to thank residents for their patience while this essential work takes place."



The importance of political engagement

Radyr, as well as everywhere else in Wales and the UK, must commit to political engagement.

The average turnout rate for 2024's general election was just 60%. This was the lowest figure since 2001 - furthermore, the last Senedd election of 2021's average was only 47%. It's more apparent than ever that we in Radyr need to become more politically engaged and to turn the tides on voter apathy, as without grassroots involvement in democracy, we have weaker representation in government and face a future of politicians disconnected from their constituents. If we want decisions that represent our feelings, we must provide our opinions, connect with those in office, and catalyze our community to advocate for the social issues they believe in.

This is not to advocate for any one type of political involvement, any one party, or any one ideology; any engagement is important, working directly with politicians or joining external groups. I have compiled a few methods below which may prove particularly effective and are ultimately rather simple and easy. We must support pluralism at all levels.

Voting

The obvious way in which to communicate with those in power and maintain a healthy democracy is by providing politicians with a clear mandate; the issue here perhaps lies with people seeing one vote as useless or not knowing how to register. It's a pretty simple process - just google instructions, keep an eye on your emails, and remember to use voter id. Just one vote can tip the balance in a referendum or election, so please don't feel that yours is useless!

Emailing a Councillor, MS or MP

Maintaining a healthy dialogue between constituents and our representatives is essential, even if nothing comes of requests or queries; we must not hesitate to remember that the people govern, not those in power, and politicians work for the masses. We should jump at any chance to ask an MP, for example, to vote a certain way in Parliament if there is a bill about to pass through it concerning an issue close to one's heart. For example, I recently emailed my MP to ask them to vote in favour of an amendment to a bill. Additionally, one could go out on a limb and ask your MS to visit your school or youth group, online or in-per-

son. MS Mark Drakeford, for example, has been a fantastic example of a politician with a strong connection to young people as he gave a Q&A session at Radyr Comprehensive in February. Emailing politicians is a great way to quickly and respectfully get a point across, and perhaps we don't utilize this tool as much as we should. As public servants, politicians shouldn't be seen as elite, unreachable figures - we should maintain a more open relationship with them and provide valuable bottom-up perspectives for them to consider. Professional email addresses are typically found online with guidance on how to address the subject.

Petitions

A rather direct manner of expressing your political beliefs, and one that perhaps gains more attention and appears to have more legitimacy should it get a high volume of signatures. The directions for creating a petition can be found online, courtesy of the UK government - local, regional or national issues can be raised in this method, depending on who the petition is directed to and who controls the subject

concerned. It's true that even with the guaranteed debate achieved with 10,000 signatures in the Senedd and the UK Parliament, the issue may not be enacted, but the very fact that you can raise awareness of an issue means that you could inspire further conversation around it either in government or in your community. They're easily created online if you read the guidelines to the process.

Volunteering with a charity

Political engagement doesn't have to relate to any one party. With summer approaching and itics doesn't affect their daily young people having weeks of free time, this is the perfect opportunity to do something meaningful (not to mention it looks great on a CV or personal statement). It's easier than ever to get involved in meaningful causes, whatever those are to you - some include Pride Cymru, Cardiff Women's Aid, Cardiff Mind, or Cardiff Dogs Home.

Responding to government consultations

Perhaps this opportunity is lesser-known, but we can influence decisions being made at the highest levels if we take advantage of it. The UK government invites people to share their views on an issue to help inform decision-making in almost all policy areas - these can be found online. This is a great way to inform those

in power and have your say on what matters to you in the country. Take advantage of it!

Youth engagement

The above methods are of course also open to young people, as long as they are 18 and registered to vote in UK elections, or 16 for Senedd ones. However, these are more specific to young people, and in a time when young people, according to a report published in March 2025 by The Electoral Commission, are not very interested in UK politics, due to feeling as though pollives. However, the report also found that about 2/3 of young people believe that it's important to learn more about UK politics. Perhaps, in this case, the answer is to show young people what impact politics and their involvement in it can have on where they live, and to foster closer relationships between politicians and this demographic.

Joining a youth council or forum

Speaking from personal experience, youth councils are particularly effective and encouraging places which can awaken one to the impact that collective voices and action can have in democracy - Cardiff Youth Council is an incredible group to join either as someone already interested

in politics or for anyone who wants to learn more about political systems in the UK or make their voice heard when voting on agendas. Projects such as Rights Fest, which CYC was largely involved in, yielded their report on gender equality in Cardiff being presented to representatives from the public services board and Cardiff Council, reflecting the power young people have when they organize projects collectively.

