Congratulations to The Old Church Rooms team who have been very busy this year installing a wonderful new lift to make the 1st floor accessible. Such a great achievement for all involved. If you know anyone who would like to rent out rooms please spread the word, a new online booking system on our website, radyrandmorganstowncc.org, makes it very easy and quick!

The Council is gathering feedback on the rooms and facilities from regular users. Please forward your comments to clerk@radyr.wales to help us improve the service, we look forward to hearing from you.

Wonderful work continues by our councillors in the environment with delightful hanging baskets, new signs in Radyr Woods, litter picking and continuous support for maintenance of woodland. We also like to thank the Radyr Wood Wardens for their fantastic work. They're always welcoming new volunteers, so get in touch with the clerks if you'd like to join their friendly and fun working parties.

community council have objected to a pre-planning consultation of a telecoms mast in De Clare Drive. The Council has suggested a more suitable location.

Our councillors in finance have also been hard at work. This financial year a sum of £18,000 has been reserved for grants with over £4,000 already being awarded. For example, we provided small sums of money to enhance our primary schools' music extracurricular activities and helped the local comprehensive set up a Business Enterprise scheme and install a community garden. Of course, we also award an annual grant to the Radyr and Morganstown Association to help them run their annual fete.

### **Cardiff Bus** Service No.63: Use it or lose it!

As a Community Council, we have been in regular contact with Cardiff Bus to discuss how we can improve the service for everyone in the area. It is important to us to ensure that this service continues to serve the residents of Radyr & Morganstown, and the surrounding areas effectively.

However, the message we have received is loud and clear. If we don't use the bus, the service is at risk of being lost. It is therefore essential that we all support the service



by using it as often as possible. If the bus use increases, we have the potential to add further services.

The bus is a vital service for many in our community, especially for older residents or those who are unable to travel far to reach services or shops in Cardiff or Morganstown. For many in the older generation, the hills and steep streets in the area make walking long distances particularly challenging, making the bus an essential lifeline. Losing this service would mean losing an important link for many people.

So, whenever you are able, use the bus even for short or occasional journeys and in addition tell your friends! By doing so you are helping the community to keep a service that is essential to keep our community alive.

Meetings with Cardiff Council and Cardiff Bus are on-going, please help us to help you.

### **Station Road Improvement Project**

The Community Council continues to make steady progress on the long-awaited improvements to Station Road, the heart of our village and home to many valued shops and businesses. We have been in regular contact with Cardiff Council, and we are pleased to report that both Huw Thomas (Leader of Cardiff Council) and Simon Gilbert (Head of Planning) have expressed their full support for improving this vital area.

In the meantime, we would like to remind everyone how important it is to support our local businesses. Every purchase you make locally helps sustain the unique character and community spirit of our village. Without our support, we risk losing these businesses that play such a vital role in village life.

Together, we can make Station Road a place we're all proud of, a centre that serves the whole community, now and for years to come.

### Co-op update

In September members of the Community Council met with representatives of the Co-op. The Co-op intend to expand into the old Spar and make a considerably larger store in the long term, four or five years down the line.

In the meantime, they are planning to do some work which will improve the look of the corner plot and allow them to use the old Spar as a store. This means the roller blinds will be taken away, the metal trolleys will be stored inside and the whole corner plot improved. This is planned to happen in the next six to twelve months. Internally further improvements are planned in the next three to four years.

# Our Senedd is changing

From May 2026, the Senedd will have 96 Members, up from the current number of 60.

Since it was set up 25 years ago, the Senedd has had the same number of Members although its powers have grown significantly. It can now make laws and raise taxes decisions which affect the lives of every single person in Wales. Having more Members will give the Senedd greater ability to look at and challenge the Welsh Government's plans and spending on important issues like hospitals, schools, and transport.

This will give your community a stronger voice in these decisions.

Having 96 Members will also bring the Senedd in line with other countries of a similar size to Wales, like Scotland which has 129 Members and Northern Ireland which has 90. This will mean stronger representation for you, your family and your community.

If you're aged 16 or over and live in Wales, you can vote in the 2026 Senedd Election which is being held on Thursday 7 May.

Wales will be divided into 16 areas for the 2026 election. Radyr & Morganstown will be in the new "Caerdydd Penarth" constituency. Each constituency will have six seats in the Senedd.

Seats are allocated based on



the share of votes each party or independent candidate gets. The new system means that your vote is more likely to help divide the overall result, because seats in the Senedd will be allocated based on the total share of the vote.

The change will make your vote stronger than ever.