Raise money for a charity in school

It's one of the most common (and fun) ways to fundraise and help a worthy cause, including some already listed. Joining a student council or becoming a House Captain can enable you to do this in all sorts of ways. Becoming part of systems like this whilst still in school can mean you learn how governments or councils work on a smaller scale, helping to inform you when you later come to vote and learn about politics.

Get out there!

All of which to say...get out there! Make your voice heard! Make use of the opportunities available! Our community can make a difference. An act as simple as volunteering on the weekends or sending an email to a politician on a whim encourages greater pluralism and means that a 'government by consent' thrives. If you have a spare hour or so, please register to vote. If you have a spare weekend, volunteer with a charity or a party.

There is no democracy without strong engagement from the masses; even if you think that one vote or one petition doesn't matter amidst millions of UK citizens, please don't fall prey to the trap of political apathy, though it can be understandable in these times of the news's bleak tone and an increasingly complex world. Still, we must try, as seemingly tiny acts of grassroots involvement form the basis of any healthy democracy.

Defibrillators

Over the past few years a number of defibrillators have sprung up around Radyr and Morganstown. Do you know where they can be found and what to do if someone collapsed with a cardiac arrest and you were the nearest person? I certainly didn't.

What is a Defibrillator?

It is a medical device used to deliver an electric shock to the heart, typically to restore a normal heartbeat in cases of cardiac arrest.

Where can they be found?

There are defibrillators;

- Outside the Ty Nant Inn.
- Inside The Morganstown Village Hall.
- In a box in the hedge near the main entrance to Bryn Deri Primary School.
- Outside the Old Church Rooms.
- Outside Radyr Eye Care in Station Road.

One of our County Councillors, Calum Davies, has kindly offered to give another defibrillator and we are looking for a suitable location around the Comprehensive School.

What can I do?

What should you do if someone has a cardiac arrest and you are the nearest person.

Phone 999 and ask for an ambulance. Say where you are. The operator will give you a code to get into the nearest box containing a defibrillator.

Make sure that the patient does not have a pulse and is not breathing. You should start cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), pressing down hard on the chest 100 to 120 times a minute, continue until professional help arrives. Ideally there will be someone else near to you to fetch the defibrillator, remember to give them the entry code to the box.

Once you have the defibrillator it talks you through the process.

Are you still uncertain?

St John Ambulance have a very good short video on their website. You can opt out of a longish advertisement after a few seconds.


Radyr Branch of St John Ambulance are planning a number of short demonstrations to be held at the Old Church Rooms in the autumn. Look out for posters.

Remember that your prompt action could save a life. Know where the defibrillators are and be prepared to use one.

Radyr's tiny treasures

Isn't it wonderful to spot wild orchids and exquisite butterflies around Radyr and Morganstown? My antennae were tuned in this Spring as I had an opportunity to learn more about the mind-boggling number of species (across Europe) from two botanical specialists. One of them, Dr Elizabeth Cooke, works for the charity Plantlife. You may have heard her on the national news in early June celebrating the return of the Lady's Slipper Orchid. It is growing wild in the UK for the first time in almost a century. She described it as 'the crowning glory of Britain's wild flowers - one of the rarest and most impressive'.

I met Dr Cooke on a week-long nature-lovers' tour in May. Although her work is based primarily in the UK, she co-led an amazing visit to the alpine landscape of the Vercors in France. I was fortunate to be part of this group. The day before leaving for the train journey from St Pancras to Lyon, I spoke with one of the Chain Gang hosting an Open Garden in Radyr. My excitement must have been infectious, as she asked me to share something of the French adventure upon my return.

Well, we saw Monkey Orchids, Military Orchids, Fly Orchids, Green-winged Orchids, Burnt Orchids, Early Purple Orchids, Elder-flowered Orchids, both of the pale yellow variety and magenta pink. We crept up close

to Dingy Skippers, Pearl-bordered Fritillary and, prince of butterflies, Scarce Swallowtail. We delighted in Trumpet Gentians, a gorgeous white Pasqueflower, Wild Tulips and more.... Marmots, Chamois, Griffon Vultures and Alpine Chough.