Political parties will prepare a list of up to eight candidates for each constituency. Independent candidates can also stand for election.

On election day you will be given a ballot paper and will have one vote for the party or independent candidate you want to represent you in the Senedd. Your ballot paper will show the full list of candidates in your constituency, so you can see who is standing for each party.

If a party wins enough votes, they will win one or more seats in the Senedd. So, if a party wins three seats in our constituency, the top three people on their list will

be elected to those seats.

### Who can I vote for?

Candidates are currently being chosen by their political parties and will be confirmed by 10th April 2026.

### Hustings

The RMA will be hosting a hustings event at the Old Church Rooms on Monday 13th April 2026 starting at 7.30pm. This will be a nonselective hustings where each party appearing on the ballot paper will be invited to send a representative to answer the questions that are important to Radyr and Morganstown residents.

# Green bin collections over the Winter

As a community, we all seemed to want a green bin collection through the winter. Lots of you sent me emails. It was helpful as it showed how much we needed the green bin collection. I wrote about green bins to the Cabinet Member with responsibility for waste collection and did a lot of lobbying last year.

Cardiff Council announced the resumption of fortnightly garden waste collections will now be year-round with a pause for two weeks over Christmas to redirect resources and manage the increased amount of recycling.

### Radyr Cricket Club

On 26th September, with our MP Alex Barros-Curtis, Chris Hitchings, Peter Sullivan from the Cricket Club and the Vice Chair of

the Community Council Iona Shariff, I met officers from Natural Resources Wales to discuss the way forward. We are keen to see the recent wall remain and to have some protection for the riverbanks against river erosion. Alex was there to ascertain what exactly is required from National Grid who also have an interest in preventing the riverbank eroding, as there are electricity cables going across the river just downriver from the Cricket Club.

# Section 106 funding and buses

Together with members of the Community Council I attended a meeting in mid-July about the Section 106 funding available for Radyr and Morganstown. Section 106 funding is money the developers have to pass to a Council for use in the areas they are developing to create amenities. We have had quite a lot of building in Radyr and Morganstown, so we do have some Section 106 funding due to us. Some of it is already ear-marked but some may be available to help us improve things in our area.

I received an email confirming the figures last week and am hoping we can steer some of that funding to improve our bus service Bus Priority 1 which is one of the biggest problems we have.

Now that they are aware of the Section 106 funding

due to us, they will look at what they can do to improve the bus service we have in Radyr and Morganstown. We have a meeting scheduled for 7th November by which time hopefully we will see some good news.

# Flooding under the M4 bridge

It is too early to celebrate but we have had some torrential rain in September and there has been no sign of even a respectable size puddle under the bridge. Cardiff Council did work on the drainage in the area during the summer. Hopefully our flooding there may have been sorted. Although as we all realise, the area will likely need work every year to stay clear.

### Flooding by Pughs Garden Centre

Still a puddle but not deep and not across the road. So an improvement. Hope someone will sweep the leaves that have started to fall on the edge of the pavement onto the drains. Will be asking the Council if they can do a leaf sweep.

### Senedd election

I am very pleased to announce that I've been selected by the local Conservative party to head its list for the Senedd in our new constituency consisting of Cardiff West, South, and Penarth. Voters will cast one vote next May under a reformed system, that will deliver six Members of the Senedd, from a variety of parties, for each constituency. You may see me knocking doors over the coming months as I spread the message. ### Migrant hotels

I brought a motion to Cardiff Council for debate, calling on the Council to inform the Home Office that it should cease housing illegal immigrants in hotels (which they don't always tell the Council they are doing!) and stop buying private property to house them in Cardiff. The British Government's approach only serves to further choke the housing supply available for people in Cardiff, including the 9,000 households on the local housing waiting list, and encourage small boat crossings.

Disappointingly, all other parties – including Reform UK – failed to back us, with only the Conservatives voting to protect Cardiff from the failures of higher levels of government. Other parties are, of course, free to disagree with us, but it was a shock to hear so many pretend there was no problem at all with this issue.

pedestrian crossing outside Christ Church in desperate need of remediation. I was later informed that this was added to the programme of works for this autumn. However, the Council has now announced this will be postponed until the next financial year due to financial constraints. This is disappointing to say the least, not only because of the dire state of the road here, but due to the number of common sense moneysaving measures Labour cabinet members have rejected.

# Meeting on buses

I was pleased to attend a meeting alongside Community Councillors with officers at Cardiff Council regarding our joint efforts to improve bus services in the ward. We have been firm and clear in our conviction that Section 106 funds from developments in our area should go towards service improvements in our area, and we believe there is scope for this to help with public transport in Radyr & Morganstown.