No doubt some readers will know of all these, but most were first sightings for me. And I've come back to a much deeper appreciation of the Common Spotted Orchid just a stone's throw from my home. Sixteen pale purple blooms are gracing the Radyr garden as I write.

The salutary nature of Dr Cooke's media message about the Lady's Slipper (we saw one in bud on the slopes of a French woodland) was that it came so near to extinction in the UK because people picked them. For this reason, the careful cultivating of the Plantlife

team meant keeping the location of this beautiful orchid secret. For the same reason, I'm reluctant to be precise about the Radyr whereabouts, even if 'ours' are of the Common Spotted variety.



I'm reliably told that this little butterfly, photographed in Radyr just before my expedition, is a Common Blue. Let's hope that they remain common for many years to come.





We are no longer able to accept larger adverts (e.g.half page) and the advertising team will confirm with current advertisers all size and price details to ensure consistency.



The Old Radyr Quarry

Mention the Radyr Quarry, and most people living in R&M would think you were referring to the quarry that overlooks Morganstown - but for around 50 years until 1908 there was a quite different quarry in Radyr. It produced a building stone, sold as "Radyr Stone" for commercial and domestic projects. This quarry was located below the area that is now occupied

by Danescourt and the comprehensive school. Close by was the track of what's now called the City Line, and there was even signal box: "Radyr Quarry Junction".

Radyr Stone was originally quarried for the construction of the Penarth docks, and carried there by rail. It was used for the Gorsedd stone circle at the 1899 National Eisteddfod, now in Cathays Park, and for a number of bridges on the Taff Vale Railway (notably the "Three Arches") - but you don't have to go that far to find some other examples of its use.

The technical bit



Radyr Stone is a 'conglomerate' - a sort of natural concrete made from a complicated mix that includes a red sandy base with limestone pebbles em-

bedded in it. It was laid down in desert conditions during the Triassic period (around 220 million years ago). The sandy material is softer than the limestone, so weathering causes the limestone pebbles to become more prominent (see opposite). Radyr Stone is quite a different rock from the one produced in the Taffs Well quarry; that's a hard form of Dolomite suitable for roadstone.

The expert on the former Radyr Quarry is a Llandaff resident,

Michael Statham. The timeline above was compiled from information in his article "The History of Radyr Quarry and Radyr Stone"

This recent view is reproduced by kind permission of Rhian Kendall of the British Geological Survey.





Another blitz is planned for August.

We continue to collect 40-50 bags a month and recruit new members, thanks to the publicity which we get in The Chain. There are now 49 of us. Much of what we collect now is takeaway food and drink packaging thrown from vehicles which mirrors the findings from Keep Wales Tidy's recent Report. This emphasised that

the litter problem in Wales is getting worse largely because of the rise in takeaway food.

We have also focused on the lane behind the Station Road shops following requests from local residents and our two Councillors, one of whom has spoken to one of the shops. We will monitor the situation.

We have recently received a grant from the Community Council, for which we are most grateful. This will ensure we can continue our work for the next three years at least.

Review: Gaslight

Radyr Drama Society opened the May Festival with three well attended performances of Patrick Hamilton's Gaslight. Although written in the 1930's it is set in the late Victorian or Edwardian period.

Rightly described as a "psychological thriller," this spine chilling play exists on several levels. It involves Jack Manningham, a man with a past. As the play progresses we discover that he murdered an elderly inhabitant of the house for her jewellery, jewellery which he cannot find and which he searches for on a nightly basis.

This was a difficult play to

perform as two hours of playing time is taken up largely by three characters, Manningham, his wife Bella (whom he is trying to drive mad) and a Police Inspector. Three parts which demanded skilful playing: Melanie McLeod as the wife; Peter Stickler as the husband: and Jonathan Wheeler as the Police Inspector. All three played with consummate control, it would have been so easy to overplay these parts and make the play into a melodrama. something that the director Chris Locke, skilfully avoided.

Pauline Watson as the housekeeper and Helen Blundell as the sassy maid made up the cast with two delightfully nuanced performances.

The other star performer was the set and lighting. Cleverly designed by Dave Burgess, the heavy Victorian set with its gaslights gave the right atmosphere for this spine chilling thriller. Every time the gaslights on the set dimmed, you knew that Manningham was searching the distant reaches of the house and nearby houses, for the missing jewellery.

All the other departments contributed to the success of the play: excellent costumes by Sandra Geen, atmospheric sound and music by Tony Watson and period props by Nicky Webber. A thoroughly enjoyable evening.

Morganstown & **Radyr Allotments**

By Peter Fortune

Many of you may be unaware our Community has its own allotment site, the Morganstown and Radyr Allotment Association off Ffordd Treforgan in Morganstown, next to the Ty Nant.

The earliest record we have of the Association is a tenancy agreement dated 2nd February 1909 with The Earl of Plymouth for approximately two acres. The annual rent was £4. An expansion was agreed in 1917 presumably a result of the First World War "Dig for Victory" campaign. The site was expandthe new road was built as part of the Cwm Farm housing development in the Mid Nineties, and we now have a three acre site, with water supply, which is included in the rent.

We currently have 80 tenants, some of whom are experienced gardeners and have had plots for many years, some are inexperienced. We are a friendly bunch, and help is always readily available for new plot holders. Allotments as we know them today were first created in Wales as a result of the General Enclosure Act of 1845 that made provision for 'field gardens' to be used by the landless poor. There was a huge increase in allotments

during the two World Wars and by 1945 there were 1.5 million plots in Great Britain producing an estimated 1.3 million tons of food. The standard size of an allotment plot is 10 square perch, approximately 50 square metres, - which was enough to feed a family of four for a year, primarily from potatoes. Most of ours are smaller than this, however.

Since the COVID pandemic, there has been an increase in the demand for allotment plots and our waiting list has, in the past, extended to many years, although this has shown signs of slowing recently. Our annual rent is only £14 a year for our ed and moved slightly when standard sized plot although there is a small joining fee. We are now happy to welcome new people to our waiting list with a real possibility that you could start growing next season.

> As well as growing produce, there is a social element to having an allotment and our site has a wonderful, quiet aspect, backed by the beech woods on the slope of the Lesser Garth and with a full, often sunny, horizon. We regularly exchange seeds and seedlings and gardening equipment, extending on occasion to greenhouses or sheds.







We are now working towards the Autumn with the view to strengthen our roof in order to install solar panels. This will obviously lower costs further and also be far more eco-friendly and sustainable.





Faces were painted, tattoos and coloured giant stuffed unicorns from the soft toy stall made their way to new homes, leaving small children with delighted faces and their parents somewhat less enamoured! The tombola was incredibly popular, as were the penalty shoot-out and corn-hole games. There really was something for everyone as

our amazing community came together.

And on the subject of supporting the club, we couldn't host the festival and fund the club without the generosity of our sponsors. We are currently working on the basis of 3 editions per year in November, March and July.


There are 4 sizes of advert available for new advertisers:

- Size D: £80


We are no longer able to accept larger adverts (e.g.half page) and the advertising team will confirm with current advertisers all size and price details to ensure consistency.

Insole Court: Cardiff's

Hidden Gem

Less than 15 minutes from Radyr and Morganstown is Cardiff's Hidden Gem: Insole Court. The Insole family story mirrors Cardiff's rise and de-Treforgan WI visit to Highgrove : cline during the Victorian and Edwardian eras. The Insoles and mine-owners, with pits in Cymmer and Abertridwr, of Welsh Steam Coal's dominance of world industry.

> The family reached the height of its prosperity in the late 19th Century having acquired large land holdings, central to which was their home, the building of which was started in 1856 and survives in Llandaff, on Fairwater Road. In the 1880s the farmland surrounding the gardens was turned into an ornamental park. Between the wars the family died out and much of the land was taken by ern Avenue.

The building fell into disrepair

al of Insole Court is the culmination of 30 years of community campaigning. The house (which has benefitted from a recent internal and external renovation thanks to Lottery and CADW funding) and gardens are now open and are managed by the Insole Court Trust.

Radyr Chain 276 - Summer 2025

In 2018, a new permanent exhibition for visitors opened on the first floor. 'This House is a Stage', is an immersive audio walk-through drama, where the stories of the abandoned rooms come to life through a mix of technology and drama to tell the story of the Insole family, their triumphs and their tragedies.

Insole Court also offers many public events such as concerts, lectures, film screenings. market days and heritage and garden tours. The rooms are available to hire and the house is a popular wedding venue. There is a gift shop, popular cafe - The Potting Shed - and a second hand bookshop - Butler's Books.