### **Roadworks**

Earlier this year, I was pleased to see some resurfacing works on Heol Isaf near Station Road. I informed the Council that while this was welcome, this was only part of the job, with the section including the





one of these to use for this edition, we wanted to show off all the entries here. I'm sure you'll agree they're all brilliant!



### **Contact**





### Radyr and Morganstown litter pickers

As well as trying to keep Radyr & Morganstown litter free, we have also spent some time recently on the Taff Trail and Longwood Drive, which is a popular walking route for many of us. We have collected over 125 bags of rubbish from there, jointly with Keep Rhiwbina Tidy and Cardiff Rivers Group, who also cleaned up the banks of the Taff. Since we started four years ago we have collected almost 3,000 bags of rubbish, most of this is take away food items and bottles and cans.

We have also reported 18 incidents of fly tipping to Cardiff Council, via their app. It is easy to do and anyone can report this; go to the Cardiff Gov App, choose "Report It" and scroll down to select fly tipping. Try to take a photograph to upload.

You can also use this App to report a litter bin which needs emptying.





Well, we all know what a lovely, warm and dry summer it has been. And all us gardeners were praying for rain. We must say, however, that it has been a good cropping year on the allotments and the apple trees were laden. Courgettes and runner beans have been prolific although this has now been shown up in our water bill, for we have a water supply on site!

Now it is time to clean up our plots and gardens, remove the weeds and dig the soil over to prepare for the frosts of winter. Some of us cover the ground with membrane which keeps the heat in, and stifles weed growth; many will add manure to the ground and then cover it. On the other hand there are those who argue to leave them open to the elements.

Either way, it is very important to nourish your soil with a layer of organic material if you can't get manure. Or if you are very ambitious sow green manure; seeds are available in Pugh's if you can get past the fabulous Christmas display.

Clear up any fallen leaves and either leave them on the ground so that they mulch in over the winter or bag them up with a small amount of water in a black plastic bag with a few holes punched in.

Some are planting winter crops from seed or potatoes for Christmas. Japanese onion sets are a favourite to plant now and they will produce crops in the Spring.

Give your tools and furniture a good clean and repair any fencing, clean your greenhouse, and ensure your compost bins are cleared out for continuous use. Also wash plant pots thoroughly to remove any risk of infection.



# Diary of a Conclave (part one)

It's Wednesday 7th May. Bethan the presenter, Sam the camera guy and I arrive at the Vatican, where the Conclave is about to begin. There are TV crews and journalists everywhere. It is bonkers!

At lunchtime, a few cardinals take their chance to escape before they're locked in, and are surrounded by journalists as they cross the piazza. The cardinals aren't surprised; they know the rules of the game, and it's probably fair to say they're enjoying their brief star status as pope-makers.

In the afternoon, a diplomatic incident. I meet a guest, Ann Ellis, who has lived in Rome for years, at a restaurant. When I ask for a cappuccino, the waitress gives me a really dirty look, and refuses. Then I remember Italians only have that in the morning, so I switch to orange juice. She accepts, and retreats into the building, muttering...

Later we expect the white smoke while we're on air, and Bethan is facing away from the Vatican, so asks me to signal to her if it happens while the programme is on. I get out my notebook, and write GWYN (white) in block caps on one piece of paper and DU (black) on the other. Who says the BBC wastes money?

The next day at just after 6 in the evening, I am close to the square when a man next to me gasps, and points at the huge TV screens; "Fumo bianco!", he cries. And sure



enough, there is definitely white smoke coming out of the Sistine Chapel chimney.

I am live on the radio within minutes, while it's pandemonium around me.

The piazza fills in minutes; the police say there are 40,000 here, but it feels like everyone in Rome has come.

A short time later, the window onto the balcony opens, and everyone knows the words that are coming: "Habemus Papam!". A few minutes later we see Pope Leo XIV for the first time as Pontiff. The piazza erupts. He speaks - a message of peace, of love and of building bridges.

Now it's time to get back to

work, but twenty minutes before air, we're in the square and our tech gives up. Sam phones his mates on the temporary BBC studio on the balcony of a nearby convent, and asks if there's any chance they've got a spare slot for us. They say they do, so we try to rush across the square, as best we can through the crazy crowds.

We finally get to the convent, and press the button for the lift, but nothing happens. Minutes pass.

10 minutes to air now and we are nowhere. The producer in Cardiff calls, understandably frantic and asks why he can't see us.

Missing our slot at the top of the programme on the day of the election is nothing but a Grade 1 disaster. We might as well not have come at all.

The lift arrives. We squeeze in. The lift moves. But only very, very slowly.



# Cardiff Nantes Exchange

Place Foch, Nantes, early Saturday morning in late September. As the city slowly prepares for another busy weekend, gentle chatter and fond farewells fill one corner of the square. After a week of fascinating visits and convivial gatherings in the company of our friends in Nantes, the Cardiff participants of the Association for the Cardiff Nantes Exchange are heading home. As the luggage is stacked neatly in the coach for the return journey, we're heartened by the prospect of meeting again in 2026.

As many readers of the Radyr Chain are doubtless aware, the city of Cardiff is twinned with Nantes, capital of the Pays de la Loire region in western France. The twinning of the two cities goes back to 1964. A number of formal and informal links have developed over the years. Adult linguistic exchanges began in 1981, with the aim of providing opportunities for participants to improve their language skills in French and English. The visits to Cardiff and Nantes are key features of the twinning between the two cities.

The enjoyment of developing links with France is, of course, familiar to many Radyr and Morganstown residents.

Over the years the Radyr and Morganstown Twinning Association led to lasting friendship with families in Saint Philbert de Grand Lieu, some 27 kilometres south of

Nantes. The official closure of the Association in 2024 marked the end of a fellowship that began in 1986. Although the formal exchanges have come to an end, it is pleasing that links with friends in St Philbert are being maintained, and plans are already under way for a small group of Radyr and Morganstown residents to visit St Philbert in 2026.

Whilst the long-established links with St Philbert may no longer provide the opportunities they were once able to offer, getting involved in the Cardiff Nantes exchange could be an ideal way of forging new friendships, and maintaining or reviving your French language skills. The arrangements for the exchange broadly follow the same format each year. A group of about 25 people from Nantes travel to Cardiff by coach and ferry. During their week-long stay with their hosts in Cardiff they get

an insight into everyday life in the city, and a programme of visits to local places of interest is arranged for them, with the hosts encouraged to join where they can. The same arrangements are put in place when the Cardiff participants travel to France: travelling by coach and ferry to Nantes, staying with hosts across the city, and travelling together to visit places of interest in the area. Participants of all language levels are welcome, and are encouraged to put their skills to use speaking French in France and English when in Cardiff.

This year our friends from
Nantes visited Cardiff for a
week in June, and welcomed

They had put together a varied
programme of excursions
that catered both for those

more recently. Following a visit to the Château des Ducs de Bretagne, a guided walk taking in some of the city's key landmarks provided a fascinating insight into the historical events that have shaped its development. We ventured further afield to the picturesque village of La Gacilly, with its museum tracing the development of the Yves Rocher cosmetics brand and a splendid openair photography festival. Another excursion took us to Angers, where we were guided through the narrow streets of the historic quarter and the Hôpital Saint-Jean, that houses a series of ten tapestries, Le Chant du Monde, designed by the twentieth-century artist Jean Lurçat. During our visit to Saint-Nazaire, between the Loire estuary and the Atlantic Ocean, we learned about the town's maritime, industrial and military heritage. Venturing down into the Espadon, the first French submarine to dive beneath the Arctic ice field. was a memorable conclusion to a fascinating day.

The week also provided an opportunity for quieter and more leisurely time with our hosts, exploring some of the less familiar corners of Nantes and relaxing over a meal. Together with the formality of the welcome reception at the Mairie, and the elegant venue of the festive dinner, these moments as well were an affirmation of the value that linguistic exchanges can bring.

The Association is always keen to welcome new members, and we would be delighted to extend that welcome to former members of the

Radyr and Morganstown-St Philbert twinning - or indeed to any other Radyr and Morganstown residents with an interest in developing links with France, French culture and the French language.





# New stone seat in Radyr Woods

To commemorate fifty years since the establishment of Radyr and Morganstown Community Council, a new stone seat has been built in Radyr Woods.

The circular seat was built by local dry stone waller and member of the Guild of Master Craftsmen, Richard Staniforth, over a month this summer.

The seat is a dry stone construction built using Blue Pennant stone.
The stone was originally quarried north of Neath.

The stone seat is located in the ancient woodland of Radyr Woods close to the site of an Iron Age foundry. It is situated close to the Pilgrims Way which is reflected by

the twelve seats (for the apostles) within the circle.

"It was a really exciting and enjoyable experience designing and building the seat in Radyr Woods. All of the many local people who visited the site, young and old, were universally enthusiastic. I imagine it as a meeting place, even a picnic site", Richard said.
